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THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The Board met in the Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall. In the absence of the President (Acting Mayor) the Vice-Chairman, Hon. James H. McInnes, occupied the chair.

In connection therewith the Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Corporation Counsel:

Sir—I have received your letter, dated August 14, 1902, to the effect that the duties of the Borough Presidents during the vacation season will be performed by the Commissioner of Public Works of each borough, in most instances, at least, and you request to be advised whether the names of these Commissioners should be added to the roll of the Board of Aldermen for the purpose of voting and also if they have the right to vote as the Borough Presidents on the different matters coming up for the Board's consideration while acting in this capacity.

Under section 18 of the Charter all of the Presidents of the several boroughs are members of the Board of Aldermen, although, as held by the Corporation Counsel in his opinion to you, dated August 11, 1902, they are not entitled to vote in filling a vacancy among the members elected to the Board of Aldermen.

It is provided in section 383 of the Charter that the President of each borough may appoint a Commissioner of Public Works for his borough, who may discharge all the administrative powers of the President of the Borough relating to certain matters, "and who shall, in the absence or illness of such President, discharge all the duties of such President."

At the end of the section is the following paragraph:

"Whenever by any of the provisions of this act powers are conferred or duties imposed upon a President of a borough, such powers may be exercised and such duties may be performed upon the request of said President, by the Commissioner of Public Works of said borough, if such official shall have been appointed; and if not, by any subordinate duly appointed by the President of said borough, under the powers conferred upon him by this act, and duly designated thereto in writing; and such powers and duties when exercised or performed by such Commissioner of Public Works or other appointee shall be regarded as having been exercised or performed by such President in the same manner as if such powers and duties had been actually exercised or performed by such President personally."

Under date of August 14, 1902, I advised Mr. Redfield, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, that I saw no reason to question his right to vote as a member of the Board of Aldermen in the same manner as the Borough President might do if he were personally present. Mr. Redfield had, however, a written designation from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

It is, I think, preferable, whether strictly necessary or not, in all cases that the President of the Borough should execute a designation in writing which should remain a matter of public record.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Report of Committee on Finance—

No. 670.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen, to whom was referred the assessment-rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York, for the year 1902, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated May 28, 1902, transmitting the Budget for the year 1902, accompanied by his certificate of the amounts of the appropriations authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for the year 1902, and an estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation during the current year, respectfully submits the following

REPORT:

The total Budget for the year 1902, as altered, modified and amended, pursuant to the provisions of section 10 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 436 of the Laws of 1902, is ninety-eight million six hundred and nineteen thousand six hundred dollars and eighty-eight cents (\$98,619,600.88), which includes county charges and expenses for the four counties, of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating three million six hundred and eighty-six thousand seven hundred and twenty-eight dollars and twenty-five cents (\$3,686,728.25), leaving ninety-four million nine hundred and thirty-two thousand eight hundred and seventy-two dollars and sixty-three cents (\$94,932,872.63). Of this latter amount, ninety-four million two hundred and ten thousand nine hundred and five dollars and eight cents (\$94,210,005.08)—is the amount of the Budget which affects the general tax rates of The City of New York, the balance, to wit, seven hundred and twenty-one thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven dollars and fifty-five cents (\$721,967.55)—is the amount to be raised by the issue of Special Revenue Bonds, under section 10 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 436 of the Laws of 1902.

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all county charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for county as distinguished from city purposes. Compliance with this provision of law will, of course, forever prevent an uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

AMOUNT TO BE RAISED FOR CITY AND STATE PURPOSES BY GENERAL RATES.

The following statement shows, therefore, the proportion of the Budget which is to be raised by taxation at uniform rates throughout the whole city:

Total Budget, as altered, modified and amended..... \$98,619,600.88

Less amount thereof to be raised by the issue of Special Revenue Bonds..... 721,967.55

Amount to be raised by taxation..... \$97,897,633.33

Less estimated revenues of the General Fund, as certified by the Comptroller and deducted, pursuant to section 902 of the Greater New York Charter..... 11,396,711.67

Net amount to be collected by tax..... \$86,500,921.66

Less aggregate of county budgets to be severally raised in the respective counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter..... 3,686,728.25

Tax to be raised by general rates throughout the City..... \$82,814,193.41

Percentage to be Added for Deficiencies in Collection.

Section 248 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your Committee has conferred with the Department of Finance in regard to the amount that will be required to provide for and meet such deficiencies as may occur in the actual product of the taxes to be imposed and levied in and for the year 1902, and have concluded to recommend that two per centum (2%) of the amounts to be collected by taxation for State, city and county budgetary purposes be added to and included in the tax levy for this purpose, this being the same percentage adopted last year and almost exactly the figure which, having prevailed in The City of New York prior to consolidation for over twenty years, has been found by experience to offset with substantial accuracy the deficiencies in the product of the tax resulting from vacated and modified assessments, uncollectible personal taxes, etc., etc. This estimate assumes that the so-called Special Franchise Assessments will be finally sustained by the Courts.

