No. 505.

Several property owners appeared before the Board to advocate the installation of sewers in Surf avenue, and directed the attention of the Board to the fact that the proceedings as advertised omitted provision for a sewer in that part of Surf avenue between West Twenty-fifth and West Twenty-seventh streets. Upon motion of Alderman Potter, the following resolution was adopted:

To construct a sewer in Surf avenue, between West Twenty-fifth and West Thirty-seventh streets, with outlet sewers in West Thirty-first street, from Surf avenue to the ejector chamber north of Mermaid avenue; in West Thirty-second street, from the ejector chamber to Neptune avenue, and in West Thirty-third street, from Surf avenue to the Atlantic Ocean; also to construct an ejector chamber as shown on Map "CC," with necessary ejectors and appurtenances; also compressed air pipe, from Caisson No. 2 to Neptune avenue; in Stillwell avenue, from Neptune avenue to Mermaid avenue; in Mermaid avenue, from Stillwell avenue to West Thirty-first street, and in West Thirty-first street, from Mermaid avenue to the ejector chamber; also a discharge pipe from the ejector chamber in Mermaid avenue at West Twenty-third street; all present voting in the affirmative.

No. 506.

The Secretary read the following report:

"March 14, 1906.

"Hon. JAMES DUNNE, Superintendent of Sewers:

"Dear Sir—I herewith return a communication addressed to you by the Secretary to the Commissioner of Public Works, dated February 13, 1906, which you have re-

ferred to me to furnish a report in the matter of the complaint of Mr. Richard Garms of Surf avenue, corner of Eighth street, Coney Island, in which he states that the sewer on Surf avenue, from Fifth to Eighth streets, is of size too small, and especially is this fact brought out during the summer months, when the floating population of Coney Island is at its height. Mr. Garms states that the sewer sometimes overflows, and the contents thereof enter his premises.

"I beg to report that the system of sewers at Coney Island were constructed prior to that territory being annexed to the old City of Brooklyn, and the system existing was handed down to this Bureau for its care. Said system of sewers were devised to care for house drainage only and not for surface waters. Recently, however, a sewerage plan was devised and adopted by the Board of Estimate calling for the construction of surface water sewers to tap the old system at various points, thus procuring a step in the direction of a combined system of sewers to care for both dry weather flow of sewage and also rain waters.

"Only one of these projected improvements has been built, which was a by-pass around the purification plant situate on Neptune avenue, near West Twelfth street. This construction provided for storm waters passing around the pumping plant for obvious reasons, and also permitted the construction of sewer basins along Surf avenue, from Steeplechase walk to West Fifth street.

"After a careful investigation, both from reports received from eye witnesses of the action of the length of the sewer which it is desired to enlarge, and from computation, it is found that the existing 12-inch sewer in Surf avenue, from West Eighth street to West Fifth street, should be reconstructed and a 24-inch pipe sewer built in lieu of said 12-inch pipe.

"A part of the trouble is due to the flat grade of the sewer which is necessitated by the well known flat grade of the territory. I recommend the reconstruction above noted, respectfully stating that the estimated cost for same is \$11,000, and the assessed valuation of the real estate (including buildings) within the probable area of assessment is \$1,335,600.

"A change of the sewerage plan is necessary under the conditions, and such change will be prepared immediately and forwarded to you. This report is made in anticipation of said plan. The enlargement of the sewers in Coney Island and the construction of additional and enlarged sewers to bring about a combined system of sewers should not be considered as the construction of relief sewers and the charge thereof placed upon the City at large. The procedure is merely in adding to a separate sewerage system such new sewers as will result in placing the territory parallel with other territories of the borough. An equity in cost would not result if these sewers were considered in any sense relief sewers, to relieve a system of sewers which were originally constructed for a combined system, but afterwards found inadequate.

On motion of Alderman Hann, a resolution recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an alteration in the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade of Caton place, from Ocean parkway to Coney Island avenue; Johnson street, from Ocean parkway to Coney Island avenue; Church avenue, from Ocean parkway to Coney Island avenue; Henry street, from Ocean parkway to East Eighth street; Montgomery street, from East Seventh street to Coney Island avenue; East Eighth street, from Church avenue to Ocean parkway; Albemarle road, from Church avenue to Coney Island avenue; East Seventh street, from Avenue C to Henry street, and East Eighth street, from Turner place to Church avenue, was adopted, all present voting in the affirmative.

