DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING AUGUST 22, 1914.

WHY DEAL IN DIRTY FOOD STORES?

We have heard much, in the past few years, concerning food adulteration, misbranding, the use of preservatives, etc. Much of this agitation has undoubtedly been productive of good. It must not be forgotten, however, that cleanly and decent handling of food is fully as important as pure food, and undoubtedly constitutes the more important item in preventing the dissemination of infectious diseases.

In order to make its campaign for clean food a success, the Department of Health must have the active assistance of the people of this city. You can help. You should insist that your butcher, grocer, baker, fruit and delicatessen dealer keep all foods protected from dirt, dust and flies as demanded by the Health Department's regulations. If you will stop dealing with a storekeeper who fails to keep his goods clean, he will very quickly mend his ways. Make him realize the importance of cleanliness and that it pays. If you experience any trouble in your work for clean foods, notify the Department of Health.

Truly our changed point of view denotes progress. Once cleanliness was a virtue; now the lack of it is a crime.

DON'T LET THE HIGH PRICE OF FLOUR DISTURB YOU.

Chemists have repeatedly called attention to the extravagance of the American public in respect to foods, and have seen in this one of the causes of the high cost of living. Again and again they have pointed out that cheaper cuts of meat, for example, are fully as nourishing as filet and porterhouse steak and that all that is needed is education as to the proper method of cooking.

What is true of meat applies also to many other foods. Just now, for example, wheat flour has advanced considerably in price being quoted at \$6.75 a barrel. Exactly the same amount of nourishment in the form of rye flour costs \$5, a saving of \$1.75 a barrel.

Why should Americans continue to prefer wheat flour when rye is equally nutritious and very much cheaper? Or why should they not learn, like the Scotch, to make oatmeal, which is even more nutritious, and also much cheaper, a staple article of diet? Or why disdain delicious and wholesome corn meal, highly nutritious and about two-thirds the price of wheat flour? Here are some valuable facts for you to remember:

TUBERCULOSIS. The Department of Health and the Department of Licenses have determined to extend the scope of the medical examination now made of applicants for peddler's licenses, and to include in each instance a Wassermann test.

In the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond, physical examinations will be made in the various tuberculosis clinics as at presnet, the applicants then being referred to the nearest Wassermann Clinic of the Department of Health. The Wassermann report will be sent to the physician in charge, and, together with the physical condition report, will then be forwarded to the Borough Chief for transmission, with recommendations to the Department of Licenses.

In the Borough of Brooklyn the physical examination of all applicants will be made at 29 Third Avenue daily, from 10 A. M. to 12 M., and on Tuesday and Friday evenings from 8 to 9 P. M., in conjunction with the Wassermann Clinic of of this Department.

Hereafter, a license will be denied to tuberculous persons whose sputum shows the presence of tubercle bacilli, and to those whose blood gives a ++ Wassermann reaction.

DO WE SAVE BABIES ONLY TO LET THEM DIE AS OLDER CHILDREN? It has sometimes been suggested that the efforts of all organizations to prevent infant mortality consisted simply in keeping babies alive during the first year of their lives only to have them die during the second or third years. Without for a moment subscribing to this view, but merely in order to determine the facts in the case an investigation has been made of the deaths and death rates of the various age periods under 1 year, between 1 and 2 years, and between 2 and 5 years. The results of this investigation are given in the following table:

A comparison of the 5-year period from 1904 to 1908, i. e., previous to the establishment of the Bureau of Child Hygiene, with the 5-year period from 1909 to 1913, shows that there is a decrease in the death rate of 23 per cent. under 1 year, of 25 vey, under section 1543 of the Charter, to per cent. between 1 and 2 years, 27 per cent. between 2 and 5 years, and a total of take effect August 18, 1914, were revoked. 26 per cent. in the death rate under 5 years of age.

These figures show that the work which the Bureau of Child Hygiene and the allied agencies in New York City have been carrying on during the past 5 years has been highly successful. Its influence has extended not only through the first year of life, but throughout early childhood.

TYPHOID FEVER ON HART'S ISLAND.

In addition to arranging for the boiling of all milk and water used on the island, all the inmates and employees, almost eight hundred in number, are being given protective inoculations of typhoid vaccine.

When the outbreak is fully controlled and the investigation as to its cause has been completed, a full report will be published in the Weekly Bulletin. At the present time neither the milk supply nor the drinking water appear to be involved.

SPECIMEN OF SPUTUM WENT ASTRAY.

Complaint was recently made to the Department of Health concerning a specimen of sputum said to have been left at a Department of Health station in a certain drug store in Brooklyn, and which failed to arrive at the Diagnosis Laboratory. Despite a careful investigation, it has been impossible to find any trace of the specimen. If other physicians have had a similar experience, they will confer a favor upon the Department of Health by making a specific complaint, so that the matter may be investigated.

