And no undertaker shall retain or expose, or assist in the retention or exposure of the dead body of any such person except in a coffin or casket properly sealed; nor shall he allow any such body to be placed in any coffin or casket unless the body has been thoroughly disinfected and wrapped in a sheet saturated with a proper disinfecting solution and the coffin or casket be immediately and permanently sealed. Nor shall he assist in the public or church funeral of any such person. No rugs, draperies, hangings, upholstered pedestals or fabrics of any kind shall be brought into any rooms or premises by any undertaker, or other person where there has been a death from contagious or infectious disease until said rooms or premises have been disinfected by the said department."

Whereas, The said maps and survey were subsequently filed in the office of the Register of the County of New York; and

Whereas, The Police Department do not intend to acquire said property; it is

Resolved, That the resolution adopted at the meeting of the Board of Police of the late City of New York held on August 25, 1897, and all proceedings had by the Board of Police subsequent to said 25th of August, 1897, with reference to the condemnation of the premises at the southwesterly corner of Bailey avenue and Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, be and said resolution and all other proceedings that may have been had relating thereto are hereby rescinded; and it is further

Resolved, That the Register of the County of New York be and he is hereby requested to attach to the map of said premises now filed in his office a copy of this resolution, and that he further requested to cause such entry as may be necessary to be made on said map and upon any index having reference thereto to show the abandonment of said condemnation proceedings by the City of New York and Police Board; and it is further

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is requested to take any other proceedings that may be necessary for the purpose of lifting from the property referred to in said map any proceedings which might tend to the condemnation of the same.

The President submitted the following report, which was approved:

IN THE MATTER OF THE CHARGES AGAINST MARTIN J. QUIRK.

This officer was convicted upon a charge of using vile and threatening language to an employee of the elevated railroad company, such conviction being had before the Board of

Police on October 29, 1897, upon which day he was dismissed from the force; subsequently an appeal was had, and by an order entered by the Appellate Division of the First Department on the 8th day of June, 1900, the judgment of dismissal of the officer was reversed and a new trial was directed to be had before the Police Board; this is the first case where the Appellate Court has remanded a case to the Police Board for a retrial. It is apparent from an examination of the record of the previous trial, together with the record of the officer, that the judgment of reversal was probably rendered for the reason that the Appellate Court deemed the punishment inflicted upon the officer, to wit, dismissal from the force, as being entirely too severe for the offense of which he was convicted, and from the evidence taken upon retrial of the case it will appear that that view of the case is fully justified.

Since the previous trial the complaining witness has died and there has been some difficulty in proving that fact, it also appears that there is a reasonable doubt as to whether the witness was sworn upon the previous trial, and unless he was so sworn, the testimony given by him would not, under the decision of the Court, be competent evidence upon this retrial. After a careful consideration of the whole matter I am of the opinion that the officer should be given the benefit of any doubt, and for that reason the complaint against him should be dismissed.

QUARTERLY REPORT ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1900.

To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of work under my supervision and charge for the quarter ending September 30, 1900.

NORTH RIVER.

Pier "A," North River.

By resolution of the Board of March 20, 1900, an extension to the building on Pier "A" was authorized. A contract, No. 684, was let for this work to M. W. Ryan. The work has been begun and considerable progress made during the quarter.

Breakwater at Pier "A," North River.

Under resolution of the Board of January 17, 1899, work has been in progress on construction of permanent breakwater at Pier "A." Piles have been driven, and a number of concrete blocks have been set.

Pier, new 16, North River.

A shed has been erected on this pier by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company under permit from the Board, and also on the bulkhead between Piers, new 16 and 17, by the same company.

Pier, new 18.

A shed has been erected on the bulkhead at this pier by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company under a permit from the Board.

Barclay Street Section Extended.

This section was practically completed in a prior quarter, and has had some slight work of placing coping and backing, log done to it during the present quarter.

Fark Place Section.

This section, which was practically completed during the prior quarter, has also had some slight work of placing coping and backing-log during the present quarter. The approaches to Piers 16 and 17 have been removed.

Desbrosses Street Section.

