BUREAU OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE CROTON AQUEDUCT.

The Croton Water Shed.—The rain-fall at the two storage reservoirs in the Croton basin and at Kensico on the Bronx river, for the three months, was as follows :

Up to July 16, the aqueduct was supplied to its full capacity from the natural flow of the Croton river, and from that date until September 23, four thousand one hundred and twenty million gallons of water was drawn from the storage reservoirs and lakes to keep up the maximum of supply.

The phenomenal rain-fall which began on the 21st of September, and continued for four days, swelled the volume of the river so rapidly that on the 24th of September water was running over the Croton dam at a depth of five feet. At the same date the Middle Branch reservoir, from which 1,230,000,000 gallons of water had been drawn during the preceding dry weather, was again filled to high-water mark, and the Boyd's Corner reservoir and the several lakes, which had also been drawn upon, were nearly refilled.

The improvements at the outlet of Lakes Mahopac and Kirk have been continued, and will be completed this year.

The Aqueduct.—There has been no interruption to the steady delivery of water through the aqueduct to its full capacity. The improvement of the structure to render its weaker portions secure against rupture, have been continued, the following being the principal items of work done :

Works for the Bronx River Supply.

The Supreme Court has directed the Commissioners previously appointed in the matter of acquiring the right of way for the conduit line between Hartzdale and Bronxville, to act also in the acquisition of land for the reservoir at Williamsbridge, and the right of way for the conduit line between Bronxville and Jerome avenue. When these proceedings are consummated the city will have acquired all the lands and rights which are necessary to control and convey to the city the waters of the Rye ponds and the Bronx river.

Favorable progress has been made on the construction of the reservoir at Kensico, at the head of the conduit line, and on the several sections of the conduit line. The work on the reservoir for the three months comprises the following principal items :

Distribution of Water.

Contracts for laying water-pipes in 24 streets or sections of streets have been completed. The length of pipes laid during the quarter is as follows :

Total, 25,435 linear feet of pipe (4 82-100 miles), with 73 fire hydrants and 60 stop-cocks.

At the beginning of the quarter 6,375 water meters were in use, and 225 new ones have been placed, making 6,600 meters in use on the 30th of September. The number of inspections of houses, to ascertain leaks and waste, for the three months is 4,192, and 2,106 leaks were discovered.

The inspection of house-drains between the hours of midnight and 6 A. M., to detect waste of water, has been continued. In 1,579 inspections made during the quarter, water was found running in 143 drains at the rate of from one-half gallon to 10 gallons per minute, showing that a large number of people are so careless of this precious element that they leave their faucets open at all hours of the night, or their plumbing in defective condition, wasting immense quantities of water. Under the present conditions of the water supply such waste is criminal and a grievous injury to thousands of people in the city who are deprived of the wonted conveniences in the use of water, because the pressure in its delivery is gradually decreasing.

The natural increase in legitimate and necessary consumption, arising from the constant additions to our population, manufactures and commerce, is a sufficient strain upon the capacity of our present water supply, without the various elements of careless and wanton waste. The problem of suppressing this waste to such an extent as to enable the Department to satisfy all actual needs until the time when we can receive an additional supply by a new aqueduct from the superabundance available in the Croton basin will tax all the ingenuity, vigilance and energy which can be applied to the subject. At an early day I shall submit the results of experiments now in progress to ascertain and stop waste in private dwellings.

These experiments already furnish indisputable evidence that such waste prevails to an enormous extent. A very large proportion of the population is apparently indifferent to or ignorant of the perils which a continuance of waste will inevitably bring upon the community. Even at this date the pressure in the mains in some parts of the city is so reduced that the water does not run above the ground floor.

It is evident that at such places a further loss of pressure would result in most serious consequences. Complaints of inadequate pressure are as frequent, however, from the more favored parts of the city. People who have been accustomed to have the water running in closets, basins and baths to the top floor, consider themselves grievously wronged because they must now submit to the use of pumps or other expedients to obtain it above the second floor ; and, from the tenor of many of the complaints received, it is evident that, notwithstanding the information which the Department has endeavored to diffuse for years past through its periodical and special reports, and by means of communications addressed to the people through the daily press, a great deal of ignorance still pre-

vails in regard to the actual condition of the water supply. It seems impossible for some people to rid themselves of the idea that a large rainfall should be followed by an increased delivery of water in the city, whereas in dry as well as in wet weather, throughout the year, we are receiving the full volume of water which the aqueduct is able to bear and convey to the city reservoirs.

