BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

REPORT FOR QUARTER ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1907.

New York, January 1, 1908.

Hon. GEO. B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to present the following report for the three months ending December 31, 1907:

The Department As a Whole.

Reference was made in the last report to the preparation of the Departmental estimates for the year 1908. These have since been acted upon by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, and the several sums, as requested and granted, are as follows:

In addition, the sum of \$4,400 was requested and granted for rents, but has been included in a "General Appropriation for Rents of all Departments."

It will be seen that the chief deduction in salaries is in providing for pavilions A and B. In the estimate, provision was made for occupying these new buildings during the last nine months of the year. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, however, considered the probability of delay in their opening and limited the appropriation to \$15,000. A deduction in corresponding proportion was made in supplies for the new pavilions for the same reason.

Quite a number of changes have been made during the quarter in the several appropriations of the Department for the year 1907.

Mention was made in the last quarterly report that the sum of \$30,000 had been asked with which to pay the salaries of the Graduate Nurses, whom it had been necessary to employ at \$50 per month in the new Fordham and Harlem Hospitals, consequent upon the impossibility of securing Pupil Nurses. Later a post graduate course in nursing was established and several Pupil Nurses were obtained from other training schools which had affiliated with Bellevue Training School for special training. These Post Graduate Nurses receive a salary of \$25 per month and the Pupil Nurses \$8 per month. As a result of this saving, it was found as the year drew to a close, that the sum required for salaries for Nurses was not so much as at first estimated. At the same time, however, it was found that there would be deficiencies on several of the other funds of the Department, due to the increased census in the several hospitals during the year involving additional supplies of every kind. On drugs alone, it was found that there would be a deficiency of \$8,000. The Trustees, therefore, requested the Board of Aldermen to rescind the previous resolution authorizing the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$30,000 and to substitute a resolution providing additional appropriations to the funds of the Department as follows:

This request was favorably acted upon by the Board of Aldermen on December 31, 1907, and it is hoped that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will approve the resolution of the Board of Aldermen as soon as possible.

In addition to this, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment upon request transferred the sum of \$4,000 from the appropriation Alterations and Repairs, where it has not been needed, to the appropriation for Supplies.

The lease of the old Harlem Hospital expired on May 1, 1907, when the buildings were vacated. The Department of Correction, however, was in possession of the dock portion of the premises and held over until August 15, 1907. The owner claimed rent from the City for the entire premises for the period of three months and fifteen days, and upon the advice of the Corporation Counsel the Department of Finance instructed that a bill be drawn for the amount of the claim, to meet which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transferred the sum of \$1,968.75 from the general appropriation made to the City for "Rents" to the appropriation entitled "Rents" of this Department.

Supplies for 1908.

The specifications for supplies for the coming year were completed by October 1, and were based upon the distribution for the months of July, August and September, with ten per cent. added for the increased hospital population sure to occur during the winter months. Bids were received at the meeting of December 17, and the lowest bids were accepted except in the case of meat, poultry, fish, butter, eggs, flour, fresh vegetables and coal for Gouverneur Hospital. On these items the bids received were so high that the Board decided to reject them all and to advertise anew. New bids were accordingly received and presented to the Board on December 31, when it was found that a substantial saving to the City had been effected upon a number of the articles bid for, these articles including the important and expensive items of meats, poultry, butter, eggs and coal. Comparing the prices of the majority of the supplies bid for this year with those of last year, it is found that they are lower upon the whole, although there are striking instances in which the prices are maintained, and even advanced. A complaint having been received that one of the

bids submitted on an article of food supplies was fraudulent and bore the mark of having been prepared in collusion with another bidder, the Board rejected the bids and invited the complainant to submit any evidence in his possession, that it might be turned over to the District Attorney for investigation and an action instituted for fraud should the evidence be found to warrant it. As a further protection to honest bidders, the Board adopted a resolution permitting the competing firms, or their representatives, to inspect the bids, including each and all of their separate items immediately after their opening, the only restriction being that the actual handling of the bids shall not be permitted.

Renewals of the annual contracts for shoeing horses, repairing surgical instruments, etc., were made at the last meeting of the year.

New System of Accounts.

The Board resolved in October that the new system of accounting recommended by the Department of Finance be adopted for the hospitals under its control. The Comptroller has appointed Messrs. Richard M. Chapman and A. G. McCarthy, Expert Accountants, to supervise the installation of the system and the necessary steps have been taken to introduce it on January 1, 1908. The system is based on the most modern methods of accounting, and is designed to secure proper administrative control in every Department with the least expenditure of labor. It will also facilitate the preparation of the annual report, as the required facts will be more easily obtained in the future through the operation of an elaborate detailed analysis of expenditures. A special feature is the use of requisitions for the obtaining of supplies of every nature. The liabilities against each separate contract will be shown as they occur precluding all chance of incurring debts beyond the contract amount. It will also involve the abolition of the central storeroom at Bellevue Hospital and allow the goods and supplies to be delivered in the future direct to the particular hospital where they are needed.

