

# THE CITY RECORD.

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### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, January 6, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board.

The Board proceeded to open estimates on Contract No. 647, a representative of the Comptroller being present.

Five estimates were received, as follows:

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit to the Comptroller the security deposits made by the above bidders at the time of submitting their estimates, whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for dredging on the East and Harlem rivers, under Contract No. 647, be and hereby is awarded to the International Contracting Company, it being the lowest bidder, subject to the approval of The Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland and The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, as sureties, by the Comptroller.

The minutes of the meetings held December 30 and 31, 1898, were approved.

Daniel Lord, attorney for, and John Lee, agent of the White Star Line, appeared in relation to the time for the commencement of the rental of the piers and bulkheads in the vicinity of West Eleventh and Bank streets, North river, and also requested that permission be granted the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company (Limited), to assign its lease of Pier, new 38, North river, to the Southern Pacific Company.

On motion, the application for permission to assign the lease of Pier, new 38, North river, was tabled for one week, and the time for the commencement of the rental of the piers and bulkheads at the foot of West Eleventh and Bank streets, North river, was fixed at January 1, 1899.

F. G. Dow appeared in relation to an application proposed to be made by the India Comb Company and the American Hard Rubber Company for a grant of land under water at College Point, Borough of Queens. He was informed that all applications for grants of land under water should be made to the Commissioners of the Land Office at Albany, but that this Board would oppose all such applications before said Commissioners.

The communication from Alexander Campbell, attorney, requesting information as to what action this Department will take in the matter of the drowning of a horse owned by Wynn Brothers, at Pier 18, East river, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to what action, if any, this Board should take in the matter.

The application of the Union Ice Company for the privilege of two renewal terms on its lease of the bulkhead between Piers, new 54 and 55, North river, was referred to the Treasurer.

The communications from the Consolidated Ice Company, requesting a lease of the bulkhead between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, North river, and consenting to the transfer of its lease of Pier No. 2 to Pier No. 1, at Wallabout Basin, when the latter pier shall have been rebuilt, were referred to Commissioner Meyer.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Ira B. Young—To land the steamer "Huntington" at Pier 32, East river, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Edward Chapman—To place catamaran to be used for hoisting coal on the pier foot of East Twenty-ninth street, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Atlantic Dock Company—To dredge between Dikeman and Coffee streets, Borough of Brooklyn.

Neidlinger & Sons—To repair the bulkheads foot of East Sixty-third and between East Sixty-third and East Sixty-fourth streets.

New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company—To repair the flooring on Piers 51 and 52, East river.

Pacific Mail Steamship Company—To renew girders and planking at the entrance to Pier, new 34, North river.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Mayor—

1st. Transmitting report of the Commissioners of Accounts on the examination of the Department of Docks for the years 1895, 1896 and 1897.

2d. Inclosing copy of communication from the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, in relation to certain alleged violations of the Labor Laws in the construction of the piers foot of West Twelfth and West Fiftieth streets, North river. Secretary directed to state that there has been no violation of the law on the part of this Department.

From the Comptroller—

1st. Advising that his certificate has been indorsed upon Contract No. 642, for furnishing piles, under date of December 29, 1898, and that the same is now a valid contract.

2d. Approving sureties on Contracts Nos. 644 and 645.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Transmitting approved form of lease to the Southern Pacific Company of the bulkhead adjoining the northerly side of Pier, new 25, North river. Officers of the Board authorized to execute same.

2d. Transmitting approved form of lease to Frederick Leyland & Company, Limited, of the pier foot of Bethune street, North river, with adjoining bulkheads thereat.

3d. Transmitting certified copies of bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of the bulkhead between Watts and Canal streets, North river; the southerly half of the block between Bank and Bethune streets, North river, and Pier 39, East river, and bulkhead adjoining same. Chief Clerk directed to prepare the necessary requisitions therefor.

From the Department of Sewers—Requesting a sketch of the proposed improvements to be made by this Department in the vicinity of East One Hundredth street, Harlem river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish same.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—

1st. Stating that repairs will be made to the dumping-board on the Pier foot of West Nineteenth street.

2d. Requesting that permission be granted said Department to erect dumping-boards on the Piers foot of West Seventy-ninth and West Ninety-sixth streets, North river. Secretary directed to state that the establishment of such dumping-boards at the localities mentioned would be a violation of chapter 900 of the Laws of 1897.

3d. Requesting the assignment of 350 feet of the north side of Pier foot of West Fifty-fifth street for the use of a dumping-board thereat.

On motion, permission was granted the Department of Street Cleaning to erect a dumping-board on the outer 300 feet of the southerly side of the Pier foot of West Fifty-fifth street, the structure to be erected thereat under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

4th. Requesting that dredging be ordered at the dumps foot of Canal street, North river, and at the foot of East Thirty-eighth street.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to order dredging at the foot of Canal street, North river, and the Secretary directed to notify the Department of Street Cleaning that the slip foot of East Thirty-eighth street was dredged within the past two months.

5th. Requesting that necessary dock facilities be provided in the Borough of Brooklyn for the establishment of dumping-boards. Secretary directed to state that there are no public docks in the Borough of Brooklyn available for such purposes.

From Thomas Mumford—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted December 30, 1898, agreeing to lease to him the premises foot of East Thirty-ninth street. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare the necessary form of lease.

From the Union Ice Company—Accepting the rate of rental fixed December 30, 1898, for the bulkhead between Piers, new 54 and 55, North river. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare the necessary form of lease.

From the Consolidated Gas Company of New York—Accepting the terms and conditions of the general permit granted December 30, 1898, for repairs to its gas service pipes along the water front.

From Cooney, Eckstein & Co.—Inclosing the consent of the sureties to the extension of time granted to January 6, 1899, for the completion of Contract No. 636.