The results achieved by the use of water meters, the house inspections and the inspection of house drains at night time, so far as the Department has been enabled to apply these measures, are most satisfactory, and without the stoppage of waste which has been effected by these means, a great part of the city would now be in most deplorable condition regarding the water supply.

Further and more radical measures for the suppression of waste must be adopted, however, in order to maintain a fair distribution and supply of water to the constantly-growing number of consumers during the years which must necessarily intervene before the completion of another aqueduct.

BUREAU OF WATER PURVEYOR.

—making a total of 56,306 square yards of new pavements.

An average force of 466 pavers, rammers, and laborers, and 89 carts was employed during the quarter in repairing pavements throughout the city. About 791 complaints of defects in pavements were received from department inspectors, citizens, the police force, the Health Department, and other sources, and were promptly attended to.

There is no doubt that the attention and energy given to the subject of replacing worn and worth less pavements, and to repairs of pavements during the past five or six years, have produced a very marked improvement in the streets of the city; but in the meantime street traffic has also greatly increased, and pavements which might have been tolerated without serious complaint or inconvenience some years past are now inadequate and unsuitable for the needs of local traffic.

The best paved streets are so overthronged with vehicles that the improvement of other adjacent thoroughfares becomes an absolute necessity. Any abatement in the progress of these useful and beneficial improvements would therefore be most untimely and injudicious.

The operations of the steam companies in laying their pipes in the lower part of the city, continue to engross a great deal of the attention and care of the department, and are the source of many inconveniences to the public, and of numerous complaints.

Strict and constant supervision is exercised to prevent the obstruction of streets to any unnecessary extent, and to see that the street surfaces are restored as expeditiously and substantially as possible. During the quarter, the two steam companies applied for and received permits under the franchises granted them by the Common Council, to lay 34,320 lineal feet of pipes; all of them in the most frequented streets south of Chambers street. That a great deal of annoyance to the public and considerable obstruction to public travel are inseparable from this work, will be readily admitted by any person of ordinary intelligence. The department will not relax its efforts to keep these annoyances and obstructions within the smallest practicable limits, and to hold the companies to the strictest observance of its directions in regard to restoration of pavements and the protection of public and private property on the line of their works.

BUREAU OF SEWERS.

During the quarter work was in progress on forty-eight contracts for the construction of new sewers, and 9,265 lineal feet of sewers, 1,061 lineal feet of culverts, and 44 receiving basins were built, making the present extent of sewerage on Manhattan Island 388 84-100 miles, with 4,661 receiving basins.

The repairs and cleaning of sewers for the quarter, embrace the following principal items of work:

BUREAU OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

During the quarter, work was in progress on 37 contracts for regulating, grading, curbing, guttering and flagging streets; 5 contracts were completed and 7 new contracts were entered into.

The aggregate quantities of work performed under these contracts are:

BUREAU OF STREETS AND ROADS.

In repairing and maintaining the twenty-five miles of macadam roadways and drives in the upper part of the city, 1,991 cubic yards of Telford foundation were placed, and 1,387 cubic yards of gravel, 614 cubic yards of broken stone used for surfacing roadways; 638 cubic yards of dirt were removed, and 4,899 lineal feet of gutters laid. The shade trees along the boulevards and drives were carefully cultivated, and the roadways were sprinkled as frequently as necessary to preserve the surface and prevent annoyance from dust.

Extensive repairs were made on the old country roadways and on over twenty unpaved streets. The drives and roads continue to be kept in excellent condition.

BUREAU OF LAMPS AND GAS.

The United States Illuminating Company has erected the additional 56 electric lamps required to fill its contract for lighting the Battery, City Hall Park, Washington Square, Broadway, between Canal and Fourteenth streets, and Fifth avenue, between Washington Square and Fourteenth street. This company now furnishes 73 electric lights, and the Brush Electric Illuminating Company 55 electric lights. These 128 lights displace 934 gas-lamps.

The number of gas lamps in use in the streets, parks, and places of the city at the close of the quarter was 23,558.

BUREAU OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES.

