Section 288. No person other than an employee of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or the Fire Department, shall, without previous permission in writing from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. unscrew or open any hydrant, nor shall leave said hydrant open for a longer period than shall be limited in said permission, nor shall use water for other purposes than may be mentioned in said permission. Anyone violating any of the provisions of this section shall be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars, to be imposed by any city magistrate, and in default of payment of any fine so imposed, such city magistrate shall commit such offender to the city prison for a period not to exceed ten days.

Sec. 2. Section 291 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, part 1,

chapter 6, article 4, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 291. No person or persons not connected with either the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or the Fire Department, shall open or use or tamper with any hydrant connected with the high pressure fire system. Anyone violating any of the provisions of this section shall be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars, to be imposed by any city magistrate, and in default of payment of any fine so imposed, such city magistrate shall commit such offender to the city prison for a period not to exceed ten days.

New Jersey, for use of the Department of Bridges in connection with the construction of the towers, cables, superstructure, etc., of the Manhattan Bridge.

This lease was for a term commencing May 1, 1907, and extending to the date of completion of the contract between the Department of Bridges and the Ryan-Parker Construction Company, dated June 15, 1906, said term, however, not to extend beyond the first day of May, 1912, with the privilege of renewal from year to year, with the condition that the rental for the renewal term should be one dollar (\$1).

The resolution fixing the compensation for the lease is as follows:

Eighth-That the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment named in said order of the Supreme Court made their report under date of September 30, 1895, and said report contains the following statement:

That pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on the 6th day of April, 1894, the title to each and every parcel of land lying within the line of said street or avenue duly vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York on the 1st day of September, 1894.

Ninth-That said Commissioners' report was confirmed by order of the Supreme Court, dated October 9, 1895.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR-Thomas Callan, John Callan, Annie O'Brien and James Callan, in a petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pray for a conveyance of the right, title and interest of the City in and to a section of old One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, about thirty feet east of Whitlock avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx. The propery is more particularly described hereafter.

It appears upon inquiry at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx that old One Hundred and Forty-fifth street was not shown on the map of the topographical survey, dated May 14, 1873, and on file in the Topographical Bureau of said Borough. The street does appear on the property map entitled "Map of the Westchester Property of Edward T. Young, Springhurst, New York, surveyed by C. B. Taylor, August, 1873," a certified copy of which is on file in the office of the Register of New York County, and designated as No. 601

It is therefore evident that old, or East One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, was brought into existence by the filing of Young's map. As to whether the City ever acquired any substantial interest in the street, the communications from the President of the Borough of The Bronx in relation to a former case involving the same question are pertinent.

Under date of October 1, 1908, the President of the Borough of The Bronx

I beg to say that it is reported to me by Chief Engineer Briggs, of this Borough, that the City does not appear, according to the record, to have a fee ownership in the street mentioned, and that it does not appear that the strip of property referred to is required for any public use, as at present determined upon, unless it might be for some rapid transit route which may be laid out in that locality in some future time.

Again, on November 7, 1908, the President of the Borough of The Bronx

I am informed that there is no record that East One Hundred and Forty fifth street was dedicated to the City or legally opened by condemnation proceed ings, but property has been sold in accordance with the said Edward T. Young map fronting on One Hundred and Forty-fifth street.

From these communications it does appear that the City did not acquire the fee of this old street. This part of Longwood avenue in front of the property herein involved was opened by condemnation proceedings "in the matter of acquiring title to Longwood avenue, from Southern boulevard to Tiffany street," confirmed October 9, 1895, and filed in the office of the County Clerk of New York County on October 29, 1895. In this proceeding old One Hundred and Forty-fifth street is shown on both damage and benefit maps. An award of \$1 was made to unknown owners for the whole street taken in the proceeding, and the land was described as a street. On the benefit map the strip between the old line of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and the new line of Longwood avenue does not appear to hav been assessed. as the strip is not given a separate lot number.

In another proceeding to open Longwood avenue, from Westchester avenue to the Southern boulevard, confirmed July 30, 1901, the property herein involved was included within the area of assessment, and is shown on the benefit map as Parcel 490. An assessment of \$14.01, embracing all of the old street within the lines of this block, was assessed against unknown owners. In none of the proceedings examined does it appear that The City of New York was recorded as the owner of

As to whether the street has ever been closed by lawful authority, the President of the Borough of The Bronx reported under date of October 13, 1908, that the old street was discontinued and closed by the filing of section 3 of the final maps on

Under date of January 8, 1909, the Corporation Counsel, in an opinion written on the application of Winnefred Day involving similar questions on the same street, certified after an examination of the records that the interest of the City was merely

In view of the foregoing I would respectfully recommend that the Corporation Counsel be asked to advise:

First-Whether the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may lawfully sell and convey the right, title and interest of the City in and to the property herein sought by these petitioners?

