

Squad Work-In addition to the squad work referred to in the above general the following pieces of work were performed by members of the squads

Two (2) boilers were relined, and the bed plates and header brick were reset in all of the six (6) boilers; twenty (20) canvas motor covers were installed; about fifty (50) pieces of furniture for members of the Pension Commission were stained and varnished; call-bell system was installed in the Tenement House Department. The intercommunicating telephone system in the City Paymaster's office was maintained by the Electrical Squad. This telephone system was installed by our Electrical Squad. In addition to these jobs, 200 or 300 smaller jobs were executed by the squads in various parts of the building. The Electrical and Carpenter Squads did a large amount of this work.

OTHER BUILDINGS.

City Hall-The electric lamp equipment throughout this building was standardized to insure good illumination with the least amount of current consumption. Installed a lavatory in the Mayor's Chief Clerk's office, and connected same to house sewer in the basement. Installed four (4) inch check valve on the Croton intake line, so that a night supply could be taken from this source and a day supply from the Hall of Records.

Repaired over twenty-five (25) square yards of plaster in the new quarters of the Art Commission. Covered three (3) desks in the Governor's Room with cloth tops. Built a partitioned passageway to the women's toilet on the second floor. Installed a new call-bell system for the Mayor's offices, which will permit of changes and additions being readily made without any tearing up of the walls, and such changes can be made in a very short time. Installed new lamps in the ceiling of the Aldermanic Chamber, and put the Aldermanic Chamber in good order for the fall meetings. This included painting and laying of new carpet and installation of new chairs and desks for the Aldermen.

New crystal light fixtures and crystal side bracket chandeliers were installed.

The restoration and alteration work of the two wings of the building is progressing satisfactorily. The alterations under way are in the following state of completion: First floor, east end, President, Board of Aldermen's new offices, 60 per cent. completed; first floor, west end, Mayor's Reception Room, and stairs from 2d to 3d floor, 70 per cent. completed; third floor, Art Commission, 90 per cent. completed.

City Court-Made the necessary repairs to two (2) hydraulic elevators, bracing the cars and planing guide rails to reduce friction. New lubricators of an approved type were installed on guide rails and counterweight rails. New operating and cut-off cables were also installed. Electric lamp equipment throughout the building was standardized to provide adequate lighting facilities without excessive current consumption. Specifications for replacing with new all the window sashes of the first, second and third floors were prepared, and the work awarded. Painted the walls and ceilings and varnished the woodwork of six (6) large court rooms on the first, second and third floors; also painted walls and ceilings of the four (4) judges' rooms. Repaired the carpet and linoleum of the seven large court rooms, replacing about 200 square vards. Cleaned, scraped and painted the roof tanks. Repaired the marble floors in the halls. Repaired the wood in court rooms which was commencing to rapidly decay.

County Court-Standardization made of electric lighting equipment in order to insure good illumination without waste of current consumption. Elevator enclosure gates were repaired by the installation of new guides and adjustments to the hangers in order to insure better gate operation. Painted dado and base, grained and varnished all railings, jury boxes and benches in nineteen (19) court rooms in order to give the rooms a brighter appearance. Painted the ceilings in two (2) court rooms and a

floors. Painted the walls, ceilings and trim of the County Clerk's offices, consisting of four large offices, two smaller offices and two entrances. In Trial Term, Part XII, removed all railing from the floor and all spectators' platforms. Altered spectators' benches so as to be portable. Kept all electrical equipment in good repair and working order. Removed all post lights from the court rooms, especially from Judges' desks.

Hall of Records-A new composition cork covering was installed on the floors of the elevator cars to replace worn out flooring. A tank guage was installed in pump room to indicate the height of water in the roof tanks. New piston rods were installed on elevators Nos. 5 and 6 to replace those condemned by the elevator inspection division of the Bureau of Buildings. The electric lighting equipment throughout the building was standardized to reduce current consumption as much as possible without reducing illumination intensity below that required. A supply of vacuum hose was installed for cleaning purposes. Two (2) boilers were relined, and the bed plates and new cheek blocks in all five (5) boilers were reset. Put electric fans in good repair and working order. Continued work of reversing chandelier brackets. Repaired the clock system, electric motors, controllers and elevator signals. Erected jury boxes in both Surrogates' court rooms and rearanged court room for jury trials. Repaired The larger and more important work accomplished during this quarter will be skylight gutters and ventilating hood on the main roof.

