BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

The most important work done in the various buildings under our jurisdiction only is specified, it being understood that our repair squads are constantly called upon for minor repairs too numerous for specific mention.

City Hall—Refinished parquet floors in Mayor's office and halls, and washed down all walls; repaired clock tower and skylights; completed restoration of Aldermanic Committee Room. Furniture for this room has not yet been provided as necessary funds have not been voted by the Board of Estimate; a resolution covering this appropriation is now pending.

County Court House-Added new stall in toilet on main floor; relocated vent lines; placed new wash-basin; painted room throughout; painted clerks' toilet on the first floor; also public toilet on second floor; painted new work around Judges' elevator; enlarged office of Clerk Lyons by extending walls to include space on south side of the elevator; laid linoleum in various court rooms; installed electrically operated Booster vacuum pump for heating system; built supply closet under iron stairs of third floor; installed storm window-sashes in several court rooms; erected plaster model of the Riverside Drive extension in basement, and protected it by a fence; repaired cellar areaway doors and five revolving entrance doors; put thirteen fan motors on current from Hall of Records; rearranged lighting system in clerks' toilet, first floor, and in public toilet on second floor; installed four desk lamps in Part X, Trial Term; installed new radiator in the office of the clerk of Part III., Special Term; installed new radiator in the cellar; fastened steel wardrobe to the walls in Judges' robing room; repaired skylight on east end of the roof and painted all vent pipes on the roof; repaired brick work.

Criminal Courts Building-Repaired brick work on top of all boilers; reset flagstones of sidewalk around the building; repaired entrance doors and rearranged Judges' bench in Part I., Special Sessions; repaired the stationary closets in the District Attorney's office and installed several desk lamps; installed a two wire volt watt meter for metering electrical output; repaired roof in various places; also overhauled all elevators; had examination made of all walls of the building to determine if there had been any horizontal or lateral shifting since last examination. These examinations were made by Messrs. George C. Wheeler and Robert W. Boyd in consultation with Mr. E. P. Goodrich, and showed that the building had not shifted during the last year.

City Court-Installed new storm-sashes in three court rooms and made numerous repairs to sashes throughout the building; repaired and painted storm-hoods and railings at the north and south entrances to the building; repaired electric lights;

repainted Judge Finelite's chambers.

Hall of Records-Installed new system of lighting in room No. 6 on the sixth floor; prepared estimate for electrical feeder from Hall of Records to bridge terminal for the purpose of determining whether or not that plant could furnish energy to light Brooklyn Bridge. This data is now in the hands of Mr. Goodrich. Overhauled electric signals on elevators; installed additional lights in engine room and changed lighting system in room No. 4 on the second floor as had been done in other rooms for the purpose of increasing illumination; put Judge Cohalan's fireplace in good condition; repaired skylight over the entrance lobby.

East Fifty-seventh Street Court-Repaired roof, gutters and leaders; installed housedrip and fresh air inlet and radiator trap in prison pen; replaced 20 feet of tiled

pipe with cast iron pipe.

Harlem Court-Installed storm-doors and sashes in various court rooms; put new hand rail on stairs leading to cellar; relined walls of both boilers and rebuilt brick partitions of same; painted and varnished Magistrates' court room, complaint room, clerks' room, court officers' room, prison pens and hall; also Judges' hall and partitions of main hall; also iron work of elevator shaft; laid new linoleum in court officers'

Madison Street Court-Overhauled wall brackets in main court room; put new gutter on roof; repaired brick work of boilers; removed old urinals from toilet on the ground floor; repaired plaster in same room.

Sixth District Court, East Eighty-eighth Street—Repaired the swinging gates and

Jefferson Market Court—Cleaned and painted two flat roofs; let contract for repair of tower and coping around the entire building for the sum of \$1,268.00; work has been carried on with satisfactory progress and will be completed by the end of January. This will put the tower and roof in first-class condition for the first time

West Fifty-fourth Street Court-Relined both boilers with new fire brick.

300 Mulberry Street-Repaired electric pump in basement and repaired heating system; ran a new water line from cellar to second floor; covered various pipes in cellar and on the roof.

96 Reade Street-Repaired the heating system and rearranged lighting system. 51 Lafayette Street—Painted examination rooms of Civil Service Commission on

fourth floor.

Municipal Building-Carpenter squad did all necessary work for removal of Bureau of Buildings and Department of Public Works from their old quarters into this building. Electrical squad installed call-bell system throughout twentieth and twenty-first floors. Roofing squad altered and reconstructed steel shelving for Correspondence Division; also built store room for janitor's supplies in the cellar. Other data with regard to occupancy of this building will be discussed in a subsequent para-

155th Street Viaduct-Repaired leader pipes and street treads upon requisition of the Bureau of Highways.

Tenement House Department-Took down partitions and electric light fixtures in old quarters on 23rd st. upon their removal to this building.

Allen Street Bath-Installed new lighting system; repaired outside lights; re-

paired smoke duct; repaired engines between engine and boiler rooms. Carmine Street Bath-Replaced copper flashing stolen from the roof.

West Sixtieth Street Bath-Repaired balcony dressing room doors; repaired outside lights; repaired various window gearings and skylight over pool; installed new hypochloride tank on line leading to the pool; this tank was installed for the purpose inve per cent. (75%) completed, the work remaining to be done consisting of interior of purifying water used in the pool; repaired coal scales and rejoined cylinder of

East Twenty-third Street Bath-Repaired shower compartment doors and reinforced brick work around No. 2 boiler; repaired brass railing around swimming pool. East Seventy-sixth Street Bath—Repaired piping to boilers and feed water heater;

replaced broken roof tile with metal tile; repaired broken skylight glass. East One Hundred and Ninth Street Bath-Repaired leader on women's side, and stopped leaking steam joints; installed wheel guards around electric generators; rehung heat duct in cellar and repaired smoke flues; completed replacing Metropolitan floor slabs with cinder concrete, flat arches, under the main floor. This was a very important piece of work necessitated by the decomposition of the old floor, which was in danger of collapsing. The Mason squad, under Mr. Gillen, built under the floor about eighty individual concrete arches which have restored the floor to a solid foundation.

