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TENEMENT HOUSE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1906.

Tenement House Department, Borough of Manhattan,
No. 44 East Twenty-third Street,
New York, February 5, 1907.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—During the year 1906 the Tenement House Department and its administration have been subjected to repeated attacks to you directly, in the daily press and in the publications and reports of various societies and associations. I have heretofore refrained from in any way answering or refuting the many misrepresentations and false statements made, resting upon your expressed confidence in me, and in the knowledge that in all things I had earnestly striven for the good of the people of the City, and that my work had shown, to those competent to judge, that I was carrying on faithfully the work so well outlined by the first Commissioner of this Department.

I now feel that, in justice to you who selected and appointed me to this office, as well as to myself and to the Department, a few words of explanation and defense, though by no means of apology, are due.

Upon my reappointment to office, at the beginning of the year, with your knowledge and cordial support, I undertook the task of practical reorganization of the Department from top to bottom.

My first effort was to surround myself with capable, earnest and dependable subordinates. With the success of this effort I have every reason to be satisfied, and the result of our year's work, as set forth in the following pages, shows conclusively that my satisfaction is in no wise without reason.

Next came the necessity of restoring to the rank and file that discipline and high morale which was needed for effective work. In order to do this it was absolutely essential to make many changes, but I can assure you that in not a single case has an employee been removed, or his resignation accepted, without careful and conscientious consideration of all the questions and facts involved. If errors have been made, I feel certain that they have been on the side of leniency, as I fully realize the serious blot upon the character and future of any employee so dismissed. It is proper that I should here emphasize the fact that in addition to those whose separation from the Department was "for the good of the service" we have also lost numerous others against whom the finger of suspicion has not pointed, but who voluntarily resigned to engage in other business, or to otherwise better their condition. The loss of this latter class was due, in great part, as has been pointed out by me in previous communications to your Commission on Salaries and Grades, to the meagre prospect of advancement existing in the present classifications and grades of employment in this Department. As a result of these changes, voluntary and forced, a large number of employees have been appointed during the year, and, as was to be expected, their inexperience has acted in some degree as a bar to our more rapid progress. In spite of this handicap it is interesting to note that the field work per man per day has been more than doubled during the year. The means by which this was accomplished will be more fully set forth in the remarks relative to the work of the various Bureaus.

I am glad to be able to state that at the present time the discipline of the Department, while by no means ideal, is greatly improved, and will compare favorably with that of any force of equal size.

New Buildings.

At the beginning of the year there were under construction and alteration in the entire city 5,760 tenements. This was a greater number than at any time during the previous history of the Department, and involved an amount of work upon the part of the Department which can scarcely be realized. In order to relieve the New Building Bureau as much as possible of the work involved in the alteration of existing tenements, covering 1,527 buildings at the beginning of the year, this work was turned over to the "Old Building Bureau," whose inspectors were already under the necessity of visiting the same premises on work in connection with the maintenance of the same. This change was made gradually, as the force was able to assume it, and this, besides saving duplication of effort, made it possible for the New Building Inspectors to pay closer attention to the details of compliance with the Tenement House Act in the new buildings. This closer supervision has resulted in a decided improvement in the physical character of the buildings erected, as is indicated by the greater number of new building violations filed, 7,163 in 1906 against 3,834 in 1905.

The tenement house building business during the past several years has largely fallen into the hands of a class of men (building on speculation, not for investment) not trained to the business, who are therefore incapable of detecting transgressions of the law in the construction of their buildings, and are at the mercy of unscrupulous and incompetent architects and contractors. Certain features of construction, such as fire escapes, other means of egress in case of fire, widths of halls and stairways, minimum sizes of rooms, width of courts, etc., had therefore been greatly neglected, and deviations from the legal requirements were discouragingly frequent. With the mass of work to be done, and consequent infrequent inspections of each building operation, it was practically impossible to detect and stop at their inception all such transgressions. Under the new plan the work is more closely watched during progress, and the difficulties are, therefore, discovered and remedied more promptly.

On account of the unfitness of so many builders, a practice had grown up among the builders of employing Inspectors of the Department (nominally after office hours) to superintend or advise in regard to the construction of buildings. The effect of such a practice, in itself a violation of law, was deplorable, but I believe it to be now practically extinct in the Department. Certainly offenders in this respect in the future will be treated with the utmost rigor and prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

The enforcement of the act in the respects noted, and interference with practices such as that above mentioned, were the real causes for the complaints which have been made to you and through the newspapers regarding the alleged "oppression" of the builders by the Department. I can positively assert that the competent architects and builders of the city heartily welcomed these actions on our part and have not been slow to express their approbation, while the moral effect upon the others has been of value to the city and its inhabitants.

Wherever due consideration for the obligations of my oath of office permitted, extreme leniency has been shown to all builders without exception, due warning being given against future offences of a like character. In all cases the Department carefully settled upon a line of conduct or ruling, which was impartially carried out.

Up to the present year the "New Building Bureau" has had charge of new construction, from the filing of plans to the issuance of the certificate that the completed building conforms with the requirements of the law. This method appeared unsatisfactory, in that it led to undesirable possibilities resulting from the placing of too much power in the hands of one set of men without a system of cross-checking by another set of men fresh to the task. I therefore instituted a "Division of Final Inspection," manned by Inspectors selected for their honesty and conspicuous ability. These men were specially trained for their duties, which consist in carefully examining all new buildings declared as practically ready for the issuance of certificate, and reporting upon the conditions then found. This examination, free from internal or external influences, has had a marked effect in improving the character of the work done both by the builders and the employees of the Department. This scheme, having been thoroughly tried in Manhattan under my own eye, is now being extended to the other boroughs. Naturally it has met with considerable opposition from those persons who desired to avoid the bringing home to them of the responsibility for their transgression of the law, which is, in my opinion, one of the most trenchant arguments for its continuance. It has also resulted in an actual saving of time for builders between the date of their reporting the building ready for final inspection and the date of the issuance of the certificate. As soon as they become alive to the advisability of co-operating with the Department and realize that it is inexpedient to report all violations complied with before they really are, thereby causing unnecessary reinspections, this saving will be vastly increased.