From Clarence True—Requesting that no permits be granted for the landing of building material at the foot of West Seventy-ninth street.

From W. M. Tebb—In relation to sunken canal-boat in front of his Pier No. 2, at the foot of Twenty-third Street, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to state that it is not within the province of this Department to remove said canal-boat.

From the New York Telephone Company—Requesting permission to place guy lines from its telegraph poles to the dumping-board on Pier, new 42, North river, and to the Dock Master's office in front of Pier, new 43, North river.

On motion, permission was granted to place a temporary guy line to the dumping-board on Pier, old 42, North river, and the application for permission to place a guy line to the Dock Master's office at Pier, new 43, North river, denied.

From the Bridgeport Steamboat Company—Reporting that the steamer "Rosedale" will discontinue landing at the Pier foot of East Thirty-first street on and after January 9, 1899. Permit revoked, to take effect January 9, 1899.

From John McDermott—Requesting renewal permit to maintain portable derricks on piers and bulkheads along the water-front. Application denied and the Secretary directed to state that a more definite application must be made before any permit can be granted.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Requesting that this Department extend Pier, new 29, North river, a distance of 200 feet.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to extend the outer end of Pier, new 29, North river, as a rack, in order to make it possible for the Albany Day Line to get into its slip on the north side of said pier and to facilitate the entrance of ferry boats in the Desbrosses street slip, provided the Pennsylvania Railroad Company agrees to pay an annual rental of ten per cent. upon the cost of construction of said extension, it being understood that said extension is not to be decked or used in any way as a pier for the landing of merchandise or passengers, and provided that the terms of this resolution are accepted by said company within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof.

From the Treasurer—Recommending that permission be granted Albert H. Hastorf to use and occupy the dumping-board at the bulkhead between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, North river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing January 9, 1899. Recommendation adopted.

From the Dock Superintendent—Report for the week ending December 31, 1898.

From Dock Master Kennedy—Reporting that the Citizens Steamboat Company discontinued landing at the north side of Pier foot of West Thirteenth street, North river, on January 3, 1899. Permit revoked, to take effect on that date.

From Dock Master Geary—Reporting his inability to collect from Thomas P. Kelly the accrued wharfage at the foot of West Ninety-ninth street, amounting to \$16. The action of the Secretary in notifying said Kelly that unless the amount is paid at once his permits will be revoked and all structures ordered removed, approved.

From Alexander Roche—Tendering his resignation as Laborer, to take effect immediately. Resignation accepted.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—Reporting the death of John H. McGowan, Toolman, and of John Reilly, Laborer. Secretary directed to take said names from the list of employees.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the title of Thomas P. T. Nash, of No. 147 East Thirty-third street, be changed from Copyist from Manuscript to Clerk, subject to Civil Service Rules and Regulations.

Resolved, That John F. Coughlin, of No. 47 Dominick street, No. 14515 on the Civil Service eligible list, be and hereby is appointed Sounder in this Department, with compensation at the rate of fifteen dollars per week, while employed.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, January 13, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held January 6, 1899, were approved.

The application of the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, for permission to assign to the Southern Pacific Company the lease of Pier, new 38, North river, and adjacent bulkheads, was tabled.

The matter of the acquisition of the northerly half of Pier 54, East river, at the foot of Jackson street, was referred to the President.

The application of the Loewer Steamboat Company for permission to land the steamer "Dolphin" at the Battery Wharf during the season of 1899, was referred to the Treasurer.

The following reports on Secretary's Orders were referred to the Treasurer for collection:

No. 18634, submitting cost of dredging material capsized from the scow "Neshamoney" in front of the bulkhead between Seventy-seventh and Seventy-eighth streets, North river, amounting to \$74 for collection from Mrs. Flaherty.

No. 18740, submitting cost of removing manure scow from the outer end of Pier, new 52, North river, amounting to \$11.10 for collection from the owner or owners of said scow.

The following communications were referred to Commissioner Meyer:

From Edmund L. Baylies, attorney—In relation to the offer of this Board for the purchase of the fifty-one feet of bulkhead owned by the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, between Market and Pike slips, East river.

From F. S. Rollins—In relation to wharfage rights formerly held by him at the thirty-eight feet of bulkhead westerly of Pier 40, East river.

The communication from John M. Scribner, attorney, requesting on behalf of the Estate of George Law a lease of the southerly half of the pier at the foot of East Eleventh street, was referred to the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Archibald Watt, to berth the steam yacht "American" at the south side of Pier foot of West Thirty-fourth street, the regular rate of wharfage to be paid therefor to the Dock Master.

The Stephens & Condit Transportation Company, to use and occupy about 200 feet on the southerly side of Pier, old 42, North river, and to erect thereon a portable shed and small office, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer, the structures to be erected under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

The following permit was granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

John D. Daily, to remove cross-ties from the cribwork at Riker's Island, it being understood that all timbers removed will be replaced by this Department at the cost and expense of the permittee.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—

1st. Approving sureties on Contract No. 647.

2d. Advising that his certificate has been indorsed upon Contracts Nos. 641 and 646, and that same are now valid contracts.



3d. In relation to the acquisition by the City of the wharfage rights appurtenant to Pier 35, East river, and requesting that requisition be drawn in favor of Eugene A. Hoffman, in payment for said rights. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary requisition.

From the Corporation Counsel—Transmitting notice of application of Richard Ravenhall for grant of land under water at Coney Island. Secretary directed to state that the Board is opposed to the granting of said application.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—In relation to the maintenance of ice bridge by Richard J. Foster, on the bulkhead between Piers, new 41 and 42, North river.

On motion, permission was granted said Foster to replace his ice bridge on said bulkhead, it being understood that the privilege is to continue only during the pleasure of the Board, and that all structures shall be removed whenever the Department of Street Cleaning may require the premises for the purpose of dumping snow and ice therefrom.