Criminal Courts Building-A new drum shaft and pinion gear were installed on the cut-off valve on No. 5 elevator equipment. Painted walls and ceilings and varnished the woodwork, furniture and floors in the twenty-five (25) offices of the District Attorney's Department. Painted the walls, ceiling and bars of five (5) prison pens and the anterooms connected with the same in the Court of General Sessions. Laid new linoleum in the Supreme Court, Criminal Branch, Part V, General Sessions and Homicide Bureau Office. This totaled 200 yards. Repairing the sidewalk on the and Terminal Facilities, 9th floor; Committee on Markets, 20th floor; Bureau of Centre and Franklin Streets sides, and reset the Franklin Street stoop. Installed several new electric fans in District Attorney's office and put all electric fans in building

in good repair and working order.

264 Madison Street Court-Commutators on the electric motor were turned down and brushes properly fitted to the surface. Laid linoleum in Parts III and IV in two (2) jury rooms. Furnished five (5) new electric fans for Judges' Chambers and put all other fans in good repair and working order. Maintained elevator in working order and made necessary repairs. Installed Pop safety valve on No. 1 boiler.

West 54th Street Court-Installed an electric elevator system with all wiring and apparatus to replace the old hydraulic elevator system. This was a job of considerable importance, and not only increased the efficiency of the building, but enabled us to reduce the engine room force and effect a saving thereby. The new electric elevator has met a demand for proper elevator operation which could not be obtained with the old hydraulic lift. Cellar drainers were installed to remove surface water from the sump pit when boilers are operating under low pressure. Removed toilet from the public hall and rearranged the toilets in order to construct a new toilet for women on the top floor. Several changes in both the steam and water piping were made in order to run the heating plant on low pressure after the hydraulic elevator was taken out. Painted Magistrates' Complaint Room and Municipal Court Judges' library. Installed two (2) water pressure drainers in the boiler room. Repaired and put in good working order all electric fans in the building; also repaired for proper operation the vacuum cleaner.

East 57th Street Court-Installed new grate bar in the boiler. Substituted high tanks for low ones in the women's toilet. Repaired windows throughout the build-

Children's Court (Old)-Inasmuch as the occupants will soon move into the new Children's Court House, only such repairs as were absolutely necessary were made in this building. These repairs included repair of roof leaks temporarily and repair of plaster ceiling in the complaint room.

Children's Court (New)—Inspections of the progress of work in this building are being made regularly. These inspections cover the general construction, plumbing, heating electrical, elevator and interior decoration contracts. This building was about 92 per cent. completed at the end of the quarter and it is hoped that it will be ready

for occupancy within a short period.

women's Detention Court (New)—Several conferences between representatives of this bureau and the architect were held during this quarter. In these conferences it was settled that a hot water heating system would be adopted; that flush tanks in place of flushometers would be used in toilet fixtures and the types of toilet fixtures were settled upon. The minor details for elevator, lighting and telephone systems were arranged. It was also recommended by this bureau that an isolated plant be used for the purpose of lighting this building. The only work actually done to date during the quarter was that of making borings and such preliminary work as was necessary to start the construction of the building.

54 Lafayette Street—Repaired the carpet and linoleum in all the court rooms and

hallways in the First District Municipal Court.

146 Grand Street, First District Court (New)—Prepared plans and specifications for new heating and plumbing systems. The plans and specifications for altering this building into a court house are now ready for advertising.

