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DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, May 10, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.
Present—The full Board.
The minutes of the meeting held May 3, 1901, were approved.
The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief submitting plans for the improvement of the water front between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-eighth streets, North river, was again tabled for one month.

The following communications were also again tabled:

From the Pacific Mail Steamship Company—Agreeing to assign or surrender to the Cromwell Steamship Company the lease of Pier, new 34, North river, with adjoining bulkheads.
From the President—Recommending that the Pier foot of Forty-fourth street, North river, be extended to the new pierhead-line.

The application of the Department of Street Cleaning for dumping facilities in the vicinity of Fourteenth street, East river, was, on motion of the President, referred to the Treasurer.

The communication from the Department of Street Cleaning stating that it has no available funds for the removal of the dumping-board from the Pier foot of East Thirty-eighth street to the north side of the Pier foot of East Twenty-ninth street, and requesting that this Department erect a double dumping-board on the southerly side of the latter pier, was also referred to the Treasurer.

The application of James W. Scott for permission to erect an ice platform, scales and tally-house on the bulkhead between Piers, old 56 and 57, East river, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Southern Pacific Company, to make general repairs to Piers, new 25, 37 and 38, North river, during the ensuing six months, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Atlantic Transport Company, to repair Pier, new 39 and 40, North river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, to repair the bulkhead foot of Forty-third street, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Townsend & Lawrence Dry Dock Company, to dredge at their marine railway slip foot of Court street, Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Amos J. Smith, to land the steamers "Victor" and "Isabelle" at the Battery landing, the time of landing to be fixed by the Dock Superintendent and the compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Pennsylvania Railroad Company, to erect a temporary hood in front of the bulkhead shed between Piers, new 27 and 28, North river.

Nicholas J. Carey, to place a float in front of the bulkhead between Piers, new 46 and 48, North river, said float to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board and free access to and from the bulkhead to be accorded the public.

William A. Foster, to maintain a tally-house on the Pier foot of East Twenty-second street, to be used in connection with the loading and discharging of the steamer "Angler."

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—Advising that his certificates have been attached to Contract No. 703, for furnishing supplies, and to Contract No. 704, for building a pier at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, North River, and that same are now valid contracts.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Transmitting approved form of lease of the southerly half of the Pier foot of Fourth street, East river, to Shewan & Sons. Commissioners authorized to execute same.

2d. Transmitting bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of Pier, old 15, East river; of the bulkheads between Eighteenth and Twentieth streets, including the Pier foot of Nineteenth street, East river, and of the properties between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, North river.

Chief Clerk directed to draw requisitions therefor.

3d. Transmitting complaint from Clifford L. Miller relative to the filling in by the Department of Parks of the lowlands along Cromwell creek within the limits of McComb's Dam Bridge Park, Borough of The Bronx, and requesting information in relation thereto. Secretary directed to transmit a copy of the report of the Engineer-in-Chief suggesting that before any further filling is deposited a crib-bulkhead be built to prevent same from filling up the creek.

From the Department of Taxes and Assessments—Stating that the assessed valuation of the northerly half of Pier, old 54, East river, is \$5,000.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 284 of the Laws of 1900, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to approve the institution of proceedings by the Corporation Counsel, for acquiring title, by condemnation proceedings, to the northerly half of Pier, old 54, East river.

From the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies—

1st. Stating that the inclosures on the Recreation Pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street, will be removed at once.

2d. Requesting that the repairs required to the approach to the public bath foot of Forty-third street, Borough of Brooklyn, be made by this Department. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs thereto.

From Bernard Wolf—Transmitting consent of sureties to the extension of time to May 1, 1901, granted for the completion of the construction of Pier, new 31, East river, under Contract No. 686.

From the John P. Kane Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted May 3, 1901, agreeing to lease certain property between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-sixth streets, North river. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare form of lease therefor.

From A. L. & S. F. Jacobs, attorneys—Accepting in behalf of James G. Wallace the offer of the Board of \$320,000 for the purchase of his property between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, North river. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare form of agreement for execution.

From Henry Henjes—Requesting permission to erect two extensions to his coal pockets on the easterly side of Bay Nineteenth street, Gravesend Bay. Secretary directed to state that before permit will be granted an agreement must be filed with this Department that in the event of the City requiring the premises for the improvement of the water front no additional item of value will be claimed by reason of the erection of such extensions beyond the actual cost thereof.

From William Langdon, attorney for the American Dock and Trust Company—In relation to the proposed construction of a sewer outlet at the foot of Arista street, Tompkinsville, Staten Island. Secretary directed to transmit a copy of the communication to the Department of Sewers.

