

No person shall ride or drive any horse or horses in the City of New York with greater speed than at the rate of five miles an hour, except on the boulevards and public drives north of One Hundred and Tenth street, where a speed of twenty-five miles an hour shall he allowed, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offence, to be recovered from the owner or driver, severally and