Still another reform in this line of work was the establishment of new rules relative to intercourse between architects or builders and the employees engaged in the examination of plans. A competent Examiner is constantly detailed to see all comers in regard to such matters, thereby centralizing and co-ordinating the actions and rulings of the Department, and making great saving of time, particularly that of the other Examiners.

It is my desire to institute during the coming year still other changes in methods dealing with new building construction, in particular to do away with the assignment of Inspectors to one or the other of two separate Bureaus (new building and old building) and instead to establish one corps of Inspectors, each of which will look after all work in one district, new building, old building or alterations, with a view to further conservation of time and effort. All Inspectors are now taken from one and the same Civil Service list, and there is no reason why, under proper training, all cannot be made equally competent. At any rate, I believe that an Inspector who cannot become thus generally competent is not mentally fitted for the work of the Department in any line. Also it will multiply several times the number of men observing the progress of new work, thereby giving closer and more frequent supervision of it.

Old Buildings.

On the side of the enforcement of law as to existing tenements, or "old buildings," in the parlance of the Department, much has been accomplished. In the fall of 1906 I began a systematic house to house inspection of all tenements in Manhattan, as to their sanitary condition. This inspection was continued and completed in Manhattan and The Bronx during the year 1906, and is well under way in the other boroughs. As a result of this work, in the districts completely covered, violations were filed covering all unsanitary conditions found, regardless of whether some of them had been reported prior to my appointment in June, 1905. It therefore became possible to cancel and supersede a great number of old violations, in which the major part of the orders had been cleared up under previous administrations, but which still showed flag-rs uncomplied with, preventing the dismissal of the violations as a whole. By this means a vast amount of dead wood was removed from the files of the Department, and much labor saved in the line of reinspections, correspondence, etc. In addition, a new and up to date record of conditions was formed, greatly simplifying the departmental action in securing compliance with our orders. It should be explained that in the usage of the Department the term "canceled," means that an order has been removed from the record regardless of compliance on the part of the owner, either because it was improperly applied or has been replaced by another and more comprehensive order. The term "dismissed," however, always means that the Department's orders have been complied with.

There were also pending in the Department thousands of orders requiring the construction of fire escapes upon the fronts of buildings, regardless of the equipment on other portions of the buildings. Many of these have been disposed of by cancellation, further examination showing that the law was complied with through the presence of this other equipment. These two classes of cases, in the main, account for the violations reported in the statistical tables, as "canceled." The fire escape cases in particular have been fruitful sources of complaint against the Department, and though well aware that the responsibility for their existence was not upon my administration, I have used every means possible, short of actually stopping all other departmental work, to remove them and stop the complaints.

There were also pending several thousand violations for the incumbrance of fire escapes, a type of case that has baffled the ingenuity of every Tenement House Commissioner. The practice of using fire escapes for storage purposes and thus rendering them useless for purposes of egress is almost universal in the crowded districts, and is not unknown in the tenements of the better class. Attempts to clear the fire escapes through the agency of ordinary Inspectors were clearly proven to be futile, and our detail of fourteen police is far too small to be effective in handling this work. Prosecution of offending tenants in the Police Courts could only end in the utter swamping of the courts, and in the crippling of the Department by the necessary attendance of the Inspectors as prosecuting witnesses. Early in the spring I obtained a promise from the Commissioner of Police of a temporary detail of officers, and also from the Board of City Magistrates a promise of co-operation in the punishment of persistent offenders. Commissioner Bingham promptly furnished me a force of thirty-five officers, who visited every tenement house on each block in the most crowded districts of Manhattan and compelled the removal in their presence of all incumbrances on the fire escapes. But the improvement was only transitory, as a reinspection a day or two later almost invariably showed the balconies in the same condition as before. A few of the worst cases, one or two in each of some thirty blocks, was selected, and the offenders arraigned in court, but I regret to say that the City Magistrates failed to live up to their agreement, and instead of punishing the offenders as prescribed by law, without exception discharged them with at most an admonition. The condition in this regard is, therefore, at present the same as at the beginning of the year, save that I was forced to expend, from an already too scanty appropriation, nearly \$4,000 for police salaries without adequate results.

In the matter of structural changes in old buildings to make the same conform with the law, the opposition of the various taxpayers' organizations had successfully tied our hands as to the removal of vile school sinks, and lack of sufficient force had prevented any systematic work of serious account in carrying out the other structural provisions of the law. When, as will be later explained, the stand of the Department relative to school sinks had been fully supported by the highest court of the State, the issuance of structural orders was resumed as rapidly as the force could handle them. In consequence of the lapse of time since the initial inspection, every case required verification before issuance, entailing a considerable amount of work on both field and office force. It was manifestly unfair to owners to require the removal of school sinks, with the attendant necessity for the provision of water closets in either yard or buildings, unless at the same time demand was also made for all other structural changes required to make the building conform to the law. My effort has been to force all these changes to be made wherever an alteration of a building was contemplated, or where the condition of the premises has made vacation of the same necessary. By this means we have accomplished during the year the removal of some 1,780 school sinks, and many other structural changes, as more fully set forth in the tables herewith attached. The continuance of this practice should, by the end of 1907, show practically all of the school sinks either removed or in process of removal, and a corresponding increase in the number of windows cut in partitions of interior rooms, etc. It will undoubtedly take several years to correct all of these conditions, but by no means such a period of time as estimated in various statements promulgated during the past few months.

In the matter of fire escape egress great progress has been made, as will be seen from the tables, but it seems certain that it will take not less than two years to bring the City as a whole to the point where every tenement will be provided with adequate fire escapes. It should not be forgotten, however, that the constant changes in the matter of occupation of buildings will undoubtedly make this branch of our work in some degree a constant quantity.

In the earlier part of this report reference has been made to the increase of work accomplished by the inspectorial force, and a word or two as to the methods by which this was accomplished will not be out of order. Each borough is divided into a certain number of inspectorial districts, varying in area according to the distribution of tenements, and the character of the latter. Each Field Inspector has assigned to him one or more of these districts, and to him are assigned all complaints of citizens, re-inspections on pending violations, alterations of buildings, etc., within that area.

