REPORT ON THE COST OF OPERATION OF BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

April 28, 1915.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller, The City of New York:

Dear Sir—For several years past efforts have been made to install in the various departments of the city accounts and records to show the functional, and where practicable, the unit costs of the service rendered by such departments. The reduction of the work of the departments to a unit basis offers several advantages: (1) it discloses gross waste, if there is any; (2) it affords a means of comparing the cost of the work done with the cost of like work done elsewhere, or done in the same department in a different period; (3) it enables a competent executive by changes in organization or methods to eliminate unnecessary expenditures and to obtain better returns for each dollar expended. Such a system counteracts in a measure the general, and, I think, laudable tendency in departments charged with technical duties to give greater consideration to such duties than to the cost thereof or to the financial returns therefrom.

Financial reports for 1914 are now being received from many of the departments in which cost accounts have been installed. This makes it possible, in some instances, to compare the 1914 results with the results obtained in 1913. The particular reports which it is now proposed to consider are those of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for 1913 and 1914.

Considering the above items by Hospitals, Bellevue shows an increased cost only in Professional Care of Patients; Fordham shows increases in Professional Care of Patients and in Plant Service; Harlem, increases in Professional Care of Patients, Plant Service and Ambulance Service; and Gouverneur, in Administration, Professional Care of Patients, Housekeeping, Ambulance Service and Day Camp. It would seem from this brief review, though it does not necessarily follow, that some of the hospitals have, judged from the financial standpoint, been more carefully managed than others.

In considering the above figures it should be borne in mind that water, books, stationery, printing, and part of the cost of lighting and electric power, for this department are paid for out of appropriations for other departments of the city. Neither do the above figures include charges for interest on the value of plant and equipment nor any charges for the taxes which would accrue to the city were the properties occupied by these hospitals used for private business purposes

In conclusion, it must be conceded that the financial showing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for 1914 as compared with 1913 is very creditable to it; for despite the various items of increase developed by our analysis of its expense reports, the fact remains that with an increase in patient days from 656,949 to 717,604 or approximately 9 per cent., the expenses of the department only increased from \$1,399,-142.24 to \$1.431,443.66, or but about 2.3 per cent. The Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by transferring from Part IX (The Prison Service) to Part 1 (Ungraded Positions), Group 3 (Positions of a Special or Miscellaneous Character), the title "Superintendent of Women Prisoners."

The Commission directed that the physical standards used in the examination for Clerk, Second Grade, be applied to candidates in the examination for Fingerprint Expert; also that candidates should not be rejected for flat feet, varicose veins, hernia or other physical defects unless such as would render normal physical activity impracticable, dangerous or persistently painful, and the Chief Examiner was therefore instructed to summon for a physical re-examination all candidates who had been rejected for any of the causes mentioned.

A communication dated March 23 was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Queens, requesting authority to continue the services of John Griffin, serving as Gardener under clause 1 of Rule XII. The request was denied,



Resolved, That, while the said sale is held
under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

PROPOSALS FOR BIDS AND ESTIMATES FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materals or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name

and place of residence of the person making th same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless. as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na-tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the adver-tisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of

the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be in

closed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Depart-ment, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate. For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said

office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who

is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject

all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do. Bidders will write out the amount of their hids

or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Cor-poration Counsel, can be obtained upon applica-tion therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawhouse sewer connections to the main sewer in lings of construction work may also be seen there.