Second—Is the interest of the City material or nominal in the following described

Taylor Phillips, enclosing a report made by Mr. Robert Jordan, Examiner in the Bureau of Examination of Claims, in the Finance Department, on the petition filed by Thomas Callan, John Callan, James Callan and Annie O'Brien, praying for a release of the interest of the City in and to a section of old One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, about thirty feet east of Whitlock avenue. in the Borough of The Bronx,

The Deputy Comptroller states in his letter that the report and the accompanying papers are transmitted to me for my opinion.

From the facts stated in the petition of the Callans, and in the report of Mr. Robert Jordan, and after an examination of the records, I am of the opinion that the City's interest in the premises hereinafter described is a mere cloud on title and I so

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 205 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, have authority to convey the premises in question provided the same are not required for any other public purpose, and upon such terms as they may deem just and equitable.

I have prepared, and herewith transmit, a release in triplicate, conveying the following described property:

Whereas, The Prresident of the Borough of Brooklyn has requested the sale of all buildings, parts of buildings, etc., now standing upon property owned by The City of New York, located in the Borough of Brooklyn, acquired by it for street opening purposes, said buildings being situated upon land more particularly described as follows:

Being all those buildings, parts of buildings, etc., now standing on land lying within the lines of Sullivan street, from the westerly line of Bedford avenue to the easterly line of Rogers avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, all of which are more particularly described on a certain map on file in the office of the Collector of City Revenue, Department of Finance, Room 141, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by virtue of the powers vested in them by law, hereby authorize and order the sale at public auction, or by sealed bids, at the highest marketable prices of all the buildings, parts of buildings, etc., upon the following terms and conditions:

The buildings and appurtenances thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay eash or a certified check drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions

of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occcur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the side-walks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of Broooklyn, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the costs and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and work-manlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs of adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR-Cornelius K. C. Billings, in a petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, prays for a sale and conveyance of the interest of the City in and to a strip of land lying within the lines of the old Fort Washington Ridge road, in the Borough of Manhattan. The property is more particularly described hereafter.

The Fort Washington Ridge road was laid out by the Commissioners of Central Park in 1869. Chapter 114 of the Laws of 1894 authorized a change of line and Commissioners were appointed to straighten the line of the road. In so doing, a strip of the old roadbed was left between abutting property and the line of the road as established pursuant to the provisions of the said act. The details of these proceedings are more particularly set forth in a special report which has been submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund,

The act referred to provided that abutting owners might purchase the sections of the old road in front of their lands at prices fixed by the Commissioners, provided that such purchases were made within four months of the confirmation of the report. In case of a failure so to do the act provided that the sale and conveyance might be authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on such terms and conditions as they might elect. Authority to sell and convey sections of roads, streets, etc., that have been closed in whole or in part by lawful authority to the owner of lands of Conveyances, Section 8, page 372. Said Emma M. Radley conveyed said fronting on such roads, streets, etc., is vested in the Commissioners of the Sinking Lot No. 43 to Cornelius K. G. Billings, your petitioner, by warranty deed dated Fund by section 205 of the Greater New York Charter. Such lands, however, must

lines of the new road were declared to be discontinued and closed by section 3 of chapter 114 of the Laws of 1892

Under date of November 17, 1908, the Borough President of Manhattan reported in writing that the property sought by this petition is not required for public use.

The City of New York owns the property in fee.

On the conditions imposed by the statute there does not seem to be any objection to granting the prayer of the petitioner on such terms and conditions as the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may deem adequate.

The rule of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in cases of this character is to charge 50 per cent. of the value of the intervening strip. In adopting this rule the Commissioners took into consideration the value of easements of light, air and access which adjoining property owners have in such lands and made an allowance of 50 per cent. of the value of the property in recognition of such easements, but in no event should the charge for the interest of the City be less than \$3,385.98, which is

the total of the amounts fixed by the Commissioners for the parcel in front of the petitioner's property.