The wall at this section is being built by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company under permit from the Board of Docks. The North Ferry slip has been removed and the new ferry slip is now being occupied by the railroad company. Work on the remaining portion of the wall has begun and progress is being made therein. The old ferry structures are being removed and the new ferry buildings will be placed in accordance with the terms of the agreement with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

Pier, new 31, N. R.

A shed is being erected on the pier and on the bulkhead by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad under permit from the Board.

Pier, new 43, N. R.

An extension to the outer end of the pier is being built by the force of the Department under resolution of the Board, and will shortly be completed.

Pier, new 47.

An extension is being built to the inner end of this pier by the force of the Department under resolution of the Board. Work is well under way.

Improvement of Water Front between Pier, new 46, and Gausewoort Street.

The bulkhead at this section was practically completed for the full length of the section during the previous quarter, and during the present quarter filling is being placed back of the wall.

Pier, new 48.

An extension to the bulkhead shed south of this pier is being erected by the White Star Line.

West Forty-second Street Section.

The Board, by resolution passed on the 27th of June, 1899, authorized the construction of the bulkhead-wall between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, on the North river. Work was begun on this section, but was temporarily suspended on account of an injunction restraining the Department from proceeding therewith. The work, however, was resumed during the last quarter, and during the present quarter considerable progress has been made.

West Forty-third Street Section Extended.

This section is in the same condition as the preceding one. Considerable progress has been made during the quarter.

Pier West Fifty-Seventh Street, N. R.

Preparatory work for the extension of the outer portion of this pier has been in progress under a resolution of the Board of the 27th June, 1900.

West Fifty-ninth Street Section.

The Board, by a resolution passed on the 27th of June, 1900, authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead or river wall in the vicinity of Fifty-ninth street, on the North river, and the construction of a new pier at the foot of the street. The work of dredging for the new section has been begun, and is in progress, and removal of the old pier at the foot of the street is being progressed with to make way for the new pier.

EAST RIVER.

Broad Street Section.

The Board, at a meeting held on the 22d of December, 1899, authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall between Whitehall street and Pier, new 7, on the East river, and the construction of two new piers. Substantial work has been done in this section and 135 feet of granite set on the "E" course. Construction of Pier, new 5, was fully completed, and work on Pier, new 4, is rapidly approaching completion. A contract has been let for the construction of a freight shed upon this latter pier, and the work will shortly be begun.

Catharine Section, E. R.

Work on this section has been temporarily suspended. No work has been done during the quarter, the work having been completed as far as can be until further property has been acquired.

Market Section.

The Board, by a resolution passed the 23d of February, 1900, authorized the construction of a bulkhead or river wall in the neighborhood of Market street, and work has been begun during the present quarter. Pier, old 40, East river, was removed to make way for the construction of new pier to be known as Pier, new 31. A contract has been let for the construction of this pier, and work thereon has been begun.

Rugers Section.

Substantial progress has been made in the work on this section during the quarter. Coping has been set on the wall and about 230 linear feet of new wharfage room made. Filling has been placed in the rear of the wall. A new wooden pier has been constructed under contract No. 676, and completed during the quarter.

East Twenty-third Street Section.

By resolution of the Board the work on this section has been divided into two parts, known as section A and section B. The work has been in progress at both these divisions, and about 130 linear feet of new wharfage room made. Considerable coping has been set at the lower end of the section, and filling is being placed. The ferry structures of the Twenty-third Street Ferry are being removed outshore by the Brooklyn and New York Ferry Company.

Pier Twenty-second Street, E. R.

The construction of the wooden pier at the foot of this street by the force of the Department was actually completed during the quarter. This pier was, however, so nearly completed during the prior quarter that it was reported in the last quarterly report.

East Thirty-eighth Street Section.

The Board, by a resolution passed on the 4th of May, 1900, authorized the construction of new section in the vicinity of East Thirty-eighth street, East river. The work has recently been begun, and is in progress. The outer end of the Pier at Thirty-eighth street has been removed to make way for the wall. Foundation piles were driven for tunnel outlet pipe for the General Tunnel Engineering Company. The dumping-board of the Street Cleaning Department was removed from the northerly side of the Pier at Thirty-eighth street, and a dumping-board erected on the southerly side inner end of the pier by the Street Cleaning Department.