The success of the system will, of course, only be demonstrated after its installation, but judging from the confidence of its promoters the result is assured.

While retaining his duties in connection with the purchase of supplies, the Assistant Superintendent, under the new system, will be relieved of the supervision of the departmental bookkeeping, which has often kept him at his desk until late into the night, and has interfered with his usefulness in other directions.

New Rules.

In consequence of misunderstanding of the rule governing the filling of prescriptions and issuing of dressings at the several Out-Patient Departments, a rule forbidding either except to patients either of the Out-Patient Department or of the hospital was adopted.

A new rule requiring the approval of his immediate medical superior to an application on the part of any Assistant or Adjunct Assistant Attending Physician or Surgeon for a leave of absence before such application shall be passed upon by the General Medical Superintendent and the Board of Trustees has been put into operation.

Consideration of a new rule concerning the method of making medical appointments has been deferred until the several medical boards shall have an opportunity of expressing an opinion of the change proposed. In the meanwhile the medical boards have been reminded that the present rule requires a report from them upon all the candidates who shall apply for appointments, not merely upon those recommended to the Board of Trustees.

A change in the constitution of the Conference Committees making the trustee members of one eligible to serve on the other has been adopted by the Board.

It has been decided to prepare a printed form for the use of patients desiring to employ the services of a lawyer in accident cases, the signature of the patient, attested by witnesses, to be required before the lawyer can be given access to the records and history of the case.

In order to check the indiscriminate use of the telephone of the Department a rule has been adopted forbidding entirely its use by visitors to the several institutions, and requiring the keeping of a record for an experimental period of one month in Fordham and Harlem hospitals of every call made, giving name of sender, number of call, etc.

Miscellaneous.

By resolution the Board of Trustees took part in the protest offered by the Municipal Art Society and other civic organizations against the alienation by the State of certain rights and properties in the seashore at Long Branch and Fire Island, it being the opinion of the Board that such property will sooner or later be needed for the health and recreation of the City's poor.

A communication having been received from the Board of Health offering to instruct hospital Internes in intubation, it was voted to refer the matter to the several medical boards, with the recommendation that they make arrangements to accept the offer for the benefit of the house staff in each institution.

BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

New Pavilions A and B.

The following report was received from the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, as to the state of the work on December 31, 1907:

"Mason work has practically been completed. The outside steps on each side, the area and cellar walls are all finished, with the exception of the walls between high and low cellar. Of the carpenter work more than half of the trim has been put in place, and a great portion of the dressers in diet rooms and shelving in linen rooms has been put up. Most of the kalamine work has been finished. The building is ready for finished floors as soon as sufficient heat is provided. More than two-thirds of the marble partition work in toilets has been finished. Also marble plinth blocks for interior doors and saddles for interior and balcony doors. The entire interior marble contract will be finished in two weeks. Of the floor tiling 80 per cent. is finished, and the loggia and balcony tiling has also been completed thus far. This last item is being delayed by the iron work. The structural steel work is completed. A great portion of the ornamental iron work is in place, except the balcony and loggia railings and some fascia work. The delay in this work has been caused by the financial troubles of subcontractors. The granite and limestone work is finished, except pointing of a small portion. Electric work is about ready for motor work, the wiring being completed. The building, however, is not fit to receive motors on account of lack of heat. The heating and ventilating work is finished except for placing of radiators and registers. The plumbing work, as far as rough pipe work, is entirely completed, and the greater portion of the fixture work is in place. Some work is delayed by tilers and marble men, not, however, to any considerable extent. The main delay on building is lack of temporary heat. This has caused all branches of the work considerable delay. Plaster work is completed except for patching. If work is pushed properly by general contractor the building could be completed in three months."

Several of the subcontractors have been unavoidably delayed in their work, and upon advice of the architects the Vacuum Cleaner Company were granted an extension of three months on their contract. The installation of an implement cabinet on each floor of the new building was considered advisable, and this was authorized at an additional cost of \$125.

The plumbers, Messrs. Byrne & Murphy, were notified of the approaching expiration of their time under the contract, but they were able to assign good reasons for the delay in their work, and the architects advised that they be given consideration. Their request that the size of the sterilizing sinks be reduced from 36 inches by 22 inches to 30 inches by 22 inches was referred to the architects for their opinion.