From the Department of Highways—In relation to paving required at the foot of East Fourth street.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to submit the matter to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, with the request that the necessary action be taken looking toward the paving of the premises so that access may be had to the Pier at the foot of East Fourth street.

From the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies—Requesting the assignment of necessary berths for the use of the free floating baths during the season of 1899.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following locations be and are hereby designated as berths for public baths during the season of 1899, subject to such amendments as may become necessary prior to the time said baths are berthed at the places mentioned.

#### North River.

Battery. South half of bulkhead between Piers, new 21 and 22, foot of Duane street. Pier foot of West Twentieth street. Pier at West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street.

#### East River.

Pier, new 29, foot of Market street. Pier foot of Corlears street. Pier foot of East Fifth street. Pier foot of East Eighteenth street. Pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street. Pier foot of East Fifty-first street. Pier foot of East Ninety-first street.

#### Harlem River.

Pier at the foot of East One Hundred and Twelfth street.

#### Port Morris.

Pier at the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted January 6, 1899, in relation to the extension of Pier, new 29, North river.

From James J. Fitzgerald, attorney—Requesting, on behalf of Frank McKnight, a lease of one of the piers proposed to be built at Wallabout basin, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to state that arrangements have already been made for the leasing of the piers to be constructed at that locality.

From Root, Howard, Winthrop & Stimson, Attorneys—Requesting, on behalf of George H. Penniman, a ten years' renewal lease of certain land under water in front of an adjoining Pier, old 36, East river. Secretary directed to state that the premises are within the lines of improvements contemplated by this Department.

From the St. Andrew's One Cent Coffee Stands—Requesting permission to place coffee stand in front of Pier, new 44, North river, and inclosing consent of the lessee thereto.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Murphy, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative, permission was granted to maintain a coffee stand on the bulkhead in front of Pier, new 44, North river, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Board, said stand to be placed not more than fifty feet easterly of the bulkhead-line.

From Augustin Walsh—Requesting an extension of time on his contract for the construction of the bulkhead-wall at Wallabout basin, Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the contract for building a bulkhead-wall on the easterly side of the Wallabout basin, Borough of Brooklyn, Augustin Walsh, contractor, be and is hereby extended for a period of three months from November 15, 1898, provided the consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From the City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia and the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, sureties, consenting to the extension of time granted Augustus Smith on December 30, 1898, for the completion of the work of building a recreation structure on the Pier foot of West Fiftieth street.

From the American Air Power Company—Requesting permission to lay two lines of piping between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, North river. Application denied.

From John McDermott—Requesting renewal permit to maintain portable horse-derrick on Pier, old 42, North river. Application denied.

From John Donnelly—Requesting permission to use and occupy new-made land north of Fifty-second street, North river, at an annual compensation of \$50. Application denied.

From the President and Commissioner Meyer—Submitting copy of the Rules and Regulations, and recommending that the same be adopted, to take effect from and after January 13, 1899.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted and the Dock Superintendent directed to see that Rule No. 19 is strictly enforced:

Resolved, That the following rules and regulations be and they are hereby adopted and established as the rules and regulations of and for the Department of Docks and Ferries, pursuant to the statute in such cases made and provided, to take effect January 13, 1899; and that all rules and regulations heretofore adopted and established for the government, and proper care of the said wharf property, be and are hereby repealed and annulled, from and after the said January 13, 1899, provided, however, that nothing in said rules and regulations hereby adopted and established as aforesaid, shall, in any manner, impair or effect any violation of any rule or penalty incurred or imposed, or any action or proceeding in relation thereto, or for the recovery thereof, prior to January 13, 1899:

#### RULES AND REGULATIONS

ESTABLISHED FOR THE GOVERNMENT AND PROPER CARE OF PIERS, BULKHEADS, SLIPS AND OTHER WHARF PROPERTY, UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTIONS 818 AND 827 OF THE GREATER NEW YORK CHARTER, BEING CHAPTER 378 OF THE LAWS OF 1897, AS FOLLOWS:

Sec. 818. The board of docks shall have exclusive charge and control, subject in the particulars hereinafter mentioned to the commissioners of the sinking fund, of the wharf property belonging to the corporation of The City of New York, as constituted by this act, including all the wharves, piers, bulkheads and structures thereon, and waters adjacent thereto, and all the slips, basins, docks, water fronts, land under water, and structures thereon, and the appurtenances, easements, uses, reversions and rights belonging thereto, which are now owned or possessed by the said corporation, or to which said corporation is or may become entitled, or which said corporation may acquire under the provisions hereof or otherwise; and said board shall have exclusive charge and control of the repairing, building, rebuilding, maintaining, altering, strengthening, leasing and protecting said property and every part thereof, and of all the cleaning, dredging and deepening necessary in and about the same. Said board is also hereby invested, except as otherwise expressly stated in this act, with the exclusive government and regulation of all wharf property, wharves, piers, bulkheads and structures thereon, and waters adjacent thereto, and all the basins, slips and docks, with the land under water in said city not owned by said corporation.

The board of docks shall not have power to change the exterior line of piers and bulkheads established by law. The board of docks shall also have exclusive charge and control, subject in the particulars hereinafter mentioned to the commissioners of the sinking fund, of all ferries and ferry property belonging to the corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted.

Sec. 827. The board of docks shall establish and enforce all needful rules and regulations for the government and proper care of all the property placed in its charge and under its control by the provisions of this chapter relating thereto, and shall furnish a copy of such rules and regulations to all the owners and occupants of such property, and shall make all needful orders necessary to carry out the provisions of this chapter relating thereto into effect, and fix penalties for disobeying such rules, regulations or orders, and shall publish such orders. The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regulation or order of said board of docks shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment, not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of such board of docks. The penalties aforesaid may be recovered by suit in the name of The City of New York, and such suit shall be prosecuted by the corporation counsel when directed by the board of docks, and no defendant in any such suit shall be permitted to plead ignorance of any such order, rule or regulation.

#### RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Rule 1.—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on any part of the water-front of the city, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board, under a penalty of one hundred dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit any such work to be done upon his premises before such permit therefor has been obtained, and there shall be a further penalty of twenty dollars a day for each and every day which shall elapse until any piles so driven, or platform so

erected, or material so filled in, without such permit being first obtained therefor, shall be removed after the expiration of the time specified in a notice for such removal, to be signed and served upon such owner, lessee or occupant, by the Dock Master of the District or other representative of the Department, said penalty to be also recovered from such owner, lessee or occupant.

Rule 2.—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or any other structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoisting-mast, coal-hopper, sign or advertising device, or any other erection or obstruction of any kind, be placed or maintained on any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a written permit being first had and obtained from this Board, upon written application from the person desiring such permit. It shall not be lawful to erect or maintain any booth, stand or structure for the sale of merchandise or refreshments upon any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, or upon any reclaimed land under control of this Department; nor shall any sign or advertising device other than those used for the business of the parties occupying the premises be placed or maintained on any shed or structure erected on property under control of this Department; and if the owner, lessee, occupant or agent shall place or erect any structure for which permit has not been duly obtained from this Board, or place and maintain any sign or advertising device on sheds or structures on property in charge of this Department, and shall fail to remove the same on notice being given to said owner, lessee, occupant or agent, signed and served by the Dock Master of the District, or other representative of the Department, then for failure to remove, said owner, lessee, occupant or agent shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty dollars for each and every day after the expiration of the time mentioned in such notice of removal, until said removal shall have been made; said penalty to be recovered by the Corporation Counsel in favor of The City of New York.

Rule 3.—No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel upon any pier, bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such vessel is being unladen, after notice signed and served by the Dock Master of the District or other representative of the Department, upon the owner, consignee, master or other officer or stevedore of such vessel, that such pier, bulkhead or structure will be endangered by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of one hundred dollars for every such offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the damages of every description which shall be caused by the further discharging of cargo upon such pier, bulkhead or structure, after the service of the said notice, both of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, consignee, master or other officer, or stevedore, severally and respectively.

Rule 4.—No manure, ashes, cellar dirt, garbage, offal, dead animals or refuse of any kind shall be received or delivered at any pier, bulkhead or reclaimed land, or placed thereon, without a special permit, to be applied for in writing, having first been obtained from the Department; and the party or parties receiving or discharging said manure, ashes, cellar dirt, garbage, offal, dead animals or refuse of any kind, or placing the same on any pier, bulkhead or reclaimed land, without a permit obtained therefor as specified, shall be subject to a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, and a further penalty of twenty-five dollars a day for each and every day after the placing of the same on any pier, bulkhead or reclaimed land, until the removal thereof, to be recovered from the owners, agent, consignee of the vessel or of the manure, ashes, cellar dirt, garbage, offal, dead animals, or refuse of any kind so received, delivered, or deposited, severally and respectively, and it shall be the duty of the Dock Master to enforce this rule and report any violation thereof.

Rule 5.—All goods, merchandise and materials of every kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, or upon reclaimed land, must be removed therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within twenty-four hours after the Dock Master of the District, or other representative of the Department, shall have served upon the owner, shipper or consignee of such cargo a notice signed and served by the Dock Master of the District, or other representative of the Department, to remove the same, under penalty of twenty dollars per day for each and every day during which any part of said goods, merchandise or material shall remain upon such pier, bulkhead, structure or reclaimed land, after the expiration of said twenty-four hours, to be recovered from such owner, shipper or consignee, severally and respectively.

Rule 6.—All goods, merchandise and materials of every kind incumbering any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, or reclaimed land, after the time designated for the removal thereof shall have expired, will be liable to be removed by the Board to any warehouse or yard, at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such goods, merchandise or materials, and all expense incurred for such removal and storage, or otherwise, shall be and become a lien thereon, and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be delivered to the owner until the expense of such removal and storage has been paid.

Rule 7.—All permits issued by this Department for tally-houses, watchmen's houses, derricks, and other like structures, shall continue only during the pleasure of the Board, and shall expire by limitation on the first day of May of each year, unless sooner revoked. Persons desiring such permits must make application in writing to the Board, stating the dimensions, character, uses, etc., of the structure for which permit is requested, and any permit issued by this Department shall be kept posted in a conspicuous place in the interior of the structure authorized by it, except in cases of derricks, etc., when it shall be produced on requirement of the Dock Master of the District.

Rule 8.—No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or discharged by horse-power on the North river, between Pier "A" and West Eleventh street, and on the East river, from the Battery to Grand street. No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or discharged elsewhere by horse-power, or shall stones or similar cargo be discharged from any vessel upon any other pier, bulkhead or wharf structure, unless proper planking be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bulkhead or wharf structure from injury consequent upon the travel of the horse, or the unloading of stones or similar cargo thereupon, under a penalty of ten dollars a day for each horse so employed, and of twenty-five dollars for each offense of discharging such stones or like cargo upon such pier, bulkhead or wharf structure, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered for using horses or discharging stones or similar cargo upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof; but if such penalty be recovered for using horses or discharging stones or similar cargo upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

Rule 9.—No brick, sand, gravel or similar material shall be unloaded on any wharf property unless a permit therefor shall be issued by the Secretary, and no such material shall be unloaded on unleased city property unless an application shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Board, accompanied by a receipt from the Dock Master for ten dollars, specifying the name of the vessel from which the cargo is to be unloaded, and a permit issued therefor by the Secretary. At the expiration of ten days from the date of said permit, if any portion of said cargo remains, a similar application, accompanied by a receipt for an additional ten dollars, shall be submitted as in the first instance. If the owner of the material shall fail to obtain a permit in the manner herein set forth, the Dock Master shall collect at the rate of five cents per cubic yard for each day that any portion of said cargo remains on the wharf property after the expiration of twenty-four hours from the time of unloading. No vessel carrying such material or cargo shall be allowed to occupy a berth for a period longer than three days when said berth is required by another vessel.