East Seventy-fourth Street Section.

The Board having authorized the construction of a wall at this section by resolution passed the 11th of May, 1900, preparation has been made for the foundation of the wall, and concrete in bags has been placed.

Ninety-ninth Street.

The ferry slips of the New York and College Point Ferry Company were transferred, and a new ferry-house, bridge, etc., have been constructed by the ferry company under permit of the Board. The work of transferring the slips was done during the prior quarter. Construction of ferry-house, bridges, etc., was done during the present quarter.

One Hundred and Thirty-second Street and Park Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited along the water front of these premises by Frank Buckley under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, West of Gerard Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by Julian L. Mott under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street, East Side, H. R.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by John Cromwell under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-seventh Street and Lenox Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited to a grade of 5 feet above high water between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets, and from Lenox to Seventh avenue, by John D. Crimmins under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Thirty-seventh Street, H. R.

A coal pocket is being erected about 150 feet east of Madison Avenue Bridge by John S. Conabert.

Morris Heights, H. R.

Filling is being deposited, and a retaining structure to hold the same erected by the Gas Engine and Power Company and C. S. Seabury Company, Consolidated, under permit of the Board.

Spyglass Duvall Creek, H. R.

Filling is being deposited in the vicinity of Broadway, and a retaining structure erected by J. C. Rogers under permit of the Board. A crib-bulkhead is also being erected in this vicinity by T. & W. Thorne & Co., under permit of the Board.

Kingsbridge.

A pier about 50 feet in length was constructed at Jansen avenue by the estate of Hugh N. Camp under permit of the Board.

Willow Avenue, Bronx River.

The filling at these premises is being extended, and a rip-rap retaining structure erected by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company under permit of the Board.

Oak Point, Bronx River.

Filling is being deposited and other improvements made by the East Bay Land and Improvement Company under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Thirty-ninth to One Hundred and Fortieth Street, Port Morris.

A crib-bulkhead is being erected by D. F. Jones, under permit of the Board.

Mott Haven Canal.

A coal-boasting tower was erected at the coal pocket south of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street by Marcus Brothers, under permit of the Board.

Westchester Creek, Fort Schuyler Road.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by John S. Bush under permit of the Board.

Clason's Point, Long Island Sound.

The salt meadows at these premises are being filled in and a pier erected thereat by Clinton Stephens.

City Island.

A new pier was built at the foot of Main street, City Island, under Contract No. 690, and completed during the quarter, 975 linear feet of new wharfage room being made.

BROOKLYN.**Pier, new 5, Wallabout Basin.**

The work of constructing a new pier to be known as Pier, new 5 is in progress under Contract No. 687.

Sheepshead Bay.

The Manhattan Beach Hotel and Land Company are pumping sand and depositing same at Manhattan Beach.

Coney Island.

A breakwater is being constructed at Sea Gate by the Atlantic Yacht Club. Filling is being placed behind the bulkhead at Coney Island creek by Charles Hart.

Pier at Bath Beach.

A pier is being constructed east of Twentieth avenue by J. Lott Nostrand under permit of the Board.

Bensonhurst.

A crib is being constructed at this locality by Frederick Semken under permit of the Board of Docks.

Between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-seventh Streets.

The water front in this locality is being improved by the Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company under permit of the Board.

Pier Forty-second street, South Brooklyn.

A shed is being erected on this pier by the Bush Company Limited, and a pier is being erected between Fortieth and Forty-first streets by the same company.

Thirty-second street, Brooklyn.

A wooden breakwater is being constructed on the northeast side of the basin by John F. Andres under permit of the Board.

Between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets, Brooklyn.

The water front in this vicinity is being improved by the Brooklyn Dock and Terminal Company under permit of the Board. This work has been temporarily suspended.

Bond Street, Gowanus Canal.

An ice plant near the foot of Bond street has been erected by Leonard Michell under permit of the Board.

Between Wallabout and Cross Streets, Brooklyn.

A transfer bridge has been erected by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company under permit of the Board.

Green Street, Greenpoint.

The pier at this locality is being extended by the New York and Boston Dyewood Company.

Newtown Creek, Borough of Queens.