There is another feature of the case that calls for comment. The survey submitted with the petition and the sketch partly compiled from the Commissioners' map of the opening proceedings and partly from map No. 727, filed in the Register's office, disclose a difference of 20.88 feet. The matter of error in map of Fort Washington Ridge road proceeding was considered by the Corporation Counsel in the matter of the application of the Fort Washington Syndicate. He there advised that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund could lawfully sell and convey the interest of the City on a description submitted. Again, in the matter of the petition of the Hogenbauer & Weslau Company, the Corporation Counsel advised that the Commissioners of the Singing Fund could lawfully sell and convey the right, title and interest of the City. It is just as well, however, to call attention to the difference and to seek a legal opinion based on the facts of this particular case.

I therefore recommend that the petition be forwarded to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may lawfully sell and convey the interest of the City in the following described property to Cor-

SIR-I am in receipt of a letter dated January 12, 1909, enclosing the report of Robert Jordan, Examiner, in the Bureau for the Examination of Claims in the Finance Department, and a letter to the Comptroller from the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, dated November 17, 1908, together with other papers, in the matter of the petition filed by Cornelius K. G. Billings, for the sale and conveyance of the interest of the City in and to a strip of land lying within the lines of old Fort Washington Ridge road. Said report together with the accompanying papers are transmitted for my examination and opinion as to whether the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly sell and convey the interest of the City in this property, and if they may, the Deputy Comptroller asks that blank deeds in triplicate be prepared and transmitted to you with my approval.

In answer thereto, I beg to advise you that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, have power to sell and convey the premises in question, because under and by virtue of the report of the Commissioners, in the matter of opening Fort Washington avenue, pursuant to authority in them vested by chapter 114 of the Laws of 1892, the land in question was described in their report and shown on the map thereto annexed as closed and discontinued as a street. Said chapter 114 of the Laws of 1892 authorizes the Sinking Fund Commissioners to sell the strips of land lying between the old lines of Fort Washington Ridge road and the new lines of Washington avenue. upon such terms and conditions as they may deem just and equitable, provided, however, the abutting owners had failed to pay the Comptroller within one year after date of the confirmation of the Commissioners report therein the amount found by such Commissioners to be a reasonable compensation to the City for conveying said land. The abutting property owners have not within one year made the payment required to the Comptroller in this case.

SIR—Cornelius K. G. Billings in a petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, prays for a conveyance of the interest of the City in a strip of the old Fort Washington Ridge road. The case is fully discussed in the papers attached.

The property was appraised by Mr. Brown of this Department at \$66,402.27. Under the rule of the Sinking Fund which recognizes the value of easements of light and access as equal to 50 per cent. of the value of the property, the charge for the con-

veyance was fixed at \$33,201.13.

This figure was communicated to Messrs. Bowers and Sands, attorneys for the petitioner. Under date of May 10, 1909, they protested that this sum was too high. Under date of August 5, 1909, they were again requested for a final answer and replied on August 20, that Mr. Billings' real estate representative was in Europe and requested an extension until he returned.

Under date of November 13, the attorneys were asked for an early decision. No reply has been received to the last communication.

As no opinion from any real estate appraiser has been presented to show any error in the City's appraisal and no acceptance of the offer has been received, it seems reasonable to assume that the terms are not acceptable to the petitioner. I therefore recommend that the application be denied.

I would further recommend that the case be brought again to the attention of the Corporation Counsel for such action as he may consider appropriate to protect the interest of the City in the land which he has certified is owned in fee by the City subject to easements.

In the matter of the application of Cornelius K. G. Billings, for a conveyance by The City of New York, pursuant to chapter 114 of the Laws of 1892, and section 205 of the Charter of The City of New York, of certain real estate situate in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York:

DEAR SIRS—Referring to the application of Cornelius K. G. Billings for a conveyance by The City of New York, pursuant to chapter 114 of the Laws of 1892, of certain strips of land lying between the lands he owns in fee and Fort Washington avenue, we submit herewith the appraisals of the following real estate experts as to value of land in this immediate locality, basing the value on a lot 25 by 100 feet free and unrestricted:

Emanuel Fellman, \$5,000 to \$6,000 per lot; Robert E. Simon, \$5,000 per lot; Charles Griffith Moses, \$6,000 per lot; Francis A. Curry, \$6,000 per lot.