The style of lighting fixtures for the new pavilions was finally determined upon by the architects and the Building Committee of the Board and specifications prepared in accordance therewith.

An additional floor outlet was authorized upon advice of the architects. Pipe lines to carry filtered ice water to designated points on the several floors were also recommended by the architects and their construction has been approved by the Board.

Specifications for painting all the walls and ceilings of the new pavilion have been received from the architects, but have been laid aside for the present.

The matter of changing the height of some of the windows to permit of easier access to the balconies has been referred to the President for investigation.

As shown by the architect's report, a very important matter is the heating of these incompleting buildings during the cold weather. The John H. Parker Company was urged to impress upon its subcontractors the necessity, on account of threatened damage to the woodwork, of heating the buildings. This was on December 3, and on the 17th, no steps having been taken by the contractors, the Board notified them that all payments on their contract would be withheld until they complied with this requirement.

The New Pathological Laboratory.

A communication from the Finance Department, under date of October 3, gave notice of the transfer to the Board of Trustees of the northwest corner of the electric light plant on the block to the north of Bellevue Hospital. This transfer allowed the completion of the excavation work which had been prevented by lack of this slip of ground.

The architects report the condition of the work at December 31, 1907, as follows:

"The excavation work has been finished complete, and the greater portion of foundation work is finished. With the arrival of the structural iron work, which is due now, a very quick progress of the work will be noticeable. The work thus far has been very satisfactory."

The Training School for Nurses.

Very good progress has been made on the construction of this building during the past quarter. With the exception of the terra cotta coping all exterior walls are practically completed. The architects are endeavoring to have the roof built before "snow flies," in order that interior work may be carried on throughout the winter, and it is expected that their efforts will be successful.

Most of the arches are in place and part of the cinder filling has been laid. The hung ceiling of the fifth floor is ready for the terra cotta blocks. The steam mains and most of the risers and vent ducts are installed. The rough soil and vent lines and the leaders are up. The Vacuum Cleaning risers are in place and the electrician has begun the installation of the conduits and outlet boxes on two floors.

After a full investigation by the Building Committee and the President of the Board the signing of a special order for \$5,200 for additional electric lighting fixtures recommended by the Bureau of Lamps and Gas was authorized by the Board early in December.

Bids ranging from \$6,200 to \$12,600 were received on October 22 for the construction of a tunnel under Twenty-sixth street, to connect the Training School with the power plant of the hospital, and the contract was awarded to Cavanagh & Seymour, the lowest bidder.

Bulkhead Line.

The work of building a bulkhead line between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-ninth streets, East River, about 980 feet in length, including the return on the northerly side of East Twenty-ninth street, is progressing rapidly. The work is being carried out by the Department of Docks and Ferries and when completed will add two and one-half acres of new made land to the City's real estate to be used by the hospital.

The Medical and Nursing Services.

For the after-treatment of patients who have been discharged from the State institutions for the insane, and more particularly for the milder cases that do not require commitment to an insane asylum, the Trustees have established at the outpatient department a weekly clinic for mental and nervous diseases, which will be under the supervision of Dr. M. S. Gregory, the Resident Alienist of the Psychopathic Ward. It is perhaps too early to speak of the results of this new work, but a promising beginning has been made.

Additional one-year men on the house staffs of the Second and Fourth Divisions have been appointed with the approval of the Trustees.

One of the temporary buildings on the ground has been set apart for the treatment of convalescent alcoholic cases. On account of the overcrowding of the Alcoholic Ward, it was often found necessary to discharge patients before they were completely cured. The new arrangement, making it possible to detain them longer, should result in a larger percentage of cures.

A valuable report upon the course of training for Nurses, submitted by the City Visiting Committee of the State Charities Aid Association, was referred to the Committee on Training Schools for consideration.

A set of rules for the handling of material in the Pathological Department, as prepared by the Director of Laboratories, has been adopted by the Trustees upon the advice of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board.

Miscellaneous.

The rumpled and creased condition in which the clothing of patients is returned to them when they leave the hospital has long been a reproach to Bellevue and other hospitals. The fault lay in the system of rolling the clothing into bundles which were kept in small square boxes or closets. These are now being replaced by regular closets of a length sufficient to permit the clothes to hang. As soon as the new appropriation becomes available, the work upon these closets will be pushed to completion.

Miss Edna Cutler was appointed Dietitian on October 1 at a salary of \$1,000 per annum. Miss Cutler had been serving under temporary appointment and is well equipped for the position.