The principal items of repairs and alterations on public buildings for the quarter, are: Cutting a new doorway through a wall in the basement of the brown-stone building, removing the old furnace, and painting rooms and hallways; repairing heating apparatus in the Hall of Records; putting up iron railings and rearranging partitions at No. 31 Chambers street; fitting up the second floor of the Staats Zeitung building for the Department of Taxes and Assessment; replanking a portion of West Washington Market; repairing the heating apparatus in the Fifth District Court-house and in the Seventh District Court-house; making general alterations in the armory of the Second Battery, National Guard. Ordinary and minor repairs were made on nearly all the forty-six public buildings and parts of buildings under the care of the department.

The contract for rebuilding the South street section of Fulton Market is nearly completed. Considerable progress has been made in the erection of the new building for Jefferson Market, though the work is not as far advanced as the very short time allowed for the completion of the whole contract would require.

BUREAU OF INCUMBRANCES.

This Bureau received during the quarter 954 complaints of obstructions on streets and sidewalks, upon which notices for removal were promptly served. In 298 of these cases the notices were disregarded, and the articles constituting the obstructions were seized and taken to the Corporation Yard. The Bureau also removed 1,632 cart-loads of stone, dirt and other refuse material from various streets, and issued 1,688 permits to place building material on streets, 139 miscellaneous permits, and 82 notices to repair defective sidewalks.

On the First Division the principal work was confined to removing surplus earth covering from embankments and repairing protection walls.

The top arch work was completed.

On the Second Division the arch work is still progressing, but the force has been principally engaged in removing earth covering from the aqueduct and building retaining walls on side-hill embankments to relieve the aqueduct arch of an excessive load of seven to eight feet of covering. The waste spillway for the gatehouse was nearly completed.

On the Third, Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Divisions the arch strengthening work was closed the last of August, and smaller gangs were employed in repairing protection walls, cleaning drains, gutters, etc., repairing waste spillways of gatehouses.

The small gang on the Seventh Division has been repairing walls, fences, hoisting coal, cleaning drains, gutters, etc.

On the Eighth Division there has been the usual routine work of cleaning screws, gate-chambers, repairing and painting fences, etc.

The fine pavement in front of both the gatehouses of the new reservoir has been reset.

Hon. HUBERT O. THOMPSON, Commissioner of Public Works :

SIR—In compliance with your directions, I herein submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the three months ending September 30, 1882.

In Exhibit "A" will be found a statement showing the amounts paid for gas to the various public markets, offices, armories, etc., and for the lighting and maintenance of the public lamps. In Exhibit "B" is a summary of the appropriation for "Lamps and Gas and Electric Lighting," and this shows an expenditure during the quarter of one hundred and thirty-nine thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight dollars and nine cents (\$139,858.09), and for the nine months of three hundred and seventy-four thousand two hundred and sixty-one dollars and ninety-four cents (\$374,261.04), with liabilities amounting to forty-three thousand eight hundred and twenty-one dollars and forty-three cents (\$43,821.43), leaving an available balance of one hundred and sixty-two thousand and twenty-four dollars and fifty-three cents (\$162,024.63). Exhibit "C" is a summary of the appropriation for "Salaries—Lamps and Gas and Electric Lighting," and shows an expenditure during the quarter of one thousand four hundred and ninety-four dollars and forty-eight cents (\$1,494.48), and for the nine months of four thousand three hundred and ninety dollars and forty-four cents (\$4,390.44), leaving an available balance of one thousand five hundred and one dollars and fifty-six cents (\$1,501.56). Exhibit "D" is a summary of the "Lamp Account," and shows a total of two hundred and twenty-six new gas lamps and fifty-six new electric lamps lighted, sixty-three old gas lamps relighted, and three hundred and ninety-seven gas lamps discontinued during the quarter. The total number of gas lamps lighted on September 30 was twenty-three thousand five hundred and fifty-eight, and the total number of electric lamps was one hundred and twenty-eight. The net decrease in the number of gas lamps was one hundred and eight. Three hundred and fifty-seven of the gas lamps discontinued were displaced by the fifty-six new electric lights. Exhibit "E" is a statement showing the lowest, highest and average illuminating power of the gases supplied to the city by the New York, Manhattan, Metropolitan, New York Mutual, Municipal and Harlem Gas-light Companies. Occasional tests have been made of the gas supplied by the Yonkers' Gas-light Company, and the average illuminating power was found to be between twenty-one and twenty-two candles.

The following table will show the average amount of impurities found in the gases of the several companies, as ascertained by the analyses made by Mr. E. G. Love, the official Gas Examiner, in the laboratories of this Department :

SIR—In compliance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this bureau for the three months ending September 30, 1882.

