FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Quarter Ended March 31, 1916.

Financial.

The budget appropriations made to this Department in the several boroughs for the year 1916, aggregated \$9,121,355.50. Of this amount there was expended during the first quarter the sum of \$2,190,372.58, leaving a balance of \$6,930,982.92 for use during the remainder of the year.

Uniformed Force.

On March 31, 1916, the membership of the uniformed force in all boroughs totaled 5,021. Included in this number are 74 Chief Officers, 10 being Medical Officers. There were also 4 Chaplains.

During the quarter 4,073 alarms for fire were received, of which 429 were false or unnecessary. For actual fires, 3,644 alarms were received. Of this number 2,806 were confined to the point of starting, and 478 to the buildings in which they originated; 81 extended to other buildings; 252 occurred in places other than buildings or vessels, and 27 on vessels in the harbor. The estimated quantity of water used for fire extinguishing purposes was 33,002,859 gallons, 5,269,382 gallons being salt water.

Engine Co. 89 and Hook and Ladder Co. 39 were disbanded. Engine Co. 69 was disbanded as a combination company and reorganized as Hook and Ladder Co. No. 39, equipped with an auto city service truck and ten lengths of one and one-half inch hose. Engine Co. No. 91 was reorganized as a double company, equipped with an Ahrens-Fox auto pumping engine in addition to its previous equipment. Engine Co. No. 223 (Fireboat "Seth Low"), was placed out of service.

During the quarter, 109 ununiformed firemen having satisfactorily completed their probationary period of three months, were appointed fourth grade Firemen, and 48 appointments as Ununiformed Firemen on probation were made.

Promotions in the uniformed force, 39 in all, were made during the quarter, as follows:

Captain to Chief of Battalion, 1; Lieutenant to Captain, 9; Engineer of Steamer to Lieutenant, 10; Fireman, 1st grade, to Lieutenant, 7; Fireman, 1st grade, to Engineer of Steamer, 12.

The number of retirements, on application, was 39, on half pay. For disability there were 13 retirements on one-half pay and 5 on one-third pay. The aggregate number of retirements was 57, with a total pension allowance of \$43,516.66, as against 14 for the corresponding period of 1915, involving a yearly outlay of \$14,850.

The resignations numbered 1, the dismissals 5, and the reinstatements 16.

There occurred six deaths of men on the active list, and 12 of retired and relieved men.

There were 784 cases of illness and 162 of injury treated by the Medical Officers, 946 in all, and the time lost from each cause was 10,930 and 3,127 days, respectively, a total of 14,057 days. The aggregate of these cases for the first quarter of the year 1915, was 999, and the time lost therefrom, 15,065 days.

The number of men examined as to their fitness for probationary appointment was 38; number rejected, 3; number of members of the uniformed force examined to determine their fitness to continue in the service, 14; number of former firemen examined as to fitness for reinstatement, 14.

Civilian Force.

The civilian force on March 31, 1916, numbered 824.

Fire Alarm Telegraph.

At the close of the first quarter the fire alarm telegraph system in the various boroughs consisted in mileage of cable and conductors in subways, and of aerial conductors and circuit mileage (the latter both underground and aerial), as follows:

During the quarter there were tested at factories 13,875 feet of conductor. The total length of cable installed was 20,967 feet, and of installed cable tested 62,908 feet.

Fire Prevention.

During the period covered by this report 41,390 inspections were made by the various divisions of the Bureau of Fire Prevention, as against 41,252 for the corresponding period of 1915, an increase of 138. Orders served or mailed totaled 6,629, as against 4,007 for the first quarter of last year, an increase of 2,622, or 65 per cent. These orders covered 17,726 items, as against 7,702 for the like period of 1915, an increase of 10,024, or 130 per cent. Orders complied with during the first quarter of 1916 amounted to 4,140, as against 3,529 for the first quarter of 1915, an increase of 17 per cent. The number of items of orders complied with was 8,557, as against 6,781 for the first quarter of last year, an increase of 26 per cent.

Fire Appliances.

During the first quarter in this Division 20,766 inspections were made; 4,701 orders were served or mailed, containing 9,981 items, and 2,803 orders were complied with, containing 4,311 items. Plans, 474 in all, for the installation of standpipes, sprinklers, fire escapes, etc., were filed with this Division.

Places of Public Assembly.

The inspection force of the Division of Places of Public Assembly during the first quarter of the current year made 1,092 original inspections. The reinspections during the same period numbered 5,521, of which 3,960 were of motion picture shows and 967 of theatres.

The number of standee violations reported during the quarter and forwarded to the Corporation Counsel for action was 29.

The number of orders served or mailed during the quarter was 198, embracing 992 items. Orders to the number of 151 were complied with, covering 632 items.

Combustibles and Explosives.

In the Division of Combustibles, all boroughs, the amount of receipts for licenses was \$43,825, as against \$38,820 for the first quarter of 1915, an increase of \$5,005. Surveys to the number of 2,970 were made on application to determine the fitness of premises for the storage of combustibles and explosive material. Blasting operations to the extent of 4,387 were supervised by civilian Inspectors of Blasting attached to the Division and in 6,847 cases by members of the uniformed force, an aggregate of 11,234. Orders totalling 1,730 were served or mailed, embracing 5,753 items. Orders to the number of 1,186 were complied with, embracing 3,614 items. Inspections totalling 14,011 were made. Permits, 5,348 in all, were issued.

Bureau of Fire Investigation.

In the Bureau of Fire Investigation, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, during the first quarter, there were 2,284 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$1,016,546, representing an average loss per fire of \$445.07. In the Bureau of Fire Investigation, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, during the same period, there were 1,360 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$1,445,035, and an average loss per fire of \$1,062.52.

The total estimated loss by fire for the first quarter of the current year was \$2,461,581. During the corresponding period of 1915 the total estimated loss was \$1,960,393, being an increase of \$501,188.

The total number of fires in the first quarter of 1916 was 3,644, as against 3,886 during the corresponding period of 1915, a decrease of 242.

The average loss per fire for the first quarter of 1916 was \$675.52, as against \$504.48 for the like period of 1915.

Arson.

During the first quarter of the current year in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, there were 14 arrests for arson, which, with 5 pending from the preceding quarter, made the number to be disposed of 19. Of this number 8 of those apprehended were convicted and sentenced, 1 was acquitted by a jury, leaving 10 under indictment and awaiting trial.

In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens during the same period there were 4 arrests for arson, which, with 5 pending from the preceding quarter, made 9 cases to be disposed of. Of this number 4 were convicted and 3 acquitted by juries. This left 2 cases pending at the close of the quarter.

There were in all boroughs 18 arrests for arson in the first quarter of 1916, as against 15 during the like period of 1915, an increase of 3. The number of convictions

during the first quarter of 1916 was 12, as against 6 for the corresponding period of 1915, an increase of 6.

Apparatus.

During the period covered by this report 15 pieces of motor apparatus were delivered under contract, consisting of 10 Ford runabouts for Chief Officers, 1 gasoline-propelled and pumping engine and 4 auto fuel wagons.

Hose.

In the first quarter of the current year there were received under contract 5,000 feet of 3½-inch and 3,000 feet of 2½-inch rubber fire hose, a total of 8,000 feet.

Buildings, Etc.

During the quarter but one contract was awarded, being for additions and alterations to quarters of Hook and Ladder Co. 104, Richmond, for \$1,870.

Minor repair jobs, 312 in all, were done to buildings by Department mechanics, entailing an expenditure of \$10,211.22, and 29 by open market orders at a cost of \$1,014.83.

Horses.

There were 829 horses in service at the close of the first quarter, a decrease of 247, as compared with the total at the close of the corresponding period of 1915, due to the progressive motorization of fire apparatus.

Stores.

During the period covered by this report 68 requisitions for furniture, linoleum, beddings, rugs, window shades, office cabinets, etc., calling for an expenditure of \$2,035.85, were turned over to the Division of Stores for investigation with a resulting saving of \$1,449.25. There were likewise investigated preliminary to distribution to companies of supplies 306 requisitions, on which a saving was effected of \$3,588.37. The total saving for the quarter was thus \$5,037.62.

Contracts executed for furnishing self-propelled and pumping engines, motor-driven city service hook and ladder trucks, automobile runabouts, forage, pipe and pipe fittings, electrical fittings and supplies and for telephone service, amounted during the first quarter to \$60,702.13. Joint contracts executed during the like period for forage, fuel, lumber, hose, hose fittings, fire appliances and supplies of various kinds amounted for the same period to \$170,927.24.

