

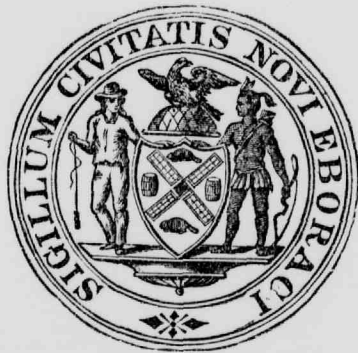

The 866 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.43, against 27.70 for the previous week, and 23.52 for the corresponding week of 1891.

The decrease of 41 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 5 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 4 from measles, of 6 from scarlet fever, of 6 from whooping-cough, of 11 from phthisis, of 25 from pneumonia, and of 25 from influenza. There was an increase of 20 in the deaths from heart disease, and of 7 from Bright's disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Twentieth Wards, from measles in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards.

The bids must, therefore, be in detail on the items required for a department or court.
