## BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
NEW YORK, February 3, 1893.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 3 P. M., at the office of the Mayor.  
Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments and the Commissioner of Public Works and Colonel James Cavanagh.

The minutes of the meeting of January 12 were read and approved.

A communication was received from John R. Thomas, Architect, reporting favorable progress on the work of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory. Ordered filed.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments presented an application and affidavit from P. Gallagher for payment to him of \$13,498, on account of his contract for the erection of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, with the architect's certificate, that the work has been performed in accordance with the contract and specifications.

The following report was received from the Clerk of the Works:

NEW YORK, February 2, 1893.

Hon. E. P. BARKER:

SIR—I have to report that by the specifications and on the longitudinal sectional plans for the Seventy-first Regiment Armory building, it is specified that the concrete shall be twelve inches thick on top of the crown of arches under main drill-room floor.

The work as now being done, there is only room left for four inches of concrete on the crown of these arches. I have consulted with Mr. Thomas, the Architect, and he tells me that four inches of concrete is all that he intended to put on.

The work is not being done according to plans and specifications, and I beg to call attention to the matter.

An application of date January 7, 1893, was received from Edward B. Ives, First Lieutenant and Signal Officer of the Signal and Telegraph Corps, for furniture, which was referred to the Commissioner of Public Works.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments presented a form of contract and specification for work and alterations to be made to the armory of the Twenty-second Regiment, and offered the following:

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to advertise for bids and proposals for the work of alterations and repairs to the Twenty-second Regiment Armory building, which work was recommended by this Board at its meeting on November 10, 1892, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 1, 1892.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Works and Colonel James Cavanagh.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments presented the following:

To the Armory Board:

The undersigned, to whom was referred the application of Commander Miller for repairs and alterations necessary to fit the United States ship "New Hampshire" for the use of the First Naval Battalion, begs to report:

In company with Commander Miller and the Clerk of the Works of this Board a personal examination of the ship was made at her mooring at the pier foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river. The ship is in a fairly good condition—hull apparently sound as demonstrated by but little leakage. The necessary exterior repairs will cost but little, being mainly required in patching weather boarding and putting gratings and shutters in ports as a preventive against thieves, strengthening rudder head, cat heads, etc. The chief expense being in the alteration and rearrangement of the bulkheads between decks, a thorough overhauling of the plumbing and steam-fittings and putting in new water-closets and wash-rooms, a new boiler and steam-fitting for heating the entire ship and a complete cleaning and painting throughout—desks, chairs, stools, mess-tables and benches, etc.

The Clerk of the Works has made a careful examination and estimates the cost of the work necessary to be done at \$14,500, as follows:

Plumbing—To tear out wash-room, replace "head" with water-closets, fit up bath-room under top-gallant forecastle, tear out cockpit closet, provide new fresh water-pumps and scuttle butt, overhaul fire and bilge pumps, repair officers' water-closets and lead new galley connection. Horizontal boiler of sufficient size to heat ship properly, to be placed on orlop deck abreast forward hatch, etc.	\$5,500 00
Painting—Inside and out, including all cabins, wardroom and whitewashing holds. Repairs to joiner work, altering crew's quarters, including making four division rooms on lower gun deck, altering closets, change bulkheads, etc.	2,500 00

I consider this estimate to be a fair one, inasmuch as the ship is old and the full extent of the work necessary to be done can only be known when the old work is torn out and the condition plainly shown.

The plumbing and steam-fittings are old and worn out. To attempt to repair them would be useless, as they are of the most primitive character and totally unfitted for the use the ship is intended

The ship having been for years used as a school ship for the navy, and last summer, when the emergency arose, was used as a hospital ship at Quarantine, the entire plumbing, piping and sanitary condition needs careful looking after in order to protect the health of the members of the Naval Battalion.

It is proper to here state that the ship has been loaned by the United States Government for the use of the Naval Battalion for a period of one year, and while there is no guarantee that the loan will be either continued or withdrawn, it appears to be the duty of this Board, under the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, of date December 3, 1892, in which he states that the Armory Board "has the power to recommend to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that a sum be appropriated for the use of the Naval Battalion as an armory," to either repair this ship or provide other accommodations.