The annexed exhibit shows the condition of the appropriations credited to this bureau, and available balances.

Among the principal items of work were the following:

NEW COURT-HOUSE.

The passenger elevator has been thoroughly overhauled, and guide-posts replaced by new ones; iron sash in offices of Surrogate and Commissioner of Jurors taken out, redoweled, and put back.

BROWN STONE BUILDING.

A doorway cut through wall in basement, and old brick furnace taken down and removed; four rooms painted, calcimined, and the wood-work varnished; the ceilings of hallway, from ground floor to top of building, calcimined, and the walls painted; open space on top of partition of elevator has been enclosed with a wire guard.

HALL OF RECORDS.

Heating apparatus overhauled, new galvanized iron air pipe put in, furnaces repaired, flue cleaned, gutters relined, and roof repaired and painted.

31 CHAMBERS STREET.

Iron railing put up in Bureau of Sewers; an opening for ventilation made in office of Water Purveyor.

General alteration has been made in the position of partitions in office of Chief Engineer in charge of Croton Aqueduct, painting included.

DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

The second floor of the "Staats Zeitung" building has been leased by the city for the use of above Department.

Contract has been made for necessary alterations and the work is progressing satisfactorily.

VESEY STREET PIER.

All defective plank and bearing timbers have been removed and new ones put in their stead; about 200 lineal feet of the pier have been replanked.

TOMPKINS MARKET.

Steps on Sixth street side have been repaired, and the areas on east side of building covered.

ESSEX MARKET.

New sleepers substituted for old ones, and flooring repaired in basement.

COUNTY JAIL.

Locks on cell doors and bars repaired, roof repaired, and ventilating flues on roof made tight.

FIFTH DISTRICT POLICE COURT.

Galvanized iron smoke pipe carried from boiler to roof, and chimney top put on chimney; heating apparatus repaired.

SEVENTH DISTRICT COURT-HOUSE.

Furnace relined with fire-brick, new bars put in furnace, and brick work around boiler repaired.

SECOND BATTERY.

Contract made for general alterations and repairs to this armory. New front put in, and new outside doors and the lighting of armory and entrances renewed.

TWELFTH REGIMENT.

General alterations have been made in this armory, giving enlarged accommodation; and the walls and ceilings, in principal rooms and halls, have been painted; gas-pipes and fixtures thoroughly overhauled and the work done to the satisfaction of the regiment.

For further information with regard to works in charge of this Bureau, I would respectfully refer you to the report of Douglas Smyth, Esq., Architect in charge of the improvements on Fulton and Jefferson Markets.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
 MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
 FRIDAY, December 29, 1882—12 o'clock M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz: :

Wm. R. Grace, the Mayor; Allan Campbell, the Comptroller; Wm. Sauer, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Thos. B. Asten, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments. The minutes of the meeting held December 28, 1882, were read and approved.

On motion, the Board proceeded to the consideration of the Final Estimate for the year 1883.

The Comptroller moved that the following item be inserted in the Final Estimate for 1883, viz: "For Providing for Additional Accommodation for the Insane of the City of New York," including an amount for acquiring the necessary farming lands for such purposes, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—\$25,000.

Which was agreed to by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented the following report:

The Comptroller, to whom were referred the annexed bills of the Automatic Gas-lamp and Lighting Company, amounting to \$3,457.46, add a communication from the N. Y. & N. J. Globe Gas-light Company, protesting against the payment thereof, respectfully

REPORTS:

The Automatic Gas-lamp and Lighting Company applies to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an appropriation to provide for the payment of these bills, to be included in the Final Estimate for 1883.

The bills are charged against the Department of Public Parks, under date of September 1, 1882.

Following are the items of the first bill:

The second bill is for 63 gas-lamps, at \$15 each, \$945; and 57 painted wooden posts, at \$1.50 each, \$85.50, in all \$1,030.50.

The facts relating to this alleged claim against the city, as they appear from an examination of the papers and documents received from the Department of Public Parks, and of the proceedings of the Gas Commission, may be summarized as follows:

On February 1, 1881, this company sent a written communication to the Park Commissioners, signed by Geo. C. Robinson, President, and A. D. Wheelock, Secretary, submitting the following proposition:

"We will, without expense to your Board, put up on the line of any main road in the Central Park, to be designated by you, fifty automatic gas-lamps, such as are manufactured by this company, and we will light and care for the same for a period of four weeks without any expense, except the actual cost of the illuminating material consumed and the wages of one man to light and attend to the lamps.