Rutgers Place Bath-Repaired casement sashes on front of building; replaced copper flashing stolen from the roof; painted and varnished the Bath throughout, with the exception of the gymnasium; completed the installation of new boilers and neces-

sary new piping.

East Eleventh Street Bath—Relocated air-separating tank and repaired roof in

several places.

East Fifty-fourth Street Bath-Connected up new receiving tank; repaired side and top brick work of both boilers; supervised contract work under Mr. Armstrong for installation of swimming pools. This work includes construction of two pools and necessary plumbing and heating connections, but the general contract is with the Andrews Building Company and progress has been totally unsatisfactory; although a large part of his time has expired, he has not completed one per cent. (1%) of the work, and it is probable we will have to cancel his contract and readvertise. The heating contract involves the installation of a new vacuum system in place of the old one line system. Frank Dobson is the contractor, and has done as much work as he could in view of the delay caused by the general contractor. The plumbing contract is with the Harley Plumbing Company. This company has not been able to do anything because of the delay of the general contractor. The Bath is, therefore, at present in a very much disturbed condition, and it seems likely to remain so for several months. There is also outstanding a contract for the general overhauling of the mechanical plant in this building. This contract is with the Curran Company. It includes repairs to the engines, new armatures and generators, the installation of new feed water weigher and receiving tank, and a general overhauling of the engine room equipment. This work is about eighty-five per cent. (85%) completed and will require about three weeks to finish. New outside lights over the sidewalk have been completed and are ready to be hung as soon as the heavy contract work is completed and the present sidewalk shed removed.

West Forty-first Street Bath-Repaired coal scales; laid new concrete floor under

and back of heaters; put a new tube in the boiler.

Cherry and Oliver Streets Bath—Rewound armature and put motor in good repair; placed steel plates on entrance doors to gymnasium; replaced copper flashing stolen from roof; painted and varnished the building throughout, except gymnasium; made various minor repairs to boilers.

Rivington Street Bath—Relined both boilers with new fire brick and set new cast

iron arch plates.

Interior Bath Patronage—The patronage for the interior baths for the fourth quarter was as follows: Allen Street Bath, 134,023; Carmine Street Bath, 70,484; Cherry and Oliver Streets Bath, 89,323; Rivington Street Bath, 84,376; Rutgers Place Bath, 111,617; East 11th Street Bath, 122,405; East 23rd Street Bath, 59,347; West 41st Street Bath, 95,588; East 54th Street Bath, 47,177; West 60th Street Bath, 97,389; East 76th Street Bath, 59,791; East 109th Street Bath, 77,635. Chatham Square Comfort Station—Repaired roof and gutters; painted kiosks inside and outside.

Mail Street Comfort Station-Replaced iron steam pipes with brass pipes; in-

stalled new floor and drains on men's side. Battery Park Comfort Station-Painted the station throughout.

Greeley Square Comfort Station-Prepared plans and specifications for alterations to this station necessitated by the construction of the Broadway subway which will take off the men's side. We have arranged with the engineers of the Public Service Commission for the construction of a new men's section on the southerly side of the building in place of the present section which will be demolished. The expense of this work will be included in the subway contract, and the work will be done under the joint supervision of the Public Service Commission and this office.

Hanover Square Comfort Station-Painted kiosks inside and outside; installed

new sink in men's side.

Willis Avenue Comfort Station-Renewed cold water pipes on men's side.

Sheriff and Delancey Streets Comfort Station-Repaired tiled flooring by putting in about 100 square feet of 2-inch hexagonal tile; placed all marble slabs and underpinned vestibule walls which had broken away through sinking of the flooring; painted building throughout and cleaned down the outside brick faces; also repaired soil pipe

125th Street and Park Avenue Comfort Station-Repaired entrance walls on women's side.

Washington Market-Installed gas pipe line for heater in Comfort Station; prepared plans and specifications for new concrete floor, counter lines and plumbing; received bids and let contracts for a total of \$30,138.00. These three contracts include also construction of temporary sheds on the north, east and south sides of the Market, which are to be occupied by the standholders while the new floor is being laid. Plans and specifications have also been prepared for a refrigerating plant to supply the building. These plans are now being checked by Mr. Goodrich. Corporate stock in the sum of \$25,000 has been voted for this plant, subject, however, to the approval of

the plans and specifications by the Board of Estimate. West Washington Market-A contract for general repair of these buildings was let for \$8,319. This work includes repair of all roofs, broken gutters, broken doors, windows, etc., and the painting of the buildings. The contractor began work on December 10th, and expects to finish by the first of February. These buildings will

then be in better condition than they have been for many years.

Fulton Market—Made extensive temporary repairs to the roof by using felt roofing covered with tar. We have, however, refrained from spending any considerable amount of money on this building as standholders continue to move out, and we expect to renew our recommendation to the Board of Aldermen that the Market be abandoned.

# CONTRACT WORK.

The following important contract jobs are being carried on under the supervision

of this Bureau and have reached the status indicated:

1. New Children's Court Building—The structural part of the building is completed; all walls are completed; the roof is on, the floors are in, largest part of the plumbing has been completed; plans and specifications have been prepared for the interior finish, and we have advertised for bids which will be opened on January 7th. The time estimated for the completion of the interior finish is one hundred (100) days, which would bring the building to a state of practical completion by the first of May. Progress has been very satisfactory.

2. Rivington Street Bath—This work includes the installation of swimming pool and additional showers, including necessary extra plumbing and heating. The total cost will reach about \$75,000. The work done up to December 31st includes foundations for additions to building, erection of all walls, completion of concrete swimming pool. All floors are laid, marble wainscoting and shower stalls fifty per cent. (50%) completed. Roof and skylights practically finished; filters, chemical tanks and circulating pump installed. Connecting piping about fifty per cent. (50%) completed. Drainage system finished, except for a few connections in the basement. Compressor for high pressure system installed; likewise generator to supply hot water to the pool. Vacuum heating and ventilating system about sixty per cent. (60%) finished. Altogether the work is about eighty per cent. (80%) completed, and the bath with its new equipment should be in good operation by the end of February.

3. Abingdon Square Comfort Station and Band Stand-All outside work of building is completed and interior work is nearing completion; should be ready for use in a few weeks. Seventy-five per cent. (75%) of the glazed tile is set. Ninety per cent. (90%) of marble set. The band stand floor tile is thirty per cent. (30%) completed. Building should be ready for use in a few weeks.

4. 129th Street and Third Avenue Comfort Station—This building is about seventyfinish and the installation of necessary plumbing fixtures. It should be ready for use

by the middle of February.

5. West Twenty-eighth Street Bath and Gymnasium-The work on this building has progressed very slowly, and not to our satisfaction. The general contractor, T. J. Buckley Engineering Company, has delayed the work in many ways, and it has been necessary for me to serve notice upon them that unless they proceed with more diligence, I will recommend the cancellation of their contract. The foundations are completed, and the walls brought up to the street level; the swimming pool has been installed, and the east and west walls brought up to the first floor; plumbing is completed in the cellar, and steel columns have been set up for the first floor; a few courses of front brick work have been laid and the second floor beams have been set in. Contractor claims that the delay is due to his not being able to get the neces sary steel. The work is only about fifteen per cent. (15%) completed. It should have been advanced two or three times that much.

6. Municipal Building-As stated in my last report, we have assumed the maintenance and operation of this building so far as it is being occupied by City departments. Below is given a schedule of the floors and occupants, and the date upon which they moved into the building:

Oct. 9, 1913 It is expected that the Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal will move into the seventeenth floor on January 26th. The City Chamberlain on the eighth floor on

January 23rd. There are no other plans for removal at this time. 7. Hall of Records Test-In my last report, I referred to this test which was to be carried on for a year for the purpose of securing accurate data to determine the cost of producing electrical and steam energy in an isolated plant, as compared with the cost of securing similar services by purchase from the Edison Company, and the New York Steam Company. This test was completed on December 16th, and the data obtained is now being collated by Professor Diederichs of Cornell, by whom it will be issued under the supervision of the full committee appointed to confer with him. This report is awaited with keen interest by all engineers interested in the question

of economy of isolated plant operation.

8. Municipal Asphalt Plant—The plans and specifications for this plant were prepared by Messrs. Wolfe and Eble of this Bureau, and the total contracts let amount to \$131,800. The buildings are completed and all the machinery installed, including dryers, boilers, flux tank and engines. All water connections and steam piping are ninety per cent. (90%) completed. The dryer room, sand and stone storage, coal bunkers, shafting, belting, etc., are also nearly finished. The asphalt kettles, mixers, oil, sand and asphalt weighing and measuring apparatus are installed. The elevator for conveying the raw asphalt to the top floor is practically completed. The plant is

about eighty-five per cent. (85%) finished.

Job Work Completed—The squads completed the following jobs during the quarter ending December 31st: Electrical Squad, 84; Carpenter Squad, 162; Plumbing Squad, 93; Steamfitting Squad, 28; Varnishing Squad, 71; Painting Squad, 25; Roofing Squad,

70; Awning Squad, 79; Mason Squad, 16. Total, 628.

There were 230 requisitions and open market orders issued during the quarter, as against 267 of the last quarter, and 325 check orders as against 311 in the previous quarter.



3. The vessels which contain milk, condensed milk or cream, while on sale, must be protected by suitable covers, and vessels so placed in the store that the milk, condensed milk or cream will not become contaminated by dust, dirt or flies.

4. Cans containing milk, condensed milk or cream shall not be allowed to stand on the side-walk or outside of the store door.

5. Milk, condensed milk or cream must not be transferred from cans to bottles or other ves-

sels on the streets, at ferries or at railroad de-

6. Vessels in which milk, condensed milk or cream is kept for sale shall be kept either in a milk tub, properly iced, or in a clean icebox or refrigerator in which these or similar articles of food are stored.

All containers in which milk, condensed milk or cream is handled, transported or sold must be thoroughly cleaned before filling, but such cleaning shall not be done, nor shall any containers be filled in any stable or in any room used for sleeping purposes, or in any room hav-ing connection with such stable or rooms, or with water-closet apartments, except when such water-closet apartments are enclosed by a vestibule, the doors of the same being provided with a spring or other device to keep them closed at all times, the door of water-closet opening toward said toilet and the door of vestibule opening

toward said store.

8. All dippers, measures or other utensils used in the handling of milk, condensed milk or cream must be kept clean while in use, and must be

thoroughly cleaned with hot water and soapsuds directly after each day's use.

9. The icebox or icetub in which milk, condensed milk or cream is kept must be maintained in a thoroughly clean condition, and must be scrubbed at such times as may be directed by the Department of Health.

10. The overflow pipe from the icebox in which milk, condensed milk or cream is kept must not be directly connected with the drain pipe or sewer, but must discharge into a properly trapped, sewer-connected, water-supplied open sink.

11. No person having a contagious disease, or caring for or coming in contact with any person having a contagious disease, shall handle milk.

Methods. 1. No milk or cream shall be dipped from cans stored in any room in which rubbish or dirty material is allowed to accumulate, or in which there are offensive odors.

2. All cans or other receptacles used for milk or cream shall be cleaned thoroughly upon

3. The cans from which milk or cream is dipped shall be packed in ice, and shall be kept covered at all times, except when the milk or cream is being actually dipped therefrom.

4. After each day's use all utensils shall be thoroughly cleaned with hot water and soda, and then with boiling water.

5. All utensils used for dipped milk or cream shall be kept clean.

6. The icetubs in which milk or cream is painted inside and outside, and

6. The icetubs in which milk or cream is stored shall be painted inside and outside, and shall be kept clean at all times.

7. A separate dipper shall be provided for each can from which the supply is being served, and such dipper shall remain in the can between dippings until all the milk in the can has been disposed of.

8. All goods sold in milk stores must be either.

8. All goods sold in milk stores must be either in unbroken packages, or must be so placed, protected and handled that no dust or odors there-

from can injuriously affect the milk.

9. Dry sweeping and dusting in rooms in which milk or cream is dispensed is prohibited.

10. The tags on cans of milk or cream must be kept on file in the store for at least two months, for inspection by the Department of Health.

12. Only such persons shall be employed as are free from infectious diseases which may be transmitted in the handling of milk.

All milk or cream brought into The City of New York to be pasteurized shall have a tag affixed to each and every can, indicating the place of shipment, date of shipment, and the words "to be pasteurized at" (stating location of pasteurizing plants).

As soon as the contents of such container or receptacle are sold, or before the said container is returned or otherwise disposed of, or leaves

is returned or otherwise disposed of, or leaves the possession of the dealer, the tag thereon shall be removed and kept on file in the store where such milk or cream has been sold for a period of two months thereafter for inspection

period of two months thereafter for inspection by the Department of Health.

Every wholesale dealer in The City of New York shall keep a record in his main office in the said City, which shall show from which place or places milk or cream, delivered by him daily to retail stores in The City of New York, has been received and to whom delivered, and the said record shall be kept for a period of two months for inspection by the Department of Health, and shall be readily accessible to the inspectors of the said Department at all times. said Department at all times.

Pasteurization. 1. All containers in which pasteurized milk or cream is delivered shall be plainly labeled "Pasteurized." 10. The receiving or handling of any milk or cream which does not comply with the minimum requirements, in rooms or in apparatus where Grade A Pasteurized Milk is handled or treated, is hereby prohibited.

Bules and Regulations for the Sale of

Dipped Milk and Cream in Stores in The

City of New York.

Milk, condensed milk or cream shall not be kept for sale nor stored in any stable, or room used for sleeping purposes, or in any room if in communication with such stable or room, or with water-closet apartments, except when such water-closet apartments are enclosed by a vestibule, the doors of the same being proopening toward said toilet and the door of vestibule opening toward said store.

2. The term "domestic purposes" shall be held to apply to rooms used for sleeping purposes or

for cooking purposes other than the preparation of the midday meal.

3. Milk or cream shall not be handled or sold in any room which is unduly crowded.

4. Milk or cream shall not be dipped from cans stored in a room in which butter or cheese

is manufactured.
5. Milk or cream may be stored in a cooling

or refrigerating room, or ice chest, the construction of which has been approved by the Department.

No milk or cream shall be dipped from cans stored in a milk booth.
7. Milk shall be kept at a temperature of 50

degrees Fahrenheit, or below, at all times.

Equipment.

Rooms in which milk or cream is handled or sold shall be well lighted.

The floors, walls and ceilings shall be smooth and must be kept clean and sanitary.

All windows and doors shall be properly correspend.

4. An adequate supply of hot water shall be provided for the washing of utensils.

5. A sufficient number of properly constructed icetubs or other adequate refrigerating facilities for cans of milk or cream shall be provided. 6. All utensils used for dipped milk or cream shall be of the seamless sanitary type, heavily tinned.

Rules and Regulations for the Use of a Sediment Tester.

1. A sediment tester, approved by the Department of Health of The City of New York,

must be used in all creameries shipping milk to The City of New York, 2. All milk received at any creameries so shipping milk as aforesaid must be tested thereat by the person having the management and control of such creamery, at least once a week, the result of such test to be posted in a conspicuous place in the creamery, and duplicates of such test forwarded to the Department of Health at the end of each month.

3. A photograph or gauge established by the Board of Health of The City of New York must be used as a standard in the creameries herein referred to in determining whether milk contains

Where the maximum of sediment is shown to habitually exist in milk tested as aforesaid at any creamery it will constitute sufficient cause to rate the milk as Grade C, with the right of said Board to exclude such milk from The City of New York when such conditions continue.

Rules and Regulations for the Purpose of
Restricting the Sale of Condensed Skimmed

Definition.

Condensed skimmed milk is milk in which the butter fat is less than twenty-five (25) per cent. of the total milk solids. Regulations.

The cans containing such milk shall be colored bright blue and shall bear the words "Condensed Skimmed Milk" in block letters at least two inches high and two inches wide, with a space of at least one-half inch between any two letters. The term "adulterated milk," when so used in this code, means: First-Milk containing more than eighty-eight

and one-half per centum of water or fluids.

Second—Milk containing less than eleven and one-half per centum of milk solids.
Third—Milk containing less than

Fourth-Milk drawn from animals within fif-teen days before or five days after paturition. Fifth-Milk drawn from animals fed on dis tillery waste or any substance in a state of fer-mentation or putrefaction, or on any unwhole-

ome food. Sixth-Milk drawn from cows kept in a crowd-

ed or unhealthy condition.

Seventh—Milk from which any part of the cream has been removed.

Eighth—Milk which has been diluted with water or any other fluid, or to which has been added, or into which has been introduced, any

foreign substance whatever.

Ninth—Milk the temperature of which is higher than 50 degrees Fahrenheit, or which contains an excessive number of bacteria.

Tenth—Milk produced in violation of the rules

and regulations adopted by the Board of Health The provisions of this section shall not be ap-plicable, however, to modified milk held or offered for sale under permits therefor from the Board of Health, pursuant to the rules and regulations of said Board.

Resolved, That section 56 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended to take effect on or after June 1, 1914, so as to read as fol-

Section 56. No milk or cream shall be held kept, offered for sale or sold and delivered in The City of New York under either or any of the designations known as Grade A, B or ( any of the subdivisions thereof, or any of the designations Condensed Skimmed Milk, Condensed or Concentrated Milk, or Modified Milk, without a permit in writing therefor from the Board of Health, subject to the conditions

By the term "modified milk" is meant milk f any subdivision of the classification known as 'Grade A: for Infants and Children," has been changed by the addition of water, sugar of milk or other substance intended to render

the milk suitable for infant feeding.