The Standard Oil Company are constructing an extension to their docks in this locality. The property of Cord Meyer & Co. is being improved under permit of the Board.

Dutch Kills.

A dock is being erected in the Kills by Thomas P. Hunt under permit of the Board.

Jamaica Bay.

A bulkhead is being erected by Mrs. Alexander C. Bowden.

Between Webster and Washington Avenues, Long Island City.

Cribs have been erected by the Bottlers and Manufacturers' Supply Company under permit of the Board.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.**Sailors' Snug Harbor.**

The dock property of the Sailors' Snug Harbor was rebuilt during the quarter, 14 linear feet of new wharfage room being made.

Port Richmond.

Two cribs were erected at Port Richmond on the property of Mary E. Jones under permit of the Board.

Shoemaker's Island, S. I.

Improvements are being made to the dock property by Townsend & Downey under grant of the Board.

Elm Park, S. I.

A crib-bulkhead was constructed at this locality by the Standard Varrish Company under permit of the Board, 86 linear feet of new wharfage room being made.

Tottenville, S. I.

A small dock has been erected at Raritan Bay, Tottenville, by William Ziegler under permit of the Board, 150 feet of new wharfage room being made.

PAVING MARGINAL STREETS, N. R.

Asphalt pavement has been laid at various places along the North river under Treasurer's Orders therefor, including between Chambers and Harrison streets, Piers, new 23 to 25, Pier new 27 to 29, and old 42 to new 35.

Also granite pavement has been laid at various places under several Treasurer's Orders including between Barclay and Warren streets and at Pier, new 29.

The pavement along the North river water front between Pier "A" and Fifty-seventh street has also been kept in repair.

PAVING ON THE EAST RIVER.

Pavement has been laid along the East river, and repairs made to pavement already laid from time to time, including work done at Twenty-sixth street, Sixty-fourth street, Seventy-eighth street and between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Forty-first streets, and the asphalt of the pavement between Ninety-ninth and One Hundredth streets.

TIMBER BASIN, N. R.

At the timber basin, timber has been received under various Treasurer's Orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required. The timber basin has been maintained in good order and condition.

PILE BASIN ON NORTH RIVER.

Pile basins between One Hundred and Fifty-third and One Hundred and Fifty-fourth streets, and between One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh streets, on the North river, have been maintained in good order and condition.

TIMBER BASIN, FORTY-THIRD STREET, SOUTH BROOKLYN.

A basin has been constructed for the reception and care of old material. This basin has been maintained, and the old material rafted and cared for.

DEPARTMENT YARDS, WEST FIFTY-SEVENTH AND EAST TWENTY-FOURTH STREETS.

At the Department Yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of material and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

RECREATION BUILDINGS.

The recreation buildings on the North and East rivers have been maintained and cared for.

SPRINKLING MARGINAL STREETS.

The marginal street on the North river, from Cortlandt to Twenty-seventh street, has been sprinkled from time to time.

PIER, NEW 11, N. R.

The outer end of this pier was damaged by the steamship "Bremen," of the North German Lloyd Steamship Company, while adrift from the fire at the steamship company's piers at Hoboken, and repairs are being made to the pier and shed by the Department force at the cost and expense of the steamship company.

FLOATING PROPERTY.

All the floating property of this Department has been cared for during the quarter, and has been repaired from time to time.

SURVEYING PARTY.

Surveys of the water fronts and the structures thereon on the North, East and Harlem rivers, in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, have been made. A detailed survey of the East river shore of the Bronx river, extending from Oak Point to Long Island sound, is in progress. An extensive survey of the water front of the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond is in progress. All the lines, levels, grades, surveys, soundings and examinations have been made and given as required.

DREDGING.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or by private parties.

REPAIRS.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places under order or permit from the Board of Docks.

Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties under order or permit from the Board of Docks have been supervised during the quarter.

DRAUGHTSMEN.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the water front, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examinations of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general office work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 5,015 linear feet. The wharfage room destroyed by the City in preparing for new improvements amounted to 1,115 linear feet, making the net new wharfage room made by the City 3,900 linear feet. The areas of the City's piers has been increased 138,748 square feet. The total increase of wharfage room made by private parties has been 3,134 linear feet.