At the expiration of the time named, if the light shall have been found perfectly satisfactory by you, we will sell the lamps to your Department for the sum of fifteen dollars each.

In case, however, your Board shall not have been satisfied therewith, we will remove them at once, without expense to you or injury to the park."

On February 10, 1881, the Company, by Charles C. Yeaton, Manager, amended the main paragraph of their offer so as to read as follows:

"And we will light and care for the same (25 to 50 lamps) for a period of four weeks, without any expense to your Board."

At a meeting of the Board governing the Department of Public Parks, held April 20, 1881, permission was granted to the company "to place 50 of their lamps in the Central Park, at points to be designated by the Board; said lamps to be supplied, lighted and maintained free of expense to the Department, and to remain in Central Park only during the pleasure of this Board."

The locating of the lamps was referred to Park Commissioner Wales with power, and the permission was signed by him, and was in conformity with the conditions above quoted.

A written protest against granting this permission, dated May 11, 1881, signed by the President and Secretary of the New York and New Jersey Globe Gas-light Company was presented to the Park Commissioners, in which it was claimed that the action of the Board was in violation of law, and unfair to rival companies. A privilege similar to that accorded to the Automatic Gas-light Company was also asked for, and notice that a suit for infringement of patent rights was sent subsequently to the Park Board.

In December, 1881, bills of the Automatic Gas-light Company, and of its Manager, for lighting Central Park, amounting to \$2,336.25, which had been sent to the Mayor, and by him transmitted to the Gas Commission, were reported upon adversely by the Superintendent of Lamps and Gas, and the Commission adopted the following:

Resolved, That the bills of the Automatic Gas-lamp and Lighting Company, and Charles C. Yeaton, be returned to said parties, with the information that as the necessity for the work has not been certified to by the Commissioner of Public Works, as required by the Charter, such bills cannot legally be paid, and also that the resolution of the Department of Public Parks, permitting the erection of the lamps, provides that "said lamps be supplied, lighted, and maintained free of expense to the Department."

A copy of this resolution, duly certified, was sent to the company by the Secretary of the Gas Commission, December 9, 1881.

On March 25, 1882, the company addressed a communication to the Department of Public Parks, to the effect that they had placed 63 lamps in the Central Park, which they had cared for and lighted from May 14, 1881, and asked the Board "to take some action as will aid this company in having an adjustment with the Gas Commission."

In the Park Board, at its meeting, April 5, 1882, a resolution to direct the removal of the lamps in question, and a substitute to authorize the Auditing Committee to report "what obligation, if any, had been incurred by this Department to the Automatic Gas-lamp and Lighting Company," were considered, but were not agreed to.

On May 3, 1882, the Park Board directed that the letters and propositions of the company be certified and transmitted to the Gas Commission "for such favorable action as they may be advised to take in settlement of the claims of said Automatic Gas-light Company."

These documents were received by the Gas Commission, and ordered on file.

The laws regulating the lighting of the public lamps of this city, provide for a Board or Gas Commission by which contracts shall be made therefor.

The Commission was organized under sections 73, 91, and 92 of the Charter of 1873.

A special act was passed in 1878 (chapter 125, Laws of 1878), enlarging the powers of the Board, and section 1 of said act was amended by chapter 478 of the Laws of 1879, so as to read as follows:

"SECTION 1. The Board authorized to make and enter into contracts for lighting the streets, avenues, and places of the City of New York with gas, consisting of the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works, is hereby authorized and empowered to contract for such lighting the public lamps on the streets, avenues, piers, parks, and places, with gas or other illuminating material in said city, by one or more contracts to be let at public lettings, as provided by law, for a period of one year, or any part of a year, and commencing and terminating at any dates the said Board may determine; and the care and maintenance of such lamps shall be under the supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works. Provided, always, that the Department of Public Parks shall have exclusive authority to decide when and where any new lamps shall be put and lighted in any of said parks or places under its control."

Upon these facts, and governed by the laws passed by the Legislature of this State for lighting the city, it would seem difficult to find any authority which would enable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to set apart any of the public moneys to be used for the payment of this alleged claim.

The permission of the Park Board for the experimental lighting of certain roads or drives in the Central Park, by this company, was carefully guarded against the incurring of any obligation on the part of the city for the expenditure involved in supplying, lighting and maintaining the lamps. The company agreed to light and care for them without any expense to the Board.