No. 433.

On motion of Alderman Hann, a resolution initiating proceedings to regulate, grade, set curb on concrete and lay cement sidewalks on Livonia avenue, between Barrett street and Hopkinson avenue, was adopted, all present voting in the affirmative.

No. 438.

On motion of Alderman Hann, a resolution initiating proceedings to pave with asphalt block Rogers avenue, between Park place and Montgomery street, was adopted, all present voting in the affirmative.

On motion of Alderman Hann, a resolution initiating proceedings to construct a sewer in Rogers avenue, between Union and Sullivan streets, and sewer basins on Rogers avenue, at the southwest corner of Park place and at the northwest corner of Union street, and an outlet sewer in Sullivan street, between Rogers and Bedford avenues, was adopted, all present voting in the affirmative.

On motion of Alderman Hann, a resolution initiating proceedings to regulate, grade, set curb on concrete and lay cement sidewalks on Hawthorne street, between Rogers and Nostrand avenues, was adopted, all present voting in the affirmative.

No. 252.

On motion of Alderman Hann, a resolution initiating proceedings to pave with asphalt, on concrete base, East Fifth street, between Greenwood and Fort Hamilton avenues, was adopted, all present voting in the affirmative.

No. 316.

A petition to amend resolution of December 6, 1905, initiating proceedings to regulate, grade and curb New York avenue, between Paerdegat and Flatbush avenues, so as to have the limits of said improvement read "between Waterworks Park and Avenue H," the object of which was to eliminate that portion of New York avenue south of Avenue H, concerning which the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways reported was occupied by a lumber yard and by the Long Island Railroad Company, which has tracks and a freight yard there, and as the extension of the improvement to Flatbush avenue would occasion considerable delay on account of the railroad crossings, etc., recommended that the proceeding terminate at Avenue H.

On motion of Alderman Hann, a resolution in accordance with said amendment was adopted, all present voting in the affirmative.

No. 441.

In connection with a petition for the construction of sewer basins at all four corners of Nostrand avenue and Hawthorne street, the following report was received from the Superintendent of Sewers:

"February 9, 1906.

"Hon. DESMOND DUNNE, Commissioner, Public Works:

"Dear Sir—Herewith I return a petition which was forwarded to this Bureau under date of December 30, 1905, with a request from the Secretary to the former Borough President that we furnish information in relation to the construction of sewer basins at all four corners of Nostrand avenue and Hawthorne street.

"Reporting on same, I would state that basins are not delineated upon the legal drainage map of the vicinity, and are not necessary at the northeast and southeast corners, as the grade will be down to New York avenue when Hawthorne street is graded. The remedy is to grade Hawthorne street or construct gutters until such time as grading is performed.

"There is at present a straight head basin on Hawthorne street, a few feet from the northwest corner, which will take care of the drainage at that point.

"A basin is necessary at the southwest corner of Hawthorne street and Nostrand avenue, the estimated cost for same being \$200, and the assessed valuation of the real estate (including buildings) within the probable area of assessment being \$100,250.

The petitioners who appeared before the Board objected to the views of the Superintendent of Sewers, insisting that if sewer basins could not be had at all four corners, the present resolution providing for one at the southwest corner of Nostrand avenue and Hawthorne street be denied, and upon motion of Alderman Hann said resolution was denied, all present voting in the negative.

No. 442.

On motion of Alderman Hann, a resolution initiating proceedings to construct a sewer in Winthrop street, between Nostrand and New York avenues, was adopted, all present voting in the affirmative.

In connection with the above, the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways submitted a statement of the improvements existing on Winthrop street, between Nostrand and New York avenues, with the object of proving dedication, which was submitted to the Corporation Counsel for determination as to whether or not the evidences were sufficient to warrant the improvement by the City.

No. 443.

The Superintendent of Sewers reporting under date of March 14, 1906, in connection with a petition for a sewer in Eastern parkway extension, northerly side, from Somers street to Broadway, directed attention to the necessity for an outlet sewer in Somers street, between Eastern parkway and Broadway. In connection with said outlet in Somers street, the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways reported that there was no record of the legal opening of said street between Eastern parkway and Broadway, but furnished a statement of facts purporting to show dedication, which was referred to the Corporation Counsel for determination as to the sufficiency of evidence.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