Under the Davies rule the strips asked for by Mr. Billings would be upon the basis of \$5,000 per lot, of the value of \$22,000, if free and clear of any easements of light, air

That the valuation of \$5,000 per lot is a proper one, is confirmed by the Book of Land Value Maps prepared by the Department of Taxes and Assessments of The City of New York in 1909, wherein this very property is fixed at a value of \$200 per front foot for a lot 25 by 100. This is a valuation fixed by a sworn officer of the City, who by section 889 of the Charter, is directed to assess the property at the value for which it would sell "under ordinary circumstances," and this value has been placed without reference to the question of easements and as free and clear of the same.

It must be remembered that this property is not available to the City for any purpose whatsoever, as the easements vested in Mr. Billings prevent its use or occupation

by any other person. It is a case of a naked legal title in the City.

It is true that Mr. Billings did not apply under the provisions of the Act within the time limited, but he was advised at that time by one of the leading assessment lawyers in New York, to the effect that it was not judicious to take these deeds until certain appeals then pending were disposed of, which it was expected would result in a material change in the descriptions of the property. It is certain that the City has not suffered any loss by this delay, except a loss of interest. It was always Mr. Billings' intention to acquire this title from the City as soon as he could do so, with assurance of getting a proper deed and it would seem to us that he should receive this deed upon paying to the City the sum fixed as the price to be paid by the adjoining owner, to wit: \$3,385.98, with interest at 6 per cent. per annum from the expiration of the four months' time within which the payment was to be made as prescribed by said Act, to wit: November 12, 1904. This would make a total amount of about \$4,400. By this payment the City would receive all that was intended by the Commissioners, with interest, and in no way would its interest be prejudiced, as Mr. Billings has paid all taxes and assessments upon this strip since these strips ceased to become a part of the road, and they have been assessed to him as a part of his property.

The whole purpose of the statute was to enable the City to correct certain errors which had been made in laying out the road, to pay for such land as was taken for this purpose, and to enable the owners of land where the line of the road shifted so as to interpose an intervening strip, to acquire the legal title from the City upon payment of the sum fixed by the Commissioners. So far as appears, there was no reason for the time limit except to compel the proceeding to be entirely closed. There were no questions of easements involved in the proceeding, one way or the other, and there would not appear to be any reason for imposing any penalty upon Mr. Billings for not having paid this money before this time except the legal rate of interest, or at the outside, the rate of 7 per cent. which is imposed upon arrears of taxes and assess-

Since this appeared before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, Mr. Billings has presented to me appraisals from four different people as follows:

Emanuel Fellman, \$5,000 to \$6,000 a lot; Robert E. Simon, \$5,000 a lot; Charles Griffith Moses, \$6,000 a lot; Francis A. Curry, \$6,000 a lot.

I am perfectly willing to accept the appraisals of Mr. Moses and Mr. Curry. whom I know to be two of the best appraisers of real estate in The City of New York as to the value of lots on this road, which value shows that my value heretofore put upon the same of \$15,000 a lot is too high. At \$6,000 a lot, the price which

Mr. Billings would have to pay would be the sum of \$13,280.45. I recommend the adoption of a resolution authorizing the release of the interest of The City of New York in and to this property as shown on the map and described in the papers, on old Fort Washington Ridge road, upon the payment of the sum of \$13,280.45, and upon furnishing further evidence that all taxes and assessments which are now liens upon the property have been paid.

Application has been made to the Board of Aldermen for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to pay this rental.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. Lawrence Gresser, President of the Borough of Queens, in a letter addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of December 7, 1909, requests that a lease be executed by The City of New York with the Unity Building Association of Glendale, Borough of Queens, for the second floor, assembly hall, 48 by 49 feet, with ante-rooms and toilets, and one room on the first floor, in the two-story club, lodge room and office building, known as "Unity Hall" and located at Nos. 1908 and 1910 Myrtle avenue, for a period of six months, from January 1, 1910, at a monthly rental of \$150, said premises to be used for a court room for the new Third Municipal District Court, in the Borough of Queens.

Upon examination I find that this is a new two-story and cellar frame club house, having steam heat, gas, electric light and water. The room to be used as a court room is 48 by 49 feet. In the rear of this is a Court Clerk's room, 20 by 14 feet, with alcove, 8 by 10 feet; a glass enclosed annex, 8 by 24 feet, and a jury room, 13 by 9 feet, with toilct attached; there is also a toilet in the rear hall. The Judge's room, on the ground floor, is 13 by 18 feet, with bay window and toilet. The lobby of the building, 24 by 30 feet, has tiled floor and metal walls and ceilings. The three toilets also have tiled floors. The building is well adapted for court purposes. The lessors are to furnish an extra janitor for day service, the regular janitor of the building being on duty only at night. It is claimed that the ground and building represent an actual outlay of \$33,000. The lessors are to completely furnish the rooms named above for court uses, including all necessary platforms, desks, tables, chairs, partitions, etc. The City will therefore be at no expense whatever, except for a safe and metal filing cases.