From the Southern Pacific Company—Requesting that the approach to Pier, new 25, North river, be paved with a granite pavement instead of an asphalt pavement. Engineer-in-Chief directed to amend the plans for the placing of a pavement thereat accordingly.

From the Central Brewing Company—Requesting that repairs be made by this Department to the cluster of piles at the foot of Sixty-eighth street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to redrive the piles and to report the cost of the work for collection from said company.

From E. A. Crankshaw & Co., agents—Stating that the owners of Pier 14, East river, will sell said pier to the City for the sum of \$279,000.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, by section 822 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, The Board of Docks of The City of New York is authorized to acquire in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of The City of New York wharf property in said city, and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and to agree with the owners of such property, rights, terms, easements and privileges upon a price for the same; and

Whereas, The Board of Docks is desirous of acquiring in the name and for the benefit of The City of New York the following-described premises, to wit:

All the wharfage rights, terms, easements, emoluments and privileges appertaining to the bulkhead on the southerly side of South street, beginning at a point where a line parallel to and twenty-four feet easterly of Gouverneur lane would intersect said southerly line of South street, and running thence easterly along said bulkhead to the centre line of the slip between Piers, old 14 and old 15, including all right, title and interest in and to Pier, old 14, East river; and

Whereas, It appears that W. C. Schenck, A. Iselin and others, executors; Harriet D. Polter, Elizabeth S. Jones, the New York Life Insurance and Trust Company, trustee; Henry E. Jones and George V. N. Baldwin, trustees; Henry E. Jones and Edward R. Wharton, trustees; C. W. Astor, D. Whipple, the estate of Edward Jones and the heirs of Jane C. Mead are the owners in fee simple of the above-described premises, together with all hereditaments, including riparian and wharfage rights; and

Whereas, E. A. Crankshaw & Co., agents, under date of May 8, 1901, on behalf of said owners, have offered to sell the above-described premises to the City for the sum of two hundred and seventy-nine thousand dollars; now therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board hereby agrees to purchase the above-described premises, with all hereditaments, free from all incumbrances, for the sum of two hundred and seventy-nine thousand dollars, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the compensation to be charged A. Lynch for maintaining boat float and runway in front of the bulkhead north of Pier, new 42, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Citizens' Steamboat Company for the privilege of berthing the steamer "Magenta," on the south side of Pier, old 36½, North river, and the rate to be charged Benjamin Griggs for the privilege of berthing the steamer "William V. Wilson" thereat, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day for each boat, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendations adopted.

3d. Recommending that permission be granted the Moquin-Offerman-Heissenbuttel Coal Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, the property owned by the City and now occupied by said company, between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-sixth streets, North river, and that compensation be charged therefor at the rate of \$3,200 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing March 1, 1901. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that permission be granted the American Ice Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, the bulkhead extending from about the centre line of Ninety-seventh street northerly to a point about 100 feet 11 inches north of the north side of said pier, together with the new-made land thereat, an area of about 10,000 square feet, heretofore occupied, and that compensation be charged therefor at the rate of \$2,400 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing March 1, 1901. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York for the privilege of maintaining a ferry rack along the north side of the Pier foot of East Twenty-second street be fixed at the rate of \$2,000.50 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing March 15, 1901, the date upon which said company commenced the use of the premises, said privilege to continue until May 1, 1904, the date of the expiration of the lease of the ferry franchise now held by the company. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that permission be granted the New York Yacht Club to maintain a temporary landing north of Twenty-third street, East river, until such time as the contemplated permanent landing place, between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, East river, is constructed by the Department, the said temporary landing to be placed under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; compensation to be charged therefor at the rate of \$20 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged P. Fitz Gerald for the privilege of maintaining a rowboat landing between Ninety-second and Ninety-third streets, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$10 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the First Bohemian Boat Club for the privilege of maintaining a boat-house at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, Harlem river, be fixed at the rate of \$10 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Reporting that he has been unable to collect from the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company rental for the land under water covered by the extension to Pier "L," North river, from November 27, 1900, the date of completion of the extension, to April 30, 1901, amounting to \$505.61, and recommending that the Corporation Counsel be requested to institute judicial proceedings to determine whether the City has title to the land under water covered by the said extension, so order that the rental therefor may be collected. Recommendation adopted.

10th. Reporting that he has been unable to collect from the New York and College Point Ferry Company the cost of removing the ferry structures foot of One Hundredth street, East river, \$1,312.95, and from Charles J. O'Neil the sum of \$61.74, cost of repairing Pier foot of Third street, East river, damaged by the tug "Ant," and recommending that the claims be sent to the Corporation Counsel for collection. Recommendation adopted.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending May 4, 1901.

2d. Recommending that the permit granted the Matawan Propeller Company for the berth at Pier, old 42, North river, be revoked, it being impossible to accommodate said company at that pier. Recommendation adopted.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending May 4, 1901.