It was discovered that not all inspectors were doing their full duty either as to character or amount of work done. In order to improve and increase the work, and to insure the getting of a full day's work from each man, the Inspector's districts were combined into groups, known as Supervisor's districts, over which was placed a picked man as Supervising Inspector. Each Supervisor has under him from eight to twelve District Inspectors, for whose work and attendance he is directly responsible to the Chief Inspector. Each Inspector prepares before leaving the office in the morning a "route card," showing the premises he is called upon to visit that day, and the order in which the visits will be made. He is required to adhere strictly to the order of procedure given in this schedule, and is daily visited and observed at his work by his Supervisor, who also gives him such instruction and assistance as he may require, or reports to the Chief Inspector any necessity for special instruction which he may discover. At the close of each day each Inspector also reports to his Supervisor at a central meeting point within the Supervisor's district, before leaving for home. By these means we are certain that the full day is spent in the prescribed manner, and in the allotted district. A year ago the average number of reports per day per man was but 9, while to-day the average is over 22.5. To this fact may be largely ascribed the great reduction in the number of pending violations in force. The present conditions were not attained without strenuous opposition from some unworthy servants of the City, the majority of whom I rejoice to state have either reformed or been translated to other spheres of activity. Those remaining with us will assuredly be forced soon to select the class to which they will elect to belong.

Departmental Searches.

It has been the custom since the organization of the Department to furnish to owners, free of charge, a "search" of the records or memorandum of the nature of the violations outstanding against their premises at any time. The only formality required has been that the request for search should be signed by the person who had registered himself in the Department as the owner, as required by the Tenement House Act. While the law prescribes a penalty for failure to register, it is nevertheless a fact that only a small percentage of tenement owners comply with this requirement, and because of lack of sufficient force in the office of the Assistant Corporation Counsel assigned to this Department, no attempt to enforce this provision has been possible. Consequently the record of owners' names is very incomplete, the activity in the tenement class of real estate operators making it impossible to keep up with the changes without the co-operation of the owners. Taking advantage of this condition, numbers of unscrupulous attorneys, real estate dealers and others have been in the habit of requesting these searches, either falsely representing themselves as the owners or presenting orders purporting to be signed by the owners, while in many cases there was every reason to believe that such signatures were forged. Then, acting on the information thus obtained, they have endeavored to harass the real owners by misrepresenting the gravity and cost of compliance with the pending orders, hoping in this way to persuade the owners to part with the property below its real value. When this failed to have the desired effect they went even further in some cases and filed complaints with the Department against the premises in question, these complaints being of such a character that additional orders were bound to be issued, since, as you doubtless know, the Department is compelled to take cognizance of all complaints, even the anonymous, and if violations of law exist, issue orders for their abatement. In the effort to minimize as much as possible the opportunity for such despicable work, several schemes were tried, all based upon the requirement of substantial proof that the applicant had a material interest in the property and was entitled to the information desired. With the assistance of the Assistant Corporation Counsel forms of requisition were finally framed, one for use by the owner, who was required to be registered as such, or to register before obtaining the search, and others for the use of the attorneys and title insurance companies and loan companies, who were required to give the name and address of the owner and to state definitely that the search was required in connection with the examination of title on behalf of a prospective purchaser or mortgagee. These regulations brought forth a storm of protest from various sources, notably from attorneys representing "intending" purchasers (?) (who almost invariably claimed that they were unable to obtain the information as to ownership required by the Department on account of owner being "out of town"). No doubt many such complaints reached your office, but I believe that the strict enforcement of these regulations has had a deterrent effect upon the practice previously explained, though I am not yet satisfied with the situation. Among the recommendations for the betterment of this Department, further on in this report I purpose suggesting some remedial legislation to meet this situation.

Review of Dismissed Cases.

In order to overcome the possibility of improper dismissal of violations a Review Division was established, in which every case, before dismissal from the record, is carefully examined and checked up, and, if deemed necessary, a re-examination in the field made by confidential inspectors. By this means we are assured that violations are not dismissed without full compliance with the law, we discover errors of omission and commission on the part of inspectors, and, indeed, it is through the working of this plan that a considerable proportion of the dishonest employees who have been relegated to obscurity have been detected in their misdeeds. It is most unfortunate that this step was made necessary by the conditions existing, since its continuance in some degree delays final action on violations, of which delay complaint has been made, but nevertheless it is a cog in the departmental machinery which it is assuredly necessary to retain. With the improvement in the skill and integrity of the field force I anticipate that a large part of the delay will be done away with, and the cause of complaints thus removed.

Vacation of Houses.

Under the authority of the Act the Department is empowered to cause the abandonment for living purposes of tenements, or parts thereof, which are grossly unsanitary, or without fire escape facilities. This power has been quite freely utilized in the past year, in the majority of cases on account of lack of fire escapes. Ordinarily this method is not adopted until every reasonable opportunity has been given for compliance with the law, but, once started, the house must either be actually vacated of tenants, or practically complete compliance with orders must be shown. Misrepresentation of the Department's action in this regard has been frequent, and the utmost efforts have been put forth by owners to secure the withdrawal of vacation orders. Such orders are never issued without careful inspection by several of the oldest, most experienced and level headed employees of the Department, or without the taking of photographs clearly indicating the worst conditions. The benefit of every possible doubt is given to the owner, and indirectly to the tenants, whose plight is even more to be deplored.

Quite a number of these vacation cases have been in connection with property acquired by the City for park, school, fire and police or other municipal departmental use, and which, pending demolition of the existing buildings, is leased for short terms to various persons. These lessees naturally object to spending a cent more than they are forced to spend on repairs and maintenance and as a result the buildings soon become seriously defective. Such properties have received most careful attention, and with the hearty cooperation of the Department of Finance which has invariably been forthcoming, much has been done to ameliorate conditions, though actual vacation has sometimes been necessary.

It should be remembered in connection with the vacation work of the Department, that before a vacation order can properly be issued a condition must be found to exist which can legally be proved a public nuisance. This requirement has been always kept in mind and no vacation order has been issued without it. But it is easy for an unscrupulous owner, at a comparatively small expense, to place a building slightly on the right side of the line of demarcation, where the condition of nuisance is practically unprovable. In spite of the hysterical clamors of certain civic bodies, we have observed, and shall continue to observe, an attitude of strict legality in such matters. It might also be remarked that the records of the Department fully disprove the claims of such organizations that it was due to their efforts that certain betterments in this line were obtained.