The lease is to be from month to month, for a period not exceeding six months, and the premises may be vacated by the City at the end of any month without notice—the lessors, however, reserving the right to use or rent the court room and the jury room, when not otherwise in use, for lodge or club meetings or other such purposes at night, between the hours of 6 o'clock p. m. and 6 o'clock a. m., during the period of said lease.

Plans are now being drawn for Jacob Blank, a builder, for a two-story brick and stone building on Myrtle avenue, Glendale, to be laid out especially to accommodate both a Municipal Court and a Magistrate's Court; and when these plans are completed, an offer will be made to the City to lease such building at a 10 per cent rental, and if the offer is accepted and a lease for a reasonable length of time is assured, he will proceed at once to erect such a building and have it ready within the six months.

The rent asked for these rooms, \$150 a month, seems at first excessive, under the conditions of the lease, but as the lease entails the employment of another janitor for day service, and covers heat, light and water, and the lessors are to completely furnish all the rooms for the purposes of the court, except as to safe and metal filing cases, and as this is the most available court room that can be found in this section, the City cannot, in my opinion, make any better arrangement to house the new court house at this time.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease of all of the second floor in the premises, known as the "Unity Building," at Nos. 1908 and 1910 Myrtle avenue, Borough of Queens, including the assembly hall, 48 by 49 feet, ante-rooms and toilets, except one ante-room in the southwesterly side of rear of said building, and also one bay-window room situated on the first floor of said building, for use as a judge's room and library, at a rental of \$150 a month, upon a month to month lease, for a period of six months from January 1, 1910, the lessors to completely furnish all of said rooms for court purposes, including platforms, desks, tables, chairs, partitions and all other necessaries, except safe and metal filing cases—lessor also to furnish steam heat, light, water and janitor service; the lessor reserving, however, the right to use or rent said assembly hall and all anterooms on the second floor, except room occupied as Court Clerk's office on the first floor, for lodge meetings, club meetings and other such purposes, between the hours of 6 o'clock p. m. and 6 o'clock a. m., during each and every day of said term. Lessor, Unity Building Association, by Henry J. Glasser, Treasurer.

I would also respectfully recommend that these premises be officially designated by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as a court room, for use of the Third Municipal District, in the Borough of Queens.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby assign the Unity Building at Nos. 1908 and 1910 Myrtle avenue, in the Borough of Queens, as a place for the holding of the Third District Municipal Court, in the Borough of Queens, from and after January 1, 1910.

The Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a sale at public auction, of tax sale certificates Nos. 5013. 5014, 5015, 5023, 5024, 5025, 5026, 5027, 5028, covering property in Block 41, Ward 24, Borough of Brooklyn:

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Registrar of Arrears of the old City of Brooklyn, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 114 of the Laws of 1883, sold for the non-payment of taxes, certain lots situated in said city, now Borough of Brooklyn, known by the Nos. 29, 30, 31 and 32, on July 21, 1886; Nos. 49, 50, 51 and 52, inclusive, on July 28, 1886, and Nos. 53 and 54 on July 21, 1886, which were bid in by the City of Brooklyn in the amount of \$253.47. Subsequently thereto and in accordance with the law, taxes were paid thereon by the City of Brooklyn, and added to the certificates and became part and parcel thereof. Also, in accordance with said law, on or about June 19, 1889, notices were served by the City of Brooklyn upon all parties deemed to have an interest therein. On or about October 9, 1890, as to Lots Nos. 29 to 52, inclusive, deeds were delivered to the City of Brooklyn in accordance with the law and upon the service of said notices, with the exception of Lots Nos. 53 and 54, upon which notices were never served, because the City authorities at that time were unable to find the owners, and no attempt was made to advertise, as required by said law.

