the Twenty-fourth Ward, extending from Sedgwick avenue, near Morris Dock, to Fordham Landing road, and requesting the views of this Department in respect to said opening, and to report as follows:

"Cedar avenue" was laid out, the grades thereof established, and the location of the monuments defining its lines on the ground, shown on a map filed by this Department June 3d, 1873. The avenue was again shown and also classified on the map of the "Kingsbridge, Fordham Heights and Boscobel District," filed by this Department January 17, 1878. From Sedgwick avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of Burnside avenue, 1,645 feet, Cedar avenue was laid out 75 feet wide, and designated as a street of the first class. As it is presumed that this request was made pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, on 11th ultimo, requesting the Corporation Counsel to take the necessary proceedings to open said avenue between said limits, I am directed to recommend that the resolution be rescinded for the following reasons:

1. Bremer avenue is designated as of Class 1; is 3,389 feet less than one mile in length, and should, therefore, be opened throughout its entire extent, by one proceeding, from Jerome avenue to Birch street, in accordance with the two petitions heretofore presented by owners of the land fronting on the avenue.

2. The adoption of the resolution of the 11th ult. was premature. The grade and monument maps, or plans and profiles, showing and establishing the grades, dimensions and angles and the location of the monuments defining the lines of the avenue, from Jerome avenue to Birch street, have not yet been filed according to law; although your Board has been furnished with such maps. The map submitted by this Department, showing dimensions of the avenue between Devoe and Birch streets, has not even been adopted. Until such maps are filed, definitely defining the lines of the avenue, it was deemed by the Counsel to the Corporation in a similar proceeding—that of East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street—inadvisable to proceed with the opening (see opinion dated January 17, 1887, in minutes of your Board of March 16, 1887).

DEAR SIR—There has been of late considerable agitation upon the matter of widening and extending Elm street, and from what I hear and read, said street is likely to be continued. As executor of the estate of A. J. Johnson I protest against the extending and widening of Elm street if it shall (as contemplated) interfere with the property now used by me as an office and known as No. 11 Great Jones street. Said premises have been used and are at present occupied by me for business purposes and it will be most annoying and very expensive if Elm street is continued, and I do protest against the above-mentioned plan or scheme, and wish to go upon record as saying that I shall fight for my rights and those of the estate and shall not be easily beaten.

The Chairman of the Board said: "I think this question of the widening Elm street wants more study and more consideration than we have yet given it. The question of opening an outlet for the traffic below Chambers street is a vital one. It is going to cost the City some millions of dollars, and it ought not to be done until a careful examination is made of all the streets that would form good avenues. The hearings that we have had have not enlightened me on the subject, and I am in doubts about which street would relieve the jam that occurs at times on Broadway, and the side streets. There are a number of scientific bodies in this city who, if they were requested, would offer suggestions in regard to this. There are two societies, the Society of Civil Engineers, and the Society of Mechanical Engineers, who could give us valuable information. The jam is below Chambers street and the opening of Elm street won't relieve it. If Elm street is opened and widened you will find that the traffic pouring south will cause as big a jam, as at the present time and no relief will be afforded."

After the Mayor had finished speaking General Newton made a motion to refer the matter back to the sub-committee, and that the societies mentioned by the Mayor be requested to send suggestions to the Board.

The President of the Board of Aldermen, then coming in to the meeting of the Board of Street Opening, presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the matter of opening, widening and extending of Elm street, be and is hereby referred back to the Special Committee for further consideration and investigation as to the feasibility of adopting the Elm street route in preference to any other, whether the contemplated improvement of Elm street will accomplish the object of relieving the crowded traffic of lower Broadway and other parts of the city below Chambers street, and that the Committee consult with the Society of Civil Engineers and the Society of Mechanical Engineers and other scientific bodies of the city which would offer suggestions on the subject, and especially whether any extension of Elm street south of Chambers street and the widening of William street will afford the necessary relief.

The bidder to whom the award is made shall give security for the faithful performance of the contract, in the manner prescribed and required by ordinance, in the sum of Three Thousand Dollars.

The Engineer's estimate of the quantities of material necessary to be dredged in order to secure at each of the premises mentioned the depth of water set opposite thereto in the specifications, is as follows:

The work to be done under the contract is to be commenced within five days after the date of the contract, and the entire work is to be fully completed on or before the fifth day of September, 1887, and the damages to be paid by the contractor for each day that the contract may be unfulfilled after the time fixed for the fulfillment has expired, are, by a clause in the contract, fixed and liquidated at Fifty Dollars per day.

### PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

### NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or

plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