Rule 10.—No sand shall be discharged from any vessel unless canvas or similar material be extended from the vessel's side to the bulkhead or wharf structure at which such vessel is being unladen, to prevent the falling of the sand into the water; and if the surface of any such wharf structure is not sufficiently tight to prevent the sand dumped thereon from going through into the water, then no sand shall be discharged thereon from any vessel, unless canvas or similar material be first laid thereon to receive the sand, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof; but if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

Rule 11.—The owners, lessees and occupants of every pier, wharf and bulkhead in The City of New York shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged, and whenever in the judgment of the Board it shall be necessary so to do, written notices shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants or collector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or occupants so notified fail to comply with the terms and requirements of such notice they shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day which shall elapse until such owners, lessees or occupants shall comply with such notice.

Rule 12.—It shall not be lawful for the owners, lessees or occupants of any pier, wharf or bulkhead, which has been covered with a shed, pursuant to the statute in such cases made and provided, and constructed in conformity with the authority of the Board, to use such shedded pier, wharf or bulkhead for the permanent storage of goods, merchandise, cargo or material of any kind which may be discharged or placed thereon. Piers, wharves and bulkheads thus shedded are designed for the protection of merchandise and cargo in transit, as prescribed by the act, and such merchandise and cargo must be removed therefrom after the expiration of a reasonable period.

Rule 13.—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or any other substance, shall be thrown into the water surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any other part of the water-front of the city under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant, severally and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf, structure, or



any property from which any such substance shall be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the same; or, if any such substance be thrown, from any vessel lying in water within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to be recovered from the owner, consignee or master of such vessel, severally and respectively.

Rule 14.—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from time to time by the Board for such dumping, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier, bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such snow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually dumping the same severally and respectively.

Rule 15.—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk, discharged on any pier or bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending removal, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day such lumber, brick or other material shall remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or from the person placing or causing the same to be placed on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

Rule 16.—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads constructed under the new plans adopted by the Department shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be, fixed and established by the laws of this State, unless otherwise ordered by the Board.

Rule 17.—The term "Board" when used in the foregoing rules and regulations, shall be taken to mean "The Board of Docks of The City of New York," and the term "Corporation," when so used, shall be taken to mean "The City of New York."

Rule 18.—No person shall load, discharge or keep on any wharf, pier or bulkhead, or allow to remain on any lighter, barge or other craft moored to the wharves, piers or bulkheads of the city, any cotton, turpentine, rosin, hay, straw or other inflammable merchandise, unless the same is covered with tarpaulins, or other more permanent or substantial material, under penalty of not exceeding fifty dollars for each day or fraction of a day that such cotton, turpentine, rosin, hay, straw or other inflammable merchandise shall be permitted to remain uncovered as provided in this rule; such penalty to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier, wharf or bulkhead on which such cotton, turpentine, rosin, hay, straw or other inflammable merchandise may be left thus exposed in contravention of the terms of this regulation, or from the owner, lessee or occupant of any wharf, pier or bulkhead to which shall be moored any lighter, barge or other craft upon which inflammable merchandise shall be left uncovered as herein provided.

Rule 19.—No unharnessed truck, cart, wagon or vehicle of any description shall be placed or left at any time on any marginal street, wharf or place, or on any bulkhead, pier or reclaimed land under the charge and control of the Department of Docks and Ferries, under a penalty of five dollars, to be recovered from the owner of said unharnessed truck, cart, wagon or vehicle of any description placed or left on any marginal street, wharf or place, or on any bulkhead, pier or reclaimed land under the charge and control of the Department of Docks and Ferries, shall be removed by the Dock Master of the District to a place to be designated by the Board, and a charge of not less than fifty cents per day for storage on same, shall be and become a lien thereon, and such unharnessed truck, cart, wagon or vehicle of any description will not be delivered to the owner until said fine and storage charge have been paid.

*The following Rules and Instructions are issued for the guidance and observance of the several Dock Masters of the Department of Docks and Ferries.*

Section 1. The Dock Masters shall be on duty in their respective districts, unless excused by one or more Commissioners, in writing, from 9 A. M. until 4 P. M., and at such other times each day as the exigencies of the case may require or the public service demand.

Sec. 2. Each Dock Master shall exercise a constant inspection and supervision of the condition of all piers, bulkheads, slips and wharf property, also all ferries and ferry property in his district, promptly reporting in writing to the Board, from time to time, such repairs and improvements thereto as he may deem necessary or proper for the safety and preservation thereof.

Sec. 3. Each Dock Master shall promptly designate and assign, in the order in which application is made, suitable and convenient berths as far as practicable, within the limits of his district, for the use of such vessels and water craft as may require the same for the reception or discharge of passengers, merchandise or other property therefrom, for the necessary repair or the safety of any vessel or water craft.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of each Dock Master to require and enforce the due observance of and compliance with such of the National and State laws, city ordinances, and the rules, regulations and orders of the Department of Docks and Ferries as appertain to the use, care and custody of the wharf property and ferry property of and about The City of New York, promptly reporting to the Board all violations and evasions of such laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and orders.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of each Dock Master, in the presence of the Captain or person in charge of vessel to punch in triplicate the wharfage tickets for wharfage due to the Corporation of The City of New York from all vessels and water-craft that may be moored within the limits of his district, and to transmit each day to the Treasurer, unless otherwise ordered by him, Ticket No. One, giving the date, name, home port and description of the vessel, the name and address of owner, agent or consignee thereof, and the wharf, pier or bulkhead at which such vessel or water-craft is located, and shall submit therewith a statement showing the amount of accrued wharfage, cash and credit. Ticket No. Two shall be retained by the Dock Master, and Ticket No. Three shall be delivered to said owner, agent or consignee, or representative thereof.