An additional Messenger has been employed in the Admitting Office at a somewhat advanced rate of remuneration to cover the cost of lodging, there being no room in the men's dormitories for him to sleep.

An arrangement has been made to have the laundry work of the Probationers' Home done outside the hospital at a cost of \$1 per hundred pieces, the hospital laundry being already overworked. The enlargement of the home has rendered necessary the employment of an additional Maid.

Changes in the Medical Staff.

The death of Dr. Loomis, which occurred on December 22, removed from Bellevue one who had been a familiar figure there for the past twenty years. The Board of Trustees passed the following resolution as an expression of its regret.

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals has learned with profound regret of the death of Dr. Henry P. Loomis, for many years one of the Attending Physicians to Bellevue Hospital; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Board desires to place on record its sense of the value of Dr. Loomis' services to the patients he has treated within the walls of Bellevue Hospital, as well as his more extended services to the cause of medical science in general; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be forwarded to his family and to the medical journals of The City of New York.

The following changes were, upon the recommendation of the Medical Board in each instance, made in the Medical Staff during the quarter ending December 31, 1907:

December 31—Dr. Gordon Lindsay appointed Acting Assistant Pathologist in place of Dr. Alwin M. Pappenheimer, who was granted one year's leave of absence in order that he might study abroad.

Census.

The total number of admissions and the average daily census for the quarter were 7,993 and 875 respectively, as compared with 6,760 and 773 during the corresponding quarter of 1906. The total number of patients treated was 8,837 as compared with 7,427. The number of visits made to the Out Patient Department was 21,979 as compared with 20,253 during the same quarter of last year.

GOVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

The Consulting Engineers of the Finance Department having reported unfavorably upon the revised figures recommended as a basis of settlement with John R. Sheehan & Co., the contractors for the new wing and changes in the old portion of Gouverneur Hospital, the Board of Trustees determined to lay all the facts in the case before the Corporation Counsel, and to this end an extended history of the case, supported by the original documents, was prepared by the Building Committee and submitted to him. The Board now awaits the Corporation Counsel's decision and will hold no further communication with Mr. Sheehan or his representatives.

Mr. Louis E. Bonnaud, who had been General Inspector of Construction in charge of the work upon the main building, was continued, after the abandonment of that work, to inspect the building of the new coal vault, a contract for which had been awarded to the Peter Fury Company. He was later suspended but in a short time reinstated, the contractor being behindhand in his work. The Board has called the attention of the contractor to the expense it is under in being obliged to retain the services of an Inspector and will impose the penalty provided for in the contract unless a satisfactory reason is given for the delay.

There being fewer women than men patients in this hospital, the Board has assigned one of the women's wards to the use of male patients, a joint medical and surgical service being maintained here as well as in the remaining women's ward. This is regarded as a temporary arrangement for the winter only and its result is to permit the handling of more patients by the hospital.

The appointment of an additional Apothecary has been made necessary by the very heavy work of the drug department at this hospital.

The request of the Medical Board that a conveyance be provided to carry its members to and from the nearest elevated and subway stations, which are situated at a considerable distance from the hospital, had to be refused, there being no money available for such a purpose.

Medical Appointments.

On October 22, upon the recommendation of the Medical Board, Dr. L. J. Nesenoff was appointed to the Children's Class, Medical, in the Out-Patient Department, and on December 17, Dr. Chas. E. Perkins was appointed Clinical Assistant to Out-Patients (ear, nose and throat).

On November 6 the resignation of F. C. Hollister, as Attending Physician, was accepted.

Census.

The total number of admissions and the average daily census for the quarter were 784 and 115, respectively, as compared with 682 and 64 during the corresponding quarter of 1906. The total number of patients treated was 893, compared with 733. The number of visits made to the Out-Patient Department was 24,581, as compared with 23,497 during the same quarter of last year.

HARLEM HOSPITAL.

Trouble has arisen with the contractors for laying out the grounds of Harlem Hospital, Messrs. Kelly and Kelley, on account of the unsatisfactory nature of their work. Upon advice of the architect the Trustees first agreed to approve the final payment on the contract, provided that \$1,000 could be withheld to cover the cost of placing the lawns, etc., in good condition in the spring. Then it was learned that no money upon this final payment could be paid without being construed as an acceptance of the work. The Board accordingly rescinded its action and declined to authorize a payment. The contractors will be called upon in the spring to complete their work in a proper manner.

For the better protection of patients the ambulance entrance has been inclosed on three sides with a metal and glass partition at a cost of \$300.

The equipment of the hospital with a system of electric clocks has been authorized at an expense of \$720. This system is already installed at Gouverneur Hospital, where it has worked excellently.