East 32nd Street Court-Put all electric fans in good repair and working order; also put in a new grate bar in boiler. Inasmuch as this building was thoroughly overhauled and renovated about a year ago, there was little necessity for further work of

First Street and Second Avenue Court—Two or three repairs were made to the floors and walls surrounding the prison pens in this building. These alterations were made to prevent the escape of prisoners, and must necessarily be made from time to time because of their destruction by prisoners.

Sixth District Court, East 88th Street-Furnished and installed five (5) new awnings for this building.

300 Mulberry Street-Put all electric fans in good repair and working order. Department of Licenses-Tentative plans for the first and fifth floors of building at No. 49 Lafayette Street, were drawn. This building is to be occupied in part by the Department of Licenses.

Madison Avenue and 59th Street-Cleaned all carpets and repaired linoleum. Cleaned and varnished benches and railings in two (2) court rooms; also the furniture in four Judges' rooms and the Judges' library. Numerous carpentry and electrical jobs were done by those squads at the request of the court. All electric fans were put in good repair and working order.

Municipal Asphalt Plant-Painted about thirty (30) signs for use at this plant. Made a considerable number of carpentry repairs and installed wooden flooring not contracted for. Installed sign boards and made a large number of electrical repairs such as connecting up lathe and grinding machines and repairing call-bell system.

Department of Public Works-Removed all paint from and redecorated one automobile. Several repairs were made by the Carpenter and roofing squads in the various corporation yards. Repaired the iron leader drains at the 155th Street Viaduct.

Washington Market-Considerable inspection work was done at this market in connection with the installation of a refrigerating plant. This necessitated the working out of details of construction that would be satisfactory to the City and to the standholders in connection with the standholders refrigerators and ice boxes. The refrigerating plant is to consist of compressors, motors, condensers, brine cooler, switchboard and brine circulating piping throughout the market. This work is about 75 per cent completed. Inspections were also made concerning the plans and specifications for electric lighting equipment as laid out by the architect for the alterations. This necesitated corrections of these specifications. Inspections were portion of the walls in five (5) court rooms. Three (3) new toilet bowls were installed in the comfort

station and two (2) new fllushometers. Repairs were made to the temporary sheds over the sidewalks surrounding the market and also repaired roofs of the show

West Washington Market-Painted the second story of Nos. 3 to 6 13th Avenue after the roofing squad had installed a new steel ceiling. Repaired the plaster of the ceiling at No. 50 Thompson Avenue. Made numerous repairs to roof leaks and leaders; removed broken plaster from the ceiling over stands at 50 Bloomfield Street and replaced the same with metal ceiling of crimped galvanized iron.

Jefferson Market-Made extensive floor repairs. Fulton Market-This market was abandoned and its jurisdiction taken from this

bureau and turned over to the Sinking Fund by a resolution adopted under date of

Free Public Markets—The painting squad painted about fifty-four (54) signs for use in these markets. Bins were also built for use by farmers and signs and runways were constructed and erected as requested.

Allen Street Bath-A proper and adequate supply of hot water hose was installed in this bath for cleaning purposes. An investigation was conducted with regard to the condition of the seats and doors of shower rooms in this building. Numerous samples are being tried with the idea in mind of establishing a uniform and standardized door and seat for use in the various public baths.

regulating system. Repaired and gave general overhauling to the exhaust fans the quarter was 3,589.787. on the first and second floors. Repaired roof around the flagpole.

Rivington Street Bath-Adjustments and changes in the operation of the refiltration system were made in order to improve the condition of the swimming pool. An adequate supply of hose was furnished and installed for cleaning purposes. A feed water meter was installed in the engine room. The contract work in plumbing, heating, ventilation and general construction in connection with the installation of the swimming pool required constant supervision. Plans and specifications were drawn for electrical installations. This matter has been held up for a long time because of the failure of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to approve these plans. The hot water generator was repaired and relocated. The shower circulating pump was also relocated and changes were made in the piping to simplify emergency operation. Temperature recording instruments were placed on the hot water supply