LANDLORDS, CONTAGIOUS DISEASES, THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

In many instances landlords apply to the Department of Health for an order for the removal to the hospital of a tenant ill with a contagious disease. The Department cannot use its powers for the purpose of adjusting disputes between landlord and tenant. The only justifiable motive for its official acts is the protection or promotion of the public health. It is the policy of the Department to remove to hospitals persons whose detention at their homes would expose or tend to expose persons therein or the general public to the danger of infection, and the forcible removal of a patient by the Department on any other ground is unwarranted.

TETANUS ANTITOXIN AND THE FOURTH OF JULY.

Conforming to annual custom, hospitals, supply stations and Department of Health Branch Offices, were provided with tetanus antitoxin to be employed as a preventive measure in cases of gunshot and firework injuries.

During the period extending from June 28th to July 15th a total of 124 prophylactic injections of tetanus antitoxin were administered by Department of Health medical inspectors, hospitals and private practitioners.

TUBERCULOSIS, SECOND QUARTER, YEAR 1914.

In the following table figures are given relating to the occurrence of tuberculosis during the second quarter of 1914. The figures show little variation from those for the corresponding quarter of 1913. There is a slight increase in the number of new cases reported, and in the total number of cases registered, the latter class showing an increase of about 3,500. As would be expected, by reason of the increased hospital facilities, a larger number of admissions to hospital are shown.

The number of renovations ordered continues to show a gratifying decrease, there having been 68 in 1913, as against 11 this year. The death rate figures show no material variation.



Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Holmes Electric Protective Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board as follows, to wit:

Resolved That the Board of Estimate and Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Holmes Electric Protective Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the according to the conditions. ing the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT. This Contract, made, and executed in duplicate, this day of , 1914, by and between THE CITY OF NEW YORK (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the HOLMES ELECTRIC PROTECTIVE COMPANY, a domestic corporation of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company),

agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors under the streets and avenues within the Borough of Manhattan and to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors and the necessary conduits for the same under the streets and avenues within the Borough of Brooklyn for the purpose of electrically con-necting signalling and communicating apparatus to be located on the premises of subscribers with recording apparatus located at some suitable point or points where such signals are to be re-ceived, and thereby maintaining and operating a burglar alarm signalling service system and

for no other purpose whatsoever.

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right and privilege to lay,

construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits, and on bridges, for the purposes aforesaid, shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which renewal of said contract for a further per ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal, it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the minimum sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term

of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the minimum sum required to nxed be less than the minimum sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers, and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, withmay obtain by inquiries and investigations, with-out the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the minimum sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted, the following

4. During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than Twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) and which shall be equal to three and one-half (3½)

6. Such reasonable sum or sums as may be imposed by the Bridge Commissioner for the use of such bridge or bridges under his juris-

diction as he may permit.

The gross annual receipts of the Company mentioned above shall be deemed to include all receipts of the Company from its operations within the City of New York, excepting therefrom those receipts which accrue to it from its

real estate and investments.

The annual charges shall commence from the date on which this contract is signed by the

All annual charges as above shall be paid into All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31 next preceding. Provided that the moneys due when this contract is signed by the Mayor shall be paid into the Treasury of the City within thirty (30) days immediately following such date, and provided further that the first annual navment therester shall be only for that annual payment thereafter shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and December 31 following

shall bear to the whole of one year. Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before February 1 in each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New

Third-The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate and no essimples have a subdifferent rate and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose, unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability ione perform eac this contract.

Fourth-The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth-Upon the termination of this original contract, or, if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this con-tract within the streets and avenues shall be-

tract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth-The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its electric system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances or departmental rules and regulations now in force, or which may be adopted, affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the

No construction or repair of said electrical system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permit so issued, such officials may impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the surpers of protecting any structures in the the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and the proper restoration of the surface of such streets and avenues over

of the surface of such streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Upon completion of any work of construction, the Company shall furnish to the President of the Borough a plan of such character as he may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structures erected, installed or constructed under this contract, and the location and dimensions of all suband the location and dimensions of all sub-structures encountered during the progress of the work; the depth below the street surface of the new structures and of the substructures encountered must be shown, also their location with reference to the nearest curb-line and the nearest curbline intersection.

The electrical and other equipment to be installed by the Company, whether the same be under streets and avenues, in any Department of the City or in private property, shall be constructed and maintained subject to the approval and under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Elec-

tricity. Seventh—The plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and all appurtenances thereto, shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest approved manner and with the most modern and improved appliances, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to its plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions or improvements are determined by the Board, after hearing, to be reasonable and necessary. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the cipits hereby recorded to the company to the cipits hereby recorded to the cipits hereby rec the rights hereby granted shall cease and de-

Eighth-All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). In the Borough of Manhattan such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City, should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. In the other territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by virtue of this contract, it may construct such subways as are necessary for the accommodation of its cables and wires, and no more. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors of the character or tension of those used by the Company, or similar companies, in any or all of the Boroughs in which it is authorized to operate by this contract, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be necessary and available for the operation of the system hereby authorized. No cables or wires shall, in the future, be strung above the surface of the streets and avenues by the Company, and those at present in existence shall be removed and placed underground when and where required by the Board or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Ninth-The use of any bridge under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges shall be at the discretion of the Bridge Commissioner and in accordance with such terms and conditions and upon such reasonable charges as he

may prescribe.

Tenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant. Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the under ground conduits herein authorized to be placed in the streets, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh-It is agreed that the right hereby granted to lay and maintain conduits shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a con-tractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move its conduits and their appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate be changed at any time during the term of this contract, or any renewal thereof, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets or avenues the Company shall take care of and protect its conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction

of such change.

Thirteenth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by this contract, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish burglar alarm service to such individual furnish burglar alarm service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any central office of the Company. The Board may require the Company to open additional central offices from time to time where it appears that there is a reasonable public necessity therefor.

Fourteenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of February in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which were in use by the Company on December 31

were in use by the Company on December 31, preceding, and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on or before the tenth day of each month, a map or plan of the locations in which wires have been placed by it during the preceding month.

Fifteenth-The rates to be charged by the Company shall not be in excess of the following, and it is agreed that the same may be altered or changed by the Board as hereinafter provided:
(a) For burglar alarm service furnished to any bank, trust company, cooperative savings and loan association, building and lot association, mortgage loan or investment corporation, safe deposit company, personal loan association, stock brokers' office, insurance company or other financial institution, the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) a day for each circuit required to be used in furnishing such service.

(b) For burglar alarm service furnished to any other person or corporation other than those specified in Subdivision (a) above, the sum of fifty cents (50c.) a day for each circuit required to be used in furnishing such service.

(c) For watchman supervisory signal service a yearly rental of sixty dollars (\$60) for the first signal box installed and thirty dollars (\$30) a year for the second signal box installed, and an additional yearly rental of twelve dollars (\$12) for each additional box installed for the same

subscriber in the same building or premises.

(d) For temporary burglar alarm service for which the telephone circuit connecting the telephone in the subscriber's premises with the central exchange of the telephone company is used, a monthly charge of seven and 50/100 dollars (\$7.50), provided such service is taken for at

least two months.

(e) For temporary watchman service which it may be found necessary to furnish to any sub-scriber to any of the before mentioned classes of burglar alarm service or which may be required by any such subscriber, the sum of forty cents (40c.) per hour for each hour of such service actually furnished.

(f) For any other service furnished or to be

furnished by the Company, the rates charged shall be reasonable and fair and before being put into effect shall be submitted to the Board for its approval.

Within thirty (30) days from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the

Company shall furnish to the Board certified forms of all the contracts used by it with sub-scribers for its various classes of service, and thereafter when any change shall be made in any such form of contract, a certified copy of the same shall be filed with the Board within the same shall be hied with the Board within thirty (30) days after the said change goes into effect. The Company shall also file with the Board on February 1 of each year a verified schedule of the rates charged by it for each class of service which it furnishes.

The Company agrees, upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City or other government, the expenses of which are paid out of the City treasury, to furnish burglar alarm protection service to any and all build-ings under the control of such Board, Depart-ment or Bureau, within the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate, subject to the provisions of this contract, at sixty-six and two-thirds per cent. (66%%) of the rates above authorized to be charged by it for whatever class or classes of service may be required.

Nothing herein contained shall be deemed, nor is the same intended to require the Company (except as specified in clause (d) above) to furnish burglar alarm service for any period less than one year, nor to install the equipment or apparatus which may be required by a subscriber without charge, but the Company may and it is hereby authorized to write its contracts for service on an annual basis and charge the reasonable and fair cost of value of such equipment and apparatus under such reasonable and general restrictions as it may see fit to im-Provided, however, that this exception as to equipment and apparatus is not intended to nor shall the same apply to watchman supervisory service and the rate specified in subdivision (c) above, for such service, is in-tended to include each and every charge for installation, rental of instruments, service furnished and everything incidental thereto, except where temporary watchman service may be required, as specified in subdivision (e) above.

Sixteenth-During the term of this contract. or any renewal thereof, the Board shall have the power, by resolution, to regulate and fix the maximum and minimum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Seventeenth-The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reason-ably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be depied services because any previous occupant denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Com-

pany for service. Eighteenth-The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purposes than those explicitly set forth herein and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Nineteenth—The Company shall assume all

liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which

agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twentieth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the ter-ritory covered by this contract, or any part

Twenty-first-If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition through-out the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any default on the part of the Company, and re-quiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of One hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided

Twenty-second—If for a period of three con-secutive months the system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of six months out of any consecutive twelve months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity.

Twenty-third-The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before February 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31, next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company in the City, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-fourth-The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than February 1 of each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:
