REPORT ON THE COST OF OPERATION OF BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

April 28, 1915.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller, The City of New York:

Dear Sir—For several years past efforts have been made to install in the various departments of the city accounts and records to show the functional, and where practicable, the unit costs of the service rendered by such departments. The reduction of the work of the departments to a unit basis offers several advantages: (1) it discloses gross waste, if there is any; (2) it affords a means of comparing the cost of the work done with the cost of like work done elsewhere, or done in the same department in a different period; (3) it enables a competent executive by changes in organization or methods to eliminate unnecessary expenditures and to obtain better returns for each dollar expended. Such a system counteracts in a measure the general, and, I think, laudable tendency in departments charged with technical duties to give greater consideration to such duties than to the cost thereof or to the financial returns therefrom.

Financial reports for 1914 are now being received from many of the departments in which cost accounts have been installed. This makes it possible, in some instances, to compare the 1914 results with the results obtained in 1913. The particular reports which it is now proposed to consider are those of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for 1913 and 1914.

This department maintains and operates:

All of the expenses of the organization are charged to the several hospitals named above except "General Administration." This item covering overhead expenses can be apportioned to the several hospitals with only approximate accuracy.

FINANCIAL HISTORY.

In order to show how the cost of this branch of the Municipal Government has increased, and the reasons therefor, a brief financial history is here inserted.

Considering the above items by Hospitals, Bellevue shows an increased cost only in Professional Care of Patients; Fordham shows increases in Professional Care of Patients and in Plant Service; Harlem, increases in Professional Care of Patients, Plant Service and Ambulance Service; and Gouverneur, in Administration, Professional Care of Patients, Housekeeping, Ambulance Service and Day Camp. It would seem from this brief review, though it does not necessarily follow, that some of the hospitals have, judged from the financial standpoint, been more carefully managed than others.

These increases and decreases are explained seriatim below:

In considering the above figures it should be borne in mind that water, books, stationery, printing, and part of the cost of lighting and electric power, for this department are paid for out of appropriations for other departments of the city. Neither do the above figures include charges for interest on the value of plant and equipment nor any charges for the taxes which would accrue to the city were the properties occupied by these hospitals used for private business purposes.

In conclusion, it must be conceded that the financial showing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for 1914 as compared with 1913 is very creditable to it; for despite the various items of increase developed by our analysis of its expense reports, the fact remains that with an increase in patient days from 656,949 to 717,604 or approximately 9 per cent., the expenses of the department only increased from \$1,399,142.24 to \$1,431,443.66, or but about 2.3 per cent. The recommendations were adopted.

Requirements: Candidates will be required to present evidence of one year's experience as interne in a hospital or sanatorium, or at least two years' experience in out-patient work.

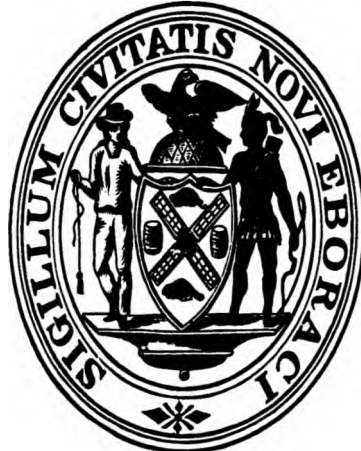

Resolved, that Rule XII. of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission be and the same hereby is amended by changing paragraph 6 to read "6 (a)" and by inserting therein the following:

"6 (b). The Commission may also, by resolution, except from competitive examination a person nominated for appointment to do a special piece of work of a technical, scientific, professional or expert character, which has been authorized by law, ordinance or resolution adopted by the duly constituted authorities of the city and is to be completed within a fixed period of time, and where the amount of compensation shall not exceed \$750, and where it shall appear that the nominee possesses unusual or peculiar qualifications for the service, and that for reasons specified in the minutes competition in such case is not practicable. Successive appointments shall not be permitted under this provision except that the Commission may, by resolution, to meet a public emergency, for reasons specified in its minutes and in its annual report, allow one extension for a further fixed period, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission in cases where the compensation is extended to an amount in excess of \$750. In similar cases where the original compensation exceeds \$750 the Commission may take similar action, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission. The head of a department asking for an extension of time shall give the Commission at least thirty days' notice before the expiration of the original appointment. No exception of the same person for like service shall be made under this subdivision or under subdivision 6 (a) of this rule if an exception has already been made under the other provision; provided that the Commission may suspend the latter limitation only in cases existing at the time of the adoption hereof."

I. Your petitioner is a corporation duly organized under and by virtue of the laws of the State of New York as a railroad for the transportation and carriage of freight for the general public, with its office and principal place of business at the foot of Jay Street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York. The certificate of incorporation of your petitioner was filed in the office of the Secretary of State, at Albany, October 9, 1909, and a certificate for an extension and the branches hereinafter set forth was filed in the office of the County Clerk of Kings County on the 5th day of April, 1915.

II. Your petitioner received from the Public Service Commission, First District, a Certificate of Convenience and Necessity on December 20th, 1910, for the original route, and the consent of the local authorities of the City of New York in and by a contract authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, June 8, 1911, and signed and delivered June 29, 1911.

III. Your petitioner, therefore, asks for the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate railroad tracks for the purpose of conveying goods, wares and merchandise only in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, as follows:

A. One track beginning at a point on the easterly side line of Jay Street, about fifty-eight (58) feet northerly from the northerly side line of John Street; thence southwesterly for a distance of about one hundred and thirty (130) feet to a point on the southerly side line of John Street, situated about twenty (20) feet eight (8) inches westerly from the westerly side line of Jay Street.

Also two spurs or turnouts from said Track A, as follows:

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