Application has been made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for leave to redeem from the operation of said sale, on the payment of taxes to date, and the ground for this request is based upon the fact that Susan M. C. Bergen gave a blanket mortgage covering all of her property in the old City of Brooklyn to one Demas Strong, in consideration of the sum of \$1,000, dated the 14th day of January, 1884, recorded January 15, 1884, in Liber 1655 of Mortgages, page 300. From the records as appear in this office, said mortgagee had never been served with a notice, as required by law. I am of the opinion that the City, in order to make a perfect title, in accordance with said act, would have to serve a notice upon the mortgagee or his executors or assigns; that the service of said notices, in accordance with law. would permit said mortgagee to redeem. The question might naturally arise whether the mortgagee would have to foreclose his mortgage as relates to Lots Nos. 29 to 32, inclusive, and Nos. 49 to 52, inclusive, before redemption by foreclosing the mortgage going to the judgment or foreclosure and sale, or whether he would have the right to redeem the same upon the service of notices. It is a legal proposition that I am not able to determine. The decisions which have been handed down from time to time seem to me to give the party who has not been cut off by the operation of said service and deed, the right to redeem. Recent decisions handed down have been against the City in a number of cases.

The question to my mind would be on the method of procedure by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. Whether under section 221 of the Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund could authorize a sale at public auction of Lots Nos. 29 to 32, inclusive, and Nos. 49 to 52, inclusive, on account of the defect caused by failure to serve notice upon the mortgagee, or whether the Comptroller himself would have the right to permit the redemption. It is a matter of fact that a deed saued by the Registrar of Arrears of the old City of Brooklyn to the City of Brookyn to these lots is recorded in the Register's office of the County of Kings, and also recorded in the office of the Registrar of Arrears, which was an office of record.

I believe that the only way to straighten out the records is by having a sale at public auction, in accordance with section 221 of the Charter, for an amount which would be the cost of redemption at the time of the sale, and in addition thereto the sum of \$100 for advertisement and preparation of the papers.

As to Lots Nos. 53 and 54, as herein noted, there was no notice served thereon. This would purely be an assignment of the certificate which would come wholly within section 221 of the Charter, and can be sold at public auction for an amount which would have been necessary to redeem at the time of sale.

I therefore recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution, in accordance with section 221 of the Charter, directing the Comptroller to sell all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to certain tax sale certificates Nos. 5013 to 5015, inclusive, and Nos. 5023 to 5028, inclusive, which were sold on or about July 21, 1886, for the non-payment of taxes, and recorded in Liber 83, in the then Registrar's office of the old City of Brooklyn. The property shal' be sold to the highest bidder for a price not less than that price which would be necessary to redeem, including bonus, interest, notice and all taxes paid on said certificate and added thereto, including interest thereon up to the time of said sale.

That as to Lots Nos. 30 to 32, inclusive, and Nos. 49 to 52, inclusive, in addition to said amount, all taxes which would be due and unpaid at the time of said sale and an additional sum of \$100 will be charged for advertisement and preparation of the papers necessary to give a release of the interest of The City of New York in and to said property.

As to Lots Nos. 53 and 54, by a simple assignment by The City of New York of the certificate as required by section 221 of the Charter, and the amount to be charged should be the amount necessary to redeem at the time of sale, and I so

As to certificate No. 5012, being Lot No. 29, which was so'd October 25, 1897, to one John I. Morrissey for the sum of \$55, and a deed was delivered thereon in accordance with law which was in force at the time the sale was made, so this is eliminated from the consideration of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

A letter was also received from the Coal Merchants' Association, withdrawing their objection to the leasing of the pier.

A public hearing on the matter was given by the Chamberlain at his office on Thursday. December 16, which was largely attended by representatives of the above named associations and corporations. Comptroller Metz, Commissioner Spooner of the Dock Department, and Chief Engineer Withington of the Department of Finance, were present; also Mr. C. L. Duval, President of the Manhattan Terminal Company, and Mr. M. E. Kelly, his counsel.

Commissioner Spooner gave his reasons for recommending this lease, and stated that he had ordered the extension of the piers at foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-second. One Hundred and Thirty-third and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth streets to the pierhead line, and that by July 1, 1910, these piers would provide about 4,000 square feet of additional wharfage space over the space now provided at the One Hundred and Thirty-first street pier. His letter to the Chamberlain on this subject, dated December 17, 1909, is hereto attached. Mr. McDougall Hawkes, on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce and the Merchants' Association; Mr. C. H. Callaghan, on behalf of the Maritime Association of the Port of New York, and Mr. Frank S. Gardner, on behalf of the New York Board of Trade and Transportation, protested against the leasing of the pier on the ground that it would reduce the amount of open pier space, which was now inadequate.

