Is the Board of Health of the Health Department? I, Moran Morris, holding the position of Sanitary Inspector in the Health Department in the City of New York, do report : That on the 10th and 11th days of June, and other time, 1881, I did inspect carefully, and personally examined the street situated East One Hundred and Eleventh street, from Second to Third avenue, in the City of New York, and found the facts to be as follows : This street is found in a condition dangerous to life and detrimental to health, for the following reasons,viz.: It has never been paved; is built up on both sides with dwelling houses, private and tenement, in which there is a very considerable population; among these there have been very many cases of serious illness and quite a number of deaths during the past year, all of which is undoubtedly owing to the extraordinary condition of the street. At every rain the mud is from six to fourteen inches in depth; this is composed of black muck, largely mixed with the ashes, refuse, and garbage of the past winter and spring. It is almost impassable for loaded wagons, and in several places ponds of stagnant water constantly remain. The atmosphere is fearfully contaminated by the offensive exha-lations therefrom. lations therefrom.

Recommendation, That the Common Council be requested to pass an ordinance for the immediate paving of East One Hundred and Eleventh street, from Second to Third avenue, as a public necessary sanitary measure. MORAN MORRIS, M. D., Sanitary Inspector.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 11, 1881 :

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,572, as follows, viz. : 2 public buildings, 579 tenement-houses, 103 private dwellings, 73 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 11 stores and warehouses, 76 stables, 17 slaughter-houses, 3 lodging-houses, 1 market, 1 public pound, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 1 bone and rag-house, 1 brewery, 35 sunken and vacant lots, 2 lime-houses, 1 public sewer, 1 sausage factory, 77 yards, courts, and areas, 103 cellars and basements, 180 waste-pipes and drains, 229 privies and water-closets, 30 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 13 dangerous stairways, 4 cesspools, 6 smoky chimneys, 12 other nuisances. The total number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 669. During the past week 233 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. Permits were issued to the consignees of 104 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the

Permits were issued to the consignees of 104 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

219 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 161 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 136 houses, 136 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 53 cases of contagious diseases were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps, and 4 dead bodies to the Morgue.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 475 births, 45 still-births, 314 marriages, and 633 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 11, 1881; this shows an increase of 53 births, and 166 marriages, and a decrease of 8 still-births, and 27 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 67 births and 6 still-births, and an increase of 164 marriages, and 154 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 5; scarlatina 5; diphtheria 2; croup, 7; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 4; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 5; cancer, 6; pneumonia, 10; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; convulsions, 12; direct effect of solar heat, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 21; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; enteritis gastritis, and peritonitis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; pre-mature and preternatural births, 1; suicide, 3; while the deaths from measles increased 3; whooping cough, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; diarrhœal diseases, 28; phthisis pulmonalis, 10; bron-chitis, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular menin-gitis, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 12; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from typhus fever, heart diseases, and apoplexy was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchilis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1881.

CHAPTER 378.

An Act making an appropriation to carry out the provisions of chapter one hundred and thirty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and chapter three hundred and six of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventynine, entitled, respectively, "An act in relation to infectious and contagious diseases of animals."

Passed May 26, 1881 ; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

Section I. The sum of fifty thousand dollars, or so much as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury, not otherwise appropriated, payable on the warrant of the comptroller, on vouchers to be approved by the governor, for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of chapter one hundred and thirty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and chapter three hundred and six of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, entitled, respectively, "An act in relation to infectious and contagious diseases of animals." Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