But there is another and a fatal objection to the payment of these bills. The Park Board has no power under the law to light the public lamps in the parks. It has exclusive authority to decide when and where any new lamps shall be lighted in any of the parks or places under its control, but the care and maintenance of the public lamps are under the supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works, and the Board known as the Gas Commission are empowered to make contracts for the lighting of the city. It follows, therefore, that the so-called permission of the Park Department, under and by means of which this alleged claim against the Corporation is presented, was void and of no effect from the beginning.

The rejection of the bills of this company by the Gas Commission in December, 1881, with the statement of the reasons for its action, and reference to the laws, published in the CITY RECORD, should have been a sufficient warning to the officers of the company that, except for the advertisement of their lamps and any profit resulting therefrom, they would receive no compensation for their experiment.

The provisions of the charter of 1873, also, are plain and explicit, that,

1. Whenever any work is necessary to be done, or any supply is needful for any particular purpose, for the Corporation, which shall involve the expenditure of more than \$1,000, the same shall be done by contract by public letting, unless otherwise ordered by the Common Council; and

2. "No expenditure for work or supplies involving an amount for which no contract is required shall be made, except the necessity therefor be certified to by the head of the appropriate department, and the expenditure has been duly authorized and appropriated."

These requirements of the Charter have not been complied with in this case. The facts and the law are against the validity of this claim. The bills are not certified by the Commissioner of Public Works, in whose department the care and maintenance of lighting the public lamps is placed by law, and cannot be so approved, because no obligation was incurred by him nor by any other officer of the City Government, in pursuance of law or otherwise, to pay for the work and supplies for which these bills are rendered. On the contrary, the offer of the Company, and the permission of the Park Commissioners were in plain words easy to be understood. "Said lamps to be supplied, lighted, and maintained free of expense to the department."

I am, therefore, of opinion that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment have no authority under the law to make provision in the Final Estimate for 1883, for the payment of this claim.

That they have examined the said premises, and that the building the Undercliff Hotel, is sufficient in extent, with a moderate cost of alterations, to make a suitable station-house and prison, for the accommodation of a proper force for such precinct for the term of five years from May 1, next.

They are of opinion that it will require an expenditure of not exceeding \$2,500 to alter and fit it up and furnish the premises as a station-house and prison etc., for said precinct.

The letter of Andrew H. Green, executor of the estate of William B. The objections to and rectifications of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1883, made by the Board of Aldermen on November 24, 1882, were then considered and acted upon, as follows:

Resolved, That the action taken by the Board of Aldermen upon the following items of appropriations, made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the Provisional Estimate for the year 1883, be approved and adopted, to wit:

Department of Public Parks—Maintenance, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—Maintenance and Government of Public Places, roads, etc.; increased from \$60,000 to \$80,000. Add for rebuilding Mount St. Vincent, \$25,000.

Asylums, Reformatories, and Charitable Institutions—Strike out Shepherds' Fold (chapter 269, Laws of 1871), \$5,000.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby overrules the action of the Board of Aldermen upon the following items of appropriation, made in the Provisional Estimate for the year 1883, to wit:

Department of Public Parks—Park Police—Salaries of Captains, Sergeants, etc., increased from \$94,000 to \$98,303.

Police Department—Police Fund—For salaries of Patrolmen of all grades, and of Detective Sergeants, increased from \$2,746,000 to \$2,793,795.67. Add 50 additional Patrolman, at \$800 each per annum, \$40,000.

Board of Education—For purchasing and procuring sites for and erecting new buildings, etc.; increased from \$400,000 to \$550,000.

Judiciary—Surrogate's Office—Add for Contingent expenses, \$1,000. This item is overruled and the sum of \$500 is appropriated for the purpose.

Miscellaneous Purposes—Add for expenses of Centennial Celebration of the Evacuation of the City of New York by the British army on the 25th day of November, 1783, \$100,000.

Add to "Support of Prisoners in County Jail" (including medicines), \$300; increasing item from \$12,500 to \$12,800.

Asylums, Reformatories, and Charitable Institutions—Add for the Eye, Ear, and Throat Infirmary at Harlem, \$500.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessment—4.

The Comptroller moved to deduct the sum of \$2,000,000 from the Final Estimate, being amount of Estimated Revenues of the General Fund, not otherwise specifically appropriated by law.