THE ASSESSED VALUATIONS.

Certain corporations which pay taxes directly to the State are exempt by law from local taxation for State purposes, so far as their assessment affects personal property. It is provided by section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896, as follows:

"Section 202. The personal property of every corporation, company, association or partnership, taxable under this article, other than for an organization tax, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation upon its personal property for State purposes, and the personal property of every corporation taxable under section one hundred and eighty-seven a of this article, other than for an organization tax, and as provided in chapter thirty-seven of the general laws, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation for all other purposes, if all taxes due and payable under this article have been paid thereby."

This provision of law requires, therefore, a special rate of tax to be imposed upon the personal estates of corporations which are exempt from local taxation for State purposes, differing from and less than the general rate for state, city and county purposes.

On the other hand, in the County of Kings, certain property of the Pratt Institute is exempt from local taxation by chapter 398 of the Laws of 1897, but not exempt from taxation for State purposes. This makes it necessary to fix a rate of tax on the assessment of this institution (\$1,150,500) which will produce only its proportionate share of State taxes.

The assessment-rolls for the current year, transmitted to the Board of Aldermen July 7, 1902, show the following valuations by counties:

The county lines correspond with the borough lines in all the boroughs except Manhattan and The Bronx, which, together, constitute New York County, and, as the rate of taxation in these two boroughs happens to be the same, it will be convenient in dealing with the assessed valuations to use the county classification.

The assessed valuation of the personal estate of corporations, joint stock companies or associations which have been found to be exempt under section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896 from taxation for State purposes in the year 1902, as appears by a detailed statement thereof on file in the Department of Finance, is as follows:

THE CITY TAX RATES: THE TOTAL TAX RATES.

As shown in the beginning of this report, the amount to be raised by uniform rates throughout the entire City for general City and State purposes is \$82,814,193 41. Adding two per cent. for deficiencies in collection 1,656,283 86

Amount to be levied \$84,470,477 27

It is to be noted that the quota of State taxes due from each of the respective counties is included in the Budget for City purposes, and in the above stated amount of tax to be raised by general rates throughout the City. In 1901 the quota of State taxes due from the several counties was included in the county charges and expenses, levied and raised in the several counties. The amount of State taxes due from The City of New York is this year imposed and levied with the tax to be raised by general rates throughout the City, pursuant to an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, expressed in a communication to the Comptroller under date of October 25, 1901.

Separating the amount to be levied, so as to show the proportion thereof for State and local City purposes respectively, produces the following result:

The assessed valuation of property liable to taxation for local City and State purposes is \$3,745,887,288 00

upon which the amount to be levied will be produced by a tax rate of 2.1937332472 per cent.

The assessed valuation of property liable to taxation for local City purposes only is \$110,009,930 00

upon which the amount to be levied will be produced by a tax rate of 2.0856838274 per cent.

The assessed valuation of property liable to taxation for State purposes only is \$1,150,900 00

(Pratt Institute)—upon which the amount to be levied will be produced by a tax rate of .1080494198 per cent.

Your Committee recommends that in fixing the actual tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the decimal fractions of such rates be not carried beyond five figures, i. e., hundred thousandths of one per cent, as any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing enormously and unnecessarily the difficulties of extending the tax-rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only \$284.08 in the whole tax levy of \$88,230,940.08.

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax-rolls, of the City, State and County rates, your Committee recommends that the aggregate thereof, or, in other words, the total tax rates in each borough, as the case may be, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1902. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, TO BE COLLECTED WITH THE ANNUAL TAXES.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

First—The amounts required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for flagging, curbing, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of said borough (late the Town of New Lots).

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1886.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements in the Thirty-first Ward of said borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, as amended.

Fourth—The amount required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 544 of the Laws of 1888, for flagging improvements in the Thirtieth Ward of said borough (late the Town of New Utrecht).

Fifth—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894, as amended by chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894.

The amount to be raised for the payment of the principal and interest on the New Lots bonds is twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22); the amount of the Flatbush sewer installment is thirty-two thousand six hundred and seventy-five dollars and eighty-three cents (\$32,675.83); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is fifty-four thousand five hundred and fifty-seven dollars and fourteen cents (\$54,557.14); the amount of the Thirtieth Ward flagging tax is eight thousand two hundred and thirty dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$8,230.67); the amount of the Flatbush avenue improvement installment is forty-six thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven dollars and twenty-three cents (\$46,927.23).