Nurses and Patients.

The Medical Board has instituted a course of instruction for Nurses, which is highly appreciated by the Trustees.

The Commissioner of Charities has authorized the Supervising Nurses of Harlem and Fordham Hospitals to telephone to the Medical Superintendent of the Metropolitan Hospital and effect arrangements for the transfer of patients, thus doing away with the necessity of patients at those hospitals (chronic cases to be transferred to the hospitals of the Department of Charities) being sent from One Hundred and Twentieth street to Twenty-sixth street, by boat, then to the admitting office at Bellevue, to be again returned to the dock for transfer to the City or Metropolitan Hospitals.

Some trouble has occurred from the manner in which patients from the J. Hood Wright Hospital have been left at Harlem Hospital without notification, and the Trustees have written to the authorities of this institution, requesting them to telephone first and make sure that there are accommodations at Harlem before transferring patients thither.

Medical Appointments.

On October 1 the resignation of Dr. Frederick P. Hammond, Surgeon to Out-Patients, was accepted.

On October 22, Dr. W. H. Stewart was appointed Radiographer to Harlem Hospital, and Dr. Foster F. Potter and Dr. L. W. Berliner appointed Assistant Surgeons (children) to Out-Patients.

On December 17—The resignation of Dr. Karl H. Goldstone, Physician to Out-Patients, was accepted.

On December 31, Dr. Frederick B. Humphreys was appointed Pathologist to Harlem Hospital.

Census.

The total number of admissions and the average daily census for the quarter were 1,038 and 109, respectively, as compared with 746 and 43 during the corresponding quarter of 1906. The total number of patients treated was 1,128, as compared with 781. The number of visits made to the Out-Patient Department was 15,913, as compared with 14,177 during the same quarter of last year.

FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

Serious trouble has arisen from the failure of the John H. Parker Company, contractors for the new hospital building, to carry out their agreement to complete certain minor details left unfinished by reason of the incomplete work of other contractors and to re-asphalt the elevator pit, if that should appear necessary. To cover the expense of these items, \$1,000 was retained from the final payment to Parker. Besides taking the advice of the architect, Mr. R. E. Almirall, the Board referred the matter to the Corporation Counsel, with the result that the Board has instructed the Parker Company to perform the work specified by the architect, under penalty of its being done for the Board by some other contractor at their expense. In the meanwhile the architect has been obliged to take temporary measures to remedy the defective dampproofing in the elevator pit.

Upon the advice of the architect, final payments have been authorized to McManus & Welch, the plumbing contractors, and to the Thomas Crimmins Contracting Company, who undertook the layout of the grounds. An extension was allowed on the latter contract on account of the necessity of doing some of the work a second time.

The contractors' work is very satisfactory. This company submitted an estimate for continuing the road above the coal vault to the road running through the property of St. John's College, but because of a lack of funds and the necessity of obtaining the consent of the college authorities to the use of the road through their property, it was decided to do nothing on this matter for the present.

For lack of a direct feed pipe from the boiler to the hospital, in addition to the one passing through the engine room, the steam service had twice to be disconnected from the hospital, repairs being needed to the pipe in the engine room. An expenditure of \$444 has been authorized to repair this defect.

The erection of a tool room containing a work bench has been authorized in the boiler room at a cost of \$205.

The lighting fixtures supplied by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity have proved so unsatisfactory by reason of the insufficient light afforded in the wards that the Board of Trustees has requested their removal in order to admit of the installation of a better system. Convalescent patients have been compelled to sit in idleness in the evening because there was not enough light to read by.

The consumption of coal at the new hospital has exceeded the architect's estimate and advertisement for an additional supply brought in but one bid, which was, however, accepted, on account of urgency, and because the contract covered only the balance of the year.

Permission has been accorded the Fordham Medical College to give their students clinical instruction in the Bellevue Psychopathic Ward, under the same restrictions applying to the students of all the other medical colleges in the city.

On December 17, upon the recommendation of the Conference Committee, the following appointments were made:

J. V. Kern, Clinical Assistant, Out-Patient Department, Medicine.

Paul Dolan, Clinical Assistant, Out-Patient Department, Surgery.

E. L. Cocks, Dermatologist to Out-Patient Department and Fordham Hospital.

Census.

The total number of admissions and the average daily census for the quarter were 452 and 94, respectively, as compared with 299 and 51 during the corresponding quarter of 1906. The total number of patients treated was 551, as compared with 356. The number of visits made to the Out-Patient Department was 2,964, as compared with 1,707 during the same quarter of last year.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