The provisions of this section shall not apply to milk or cream, except "modified milk," when said milk or cream is entirely consumed on the premises; nor to condensed milk or condensed skimmed milk when contained in hermetically sealed cans. The permit shall specify the grade of the milk or cream which the holder of the permit is authorized to keep, sell, offer for sale

or deliver.

The term "adulterated," when used in this section, refers to cream in which any foreign substance whatever has been added, or which has been put through a process by means of which it has been made to appear better than it really is, or which contains less than 18 per cent. of butter fat.

The provisions of this section shall apply to all cream products and preparations such as sour

cream, smeteny, homo or milk curds.

Resolved, That section 183 of the Sanitary

Second-The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railroad shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, until January 1, 1929, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be de-termined by three disinterested freeholders se-lected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by

the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their re-port shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. During the remainder term of five (5) years an annual sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000). The annual charges shall commence from

January 1, 1914.
All annual charges as above shall be paid All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fifth-The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwith-standing any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad com-pany providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any person or corporation a franchise or right to use the streets hereinbefore mentioned, or any part of them, for railroad purposes, and the Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall consent to the construction and operation of a railroad by any such other corporation or individual which may receive a franchise therefor from the City; provided, how-ever, that nothing in this clause contained shall estop the Company from appearing before the Board and being heard on any application for rights in said streets.

Seventh—If the right of way on private property upon which the Company proposes to operate or any location of track herein authorized (all as shown on the map hereto attached) shall be crossed intersected or joined by the right of way or tracks of another railroad corporation, then the Company shall unite with such corporation in forming the necessary connections between the railroads of the Company and such corporation, and shall grant the requisite facilities therefor, whether the tracks on the right of way of such corporation are at the same or a different grade from the tracks of the Company at the point of such crossing or intersection.

In case the Company and such corporation can-

not agree upon the amount of compensation to be paid therefor, such compensation shall be fixed in the manner provided in section 22 of the Railroad Law.

When such railroads shall be so connected, the Company shall receive from such other corporation, and forward to their destination, all goods, merchandise and other property intended for points on its railroad, and receive and forward to the railroad of such other corporation all goods, merchandise and other property shipped by way of the Company's railroad and intended for points thereon, with the same despatch and the granting of the same, as are necessary for at a rate of freight not exceeding the local tariff rate charged for similar goods, merchandise and other property received at or forwarded from the same points for individuals and other corpora-

The intent and purpose of the foregoing is to provide for the use of the Company's railroad by any other railroad which may be constructed in the vicinity, so that such other railroad may be afforded an outlet and rail connection with a trunk line railroad or a water connection with the Dutch Kills Creek by means of the railroad of the Company.

Eighth-The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other per son or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unneces-

sary any subsequent consent or consents. Ninth-Should it be deemed advisable by the Board at any time during the term of this contract to require the extension of the tracks of the Company to reach property owned by any individual or corporation making application to the Board for such extension, and the Board shall so order, then the Company shall, immediately after reaching an agreement with such applicants with respect to the terms upon which such extension shall be constructed, or in lieu thereof a determination of the arbitrators, as herein provided apply for and accept a franchise upon terms and conditions similar to those contained herein to extend its tracks beyond the tracks now planned by the Company, as indicated by the layout of track shown upon the map at-tached hereto, to the property of such applicant, and upon receiving such a franchise the Company shall, upon terms to be agreed upon be-tween the petitioner and the Company, so extend its tracks and deliver and receive freight for shipment to all persons desiring such service along the line of such extension or extensions, such service to be performed at the rates charged for similar service upon the railroad herein authorized, or as may be fixed by the Board.

In case the Company and the applicants for such extension cannot agree upon the terms upon which such extension shall be constructed, including the division, if any, of the cost of the extension and of the maintenance thereof, then such terms shall be determined and fixed by three arbitrators selected in the following man

One fit and impartial person shall be chosen by the Company; one fit and impartial person shall be chosen by the applicant or applicants for such extension, and the two so chosen shall choose a third fit and impartial person. The decision under oath of any two of such persons who shall be so selected shall be final and conclusive. If either the Company or such applicant fails to appoint an arbitrator, as herein provided, or should the first two arbitrators fail to agree on the selection of a third arbitrator within thirty days after the first two arbitrators shall be chosen, or if no two arbitrators selected shall agree upon the terms upon which such extension shall be constructed and maintained within sixty (60) days after the arbitrators shall be so selected, then such may be fixed by a commissioner appointed by the Supreme Court on the application of either party.

Tenth—The Company shall commence construction of any portion of the railroad herein authorized which shall be necessary to transport freight to or from property proposed to be so served, as indicated by the layout of the railroad shown upon a map attached hereto, within thirty (30) days from the date upon which application for service shall be made by the owner or occupier of such property, provided that the consents of the property owners, as herein required have been obtained, or, in lieu thereof, an order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law confirming the determination of the com-missioners appointed thereunder that such rail-road ought to be constructed, has been issued If the consents of property owners have not been obtained, nor the order of the Appellate Division issued, at the time when application for the use of such railroad is made by such owner or occupier of such property, then, the Company shall commence the construction of that portion of the railroad for which application has been so made within thirty (30) days after the obtaining of such consents or the issuance of such order. The Company shall complete such portion of said railroad and place the same in operation within sixty (60) days after such application has been made by such owner or occu-pier of said property, or if neither the consents of the property owners or said order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court has been obtained at the time such application is made, then within sixty (60) days from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order. If the Company shall fail to complete the construction of the railroad and put the same in operation as herein required, all rights hereunder shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City. Provided, however, that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railroad in operation may be extended by the Board; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be dili-gently prosecuted by the company, and provided that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice-to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such

proceedings.
Eleventh—If the grade of the tracks or any portion thereof herein authorized be at any time during the existence of this contract changed to a position either above or below the surface of the streets or avenues, then the Company shall pay to the City any sum or sums which the City may be required by law to pay toward the change of grade of such tracks.