The law requires that these assessments and installments be included in the tax levy ordinance to be levied and collected with the annual taxes.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York, and the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for the payment of the quota of the State taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1902.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of eighty-two million eight hundred and fourteen thousand one hundred and ninety-three dollars and forty-one cents (\$82,814,193.41), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1902, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City Debt, and the quota of State taxes due from the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the Budget for the year 1902, which is to be raised by taxation, amounting in the aggregate to ninety-seven million eight hundred and ninety-seven thousand six hundred and thirty-three dollars and thirty-three cents (\$97,897,633.33), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of three million six hundred and eighty-six thousand seven hundred and twenty-eight dollars and twenty-five cents (\$3,686,728.25), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of eleven million three hundred and ninety-six thousand seven hundred and eleven dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$11,396,711.67), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York, in a communication dated May 28, 1902, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Budget for the year 1902, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said Budget are as follows:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this act and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the sinking funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations, by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such sinking funds for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt of the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which, by law, they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county; to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county for county, as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your honorable body statements as follows:

First—The altered, modified and amended Budget, in detail for the year 1902.

Second—The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget and to be raised, respectively, by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation.

Concerning the receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation, the following are the items of my estimate:

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Money received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as, from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

In addition to the sum of eighty-two million eight hundred and fourteen thousand one hundred and ninety-three dollars and forty-one cents (\$82,814,193.41) imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon said estates, to be raised, collected and paid according to law, two per cent. of said sum, or one million six hundred and fifty-six thousand two hundred and eighty-three dollars and eighty-six cents (\$1,656,283.86), the said amount being necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by the first section of this ordinance, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter.

Sec. 3. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, the sum

of two million two hundred and ninety-five thousand seven hundred and eight dollars and seventy-five cents (\$2,295,708.75), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1902, and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county two per cent. of said sum or forty-five thousand nine hundred and fourteen dollars and seventeen cents (\$45,914.17), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making the total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, two million three hundred and forty-one thousand six hundred and twenty-two dollars and ninety-two cents (\$2,341,622.92).

Sec. 4. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, the sum of one million one hundred and eighty-two thousand seven hundred and ninety dollars and fifty cents (\$1,182,790.50), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1902, and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county two per cent. of said sum or twenty-three thousand six hundred and fifty-five dollars and eighty-one cents (\$23,655.81), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making the total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings of one million two hundred and six thousand four hundred and forty-six dollars and thirty-one cents (\$1,206,446.31).

Sec. 5. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, the sum of one hundred and forty-four thousand four hundred and seventy-four dollars (\$144,474), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1902, and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county two per cent. of said sum or two thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine dollars and forty-eight cents (\$2,889.48), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, of one hundred and forty-seven thousand three hundred and sixty-three dollars and forty-eight cents (\$147,363.48).

Sec. 6. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, the sum of sixty-three thousand seven hundred and fifty-five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$63,755), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1902, and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county two per cent. of said sum or one thousand two hundred and seventy-five dollars and ten cents (\$1,275.10), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, of sixty-five thousand and thirty dollars and ten cents (\$65,030.10).

Sec. 7. The assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within The City of New York, for the year 1902, are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations of said estates for such year is hereby fixed at the sum of three thousand eight hundred and fifty-six million and forty-seven thousand seven hundred and eighteen dollars (\$3,857,047,718), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for said year submitted to the Board of Aldermen on the 7th day of July, 1902.

Sec. 8. The rates of tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, and the several counties and boroughs included within said city are, for the purpose of carrying out and making effective the foregoing sections of this ordinance, hereby fixed for the year 1902, as follows:

I. In the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (being also the County of New York), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 2.165.39 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2,273.44 per centum.

II. In the Borough of Brooklyn (being also the County of Kings), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 2.245.48 per centum; on the estates not subject to local taxation, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 398 of the Laws of 1887, .10804 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2,353.53 per centum.

III. In the Borough of Queens (being also the County of Queens), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes 2.210.68 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2,318.73 per centum.

IV. In the Borough of Richmond (being also the County of Richmond), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes 2.228.48 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2,336.53 per centum.

Sec. 9. In addition to the sums mentioned in the preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lots) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward improved by flagging, guttering, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1896, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making said improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of thirty-two thousand six hundred and seventy-five dollars and eighty-three cents (\$32,675.83), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirtieth Ward (late Town of New Utrecht) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements, for which the unpaid assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are, under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of fifty-four thousand five hundred and fifty-seven dollars and fourteen cents (\$54,557.14), as the same

seven dollars and twenty-three cents (\$46,927.23), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by said Board of Assessors on each lot, piece or parcel of land lying within the boundary lines of said assessment districts.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
