Resolved, That the office of Inspector of Dumps be and is hereby abolished, and that the Super-intendent of Police assign to the Inspector of Street Cleaning such patrolmen from those now on detail duty (whose services can be best dispensed with), as they may require to perform the duties heretofore done by the Inspectors of Dumps, and that the Superintendent report the officers so assigned to the Board of Police for permanent detail.

Whereupon Commissioner Erhardt moved its adoption. Commissioner Smith moved to amend by striking out the word "best." Amendment accepted. Commissioner Smith moved to further amend: That the pay of patrolmen assigned to duty as Inspectors of Dumps be taken from the appropriation for Street Cleaning, provided the opinion of the Counsel to the Board is given to the effect that the same can be legally done. Amendment adopted—all voting aye.

The question was then taken on the resolution as amended, Commissioners Smith and Erhardt voting aye; Commissioner Nichols not voting, giving the following reasons: That while Inspectors of Dumps receive \$800 and patrolmen \$1,200, it would be an unwarrantable expenditure of the public money to place members of the police force on duty as Inspectors of Dumps, and I wish it understood that I will vote, as I have always been in the habit of doing, to remove any person in the Department who is unfit to perform his duties; that I will not now vote upon the resolution for the purpose of public demonstration, or do anything whereby any employee may be unnecessarily or wrongfully injured. The President decided the resolution not carried. Commissioner Erhardt appealed from the decision. The question was then taken upon sustaining the Chair, and the Chair was sustained, Commissioners Smith and Nichols voting aye; Commissioner Erhardt voting no.

Communication from W. H. Hall, 259 Greenwich street, asking the removal of ashes, was referred to the Committee on Street Cleaning.

Commissioner Smith moved that the Board adjourn. Carried-Commissioners Smith and Nichols voting aye; Commissioner Erhardt voting no. Adjourned.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional sections to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code.

Section 202. Any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruits, or vegetables, found by any inspector or officer of this Department in a condition which is, in his opinion, unwholesome or unfit for use as human food, shall, upon the order of the Sanitary Superintendent, be removed from any market, street, or public place, and the owner or person in charge thereof, when so directed by the said inspector or by such order of the Sanitary Superintendent, shall remove, or cause the same to be removed, to the place designated by the Sanitary Superintendent, or to the offal dock, and shall not sell, or offer to sell, or dispose of the Sanitary Superintendent, any such meat, fish, fruits, or vegetables shall be unfit for human food, and improper or unfit to remain near other animals or to be kept alive, the Board of Health may direct the same to be destroyed, as dangerous to life and health, and may order any such animals, sheep, swine, or fowls, to be removed by any inspector, police officer, officer, or agent of this Department, and to be killed and taken to the offal dock.

Section 203. That hereafter no person shall gather.

Section 203. That hereafter no person shall gather, collect, accumulate, store, expose, carry, or transport in any manner through the streets and public places of this city, or in or to any tenement-house, cellar, or house in said city, any bones, refuse, or offensive material, without a special permit in writing from the Board of Health, in accordance with the conditions and subject to the limitations thereof, and in such manner as not to cause offensive odors or any nuisance whatsoever.