Twelfth—Said railroad shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railroad shall be commenced until written permits have been ob-

tained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of

the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railroad within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Thirteenth—The work of construction of the tracks hereby authorized shall be done in such

manner as shall not substantially interfere with the ordinary use of any street or avenue as a public highway.
Fourteenth—During the period prior to Janu-

ary 1, 1916, cars may be operated upon said tracks by steam locomotives which shall be housed or boxed so as to conform with the type commonly known as the "dummy engine." On or before January 1, 1916, the Company shall discontinue the use of said dummy steam locomotives and operate said tracks by electric power or any other motive power which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the abutting property owners in accordance with the provisions of law and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York. It is understood, however, that no overhead wires except trolley wires shall be permitted for the operation of said tracks by the electric power.

Fifteenth—Neither pedestrians nor vehicles shall be prevented from crossing the tracks hereby authorized by the occupation of such tracks by cars or trains operated thereon, for a greater period than five (5) consecutive minutes at any time, and the aggregate of such periods shall not exceed ten (10) minutes in any hour between 7 o'clock a. m. and 6 o'clock p. m.

Sixteenth-Should the Company be allowed to operate at the same grade as the streets and avenues, the Company shall station flagmen at such points as shall be necessary to exclude pedestrians and vehicles from the tracks at all times when cars or trains shall be operated thereon. Should it seem necessary in the opin-ion of the Board at any time during the term of this contract that gates be erected, maintained and operated across any of the streets or avenues for the purpose of excluding pedestrians and vehicles from the tracks hereby authorized, then the Company shall erect, maintain and operate such gates as may be designated upon thirty

(30) days' notice by the Board to the Company.

Seventeenth—As long as the said tracks or any
portion thereof shall remain in the streets and avenues during the term of this contract the Company shall, at its own expense, set the curbs and pave the entire roadway and sidewalk and keep the same in permanent repair upon that portion of Nott avenue between the southeasterly ide of Meadow street and the westerly side of School street, that portion of Anable avenue be-tween the easterly side of Orton street and the westerly side of School street and those por-tions of Davis street, Pearson street, Creek street, Orton street, Manly street, Mount street and Anable avenue, except Anable avenue between Orton street and School street, between the tracks and the rails of the tracks hereby authorized in said streets and avenues and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond such rails on either side thereof; all of the work to be done under the supervision of the local authorities in such manner and at such time as they may prescribe. In case of the neglect of the Company to make pavement or repairs after the expiration of wenty (20) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough of Queens, said President may make the same at the expense of the Company, and the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official. at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Eighteenth-Should the Company be allowed avenues, it shall at all times keep that portion of Nott avenue between the southeasterly side of Meadow street and the westerly side of School street, that portion of Anable avenue between the easterly side of Orton street and the westerly side of School street and those portions of Davis street, Pearson street, Creek street, Orton street, Manly street, Mount street and Anable avenue (except Anable avenue between Orton street School street), between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the President of the Borough of Queens, enter an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Nineteenth-Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railroad is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railroad has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improveent upon said streets or avenues the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such

Twentieth-It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a railroad shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railroad in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-first-Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railroad, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the

proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-second—Said railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of railroad construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railroad equipment, including rolling stock and railroad appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine. Twenty-third—The rates for carrying property

upon the tracks hereby authorized shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, and may be fixed by the Board after notice to the Company, and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, and no rates in excess of those fixed shall be charged for such

Twenty-fourth-The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next pre-

service.

ceding and at any other time upon request of the Board, which shall give the result of the operations of the railroad during the year and such other information in regard to the business of

the Company as may be required by the Board.
Twenty-fith—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total length of track in operation within the limits of the City and the length of track constructed and operated under this contract and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-sixth-In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted, may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Cor-poration Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railroad constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-ninth-This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the pay ment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at reasonable rates, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice, the quality of construction of the railroad, and the maintenance of the property in good condi-tion throughout the whole term of this contract; and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or comoliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furuished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder relating to the obstruction of traffic and the maintenance of gates and flagmen, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each day of violation, all of which sums may be deducted from said fund. The procedure for the imposition and collection

of the penalties in this contract shall be as

follows: The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty or where the arrows of the scribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10. 000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the

City.

Thirtieth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Compuny is hereby authorized to operate.
Thirty-first—The Company hereby agrees that

it will not institute any proceedings to acquire by condemnation any land, property, appurtenances or rights pursuant to any law, unless and until permitted to do so by resolution of the Board, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Thirty-second-The words "notice" or "direcwherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been

designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal no-tice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-third-If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or

strued as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on April 10, 1913, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon, as May 8, 1913, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in "The Evening Mail" and "New York Press" newspacers design. and "New York Press," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the CITY RECORD for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day: and Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to

the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the Union Railway Company of New York City, and the adequacy of the compensation to be paid there-

for: now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right aplied for by the Union Railway Company of New York City, containing the form of the proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Ap-

portionment hereby grants to the Union Railway Company of New York City the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract con tained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to

#### PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This Contract, made and executed in duplicate this day of , 1914, by and be-tween The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Union Railway Company of New York City (here-inafter called the Company), party of the second

part, witnesseth:
In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto

do hereby covenant and agree as follows: Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate double and single track extensions to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following routes,

to wit:

First—Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in Lincoln avenue; thence westerly by double track in, upon and along East 136th street to and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in 3d avenue, Borough of The Bronx, in order that the title of said Company to operate over such route may be perfected and legalized.