2d. Submitting list of old material, and recommending that same be sold at public auction.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Philip A. Smyth, auctioneer, be and hereby is authorized to sell, on behalf of this Board, on Monday, June 3, 1901, the old material, as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief.

3d. Reporting the erection of a building on the easterly side of the Harlem river, about opposite One Hundred and Fifty-first street, by the Fireproofing Company. Secretary directed to notify said company that unless a permit for said building is obtained all work thereon must be discontinued.

4th. Reporting the erection of a dancing pavilion near the foot of Main street, City Island. Secretary directed to notify the owner or owners thereof that unless permit is obtained therefor all work thereon must be discontinued.

5th. Recommending that the owners be directed to make repairs to the pavement on the approach to the bulkheads between One Hundred and Thirty-eighth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets, Harlem river; and that the Catskill and New York Steamboat Company be directed to replace the broken spring piles at the southerly side of Pier, new 43, North river, originally placed thereat at the request of said company. Recommendations adopted.

6th. Recommending that sundry repairs be made by the force of the Department to the piers between Sixteenth and Twentieth streets, North river, from time to time, when required, at an aggregate cost not to exceed \$500. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that repairs be made by the force of the Department to the northerly side of the Pier foot of Eighth street, East river, to render the pier available for use during the construction of the new pier at the foot of Fifth street, East river. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that repairs be made by the force of the Department to Pier "A," North river; to Pier, old 42, North river; to the Pier foot of West Fifty-fifth street, North river; to Pier 62, East river, and to the retaining-wall between Seventy-fifth and Seventy-sixth streets, East river. Recommendations adopted.

The Engineer-in-Chief submitted the following reports on Secretary's Orders:

No. 30834, submitting plans, specifications and form of contract for the construction of a crib-work between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Harlem river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the plans, specifications and form of contract submitted this day by the Engineer-in-Chief for the construction of a crib-work between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Harlem river, be and hereby are approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of contract printed and proper advertisements inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

No. 30865, reporting that the repairs to the brace at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, Fort Morris, where damaged by Transfer Boat No. 6 of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, will not now be necessary owing to the proposed erection of a platform thereat.

No. 30950, recommending that permission be granted Cannon Brothers to run a 10-inch section pipe through the bulkhead at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, North river, and under the pier thereat, in place of the 6-inch pipe now maintained south of said street, the new pipe to remain only during the pleasure of the Board, and the compensation for the privilege to be fixed by the Treasurer.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Murphy, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending May 9, 1901, amounting to \$106,991.06 which was approved and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to place the Department in possession of the Pier foot of Seventh street, and the south half of the Pier foot of Eighth street, East river, said piers being in a dangerous and dilapidated condition.

On motion, the permit granted the Hazelwood Ice Company to erect and maintain, during the pleasure of the Board, an ice platform, scales and tally-house on the north side of the Pier foot of Fifth street, East river, and the permit granted H. L. Emerson to maintain the bath "Stuyvesant" on the north side of said pier were transferred to the Pier foot of Eighth street, East river, the compensation to be charged the Hazelwood Ice Company to be hereafter fixed by the Treasurer, and the compensation for the bath to be at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master, the permittees to hold the City harmless from any accidents which may occur on said pier.

The Secretary reported that the pay-roll for the week ending May 3, 1901, amounting to \$17,492.28, had been approved, audited and transmitted to the Department of Finance for payment.

The Board went into executive session at 3.40 P. M.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,855,000), which was issued by the City of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 21 of chapter 278 of the Laws of 1899.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1895, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-creating purposes of section 10 of article VIII of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-creating capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as in the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were redeemed by the issue of Corporate Bonds of the City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 590 of the Laws of 1900 upon the best attainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the City of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,855,000), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 21 of chapter 278 of the Laws of 1899.

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 590 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the City of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be able to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was adopted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 590 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 590.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the city of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ENACTED BY THE CITY.

Section 1. A law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor, passed, a majority being present.

This People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 2. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the city of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 25, Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent. Preference will, as far as possible, be given to the proposals received according to priority in the date of their receipt, the proposals first received being entitled to the privilege of the longest extension period, unless such proposal shall indicate a preference for the shorter terms. The stock which is to be extended in accordance with the terms of this circular must be delivered to the Comptroller upon demand, when the certificates will be stamped across their face with the terms of the extension, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 590 of the Laws of 1900, provided, however, that such stock now outstanding in coupon form when presented for extension will be extended in the form of registered stock. Therefore transfers may be made of such stock on the books of the Corporation in accordance with the general provisions of law and the rules of the Department of Finance in regard thereto.
