LABOR REPORT. The average number of male patients at work during the quarter was 112; they were employed as follows: 16 in kitchen, 40 in pavilions, 1 in carpenter shop, 2 in engine room, and 45 at shovel-ing coal, carrying clothes to and from the laundry, wheeling stones, removing freight from dock, removing snow and ice from roads, whitewashing, removing ashes and garbage from pavilions, blasting, preparing fertilizers, etc. Of the female patients, an average number of 365 have been daily employed in the following manner: housework, sewing and knitting, 310 ; in the laundry, 40; scrubbing offices, store, drug store, employees' rooms, etc. 8; as help for medical staff and officers, 7. Those employed in the laundry have turned out 100,656 pieces; for Hart's Island Asylum, 95,127, and for the Medical Staff of Ward's Island, 5,529. Those engaged in sewing and knitting have made 3,573 articles, and have repaired 33,923. Following is an itemized statement:

Of the zymotic diseases diphtheria and scarlatina show an increase over last week (6 and 10 respectively). Diphtheria is less prevalent than in the corresponding week of last year and scarla-tina more so, the number of deaths (32) being greater than in any week since that ending January 7, 1888, when there were 33. Diphtheria increased in the Fifth, Seventh, Twelfth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Seventeenth, Nine-teenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-third Wards, and decreased in the Fourth.