Commander Miller informs me that the limit of one year was specified in the loan by the Secretary of the Navy, in view of the coming change of administration of the Navy Department, and the unwillingness of the present Secretary to encroach upon the rights of his successor, but that every assurance may be anticipated for an indefinite continuance of the loan.

Inasmuch as it is the duty of this Board to provide accommodations for this battalion, in the same manner that it would for a regiment, and through the intervention of the State authorities, the ship has been secured for one year, and the amount as estimated for the necessary repairs to fit it to the use of the Naval Battalion would not largely exceed the amount that is annually expended by the City in rent for an armory for a regiment, or what the City would be compelled to pay for rent for a building, should one be hired for the use of this battalion, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment having made appropriation for the use of the Naval Battalion to maintain their armory or ship, the undersigned is of the opinion that the repairs and alterations as asked for should be made.

As I understand from Commander Miller, this ship has been practically condemned as of no further use to the United States Government, and had it not been loaned for the use of the Naval Battalion, would, as is the practice in such cases, doubtless have been ordered sold. In order to relieve the City or the battalion from any contingency arising by the failure to extend the time for which the ship has been loaned, I beg to suggest the idea that the Naval Battalion present a bill to Congress authorizing the permanent transfer of this ship to a continuance of its present use. If this is done, no question can arise as to the justification of the City in properly maintaining it for the use of the Naval Battalion for armory purposes.

I beg to recommend—

1st. That the repairs as asked for be made.

2d. That a recommendation be made to the Sinking Fund Commissioners authorizing the issue of bonds for \$16,000 in amount to cover the cost of the work and inspection of the same.

3d. That the specifications and contract be prepared and submitted to the Armory Board for approval that proposals for doing the work may be invited, and the work proceeded with so soon as duly authorized and the money for doing the same provided, and submit resolutions covering these recommendations for your consideration.

Resolved, That the Armory Board recommend repairs and alterations to the United States ship "New Hampshire," loaned by the United States Government for the use of the Naval Battalion, to be made under contract by public letting, at an expense not exceeding sixteen thousand (\$16,000) dollars, to be paid for from the proceeds of the sale of bonds, under the provisions of chapter 487 of the Laws of 1886, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are respectfully requested to concur in the same and authorize the issue of the necessary bonds.

Resolved, That the Secretary be requested to have prepared and submitted to this Board for adoption a form of contract and specifications for doing the work of alteration and repairs to the United States ship "New Hampshire," by the lowest bidder, at a public letting and under the inspection and supervision of the Clerk of the Works of this Board.

Commander Miller appeared in relation to the matter.

The Mayor stated that inasmuch as the time for which the ship had been loaned was limited, and the uncertainty of its remaining for use as an armory for the Naval Battalion for more than a year, he had been unwilling to consent to fit the same as an armory at an expenditure as recommended, but after conference with Commander Miller, who assured him that in case of necessity next summer, if the ship should be required for the use of cabin passengers transferred from infected ships, that no objection would be made to the "New Hampshire" being put to such temporary use and occupancy, he was in favor of putting the ship in condition for the use of the Naval Battalion.

Commander Miller being present expressed his entire willingness to such an arrangement.

On motion of the Mayor, the report was accepted, and the resolutions were adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Works and Colonel James Cavanagh.

On motion, adjourned.

Daniel Lord, attorney, appeared on behalf of the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company (Limited), and requested an explanation of the meaning of the permit to sublet granted January 12, 1893, to the Liverpool and Great Western Steamship Company (Limited).

He was informed that by the permit referred to, the Liverpool and Great Western Steamship Company (Limited) were authorized to grant to the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company (Limited) all the rights in said pier which they enjoyed under their lease dated May 1, 1888.

Samuel Weil appeared on behalf of Schwarzschild & Sulzberger, who were notified on the 19th inst. to be present and show cause why the buildings erected by them on property belonging to the City foot of East Forty-fifth street, without a permit, should not be removed.

## TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