Contract orders to the number of 219 were issued in the gross sum of \$129,714.03 in the first quarter of 1916. The number of open market orders issued during the same period was 557 representing an expenditure of \$71,464.71.

Condition of Appropriations, All Boroughs.

Summary.

During the quarter 4,073 alarms were received, of which 429 were false or unnecessary. Alarms to the number of 3,644 were received for actual fires. Of these fires, 2,806 were confined to the point of starting, 478 were confined to the building in which they originated, 81 extended to other buildings, 27 occurred in vessels in the harbor and 252 in places other than buildings or vessels.

The following statement shows there was a decrease of 242 in the number of fires, and an increase of \$501,188 in the estimated loss for the first quarter of 1916, as compared with the figures for the corresponding period of 1915:

Fires—First quarter of 1915, 3,886; first quarter of 1916, 3,644; decrease, 242.
Losses—First quarter of 1915, \$1,960,393; first quarter of 1916, \$2,461,581; increase, \$501,188.

In the extinguishment of fires 33,002,859 gallons of water were used, 5,269,382 gallons of which were salt water.

On March 31, 1916, the uniformed force consisted of 5,021 members, assigned (with the exception of 74 chief officers, of whom 10 are medical officers) to the 203 companies of the 44 battalions. There are also 4 Chaplains.

The report for the quarter ended March 31, 1915, shows that there were three thousand eight hundred and eighty-six (3,886) fires.

The report for the quarter ended March 31, 1916, shows that there were three thousand six hundred and forty-four (3,644) fires.

Comparison shows a decrease of two hundred and forty-two (242) fires.

The total loss on buildings and contents for the quarter ended March 31, 1916, exceeds the loss for the corresponding quarter, 1915, by \$501,188.

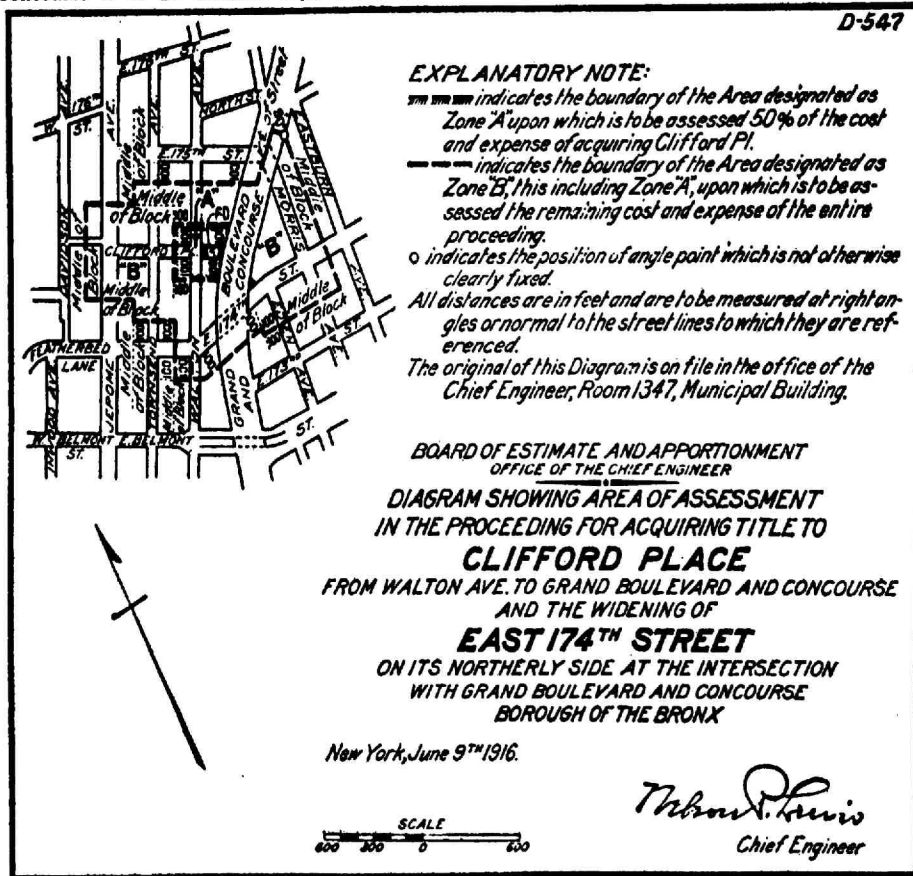

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal or shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such buildings by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureau or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board or Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy chief, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