Which was agreed to by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered the following preamble, resolution, and Final Estimate for the support of the City Government for the year 1883:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 31st day of October, 1881, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-three (1883), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Aldermen, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 25, 1882, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 5, 1882; therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, the year eighteen hundred and eighty-three (1883), in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, as follows:

The Comptroller presented the following:

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen at a meeting held on November 24, 1882, made certain objections to and rectifications of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1883, which were presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 5, 1882; and
Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have duly considered such objections and rectifications as provided by section 112, chapter 335, of the Laws of 1873; and
Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment in making the Final Estimate for the year 1883, at a meeting held December 29, 1882, have approved and adopted several items of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1883, as rectified by the Board of Aldermen, and overruled others; therefore

Resolved, that the reasons for overruling the action of the Board of Aldermen, in respect to certain items, are as follows:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Park Police.—Salaries of Captain, Surgeon, Sergeants, etc., increased from \$94,000 to \$98,303. This item is overruled for the reason that the amount appropriated in the Provisional Estimate is considered sufficient for this purpose.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Police Fund.—For salaries of Patrolmen of all grades, and of Detective Sergeants, increased from \$2,746,000 to \$2,793,795.67.

This item is overruled for the reason that the amount appropriated for this purpose in the Provisional Estimate is sufficient to provide for the increase of pay of forty Detective Sergeants, increased as provided by act of the Legislature (chapter 179, Laws of 1882), from \$1,200 to \$1,600 per annum, and for increased salaries of Patrolmen appointed in 1881, authorized by the said act.

Add for fifty additional Patrolmen at \$800 each per annum, \$40,000.

This item is overruled for the reason that the proposed increase of the police force is not considered necessary at this time.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

For purchasing and procuring sites for and erecting new school buildings, etc., increased from \$400,000 to \$550,000.

This item of rectification is overruled for the reason that it is considered to be more than is required for the purpose in the year 1883, in view of the fact that the sum of \$61,800 has been received from the sale of lands belonging to the city, and specially appropriated by an act of the Legislature for the purchase of sites and the erection of new school buildings, and also that certain lands on the corner of Lexington avenue and Sixty-eighth street, belonging to the city, have been heretofore designated and appropriated to the Board of Education as a site for school buildings, which are to be erected thereon, thus obviating to that extent the necessity for purchasing sites for school buildings in the coming year.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has, however, increased the appropriation for this purpose from \$400,000, as made in the Provisional Estimate, to the sum of \$450,000, in the Final Estimate, and reduced the general appropriation for all other purposes from \$3,350,000 to \$3,300,000.

The total appropriation of \$3,750,000, which was made in the Provisional Estimate, therefore, remains the same in the Final Estimate, the amount being deemed adequate for all necessary expenditures in the year 1883.

JUDICIARY.

Surrogate's Office.—Add for Contingent Expenses, \$1,000.

This item is overruled, and the sum of \$500 appropriated, the latter amount being deemed sufficient for the purpose.

MISCELLANEOUS PURPOSES.

Add for expenses of Centennial Celebration of the evacuation of the City of New York by the British army on the 25 day of November, 1783, \$100,000.

This item is overruled, for the reason that it is considered an extravagant and entirely unnecessary expenditure, which is not properly a charge upon the City Treasury to be paid from taxation.

Add for "Support of Prisoners in the County Jail" (including medicines), \$300; increasing item from \$12,500 to \$12,800.

This item is overruled, for the reason that the amount appropriated in the Provisional Estimate is deemed sufficient for the purpose.

ASYLUMS, REFORMATORIES AND CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Add for the Eye, Ear, and Throat Infirmary at Harlem, \$500.

This item is overruled, for the reason that the appropriation cannot be lawfully made, to be raised by taxation. Appropriations to institutions of this kind may be made from the Excise Fund.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to inform you that the following work has been done during the last week upon the Bridge, viz.:

359 main truss pins erected; 23 over floor stay bars erected; 46 main truss diagonals erected; 111 sections of top chords erected; 3 supporting channels erected; 10 knee braces erected; 9 promenade floor beams erected; 2 bent suspender rods erected; 14 over floor stays put up on the tower.

All of the main truss diagonals, and all of the bottom pins are in place on the main span and all of the top chords are in place.

All of the diagonals are in, and all but 53 bottom pins are in on the land spans.

All of the railing on the New York approach has been put in place by the contractors, except that in and around the station building, and the promenade is completed to the same point.

In Brooklyn good progress has been made on the engine foundation and on the boiler house.