Erection of New Fire Escapes.

Prior to the establishment of this Department the responsibility for the enforcement of the law relative to construction of fire escapes upon tenement houses was vested in another department of the city government. The new law transferred this work to the Tenement House Department and involved many departures from the law previously in effect, and it has required a considerable time, and some temporary laxity, to bring iron work contractors to a realizing sense of the necessities of the case. Following the natural tendency, any display of relaxation has been the signal for prompt attempts by them to seize even more than the advantage offered, and as a result the requirements of the Act have been found to be in many respects disregarded. This made necessary an active campaign to bring up the character of the work done on fire escapes to the requisite standard. No attempt has been made to put all the provisions of the law in full force at once, but bit by bit and step by step the more essential features were emphasized and enforced. By verbal warning, by written word, and by printed circulars, attention was drawn to the coming changes, and if these repeated warnings were ignored, and certain manufacturers suffered, they had only themselves to blame. Even then the Department accepted, wherever possible, reasonably adequate substitutes for the specific construction of the Act, and gave to all alike the opportunity to place themselves in a position of accord with the Department. Allegations have been made that equal treatment was not accorded to all, but we are prepared to deny without qualification such assertions, and to prove our contention from the records.

Legal Developments of the Year.

The most important feature of the year in this regard was the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States supporting the Department in its action regarding the removal of school sinks. A test case, the decision of which affected thousands of others, was begun in 1903, and has been successively carried from the Supreme Court, General Term, to the Appellate Division, the Court of Appeals, and the United States Supreme Court. The point at issue was, broadly, whether the police power of the Legislature was sufficient to enact into law a procedure which might require the expenditure of a large sum of money for the improvement of a sanitary condition. The Tenement House Act having been declared constitutional in this regard the work of removing school sinks by the Department is now proceeding unchecked.

Another matter which has received considerable attention is that of the so-called "alcove" room in new tenements. Several builders have endeavored to force approval of plans by the Department, involving an arrangement of rooms in which it was clearly evident that there was an intention to violate the law. Portions of such rooms were so constructed as to be without the required windows to the outer air, and devoid of the privacy enjoined by the law, if once separated by curtains or other devices from the main body of the rooms. The stand of the Department against such plans has been wholly supported by the decisions of Judges Bischoff and Van Kirk, and in great part by the decision of Judge Burr. Appeal has been taken by the Department from the decision of Judge Burr, and it is confidently hoped that final adjudication in favor of the Department will shortly be obtained.

The Revision of the Tenement House Act.

The past five years' experience in the enforcement of the act has clearly shown that the latter, as perfect as it was possible for any such comprehensive law to be while still untried, would be the better for some considerable revision. In some points, as, for instance, in the matter of area of lot that may be covered on corner lots, the fireproofing of bakeries, the occupation of basement apartments of old buildings, certain requirements as to scuttles, construction of bulkheads, location and construction of fire escapes, etc., some relaxation of the present law's demands can properly be made without detriment to the interests of the people. On the other hand, there are numerous sections where co-ordination of requirements is essential, and still others in which obscured intent necessitates elucidation. With such objects in view the officers of the department have been for some time actively engaged in a careful analysis of plans for the revision of the act, which will be completed in time to bring the matter before the present session of the Legislature. It is expected that the proposed amendments will directly meet and satisfy a large part of the objections raised by the tenement owning and building interests, while at the same time fully conserving the interests of the tenement dwellers. Some minor changes will also be suggested in that chapter of the Charter under which the department derives its powers.

Suggestions for Betterment.

I desire to recommend to your consideration the following suggestions for the betterment of the department:

Searches of Departmental Records—That such necessary changes be made in the Tenement House Act as will authorize the imposition of a reasonable charge for transcripts of records of violations pending in the department against any tenement property. Such searches to be made at the request of any person, upon payment of

a fee of one dollar, unless such person be previously recorded in the department as the owner of the property, in which case no charge is to be made. Such fees to become a part of the funds of the department and to be added to the amount of its annual appropriation. A severe penalty for false registration of ownership should be provided, though it is believed that the imposition of the above fee for the service will tend to prevent much of the present abuse of the privilege of search.

Licensing Superintendents of Construction—The enactment of a law requiring that no tenement house shall be constructed save under the direct supervision of a competent architect or constructing builder, whose knowledge of the Tenement House Law shall be tested by a board of examiners consisting of at least two architects, two builders and a representative of the department. The lay members of this Board to hold office concurrently with the Commissioner of this Department. The members of this board, exclusive of the representative of this department, to be experienced in tenement construction and to be remunerated from the proceeds of license fees paid by the applicants. Such license to be revocable by the Commissioner for violation of the Tenement House Act, or to be suspended for a given period. The holder also to be held to have punishable knowledge of and responsibility for such violations as are discovered in the buildings under his charge. It is believed that such a provision would entirely stop the present lax method of construction of tenements by untrained "builders" on plans merely purchased from architects, and without the supervision of the latter.

Consolidation of Inspection Bureaus—As stated in the early part of this report, I believe it to be both feasible and advisable that the Inspectors of the department be required to be responsible for the construction of all new buildings, as well as the alteration and maintenance of old buildings, in their respective districts. This change would require some slight amendment of the Charter provisions, but can be easily accomplished as a practical fact. It will further centralize the field control of the force, and by decreasing the number of new buildings under the charge of any one man, make more frequent inspection and closer supervision possible. The titles of the present Chief Inspectors assigned to the new Building Bureau should be changed to that of Chief Plan Examiners, this being the line of work to which they would then be confined, and no reduction of pay is contemplated.

Increase of Force in Corporation Counsel's Office.—The great increase in the amount of work devolving upon the Assistant Corporation Counsel assigned to the Bureau of Buildings and the Tenement House Department has not been accompanied by a corresponding increase in force, and while this branch of the work is outside of the Tenement House Department, its relation to the work is so close and important that I feel it quite proper that its necessities should be noted in this report. At present the enforcement of the orders forwarded to the Corporation Counsel, the Tenement House Department having failed to obtain compliance within a reasonable time, is so delayed as to be a serious detriment to the prestige and effectiveness of the department. I therefore urge the necessity of assigning an Assistant Corporation Counsel, with an adequate force and equipment, exclusively to the Tenement House Department.

Storage of Records—Judging from the experience of the past five years, the problem of housing the obsolete but still necessary and valuable plans and other records of the department is nearing the point where drastic action is required. At the present time the limits of storage space obtainable, at a reasonable cost, in the buildings where our offices are located have been reached. Such records must be accessible for reference at need, and prompt action is urged in the matter of provision of a suitable municipal storage building, which I understand to be under contemplation by you.

Readjustment of Salaries and Grades—The necessity for prompt action in this regard, to provide for proper recognition of faithful services and to retain in the departmental employ the most efficient of our force, who have now no incentive to remain with us, has already been pointed out in several communications to your Commission on Salaries and Grades. The standard of excellence and discipline cannot be maintained without compensation of the subordinate employees commensurate with their responsibilities and equal to the opportunities offered by other departments. No general increase in salaries has been possible since the formation of the department, in spite of the increased cost of living.

I also wish to call attention to the fact that my deputies, than whom no harder worked men are in the employ of the City government, are much underpaid. The office at present is not attractive to the class of men in whom alone are to be found the necessary attributes of skill and ability, and I earnestly recommend the increase in their salaries to \$5,000 per year, in place of the present \$4,000.

Appropriations—As to appropriations, I ask for a more liberal policy in the future, commensurate with the growth of our problem, and desire to point out that while it is true that the appropriation for 1907 is greater by \$51,400 than that for 1906, this sum enables me to expend monthly for salaries but a small amount more than the monthly payroll for December last. And in that month, too, our clerical force was most inadequate to the demands upon it.

Office Room—In the matter of office room, the Manhattan and Brooklyn offices particularly are greatly hampered for lack of room. The buildings in which we are situated are poorly fitted for the needs of such a department, the volume of work

which we have to perform being inconceivable to those who have not been brought in direct contact with it. We need at least one-third more office room, and from present indications it will be impossible to obtain this space in these buildings.

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx be and is hereby authorized to advertise for each separate pavement with a view of awarding the contract to the lowest bidder.

DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

QUARTERLY REPORT, DEPARTMENT OF PARKS, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX, THREE MONTHS ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1906.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted report of the designs for improvement, work accomplished and finances of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, for the three months ending December 31, 1906.

Bronx Park.

Change of Entrance—The entrance at the corner of Pelham avenue and Southern boulevard has been changed to conform to the new grade of street; 3,000 cubic yards of top-soil has been deposited there and the whole corner has been planted, including the terraced portion along the Southern boulevard.

Drainage—A swamp which existed north of Pelham parkway and just east of the Bronx river was thoroughly drained by means of a stone drain 675 feet in length and 2 feet in width, this work requiring 50 yards of rock excavation, 300 yards of earth excavation and 700 yards of fill. Two hundred and twenty-five yards of rock was carted and used in building the drain.

Roads, Walks, etc.—Boston road, in the rear of the Zoological Park, along the Bronx river, is being widened from six to ten feet, making a 32-foot roadway. Two thousand and seventy-five linear feet of this road has been graded and made ready for macadam pavement. The rock foundation has been laid, preparatory to receiving the trap-rock and screenings. Two hundred yards of rock and 400 yards of earth have been excavated and 1,000 yards of earth carted for grading and filling. A retaining wall 200 feet long, 15 feet high and 3 feet wide at base has been built. Two hundred and seventy yards of stone was carted from Crotona Park to be used in this work.

In the workshop, tools were sharpened and repaired, signs painted, rolling stock repaired and painted, new harness made and old harness repaired. Snow scrapers, pruning poles, tool boxes, stepladders and swinging poles for athletic fields were also made.

In the greenhouses the usual cleaning was done and other preparation made, at the commencement of the last quarter, for the reception of tender plants to be taken from the various parks for protection during the winter season. Cuttings were made from many plants for propagating. Frames were prepared and filled with garden mould and pansy seeds planted therein. A great number and variety of chrysanthemums were cultivated and, when staged in the greenhouses, elicited the admiration of the many visitors. Fifteen thousand bulbs, such as hyacinths, narcissus, tulips, lilies, etc., were planted in a pit and covered with earth, to be taken to the greenhouses and forced as occasion requires. During the holidays 3,000 hyacinths and 2,000 narcissus were flowered.

A large number of evergreens were taken from the hill back of the greenhouses, where they had been growing too thickly, and planted in different parts of the herbaraceous gardens.

Two hundred Cornus Florida (dogwood) were planted on the hill back of the rocks on Southern Boulevard.

Cuttings made from geraniums were placed in the propagating house and rooted, then potted and placed in the growing house; these numbered ten thousand.

Thirty thousand young plants were transplanted. Upwards of sixty-thousand plants were propagated and cared for in the greenhouses.

Botanical Garden, Bronx Park.

Blue Bridge—A contract was awarded on October 18, for the erection of a new bridge to take the place of the present Blue Bridge, and the work will be commenced as soon as the weather permits, in the spring.

Roads, paths and walks were repaired and kept clean.

Zoological Garden, Bronx Park.

Baird Court Improvement—The work on this court is completed, excepting that the pavement is badly broken and cannot be repaired until spring; hence final payment has not been rendered.

Deer House—On this building the work is practically completed. The heating apparatus is now being placed, and the cages are in course of erection. The building will be completed in about a month.

Terrace Walls and Steps—This contract was completed, and final payment rendered on October 30, 1906.

Boat House—With the exception of the painting and the setting of plumbing fixtures, this building is finished.

Concourse and Approaches—Work is progressing favorably on this contract, one hundred feet of the wall extending from Pelham Avenue Bridge along the Bronx river being completed. The excavation has been done over a considerable portion of the work, and the water main has been carried in from Pelham avenue.

Widening Boston Road—The work of widening this road is being prosecuted by park labor. About three-quarters of the grading is finished, and one-half the telford laid.

Pelham Bay Park.

Orchard Beach—The work of improving this beach has been finished. The improvements have increased the bathing capacity of the beach 100 per cent. Two hundred and fifty yards of rock and two hundred yards of earth were removed and used to fill the patch of swamp land nearby. Twenty-five yards of sea wall, 5 feet high, was constructed. Four hundred yards of sand was carted and spread on the beach.

Comfort Station—The comfort station near the bath houses at Orchard Beach has been completed, and final payment was rendered on December 12, 1906.

Athletes' Lodge—This contract is nearing completion. The work of installing the boiler in the cellar is delayed by reason of there being 15 inches of water in the cellar. The water will be drained from this section of the park by park labor, and the boiler will then be installed.

Addition to Public Comfort Station Already Erected—This contract has been completed, and final payment was rendered on December 29, 1906.

Macadamizing Road Along Pelham Bay—This road is now completed, and has been thrown open to the public. All the work was done by park labor.

Athletic Field Beach—One hundred and eighty yards of new beach has been added to the old beach. In the progress of this work, rocks and mud were removed and used for grading and filling in low lands. Two hundred yards of sand was carted and spread on the beach.

Van Cortlandt Park.

Lake—The question of drainage from this lake has not been settled. Specifications have been sent to the printer, and the contract may be let the first of the year.

The work of cleaning, filling and widening the lake has progressed rapidly. Three thousand yards of mud was removed therefrom, and was used for filling the low lands on the side of the lake.

Excavation—The location of the road under the railroad at Van Cortlandt Park Station, where this excavation is in progress, is being changed by diverting it to the eastward. The road will also be widened. This work will not be finished for about two months.

Planting, etc.—The planting on the road from Van Cortlandt Mansion to the deer paddock has all been completed, and the top-soil furnished by contract has been placed, all work being done by park labor.

In the colonial garden flower beds were cared for and walks cleaned and raked. All plants and trees in the northwest corner were taken up and removed to the nursery. Rhododendrons and other tender plants were covered with straw to protect them through the winter.

Thirty-two tree holes, 6 feet square, were dug and refilled with top-soil along the parade ground. The soil taken from these holes was used to grade bank along the lake.

The plantation extending from small lake on west side of railroad track to trestle on east side of parade ground was ploughed and graded, and 1,800 yards of top-soil spread thereon. Three thousand shrubs and fifty trees were planted in this section, and were pruned and cared for. Thirty loads of fertilizer were carted, to spread around these trees.

Fertilizer was also spread over the polo field and over the flower beds and lawns in the colonial garden. One thousand yards of fill was carted and graded in this garden, being part of the work of raising the grade of the garden three feet.

In connection with the work of the nursery, the Gardeners were engaged in pruning and cultivating shrubs, digging trees and shrubs and sending them to the various parks to be planted; transplanting trees and shrubs, when necessary to grow strong, fibrous roots, which could be had only by transplanting; making eight thousand cutting of shrubs of different varieties, and placing them in the greenhouses for rooting in the spring, and covering five hundred herbaceous plants sent from the Bronx Park greenhouses, to make room for other plants to be used earlier in the season.

A number of dead trees were removed, several being large chestnut trees which stood along Rockwood drive, and were dangerous to persons or to passing vehicles.

Comfort Station—On October 25 a contract was awarded for the erection of a shelter house and comfort station near the polo field in this park. The excavation has been completed, the foundations are in, and some of the bluestone water table is set.

Widening Road—Part of the road along the golf links has been widened and macadamized. When the appropriation was made for this work, it was intended merely to macadamize the existing width, 16 feet, but it has since been decided to widen the road to accommodate the rapidly increasing traffic, and the amount appropriated is not sufficient to cover the completion of the work.

New Lawn—The tract of low land lying north of Gun Hill road and east of Grand avenue was converted into a lawn, a paved drain having been constructed into which the stream which spread itself over this field was conducted. This new section will be planted with grass seed, next spring, and thrown open to the public.

New Lockers—The increased demand for lockers in the golf house has necessitated the building of additional lockers, ninety-six of which are now in course of construction, and will be finished early in January.

Crotona Park.

Terracing North Side of Park—The work of terracing along the north side of the park has been completed to the extent provided for by the available funds, the work being done by park labor.

Drainage—The draining has also been completed in the portions of the park for which funds were appropriated.

Grading, etc.—Banks along the roads were graded and sodded, and roads were regulated and resurfaced.

The appearance of the park in the vicinity of Indian Lake has been much improved by the removal of many dead trees and stumps, and the clearing away of undergrowth.

Trees and shrubs were pruned and cultivated throughout the park, and tree-guards placed around the trees on Crotona avenue.

Macomb's Dam Park.

A rail fence was built around the southern end of this park; also around the athletic field and running track.

An addition was made to a small building used as a locker house and dressing room by athletes using the running track.

Claremont Park.

Improvement of Clay Avenue Side—The eastern side of this park, along Clay avenue, north of the main entrance to the park, has been practically filled in, and the grading is now under way for that portion lying along Clay avenue, south of the main park entrance. The work is being prosecuted by park labor. About 400 yards of stone and earth was removed and deposited for grading in the field at the Wendover avenue entrance to the park.

St. Mary's Park.

Asphalting—Under contract, the work of asphalting all existing walks in the park was undertaken and is nearly completed, but the remainder cannot be finished until the weather permits in the spring. Several new walks were constructed and are to be covered with asphalt.

Grading—Most of the grading has been completed, but more funds will be needed to entirely finish it.

Old Passage Road—The work of widening, grading and macadamizing this road has been finished and the road is now in good condition. A new walk was constructed along this road and is about half completed. The balance will be finished as soon as the weather is favorable in the spring.

Planting, Etc.—Seventy-five hawthorn bushes were planted around the railroad vents to prevent children from climbing over the ventilators and to screen the unsightly walls.

The reparking of the northerly section of the park has been continued and is now nearing completion. Two thousand yards of fill and top soil, which was needed in this work, was carted to that section and graded.

Small Parks.

Considerable grading has been done in the smaller parks of the borough. The contractors have delivered all the material for fencing the small parks, but it came too late to be erected during the winter. The work will be commenced early in the spring and will be done by park labor.

Bronx and Pelham Parkway.

From the Southern Boulevard to the Bronx river the walks have been reconstructed on both sides of the road, the gutters and sides of the road cleaned and regraded and a strip of sod placed around the trees along the paths.

From the railroad bridge to the north side of the parkway 250 feet of sidewalk has been constructed and regraded, 200 yards of fill being carted and used for filling and grading.

On the south side of the parkway 2,300 feet of new sidewalk has been completed. A stone retaining wall, 5 feet high, 2½ feet wide at the bottom and 2 feet wide at the top, to retain this sidewalk, is in course of construction on one side of the road leading from Pelham parkway to Pelham bridge. Three hundred feet of this wall is finished. Fill is being deposited to bring the sidewalks up to grade.

Eighteen hundred shrubs were planted along the parkway, from the railroad bridge to Pelham road.

Fifty dead trees were removed and replaced by elms.

Moshulu Parkway.

Completion of Improvement—This work is practically completed; the grading and draining have been finished, and nothing remains to be done except some raking and seeding, which will have to be postponed until spring.

On the crest of the parkway, for a distance of 300 feet, a new grade has been established. This was accomplished by reducing the grade on one side and using the fill thus removed to raise the grade on the other side.

A cobblestone gutter was laid and finished the entire length.

Eighteen hundred feet of Belgian pavement gutter was laid and finished.

Eight-inch drains have been laid across roads, where found necessary.

From Webster avenue to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad bridge, a distance of about 300 feet, a roadway has been built and 12-foot sidewalks laid out, making the roadway and walks the same width as the bridge—100 feet. The road was laid with trap rock, which was napped, rolled, spread with screenings and small rock, sprinkled and again rolled. At the lowest point of this road two catch basins have been built and connected with an 8-inch drain 10 feet in length.

Fifty elm trees, which died shortly after planting, were removed and replaced by new trees.

Spuytten Duyvil Parkway.

This parkway has been cleaned and the washouts repaired; also gutters cleaned and repaired. Some of the walks and part of the grading and terracing along the roadway have been completed. The work was done by park labor.

The traffic on this road is increasing every year to a large extent and the necessity of bringing this work to completion in the near future is apparent.

Street Trees.

The trees on the streets and highways of the borough were placed under the care of the Department of Parks several years ago. These trees number about 130,000. During the last quarter of the year a record, showing the kind, location, size and condition of each tree, was established, to enable the Department to systematically care for them.

Thirty-eight tree climbers and pruners, divided into five gangs, have been at work throughout the borough pruning trees and removing dead trees.

General Work.

In the general maintenance of the parks, the usual work of the last quarter of the year was prosecuted. Trees, shrubs and flowers were cultivated in all the larger parks, and in the small parks, squares and gores, and in certain sections of the parks bordering on the parkways, flower beds were cared for.

Grass was mowed on all lawns; tennis courts, ball fields, polo fields, athletic fields and apparatus, cricket grounds, etc., were kept in fine condition.

Roads, walks and paths cleaned and repaired.

Gutters, basins and drains were cleaned and washouts filled in.

Comfort stations were cared for.

Rubbish and leaves were raked and burned.

In preparation for the winter, tender plants were taken from the flower beds to the greenhouses for protection and cultivation. The flower beds were dug and covered with fertilizer. Thousands of cuttings were made from plants for rooting in the spring. Many flower beds were planted with bulbs and covered with fertilizer.

The ball field in the rear of the Municipal Building in Crotona Park was flooded, making an additional skating pond of large area in the centre of a populous section.

The hills in Van Cortlandt, Claremont, Crotona and St. Mary's parks were thrown open to children and thousands of the little ones enjoyed this sport free from the danger of passing vehicles.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:
 From January 27 to February 2, inclusive, forty-one operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, seven at Gouverneur Hospital, nine at Harlem Hospital and eight at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

The Director of Laboratories recommends the appointment of a trained Laboratory Assistant from the Civil Service list; also the appointment of a third salaried Pathologist.

It is recommended that a letter be sent to Dr. Placek of Fordham Hospital, commending his conduct on January 7, in amputating a patient's leg under an engine.

The Fire Marshal reported on the fire in Bellevue Hospital and recommended that the ceiling in the basement be covered with asbestos one-eighth of an inch thick, with a metal ceiling over it; also that the air shaft between the tower and the hospital building have the wooden sides covered with metal; also that all the wooden buildings be removed as soon as possible and that the fence close to the new building be removed so that the fire engines may use the carriage way south of the wooden buildings in case of necessity. It is impracticable at present to dispense with any of the portable buildings.

The Superintendent of the Training School recommends that the salary of the Acting Dietitian be increased from \$600 to \$720 a year, and it is recommended that this increase be granted.

The Clerks in the hospital have been given much trouble by lawyers coming after 5 o'clock in the evening to have records searched. This occurs at a time when many of our Clerks are at supper, have gone home, and the force is short, and it is recommended that a rule be made that no records are to be searched for data for outside information before 9 or after 4 o'clock.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, having heard of the courage, promptitude and skill displayed by Dr. L. J. Placek, of Fordham Hospital, on January 7, in going under an engine and amputating the leg of an injured man, desires to place on record its appreciation of Dr. Placek's act; further

Resolved, That a letter be sent to Dr. Placek, expressing the Board's appreciation and thanks.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That authority be given the General Medical Superintendent to obtain estimates and award the work to the lowest bidders on the work of covering the basement ceiling with asbestos and placing a metal ceiling over it, and of having the wooden sides of the air shaft covered with metal, in accordance with the recommendation of the Fire Department.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Acting Superintendent of the Training School and the General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, the salary of the Acting Dietitian be increased from \$600 to \$720 a year.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That transcripts of the records of patients be not furnished lawyers and other persons not connected with the hospital before nine o'clock in the morning and after four o'clock in the evening.

Reports of Committees.

Dr. Brannan reported that but one bid on the labor and material required for making refrigerating and pipe connections with the present refrigerating plant at the new Harlem Hospital was received on Friday, February 1, and that it was informal.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That advertisements be again inserted in the CITY RECORD calling for bids on the labor and material required for making refrigerating and pipe connections with the present refrigerating plant at the new Harlem Hospital, said bids to be opened on Tuesday, February 19, 1907.