Rutgers Place Bath-The large steam reducing valve was repaired to prevent waste of water. Plans and specifications were drawn and certified to by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the electric lighting of pool and those portions of the bath which were altered in connection with the construction of the pool. A piston type water meter was installed to determine the operating condition of the boilers. Adjustments and changes were made in the refiltration system to improve the condition of the swimming pool. An adequate supply of hose for cleaning purposes was installed. A cotton safety rope was put in the pool in place of an iron chain, which discolored the marble when it became rusty. A croton bypass connection was made at the filters to expedite clearing and filling of the sediment tank. New floor drains were installed in the filter room. Electric telltales were installed on the

East 11th Street Bath-Relined two (2) boilers. Installed new lead covered lighting wires in circuit on women's side of the bath. Installed an adequate supply

of hot water hose for cleaning purposes.

East 23rd Street Bath-Individual valves were installed on the hot and cold water pipes to each shower compartment to facilitate repairs to mixing valves and prevent the shutting off of a large number of showers in order to repair one or two. Adjustments and changes in the operation of the refiltration system were made to improve the condition of the swimming pool. Details were taken up in connection with the proposed installation of a screen tank in the refiltration system. A new supply of hose was installed for cleaning purposes. The filters were overhauled and recharged. A feed water meter was placed in the engine room. Five (5) inch back pressure valve was installed and repairs were made to the exhaust line. The terrazzo flooring of the swimming pool and railing around the pool were repaired. Forty (40) new seats were installed in the various shower rooms.

West 28th Street Bath-(New, not open). Inspections are being made regularly in regard to the progress of work in this building. These inspections cover work in general construction, plumbing, electrical and heating. At the end of the quarter these contracts were about 95 per cent completed. It is hoped that this bath will be opened

to the public by the first of February. West 41st Street Bath-Aside from minor jobs, repairs were made to feed

East 54th Street Bath-Plans and specifications were drawn for electric lighting and gas lighting for the gymnasium; plans and specifications were also drawn for altered section of the building in connection with the new swimming pool. Outside electric lamps were installed on front columns and wiring in connection with these was installed to replace the lamps formerly set on a post on the sidewalk. Regular inspections of the progress of the alterations in regard to the plumbing and mechanical equipment in connection with the installation of two swimming pools were made. These inspections show that at the end of the quarter contracts were properly completed as indicated: Building operations, 75 per cent.; plumbing alterations, 85 per cent.; heating alterations, 85 per cent.

West 60th Street Bath-Installed a hypochlorite tank to feed hypochlorite of lime to the swimming pool in connection with the filtration system for disinfecting purposes. Adjusted and made changes in the operation of the refiltration system to improve conditions of the swimming pool. Installed an adequate supply of hot water hose for cleaning purposes. Repaired plaster and tiling in the pool floor. Replaced about 300 feet of gas piping. Took up details in connection with the proposed cleaning outfit for pool floor and details in connection with the shuttered doors leading from the waiting room to the balcony to improve ventilation of the bath.

East 76th Street Bath-Made repairs to the commutator of generator and installed new brushes to prevent excessive wear on the same. Installed eight (8) new slabs of marble; installed and cleaned out door at bottom of chimney. Installed an adequate supply of hot water hose for cleaning purposes.

East 109th Street Bath-Plans and specifications were drawn for electric lighting of the entire building to supersede the present lighting plan. These specifications were approved by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Repairs were made to the water heaters and these heaters were relocated. Installed an adequate supply of hot water hose for cleaning purposes. Painted the floor of the men's well, first floor. Made large repairs to the front skylight, which had partially collapsed.