Sec. 6. Each Dock Master shall make return at 10 o'clock A. M. on Tuesday of each week, or as much oftener as may be required by the Board or its Treasurer, of all wharfage or crannage collected by him during the previous week within the limits of his district, together with a statement of all wharfage and crannage due the Corporation of The City of New York, which has accrued during the same period within the limits of his district, specifying the amount accrued at each particular wharf, pier or bulkhead.

He shall keep a record of all structures (other than sheds duly authorized), such as tally-houses, watchmen's houses, derricks, etc., for which permits have been granted by the Board, and shall require said permits to be posted in a conspicuous place in the interior of the structure authorized by them. It shall be his duty to report, without delay, any and all structures, houses, booths, places of refreshment, etc., erected in his district without due authority from the Board, as well as all obstructions on wharves, piers or bulkheads of every nature whatsoever.

He shall also report to the Board, without delay, the commencement of any work without a permit within the limits of his district, and any violation of the Rules and Regulations of the Department.

Sec. 7. Each Dock Master is expressly prohibited, under penalty of immediate dismissal from his position, from receiving or demanding, directly or indirectly, any fee, gratuity, compensation or article of value of any nature or kind for the assignment of a berth to a vessel at any pier, slip or wharf property whatsoever, or for the performance of or the omission to perform any of the duties required of or appertaining to the position of Dock Master of this Department.

Sec. 8. The Dock Masters shall prevent any accumulation of material upon the piers, wharves, bulkheads and reclaimed land in their respective districts; and whenever any pier, wharf, bulkhead or reclaimed land in The City of New York shall be incumbered or obstructed in its free use by any vessel, merchandise or material in transit or otherwise, or by any structure, incumbrance or obstruction not authorized or permitted by this Board, the Dock Master of the District in which such incumbrance or obstruction shall exist is authorized to require the owner, agent, consignee, or person occupying or in charge of such to remove the same without delay. Upon receiving said order, the owner, agent, consignee, or person in charge of the vessel, merchandise, material, structure, incumbrance or obstruction, as the case may be, in reference to which said order or direction was given, shall comply with the same without delay, and in default thereof the Dock Master may employ such assistance as may be necessary to carry into effect his order or decision by the removal of such vessel, merchandise, material, structure, incumbrance or obstruction, in respect to which the order was given. All expenses actually and necessarily incurred in effecting such removal, and for storage of merchandise or material thus removed, shall be paid by the owner, agent, consignee or person in charge, and the amount thereof shall be a lien upon the same, in favor of The City of New York.

SEC. 9. Each Dock Master shall have immediate supervision of the Laborers of this Department engaged in cleaning the piers, bulkheads and marginal streets of his district, and make to the Dock Superintendent such daily reports upon the work as may be necessary.

RATES OF WHARFAGE FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, IN FORCE JANUARY 1, 1898.

Sections 859, 860, 861, 862 and 863 of The Greater New York Charter, being Chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Section 859. It shall be lawful to charge and receive within The City of New York wharfage and dockage at the following rates, namely: From every vessel that uses or makes fast to any pier, wharf or bulkhead within said city, or makes fast to any vessel lying at such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or to any other vessel lying outside of such vessel, for every day or part of a day, except as hereinafter provided, as follows: From every vessel of two hundred tons burden and under, two cents per ton, and for every vessel over two hundred tons burden, two cents per ton for

each of the first two hundred tons, and one-half of one cent per ton for every additional ton, except that, save as hereinafter provided, vessels known as North river barges, market boats and barges, sloops employed upon the rivers and waters of this State, and schooners, exclusively employed upon the rivers and waters of this State, shall pay for every such vessel under the burden of fifty tons, at the rate of fifty cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of fifty tons and under the burden of one hundred tons, at the rate of sixty-two and a half cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of one hundred tons, and under the burden of one hundred and fifty tons, at the rate of seventy-five cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of one hundred and fifty tons and under the burden of two hundred tons, at the rate of eighty-seven and a half cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of two hundred tons and under the burden of two hundred and fifty tons, at the rate of one hundred cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of two hundred and fifty tons, and under the burden of three hundred tons, at the rate of one hundred and twelve and a half cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of three hundred tons and under the burden of three hundred and fifty tons, at the rate of one hundred and twenty-five cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of three hundred and fifty tons and under the burden of four hundred tons, at the rate of one hundred and thirty-seven and a half cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of four hundred tons and under the burden of four hundred and fifty tons, at the rate of one hundred and fifty cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of four hundred and fifty tons and under the burden of five hundred tons, at the rate of one hundred and sixty-two and a half cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of five hundred tons and under the burden of five hundred and fifty tons, at the rate of one hundred and seventy-five cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of five hundred and fifty tons and under the burden of six hundred tons, at the rate of one hundred and eighty-seven and a half cents per day; for every such vessel of the burden of six hundred tons and upwards, to pay twelve and a half cents in addition for every fifty tons in addition to the rate last mentioned, for every day such ship or vessel shall use or be made fast to any of the said wharves; but no boat or vessel over fifty tons burden shall pay less than fifty cents for a day or a part of a day, and the class of sailing vessels now known as lighters shall be at one-half the first above rates. Every other vessel making fast to a vessel at any pier, wharf or bulkhead within said city, or to another vessel outside of such vessel, or at anchor within any slip or basin, when not receiving or discharging cargo or ballast, one-half the first above rates; and from every vessel or floating structure, other than those above named, or used for transportation of freight or passengers, double the first above rates, except that floating grain elevators shall pay one-half the first above rates; and every vessel that shall leave a pier, wharf, bulkhead, slip or basin, without first paying the wharfage or dockage due thereon, after being demanded of the owner, consignee, or person in charge of the vessel, shall be liable to pay double the rates established by this section.