Mr. M. E. Kelly, counsel for the Manhattan Terminal Company, stated that should the lease be granted the pier was to be used solely for a freight terminal for the accommodation of lighters and other vessels handling freight to and from the Harlem District. Such a terminal would be a great convenience to shippers throughout the city at large, and it would be an especial convenience to the Bloomingdale and Harlem districts, as well as to The Bronx. At present it is necessary for shippers having goods to deliver in those districts to cart them the length of the city, at great expense and inconvenience. The establishment of a freight terminal at this point would relieve congestion of traffic of the streets caused by unnecessary cartage of goods. It is necessary that the pier should be covered so as to protect perishable goods. The lease of the pier does not contemplate that it shall be used for a purely private purpose, as it will be open for the use of the public generally.

The Chamberlain received a letter, which is annexed, from Mr. W. M. K. Olcott, counsel for the Hudson River Day Line, withdrawing the offer of \$12.000 a year for the One Hundred and Thirty-first street pier, which he had made on behalf of that Company at the meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 2, 1909.

The Chamberlain reports that most of the persons present at the hearing who objected to the lease were in favor of the proposed freight terminal, but would prefer that it be located at a pier to be creeted for the purpose in that vicinity.

In the opinion of the Chamberlain the establishment of a freight terminal at the West One Hundred and Thirty-first street pier will be a great public benefit, and he therefore again recommends the granting of the lease of the pier and bulkhead to the Manhattan Terminal Company for a term of ten years, at a rental of \$9,250 a year, with the privilege of one renewal of ten years, at an advance of 10 per cent. on the rental for the first term. A resolution for that purpose is presented, which includes a provision that the Company shall use the pier for a freight terminal, and that it shall have the privilege of sub-letting so as to permit other companies to land at the pier to receive and discharge passengers and freight.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES, PIER "A," NORTH RIVER, NEW YORK, December 17, 1909.

Hon. James J. Martin, City Chamberlain:

DEAR SIR-In answer to your inquiry over the telephone to-day, would advise that if the piers at One Hundred and Thirty-second, One Hundred and Thirty-third and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth streets, North River, are extended to the pierhead line the extensions will make a surface area of 4,000 square feet in excess of the area of West One Hundred and Thirty-first street pier, and an excess in wharfage length of pier. There is no reason why these extensions should not be completed by July 1, 1910.

Relative to your request that I give you my views as to what should be stipulated as conditions governing the rental of this pier, would advise that after yesterday's hear ing I am in favor of recommending the setting aside of the West One Hundred and Thirty-third street pier for open wharfage purposes, as provided for under the statute

Relative to One Hundred and Thirty-second and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth streets, I do not believe it would be good policy to make such a recommendation, inas much as the lease of ice bridge privilege on the One Hundred and Thirty-second stree pier will preclude its being set aside in entirety. Also, it would be inadvisable to set side the One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street pier in its entirety, inasmuch as ac-ommodations for the Department of Street Cleaning must be maintained in this icinity, as it is the most practicable place thereat to dispose of the city's refuse. How ver, I do not think it would be wise to grant any leases on either the One Hundred and Thirty-second or One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street piers, but they should be naintained as open piers in a general way. I do not believe it was the intention to have open piers made so that vessels could come haphazard at all times, at any portion of the river-front, as it is quite necessary that places should be designated for the disposal of the city's excavations, receiving of the city's coal, etc., for short periods of time, provision for which should be in the discretion of the Commissioner of Docks, and should not in any case exceed one year. If these piers were set aside as under the statute, it would prohibit any such accommodation, which, in my judgment, is not within reason.

As to further stipulations to be included in the lease of the One Hundred and Thirty-first street pier, I understood the Comptroller's views and also those of the representatives of the Manhattan Terminal Company were to the effect that this pier was to be used for a freight terminal for the accommodation of lighters and other vessels handling freight for the Harlem District. Without abrogating the lessees' rights, it should have some privilege of discrimination as to who should use this pier.