Free Floating Baths-Completed the installation of a water distribution system for the sixteen (16) outlets along the floors of the six (6) floating baths, and then connected the baths with Croton water mains at following locations: Battery Park (2 baths), Pike Street, East 5th Street, East 96th Street, West 51st Street. Three of the supply pipes were metered, but the remainder were not, as the conditions were similar to the metered supply pipes. The average supply of these pipes was from 50,000 to 60,000 gallons a day. This work entailed opening up of about 300 linear feet of street pavement and 500 feet of park walks and lawns. It also meant the laying of 3,000 feet of pipe 1/2 to 21/2 inches in diameter. A large amount of carpentry work was necessary in connection with the fresh water piping and getting the baths in their proper berths. The electric lighting equipment was put in good repair in Battery Park Floating Baths. The East 96th Street Floating Bath, which was damaged by a tug, was also repaired. The floating baths were opened to the public on the following dates: East 5th Street, July 15th; Battery Park No. 1, July 17th; Battery Park No. 2. July 19th; East 96th Street, July 20th; Pike Street, July 31st; West 51st Street, July 31st.

Battery Park Comfort Station-New marble saddles were furnished and set in

the entrance. Hanover Square Comfort Station-The electricians rewound the motor of the sewage ejector. Took apart and thoroughly overhauled the sewage pump. Repaired glass tile throughout the station. Made repairs to the roof and gutter and installed strainers on the sewage pumps.

Mail Street Comfort Station-Installed new safety treads on men's stairway.

Placed electric exhaust fan in good repair. Abingdon Square Comfort Station-Made inspections incidental to closing up the contract work on this station. Equipped for proper operation; telephone installed.

Chatham Square Comfort Station-Numerous tanks relined. Made repairs to stair railing. Made repairs to exhaust motor fans.

Sheriff and Delancey Streets Comfort Station-Installed marble slab inside vestibule door to shut off view of station from street. Repaired roof by replacing a large

area of broken clay tile with painted galvanized iron tile.

Greely Square Comfort Station—Conferences were held with the Public Service Commission concerning the changes of plans to be made necessary on account of the new Broadway subway. The change of plans was accepted for the rebuilt station. The new subway would otherwise have cut off a portion of the men's section and the new plans provide for an enlargement of the station on one side to make up for an otherwise loss of this room.

Park Avenue Comfort Station-Installed two (2) new gas stoves on fireproof shelves and brackets.

Willis Avenue Comfort Station-Repaired skylights and cleaned out and repaired gutters along roof. Installed new smokestacks.

129th Street and 3rd Avenue Comfort Station-Installed gas stove on fireproof shelf and bracket.

General-The following completed jobs were done by various squads: Carpenter, 139; electrical, 104; plumbing, 139; steamfitting, 20; varnishing and painting, 72; roofing, 44; masonry, 43; awning, 34. Numerous repairs were made to the marble in this building and three (3) new slabs were installed.



Ninth—The grantees shall immediately begin the construction of ducts, conduits, poles and towers and the installation therein or thereon of wires, cables or other conductors and complete so much of such construction and installation as shall be necessary to furnish the service herein required and stand ready to supply the current herein required for the purposes of the Board of Water Supply and the City of New York within five (5) months from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor; otherwise this right shall cease and determine; provided that the time for completion of such construction and installation and the commencement of current supply, as required, may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time shall not exceed twelve months; and provided further that when the completion of the construction or installation or the delivery of current shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement or from other causes not within the control of the grantees, then such time may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the grantees and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the grantees shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceed-ings or other occasion of delay and shall have delivered to the Board copies of any injuction or other orders and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the grantees shall in writing consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Tenth-Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, the conduits, poles, towers, fixtures, wires, cables and equipment of the grantees constructed pursuant to this contract shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased

to any company or individual. If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolu-tion, the grantees shall, upon thirty (30) days notice from the Board, remove any part or all of such conduits, poles, towers, fixtures, wires, cables and equipments constructed pursuant to this con-

line herein authorized.

-The position of said transmission line upon said aqueduct lands shall be such as shall coincide with that designated and fixed by the Board of Water Supply. Thirteenth—All structures and appurtenances

erected hereunder shall be kept in good and safe repair and in accordance with the instructions given by the Board of Water Supply.

Seventeenth—If at any time the powers of the Board or of the Board of Water Supply, or any other of the autherities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or of-ficers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or the Board of Water

Supply or other authorities, officer or officers.