§ 860. Vessels of two hundred tons burden and under, which shall be actually engaged in the clam or oyster trade, and which shall make fast to any pier, wharf or bulkhead within The City of New York, shall pay one and one-half cents per ton per day, and every such vessel which shall make fast to another vessel lying at any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or to any vessel lying outside of such vessel, or that shall anchor within any slip or basin in said city, shall pay one cent per ton per day; provided, however, that no vessel shall pay less than twenty-five cents, nor less than one day's wharfage, nor shall more than one day's wharfage be charged unless for a continuous use of the pier, wharf, bulkhead, slip or basin of more than twenty-four hours.

§ 861. Every canal-boat, and every vessel engaged in freighting brick on the Hudson river, occupying a berth next to any pier, wharf or bulkhead in The City of New York, and engaged in delivering cargo upon said pier, wharf, or bulkhead, or receiving cargo therefrom, shall pay wharfage at the rate of fifty cents for every day or part of a day while so engaged; but when unloaded such canal boat or vessel aforesaid shall pay wharfage at the rate of thirty cents per day or part thereof; but no canal-boat or vessel lying in any slip between two adjacent piers, shall be required to pay full wharfage to the owners or lessees of both said piers for the same day, notwithstanding such canal-boat or barge may, during said day, have changed her location between said piers; provided that they shall pay one-half rates to each owner or lessee when they have changed their locations between said piers; and the word "day," whenever it occurs in this and the last preceding section, shall be taken and construed to mean twenty-four hours.

§ 862. It shall be lawful for the owners or lessees of any pier, wharf or bulkhead within The City of New York, to charge and collect the sum of five cents per ton on all goods, merchandise and materials remaining on the pier, wharf or bulkhead owned or leased by him, for every day after the expiration of twenty-four hours from the time such goods, merchandise and materials shall have been left or deposited on such pier, wharf or bulkhead, and the same shall be a lien thereon.

§ 863. It shall be the duty of every person owning or having charge of any pier, wharf, bulkhead or slip in The City of New York to cause to be printed on the backs of all bills presented by them for wharfage, section eight hundred and fifty-nine of this act, and the owner, consignee or person in charge of any vessel shall not be required to pay the wharfage or dockage due on such vessel, unless upon his demand the bill printed in conformity with this section is presented to him. Any person owning or having charge of any pier, wharf, bulkhead or slip, as aforesaid, who shall receive for wharfage any rates in excess of those now authorized by law, shall forfeit to the party aggrieved treble the amount so charged as damages, to be sued for and recovered by the party aggrieved.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby authorized to have printed one thousand copies of the Rules and Regulations, adopted this day, and to cause to be published in the CITY RECORD a copy of said Rules and Regulations.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Andrew Marshall, for the privilege of maintaining boat-house, in the vicinity of One Hundred and Seventy-third street, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$8 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Captain Ira B. Young, for landing the steamer "Huntington" at Pier, new 32, East river, three days each week, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged John A. Bouker, for the privilege of maintaining dumping-board, during the pleasure of the Board, on the bulkhead between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$600 per annum, payable at the end of each month to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged M. Murray, for the privilege of maintaining boat-house at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-third street, Harlem river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the permit granted Edward Chapman, January 6, 1899, to place catamaran on the Pier, foot of East Twenty-ninth street, be revoked, to take effect immediately. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that the permit granted the Yorkville Yacht Club to maintain boat-house, etc., at Bronx Kills, be revoked, to take effect immediately. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that the lease of the bulkhead south of the Pier foot of West Fiftieth street, be revoked, he having been unable to collect the rent therefor; and also recommending that the claim of this Department for rental of said bulkhead be transmitted to the Corporation Counsel for collection.

On motion, the recommendation of the Treasurer was approved and the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, At a public sale, held April 18, 1898, William Brooks' Son Company purchased the right to collect and retain all wharfage which may accrue at the new bulkhead-wall south of Pier foot of West Fiftieth street, North river, about eighty-three feet, with crib return about fifty-three feet, for a term of two years, from May 1, 1898, at a yearly rental of seven hundred and fifty dollars, and

Whereas, At the time of the sale the said William Brooks' Son Company duly executed an agreement in writing, which provided among other things, as follows:

"It is hereby agreed that the necessary lease for the said right at the above-named premises, the printed form whereof has been duly examined, will be executed within ten days after notice shall have been given that it is prepared and ready for signature and execution; and it is further understood and agreed that until the said lease shall be executed all the terms, conditions and covenants contained therein, and in the 'terms and conditions of sale' affixed hereto, including published notice of sale, shall be held to be as binding and of the same effect as though the lease was completed and executed;" and

Whereas, Said agreement further provided as follows:

"Lessees will be required to pay their rent quarterly in advance, in compliance with the terms and conditions of the lease prepared and adopted by the Department," and

Whereas, the said William Brooks' Son Company, was on the 27th day of July, 1898, notified in writing that the lease referred to in said agreement was prepared and ready for execution, and

Whereas, The said William Brooks' Son Company has failed to execute said lease within ten days after service upon William Brooks' Son Company of said notice; and

