MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York
Held Wednesday, Nov. 7, 1917, at 10:30 A. M.

Present—Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. Commissioner James presided.

A public hearing was held on the adoption of the proposed resolution, waiving the provisions of Clause 18 of Rule XV. as follows:

Whereas, In order to correct the inappropriate assignment of certain butchers in the Department of Correction to perform the work of Inspectors of Foods (Meats), provision has been made in the budget of the Department of Correction for the year 1918, for the employment of Inspectors of Foods (Meats), at a salary of \$1,200 per annum, which positions are in the competitive class; and

Whereas, Because of long continued service of such butchers in the performance of inspection work, it is in the interests of best administration and the spirit and intent of the civil service law that all butchers who have served with fidelity for at least three years be allowed to enter a promotion examination for the position of Inspector of Foods (Meats), Grade 2, in the competitive class, in order to meet the conditions of the budget of the Department of Correction for the year 1918; therefore be it

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the provisions of Clause 18 of Rule XV. of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission be waived, and the Municipal Civil Service Commission be empowered to hold a competitive promotion examination for the position of Inspector of Foods (Meats), Grade 2, Department of Correction, in the competitive class, which shall be open to all butchers in the non-competitive class who have served with fidelity for not less than three years.

Burdetta G. Lewis, Commissioner of Correction, appeared in favor of the proposed resolution. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session, and on motion, the foregoing resolution failed of adoption.

William J. Doherty, Second Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, appeared and requested that an open competitive examination be held to fill vacancies in the position of Senior Social Investigator in the Children's Home Bureau. The matter was referred to the Acting Chief Examiner for a report.

Statistics—We have continued our examination of the various City Charters, Acts of Legislature, Common Council and Board of Aldermen, making abstracts of such detail as relates to the alignment and title of streets, parks, lands under water, etc. These abstracts are indexed and filed.



Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furring, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Revised New York Charter.
