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EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

MAYOR'S OFFICE.

A meeting of the Commission appointed by chapter 84 of the Laws of 1887, was held in the Mayor's Office at one P. M., on Tuesday, November 29, 1887.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Health, Mr. D'Oench, as the delegate from the Bureau of Inspection of Buildings, who presented his designation by the President of the Board of Fire Commissioners, and the Commissioner of Street Cleaning.

Absent—The Commissioner of Public Works.

Upon motion of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, the Mayor was unanimously elected Chairman.

Upon motion, Arthur Berry was elected Secretary pro tem.

The President of the Board of Health stated that he had in preparation a report upon the subject of Tenement-houses which he hoped to have ready within two weeks, and that it would be an elaborate one and fully cover the ground.

Mr. D'Oench informed the Board that he had no suggestions to make as to the modes of construction of buildings, but believed, from his examination of the tenement-house law, that many of its provisions were in conflict with the building law as it now stands, and that he would prepare such amendments as he thought necessary and submit them to the Commission.

It was agreed by the Commission that the President of the Board of Health and Mr. D'Oench should consult upon the recommendations to be made to the Legislature by the Commission, and submit the result of their deliberations at the next meeting.

Colonel Balch then addressed the Commission, by invitation. At the close of his argument, he stated that he would submit his views in writing to the Commission.

The President of the Board of Health moved that the thanks of the Commission be extended to Colonel Balch for the valuable information furnished by him. Carried.

Upon motion, the Commission adjourned until December 14, at 3 P. M.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, November 28, 1887.

Whereas, It is provided in and by section twelve of chapter seven hundred and eighteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, entitled "An Act to provide for the recording and indexing of conveyances and instruments relating to land in the City of New York, according to limited areas," that if it shall be determined by the Mayor of said city and the Register of the City and County of New York that said act cannot go into operation at the time therein designated therefor, by reason of the non-completion of the map or indices referred to in said act, or for any other reason, thereupon said Mayor, by notice published in the City Record, in the City of New York, for thirty days prior to the expiration of said time, may extend the time for said act to go into operation, and for the books, maps and indices in said act referred to to be completed, not exceeding six months from the time in said act designated therefor, and that said act, upon such publication, shall thereupon go into operation in said Register's office at the time so to be designated by said Mayor; and

Whereas, The said Mayor and Register have determined that said act cannot go into operation at the time therein designated therefor, by reason of the non-completion of said map and indices, and for other reasons;

Now, therefore, I, Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby give notice that I have extended and do hereby extend the time for said act to go into operation, and for said books, maps and indices to be completed, to the thirtieth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, which is hereby designated by me as the date upon which said act shall go into operation in said Register's office.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Cora and Myra Moffat, owners of property Nos. 335 and 336 Broadway, to connect the said premises, by an iron pipe, not to exceed four inches in diameter, to act as a casing for two small iron pipes, to be laid across Broadway, beneath the surface of the street, for conducting water and steam, provided the said Cora and Myra Moffat shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage to person or property that may occur by the exercise of the privilege hereby given, during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of laying said pipe, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Approved by the Mayor, November 29, 1887.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Ridley & Sons to connect premises Nos. 171 and 182 Suffolk street by a steam-pipe, not to exceed three-quarters ($\frac{3}{4}$) of an inch in diameter, laid beneath the surface of the street, provided the said Ridley & Sons shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage to persons or property that may be occasioned by the exercise of the permission hereby granted, during the progress of the work or subsequently, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, November 22, 1887.

Approved by the Mayor, November 29, 1887.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Children's Aid Society to construct a vault under the sidewalk in front of their premises on the northwest corner of Second avenue and Forty-fourth street, commencing about twenty-eight feet six inches from the corner of Second avenue, and extending twenty-five feet west, as shown on the annexed diagram, without the

payment of any fee, the work to be done at the expense of the Society under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, November 22, 1887.

Approved by the Mayor, November 29, 1887.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the "Excelsior Steam Power Company" to extend vault in front of their premises, Nos. 33 to 43 Gold street, two feet beyond the curb-line, as shown in the accompanying diagram, provided that the said "Excelsior Steam Power Company" pay the usual fee; that the work be done in a durable and substantial manner, and that a stipulation be entered into between the said "Excelsior Steam Power Company" and the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may occur, caused by the construction of said vault, during said construction or subsequent to the completion of said vault, the work to be done at the expense of said "Excelsior Steam Power Company," under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, November 22, 1887.

Approved by the Mayor, November 29, 1887.

Resolved, That, as provided in section 254 of chapter 410 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, this Common Council hereby approves and authorizes the location of a station-house, lodging-house and prison for the Twenty-fifth Precinct Police in the ground and premises belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York, on the north side of East Sixty-seventh street, commencing one hundred and fifteen feet east of Lexington avenue, being seventy feet in width in front and rear, and one hundred feet and five inches in depth on each side.

Approved by the Mayor, November 29, 1887.

Resolved, That Cosmopolitan Park, located on One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and Tenth avenue, near High Bridge, be and is hereby excepted from the prohibition contained in section 183 of article XIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, relating to the firing of firearms.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, November 22, 1887.

Approved by the Mayor, November 30, 1887.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to take whatever measures he may find to be necessary to compel the Eighth Avenue Railroad Company to restore the surface of the carriageway of Hudson street, from Fourteenth street to Canal street, to the grade established by law.