DEAR SIR-On behalf of our client, the Hudson River Day Line, I beg to with draw the application made on behalf of that line for a lease of the pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-first street,

The Day Line, as you know, had a lease of the outer end of the pier at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street. Owing to the fact that the question arose as to the continuance of the lease to the Day Line of the pier at One Hundred and I'wenty-ninth street, and in order to preserve to the line a landing place for the convenience of its patrons of the Harlem district, my client felt impelled to make an offer for the pier at One Hundred and Thirty-first street, and in pursuance of that offer, I recently appeared before the Sinking Fund Commissioners. The offer made on behalf of the Day Line for the One Hundred and Thirty-first street pier was at a rental which was admittedly some \$3,000 above the rental value of that pier. The Day Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Board of Education, for a period of one Line made this offer realizing that its acceptance would be a loss to it, but it was year from December 1, 1909, at an annual rental of \$6,000, payable quarterly, and upon impelled to do this for the convenience of its patrons in that vicinity, and my client | the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, Mrs. was willing to undergo the loss in order to perform what it conceived to be its duty | Josephine Schnurmacher. to its Harlem patrons, inasmuch as the discontinuance of a landing place in that vicinity would be a great injustice to them; also because my client felt that its prestige would suffer if it lost a Harlem landing.

As the arrangements for a permanent landing place at the One Hundred and I wenty-ninth street pier have now been perfected, the necessity for it having the One Hundred and Thirty-first street pier has disappeared. The proper rental value of the pier at One Hundred and Thirty-first street, it was agreed between my client and the Commissioner of Docks, was about \$9,000.

My client, the Day Line, is familiar with the application made by the Manhattan Terminal Company for a lease of the pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-first street at a rental of \$9,250 per year. The object of this lease, as we understand it, is to establish a terminal at that point for the handling of general freight for receipt and shipment. Such a terminal would be a great convenience to shippers throughout the City at large, and it would be an especial convenience to the Bloomingdale and Harlem districts as well, as to the district north of Harlem. Under the present arrangements it is necessary for shippers having goods to deliver in those districts to cart them throughout the length of the City at great expense and inconvenience. The proposed plan has for its object the facilitating of such shipping and deliveries by enabling the delivery of goods in the downtown district by lighters to be conveyed by water to the One Hundred and Thirty-first street pier and there delivered to the parties in that vicinity for whom the goods are intended. In the same way the people of that district, instead of being compelled to cart their goods intended for shipment to the lower end of the City, can simply, without further expense to them, deliver their goods at this pier, from which point they will be forwarded to their destination. The advantage not only to the people of the Harlem district and that vicinity, but also to the downtown district and to the City at large as tending to relieve congestion of traffic of the streets caused by unnecessary cartage of goods, must be apparent to everybody. The necessity of a covered pier for the protection of goods is also equally apparent, and we have no hesitation in recommending the leasing of the pier to the Manhattan Terminal Company for that purpose intended. The lease does not contemplate that the pier shall be used for a purely private purpose, but it will continue to be used for the benefit of the public generally and will be open to the use of the public generally like any terminal. The general commerce of the port of New York cannot but be greatly convenienced by the proposed arrange-

The City at its cost and expense will erect a one story freight shed on said pier and also on the bulkhead extending from the southerly side of said pier to a line midway between the piers at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-first and West One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, as said piers now exist, and extending inshore a distance of 50 feet from the face of said bulkhead, and the lessee shall have the right to said sheds during the term of the lease or renewal thereof. All appliances or equipment of any kind whatsoever appurtenant to or connected with said sheds (excepting doors and windows) to be furnished by and at the expense of the lessee. The lease to commence from the date of occupation, which is to be given upon the completion by the

Department of Docks and Ferries of improvements at the adjoining piers, West One Hundred and Thirty-second, One Hundred and Thirty-third and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth streets, which will provide an equivalent amount of space for the business now carried on at the West One Hundred and Thirty-first street pier, and to continue for a term of ten years; a proportionate amount of rent shall be paid by the lessee in case the lessee occupies any part of the premises before the completion of the entire work. The lessee to have the privilege of a renewal for an additional ten years. The rental for the first term to be at the rate of nine thousand two hun-301 feet over that contained in West One Hundred and Thirty-first street pier, thus dred and fifty dollars (\$9,250) per annum, and for the renewal term at an advance of showing that wharfage in this vicinity will not be diminished by the leasing of that 10 per cent. on the rental for the first term. The lease to provide that the lessee shall at all times during the term thereof, put, keep, and maintain the said property and every part thereof, and the structures thereon, or to be erected thereon, in good and sufficint repair and condition, and that it will at all times during the said term do such painting to the structures and sheds erected, or to be erected thereon, as may be necessary to preserve such structures and sheds in good repair and condition, and that all such repairs and painting, during the said term, shall be done at the sole cost, charge and expense of the lessee. 