Second—Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in Willis avenue, at or near the northerly side of East 134th street, at or near the northerly side of East 134th street, Borough of The Bronx; thence southerly by double track in, upon and along Willis avenue and upon and over the Willis Avenue Bridge and its approaches to East 125th street, Borough of Manhattan; thence by double track westerly in, upon and along said East 125th street and West 125th street to Manhattan street; thence by double track westerly in, upon and along said Manhattan street to West 129th street; thence westerly by single track in, upon and along said Manhattan street to 12th avenue; thence south erly by double track in, upon and along said 12th avenue to West 129th street; thence easterly by single track in, upon and along said West 129th street to Manhattan street, and there connecting with the existing east-bound track in said Manhattan street.

Third-Beginning at and connecting with the above described tracks on the Willis Avenue Bridge at the intersection of the northerly and easterly approaches to said bridge; thence easterly and northerly by double track upon and over said easterly approach to and connecting with the existing tracks in Southern boulevard, Borough of The Bronx.

And to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said routes. The said routes, with turnouts, switches and crossovers, hereby authorized, are

switches and crossovers, hereby authorized, are shown upon two maps entitled, respectively:

(a) "Map Showing Proposed Extension of the Union Railway Co. of New York City, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition dated March 31, 1913, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

(b) "Map Showing Proposed Extension of the Union Railway Co. of New York City, in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition dated March 31, 1913, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment"

—each of said maps is signed by Edward A. Maher, Vice-President, and T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer, a copy of each of said maps is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text there-of, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing descriptions and the other pro-visions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

The first and third routes above described to be operated by the Company as parts of continuous routes in connection with its existing lines in the Borough of The Bronx and the second route above described to be operated by the Company as part of a continuous route in connection with its existing lines in the Borough of The Bronx, to and over the Willis Avenue Bridge and its approaches, to 125th street in the Borough of Manhattan, and by means of trackage agreements with other companies upon and along 125th street and other streets to the intersection of Manhattan street and 12th avenue. and upon failure of the Company to so operate said routes, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Nothing in this contract shall be construed as permitting the construction of more than one double track street surface railway upon any of the routes hereinabove described

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is sub-ject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

irst-The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within said three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Com-missioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to

be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease Second—That said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and en-joyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor until August 2, 1936, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such

right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years, and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) lessee that the same is subject to all the condi-

years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the folowing manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, with out the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annua' rate then determined over the previous annual rate The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company each paying one-half thereof. Third—The Company shall pay to the City for

the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the

privilege hereby granted,
(b) During the first term of five (5) years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand eight hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$3,875), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts,

If the Company and so if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand eight hundred and seventy-five dollars

During the second term of five (5) years, an During the second term of five (5) years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven thousand one hundred dollars (\$7,100), One fit and impartial person shall be chosen seven thousand one hundred dollars (\$7,100), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage

shall exceed the sum of seven thousand one hundred dollars (\$7,100).

During the third term of five (5) years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven thousand eight hundred dollars (\$7,800), and which shall be shall be said to the said the said to the said and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven thousand eight hundred dollars (\$7,800).

During the fourth term of five (5) years, an

annual sum which shall in no case be less than eight thousand six hundred dollars (\$8,600), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of eight thousand six hundred dollars (\$8,600).

During the remaining term, expiring August 2, 1936, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than nine thousand four hundred and fifty dollars (\$9,450), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum nine thousand four hundred and fifty dollars (\$9,450).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the ex-tensions hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the

date upon which this contract is signed by the

Mayor. (c) For the use of the Willis Avenue Bridge and its approaches during the term expiring August 2, 1916, an annual sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500); during the succeeding term of five (5) years expiring August 2, 1921, an annual sum of two thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,750), and during the remaining term of fifteen (15) years expiring August 2, 1936, an annual sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000). The compensation herein reserved shall commence from the date on which

this contract is signed by the Mayor. All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall

bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preced-

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law, as amended, and such charges as are required under chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 to be said by the Company for these extensions to be paid by the Company for these extensions, if said act applies to or controls the Company in relation to the rights and privileges hereby

granted.

The City does not and shall not demand or require the payment by the Company of a per centage of gross receipts under the provisions of chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892, on the gross receipts earned on the extensions constructed pursuant to this contract.

And any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter re-

quired to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstand-ing any clause in any statute or in the charter any other railway or railroad company pro viding for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assign-ment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renew al), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof,

tions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary not-withstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth-Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any other corporation or to any individual a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the routes hereinbefore described, and the Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon request of the Board, consent to the use for street surface railway purposes of the tracks and appurtenances covered by this grant, or any portion thereof, by any such other corporation or individual which may receive a franchise therefor from the City.
Should the City at any time during the term

of this contract grant to any other corporation or to any individual the right or privilege to operate a railway upon the tracks of the Company on the routes herein described, or any por-tion thereof, then the City shall, within thirty (30) days thereafter, give notice to the Com-pany that such right has been granted, and of the name of the corporation or individual to

which such right has been granted. At the expiration of the ninety (90) days after the giving of such notice such individual or cor-poration shall have the right to begin the opera-tion of cars upon the tracks of the Company upon the route, or any portion thereof, over which such corporation or individual may receive a right or privilege, and to use therefor the tracks, company which shall be necessary in the opera-tion of the cars of such individual or corpora-tion upon the tracks of the Company and shall have the right to continue such operation until this contract, or the right to use such property under the terms of this contract granted said corporation or individual by the City, shall expire. Such corporation or individual shall pay to the Company for the right to use such tracks, equipment, power and other property above de scribed, such sum or sums as may be agreed upon in writing by such corporation or individual and the Company within said ninety (90) days, or in the event that such agreement cannot be reached within said ninety (90) days, such sum or sums as shall be determined in the manner

If the Company and such corporation or indi vidual cannot, prior to the expiration of said ninety (90) days, agree upon the compensation for the use of such tracks, then such compensa-

by the Company; one fit and impartial person shall be chosen by such corporation or individual and the two so chosen shall choose a third fit and impartial person. The decision under oath of any two of said persons who shall be so selected shall be final and conclusive.