Mr. Robbins reported that there was no drain for the coal bin at the new Harlem Hospital, that the painters had not yet begun the work of painting the plastered walls and ceiling surfaces and that the elevator was not in proper order.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That a letter be written to the architects, Messrs. Horgan & Slattery, calling attention to these matters and asking that they receive immediate attention.

Dr. Brannan reported informally that no money had yet been paid P. J. Carlin & Co. under the authorization to pay \$40,000 on account.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY ON THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 28, 1907.

There were present—John H. Starin, Vice-President, presiding; Mayor George B. McClellan, Comptroller Herman A. Metz and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon and Charles Stewart Smith.

George L. Rives, of counsel, and George S. Rice, Chief Engineer, also were present. The minutes of the meeting of the 25th of February were read and it was moved that they be approved.

The Vice-President announced a public hearing, in accordance with the terms of chapter 607 of the Laws of 1906, on the form of the proposed contract for that portion of the Brooklyn-Manhattan subway loop system, in the Borough of Manhattan, in Centre street, between Pearl and Canal streets. No one appearing in favor or in opposition thereto, the hearing was declared closed.

The following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That the form of the proposed contract for the Brooklyn loop lines, Centre street, from Pearl street to Canal street, now submitted, be and the same hereby is adopted, except that there shall be made thereto such further amendments as may be agreed upon between the Corporation Counsel and the Counsel of the Board, and as shall be approved by the Committee, and that a communication be addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting the said Board, pursuant to the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act, to consent to the said form of contract.

Resolved, That as soon as the form of contract is completed, approved and consented to, as above provided, and deposited in the office of the Secretary of this Board the President of the Board be and he hereby is authorized and directed to procure the invitation to contractors to be duly published in such newspapers as the Mayor may select fixing such date for the opening of bids as he may deem proper.

ALEXANDER E. ORR, Esq., President, Rapid Transit Commission, No. 320 Broadway:

DEAR SIR—In accordance with the understanding arrived at at the meeting of the Rapid Transit Commission on Monday, the 25th inst., I have sent to the Mayor some copies of the proposed bill intended to carry out the tentative agreement with the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, and I hand you herewith other copies for the use of the Commission.

So far as the question of form is concerned, I would say that in drafting this bill it has been thought wise to follow as far as practicable the general features of chapters 423, 424 and 425 of the Laws of 1903, which provided for the abolition of grade crossings on the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad, the New York and Putnam Railroad and the New York and Harlem Railroad and for the extensive changes being made in and near the Grand Central Station at Forty-second street. These acts were the subject of very careful and prolonged consideration by the counsel for the railroad company and for the City at the time of their enactment, and have stood, I believe, with perfect success the test of actual construction under them.

The Board gave a hearing on the report of the Special Committee on the matter of depressing the tracks, etc., of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company on Tenth and Eleventh avenues. Charles De Hart Brouwer addressed the Board, suggesting certain amendments to the form of bill which had been drawn under the direction of the Committee, entitled "An act to provide for such changes as may be necessary or required to abolish, discontinue and avoid the use by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for railroad purposes, of streets, avenues, public parks or places in the Borough of Manhattan in the City of New York, at grade, and to that end to authorize The City of New York to grant to and receive from the said railroad company such lands, or lands under water, rights or interests in lands, as may be agreed upon by and between the said railroad company and The City of New York, acting by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

H. G. Schneider objected to any amendment to the law, and urged the Board to take advantage of the condemnation clause in chapter 109 of the Laws of 1906. On motion the hearing was postponed until March 7, 1907, it being understood that the motion to reconsider the report of the Special Committee presented at the meeting of the 25th of February be considered still pending.

DEAR SIR—Mr. Burrows has sent me a copy of a letter dated the 21st inst., from the President of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, calling attention to the action begun in the Supreme Court, Kings County, by Charles H. Otis, against The City of New York and the contractor and sub-contractor for the construction of the Rapid Transit Railway in Joralemon street, near Henry, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The President of the Interborough Company requests you to take such steps as may be necessary or proper to enable the City to fulfill its covenant in regard to protecting the contractor against suits by any person under certain conditions.

I have already conferred with Mr. Wickersham, the counsel for the Interborough Company, and with Mr. Bell, the Assistant Corporation Counsel in charge of the Brooklyn office, in regard to the defense in this case, pursuant to the instructions given by the Board on December 13, 1906 (Minutes, page 4542), and I believe everything is being done that can be done to carry out the obligations of the City. Of course, I need not say that the City is not called upon to protect the contractors against claims for damages due to their own negligence.

I would suggest that a copy of the letter from the President of the Interborough Company be transmitted to the Corporation Counsel as a matter of record, and that his attention at the same time be called to the fact that the counsel for this Board on December 14, 1906, had written to him on the subject.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners:

DEAR SIR—In the matter of the four-track subway to be constructed through the Flatbush Avenue Extension, from the Manhattan Bridge to Fulton street, I recommend that provision be made in the contract for construction which shall definitely provide a fixed period during which the work may be carried on in open cut, and that after the lapse of this time at least two-thirds of the width of the roadway shall be completely floored over in a substantial manner and made available for street traffic. This period for open cut work should not exceed twelve months, to run from the date the contract is executed.

Such provision is, in my opinion, essential for the proper utilization of this important artery about to be opened up at great expense by the City, providing a direct route from an important juncture of thoroughfares in this Borough and extending not only to the Manhattan Bridge but, by a short deflection, to the south, to the entrance to the old Brooklyn Bridge, and by such provision the roadway will be in condition for the laying of permanent pavement and for opening up the street for travel within a reasonable period of time.

I would also urge your Commission to provide for the construction of pipe galleries throughout the length of the Brooklyn Subway Loop, so that sub-surface pipes and conduits may be fully provided for in the first construction and a permanent pavement laid over the subway immediately thereafter. The installation of pipe galleries seems to me to be especially desirable through Flatbush avenue, where exceptional conditions in an unoccupied street of great width will allow contract work to proceed rapidly.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