Whereas, In said printed form of lease it was, among other things, provided as follows: "And the said parties of the second part" (the lessees) further covenant and agree that if the rent, or sum of money herein reserved, or any part thereof, shall at any time be due or unpaid for the space of



ten days after the same shall have become due and payable, according to the terms hereof, or if the said parties of the second part shall fail to perform, keep, do or observe any or either of the covenants, agreements, promises, things, terms or conditions herein contained on the part and behalf of the said parties of the second part to be performed, kept, done or observed, then and in such case, and in every such case, it shall and may be lawful for the said party of the first part by resolution of the said Board of Docks, at its discretion, to declare this lease or demise, and the terms, estate or interest hereby created to have ceased, determined, and come to an end, and forever thereafter be null and void, and to serve or cause to be served, a copy of said resolution on the parties of the second part, their successors, executors, administrators and assigns, or on some or one of them either personally, or by causing the same to be posted in a conspicuous place on said wharf property. And then, and from thenceforth, the lease and demise herein contained, and hereby created, and all franchises, powers, rights and privileges connected therewith, and growing, arising or accruing out of the same, shall cease, determine and come to an end, and the said party of the first part shall have again, repossess and enjoy the said wharfage, cranes, franchises, powers, rights, and privileges, as in its first and former estate, the same as if this lease and demise had never been made. And the said parties of the second part shall and will peaceably and quietly surrender and yield up to the said party of the first part the said wharfage, cranes, franchises, powers, rights and privileges, and will not nor will any or either of them ask, demand, sue for, collect or receive in any manner, nor from any persons whomsoever, any wharfage crane or compensation which shall have accrued or become due and payable by reason of any vessel having come to, laid at of used said wharf property after the giving of said notice in the manner aforesaid; and

Whereas, On the first day of November, 1898, there became due and payable the sum of one hundred and eighty-seven dollars and fifty cents, as and for rent for the wharf property described in said agreement for the quarter beginning on the 1st day of November, 1898; and

Whereas, Said quarter's rent has not yet been paid to the Department of Docks; therefore be it Resolved, That the lease of the right to collect and retain all wharfage which may accrue at the premises described in said agreement be and the same is hereby declared null and void; and further, be it

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be served upon the said William Brooks' Son Company by personal service upon any one of the officers of said company, and by posting or causing to be posted in a conspicuous place upon said wharf property, a notice of these preambles and resolutions.

From the Dock Superintendent—Report for the week ending January 7, 1899.

From Dock Master Clark—

1st. Reporting repairs required to the pavement on the bulkhead east of Pier 52, East river. Secretary directed to notify the Long Island Railroad Company, owners, to make the necessary repairs to said bulkhead, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

2d. Reporting repairs required to the pier foot of East Fourth street. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs thereto.

From Dock Master Hennessy—

1st. Reporting repairs required to the bulkhead foot of East Sixty-fourth street and to the approach leading thereto. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs.

2d. Reporting damage to the bulkhead between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, East river, by dredge belonging to the Atlantic Dredging Company. Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair said damage and to report the cost of the work for collection from said company.

From Dock Master Powers—Reporting dredging required at the north side and outer end of the bulkhead at the foot of East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order the necessary dredging thereat.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending January 7, 1899.

2d. Reporting the completion of Contract No. 636, January 6, 1899.

3d. Reporting that the inner 250 feet of Pier 44, East river, can now be used for wharfage purposes, and stating that repairs to the outer end of said pier will be discontinued until such time as the question of permanent improvements in the locality of Pier 44, East river, shall have been decided. Dock Superintendent directed to collect wharfage thereat.

4th. Recommending the removal of such portions of the structures now located at the Watts Street Section, North river, as may be necessary to expedite the construction of the bulkhead wall thereat. Recommendation adopted, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative.

5th. Recommending that George W. Winant be directed to remove sunken canal-boat, laden with coal, from the slip adjoining the pier foot of West Fifty-seventh street. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company be directed to remove sunken canal-boat, laden with coal, from the slip between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, East river. Recommendation adopted.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Riverside and Fort Lee Ferry Company to repair said damage, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and that unless said repairs are commenced within ten days, the work to be done by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said company.

9th. Recommending that M. M. McDermott, lessee, be directed to make the necessary repairs to the pier foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street. Recommendation adopted.

10th. Reporting the sinking of the Borer "Woodcock" at the foot of East Eightieth street, and recommending that the same be raised and fitted for further service in the work of the Department. Recommendation adopted.

11th. Recommending that the necessary repairs be made by the force of this Department to the bulkhead between Fiftieth and Fifty-first streets, North river. Recommendation adopted.

Resolved, That the lease of said pier and bulkheads be and is hereby directed to be made in the name of Thomas Wilson, Sons & Co., Limited, and Frederick Leyland & Co., Limited, Liverpool, England, jointly, and the Corporation Counsel be and hereby is respectfully requested to make the necessary changes in the form of said lease.

The President gave notice that at the next meeting of the Board, to be held on the 20th instant, he would move to shed the Pier at the foot of West Thirty-fourth street, North river.

GENTLEMEN—I beg to call your attention to section 27, chapter 230 of the Laws of 1898, reading as follows:

"The public administrator shall exhibit to the municipal assembly of The City of New York, on the first day of January in each year, or within fourteen days after that day, a statement, on oath, of the total amount of his receipts and expenditures in each case in which he shall have taken charge of and collected any effects, or in which he shall have administered during the preceding year, with the name of the deceased, his addition, and the country and place from which he came, if the same be known. The said statement shall be published in the CITY RECORD three times each week for three weeks, and brief notices referring to such publication shall be published for the like period and times in three daily newspapers to be designated by the board of city record, the payment of the expense of which shall be made through the proper disbursing officer of the finance department from an appropriation to be provided by the board of estimate and apportionment and municipal assembly in the annual estimate or budget, on vouchers to be filed in said department, certified by the public administrator, by warrants drawn on the city treasury in the manner now prescribed by law. The public administrator shall, once in three months and at such other times as the mayor of The City of New York may direct, make to him in such form and under such rules as he may prescribe, reports of the operations and action of his bureau, which report shall be published in the CITY RECORD."

I respectfully request the publication of my report, which was filed with the Municipal Assembly on the 10th instant, in the CITY RECORD three times a week for three weeks, and ask your Hon-
