

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING NOVEMBER 22, 1890.

Gen. EMMONS CLARK, Secretary Board of Health:

SIR-583 deaths were registered in this office during the week ending at noon of Saturday, November 22, 1890, representing an annual death-rate of 18.43 per 1,000 on an estimated population of 1,650,848.

Opening of Proposals.

The Comptroller, by representative, attended the opening of proposals at the following *Departments, viz. :

November 25. The Department of Public Works--For taking up the pavement and laying a trap-block pavement, and for regulating and paving with granite-block pavement in the several streets and avenues enumerated in the advertisement of said Depart-ment, dated November 12, 1890, published in the CITY RECORD.

The 583 deaths represent a death-rate of 18.43, against 20.33 for the previous week, and 20.01 for the corresponding week of 1889.

The decrease of 60 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 7 in the deaths from phthisis, 7 from apoplexy, 8 from bronchitis, 11 from croup, 7 from Bright's disease, and 11 from violent causes. There was an increase of 2 in the deaths from diphtheria, and a decrease of 3 in typhoid fever.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, is writing, specifying the ward number and street numbe, of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall theneeforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.