The compensation and expenses of the persons

selected as arbitrators in the determination of such sum or sums shall be borne by the individual or corporation to which such right may be

Within thirty (30) days after an agreement shall have been reached between said parties, or in case said agreement cannot be reached before the time specified herein, then within thirty (30) days after the determination of the arbitrators, as herein provided, should two of such arbitrators agree, the said parties shall hie a duplicate copy of a written agreement with the Board which shall specify the sum or sums which shall have been agreed to by the said parties or determined by said arbitrators as the sum or sums which such corporation or individual shall pay to the Company for said privileges. If the Company fails to file the same with the Board within said thirty (30) days, then the right herein granted shall cease and determine.

If either party fails to appoint an arbitrator, as herein provided, or should the first two arbi trators fail to agree on the selection of a third arbitrator within thirty (30) days after the expiration of said ninety (90) days, or if no two of said arbitrators so selected agree upon the sum or sums to be paid by such individual or corporation within sixty (60) days after they shall have been so selected, then such sum or sums shall be fixed by the Supreme Court upon the application

of either party.
Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or cor-poration whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the con solidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh-Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pur-suant to this contract within the streets and avenues and upon the bridge shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets, avenues and bridge shall be restored to their original condition at the ole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth-The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law, confirming the determination of the Com-missioners appointed thereunder that such rail way ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City: provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said

ment or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth-Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and deter-

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of

the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues and upon the bridge over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon the bridge and its approaches, or upon private property shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water

Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—The portion of said railway in the Borough of Manhattan shall be operated by underground electric power substantially similar to the system of underground electric power now used by the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan; provided that any other power may be used, except locomotive steam power, horse power or overhead electric power, which may be lawfully used, approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the provisions of law and by the Public Service Commission for the and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York. The portion of said railway in the Borough of The Bronx and upon the Willis Avenue Bridge and its approaches, may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street sur-tace railways in the Borough of The Bronx; provided that any other power may be used, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be lawfully used, approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the provisions of law and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York First District of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, upon giving to the Company one (1) year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of the routes herein authorized by underground electric power substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or by any other practical motive power then in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues, and upon the bridge and its approaches, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove it poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets, avenues and bridge of the City.

Twelfth—Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the trans-mission of power, except trolley wires, for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the routes hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two (2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such conduits shall be used only by the

Company for the operation of its railway, and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride, from any point on its road or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control to any other point thereof, or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the rail-

way hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are

in full uniform,
Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said

Fifteenth-The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities and the state of t ties, or as may be required by resolution of the

Sixteenth-All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be re-quired by resolution of the Board. Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some

lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company, so long as it shall

continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues or bridge in or upon which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets, avenues and bridge, except when the width of such streets, avenues and bridge shall exceed sixty (60) feet between the curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets, avenues and bridge in a satisfactory man-

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, aveneus and bridge, upon which the said railway is constructed, between its

tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season or part thereot, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

And provided, further, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Bridges enter into an agreement for each winter season or part thereot, to clean an equivalent amoun of roadway upon the bridge and its approaches.

I wenty-nrst-As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue upon the bridge, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the sur-face of the street, avenue or bridge in or upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

In case of the neglect of the Company to pave

or repair the pavement on the streets after the expiration of twenty (20) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough having jurisdiction, or in case of the neglect of the Company to pave or repair the pavement on the bridge after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice so to do from the Commissioner Bridges, said President or said Commissioner, as the case may be, may pave or repair the same at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-second-Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other subsurtace or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

I wenty-tourth-Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constituted and during the term of this contract the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and imes, and during the construction of any public improvement abon said streets and avenues, the Company snah take care of and protect the tracks appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done supject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such

I wenty-nfth-The Company shall keep and maintain the tracks and the electrical equipment upon the bridge and its approaches necessary for the operation of cars thereon in good order and repair and in such manner as shall be approved and directed by the Commissioner of Bridges, and shall turnish all motive power required by the Commissioner of Bridges for the operation of its cars. It deemed necessary by the Commissioner of Bridges, the Company shall install and operate a system of signals to insure the sate and efficient operation of cars, such system to be approved by the Commissioner of Bridges. The Company shall submit to the Commissioner of Bridges plans and specifications for the proposed construction upon the bridge, which plans and specifications shall be approved by said Commissioner of Bridges before any part of said construction shall be commenced and the Commissioner of Bridges may require the Company to make such alterations in the bridge structure as are necessary in order to permit of the sate operation of cars thereon without in any way im pairing the usefulness of the bridge. In the event of any necessity for changing the layout of tracks, curves, switches, sidings or platforms on the bridge, in order to facilitate operation of cars by the Company, said Company must do all the work and turnish all the labor and tools necessary for effecting such changes, which shall all be made under the control and direction of the Commissioner of Bridges, and no such changes or construction connected therewith, or relating thereto, shall be made unless the plan or plans for the same have been first submitted to the Commissioner of Bridges and approved by

Twenty-sixth-Before beginning the operation of cars the Company shall hle with the Commissioner of Bridges a statement for his approval and assent as to the type of car which it proposes to operate and a sketch showing clearance dimensions, weight on axles and wheel spacing, or such other information as may be required by said Commissioner. All cars operated over the bridge by the Company and all equipment and appliances relating to such operation shall be subject at all times to the inspection of the Commissioner of Bridges or his authorized representatives, who shall have power to forbid the entrance to the bridge of cars which may for any reason be unsatisfactory, and who shall have power to direct the removal of any old or inade quate appliance and the substitution therefor of appliances of approved character.

Twenty-ninth-The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross re-ceipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report

shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company, for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine

its officers under oath.

Thirtieth-In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board or of the Commissioner of Bridges, acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on no-tice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by vitrue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without pro-ceedings at law or in equity. Provided, how-ever, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution de-claring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. The Board, on complaint made, shall give no tice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as ap-pears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount, and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the pro-visions of this contract shall affect any other

legal right, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.
