## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's office, at 1 o'clock P. M., on Friday, January 10, 1890.

Present—Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; Richard Croker, Chamberlain, and Walton Storm, Chairman Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The Comptroller presented a certificate of the appointment of Alderman Walton Storm, Chairman of the Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen, as follows:

This is to certify that at a meeting of the Board of Aldermen, held January 6, 1890, that the President of the Board named the Committee on Finance and designated Alderman Walton Storm as Chairman.

Which was ordered to be placed on file.

The reading of the minutes of the meetings held December 28 and 29, 1889, was dispensed with.

The Comptroller submitted the revised specifications and form of contract or contracts for the work of erecting and completing the Criminal Courts' building, whereupon the Recorder moved that the resolution adopted on December 28, 1889, approving thereof, as then presented, be rescinded, which motion was unanimously carried.

The Mayor then offered a resolution to change the amount of the percentage to be paid to contractors on account of materials furnished and work done in erecting and completing the Criminal Courts' building, as follows:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby fix the amount of the percentage to be inserted in the contract or contracts for the work of erecting and completing for occupancy the Criminal Courts' building, at seventy-five (75) per centum of the amount stated in each estimate or certificate of the Architects to be the value of the material furnished and work done.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Recorder, the Chamberlain and the Chairman of the Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen.

Negative—The Comptroller.

The Recorder offered a resolution to approve of the revised specifications and contract or contracts for the work of erecting and completing the Criminal Courts' building, as follows:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby approve of the revised specifications and form of contract or contracts for the work of erecting and completing for occupancy the Criminal Courts' building, prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation and the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller offered a resolution to change the dates for advertising and opening the estimates or proposals for the work of erecting and completing the Criminal Courts' building, as fixed on December 28, 1889, as follows:

Resolved, That the advertisement for proposals for the work of erecting and completing for occupancy the Criminal Courts' building, pursuant to the approved plans and specifications, be inserted in the CITY RECORD from Saturday, January 11, 1890, to Wednesday, February 12, 1890, inclusive, and in the public newspapers designated to publish said advertisement, from January 20, 1890, to February 12, 1890, inclusive; and that the time for opening said proposals at the Comptroller's office be and is hereby fixed at 12 o'clock M., Wednesday, February 12, 1890.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Mayor offered the following resolution to authorize the printing of the specifications and the form of contract or contracts, and the estimates or proposals for erecting the Criminal Courts' building:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to have printed five hundred (500) copies of the specifications and contract or contracts for the work of erecting and completing for occupancy the Criminal Courts' building, as approved by this Board, including the estimates or proposals, the expense of such printing to be paid by the Comptroller out of the proceeds of Criminal Court-house Bonds, issued pursuant to chapter 371 of the Laws of 1887.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution to pay and stop the interest on \$321,400 Croton Water Stock, payable on and after February 1, 1890:

Whereas, Certain Croton Water Stocks of the City of New York, amounting to \$321,400, and bearing interest at five and six per cent. per annum, become due and payable on or after February 1, 1890, as follows:

The Comptroller presented the following resolution from the Armory Board with a resolution to concur therein:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Armory Board, held at the office of his Honor the Mayor, in the City Hall, at 10.50 A. M., December 20, the following business was enacted:

Whereas, This Board at its meeting October 24, passed the following resolution:

Resolved, That, for the purpose of testing the heating apparatus in the Eighth Regiment Armory Building, the Secretary is hereby directed to purchase ten tons of coal and one load of wood of William D. Bruns, Jr., foot of East Twenty-fourth street, to be delivered at the armory building, Fourth avenue, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, at the same prices at which he now furnishes the City, under contract, the coal and wood for the public buildings.

And Whereas, This Board is advised by the Commissioner of Public Works that, in accordance with the prices at which their supplies of fuel are furnished to his Department under contracts made at public letting, the amount required will be seventy-two dollars; it is therefore

Resolved, That the sum of seventy-two dollars (\$72) be appropriated from the General Armory Fund to the Fund for the Eighth Regiment Armory Building, and that the Comptroller be directed to pay to William D. Bruns, Jr., the sum of seventy-two dollars for coal and wood furnished to the Eighth Regiment Armory, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are requested to concur in the same.

This resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report on the houses and lots belonging to the City, situated on the line of the New Croton Aqueduct, between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Fifty-second streets, leases for which will expire on May 1, 1890; and also on school sites leased temporarily, until the premises are required by the Board of Education for the erection of school buildings thereon:

GENTLEMEN—In 1887 the Aqueduct Commission turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a number of houses and vacant lots on the line of the New Croton Aqueduct between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Fifty-second streets, acquired by said Commission for aqueduct purposes. Leases of several houses and lots were sold at public auction, which expire on May 1, 1890, and I submit a resolution to authorize the Comptroller to lease for another term, at public auction, any and all such property as may be deemed advisable.

There are a number of pieces of property in different parts of the city acquired for school sites which are not required immediately for the erection of school buildings. They are in the custody of the Comptroller until needed for that purpose by the Board of Education. The houses on these school sites have been let temporarily to the old occupants or other tenants at the highest rents that could be obtained, and they produce a revenue to the City at the present time of \$1,046.49 per month.

On motion of the Mayor, that portion of the Comptroller's report relating to the leasing houses and vacant lots on the line of the aqueduct, was referred to the Board of Aqueduct Commissioners, with the request that they report to this Board upon the expediency of leasing such houses and lots and make such recommendations as they may deem advisable.

The Comptroller presented the following report on Public Markets, and on real estate belonging to the City, with a resolution to authorize the sale of certain vacant lots in the Twelfth and Twenty-fourth Wards:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting held on December 30, 1889, I presented a report calling attention to property used for market purposes by the public, and suggested that it might be advisable to obtain legislative authority to sell such property at public auction. The markets specially referred to are as follows:

1. Essex Market occupies a plot of ground bounded by Grand, Ludlow and Essex streets, and Essex Market place, having an area equivalent to  $6\frac{1}{2}$  city lots; the building itself is in very poor condition, one of the main walls being much out of plumb; extensive repairs were made by the City a few years ago, yet a large amount of money would be required to put the building in proper condition to attract trade and return a profitable income.

The entire plot was originally purchased for \$69,800, which included, besides the market, the ground occupied by the County Jail, the Third District Police Court, the Third District Prison, and a "street" or "place" thirty feet wide, set apart as such by the deed to the City. The first floor of the building is rented by the Chicago Beef Company and market stands, bringing in nearly \$6,000 per annum; a portion of the second floor was temporarily rented until recently, when the premises were taken from the tenant on account of sub-letting a part without authority; the remainder is occupied by the Eastern Dispensary, rent free; and the third floor is occupied by the Volunteer Firemen's Association without charge, by permission of the City. The cellars return an annual income of nearly \$2,000; so that the entire property yields a net amount of about \$8,000 yearly, on an assessed valuation of \$200,000.

The income on actual value is a little over two per cent., and even if fully rented on the basis of the present rate of return, would not be a very remunerative investment for the City.

2. Centre Market is a trapezoid bounded by Broome, Grand and Centre streets, and Centre Market place, having an area equal to 9.5-10 city lots. The market and stands bring in a rental of about \$7,000 per annum; the cellars about \$2,500; the second floor occupied by the Second Judicial District Civil Court, rent free; a large room, not now used, and the remainder to B. G. Hughes, a box-maker, at \$1,425 per year. The return of the market on the actual value would be about four per cent. The building is in very good order, the court-room having been set apart and fitted up within two years at considerable expense; the business of the market is flourishing and active, but the newer and larger and more commodious market buildings slowly are drawing the trade to the more direct lines of travel.

3. Union Market. An irregular plot bounded by Second, Houston, Columbia and Sheriff streets, containing an area of 2.72-100 city lots. The larger portion is occupied as a Police Station for the Eleventh Precinct, and a small space for stands bringing in a yearly income of \$546. As a market the building has long outlived its usefulness; the business is transacted from stores in the neighborhood; and there would seem to be no reason whatever for maintaining even the small space now devoted to market purposes.

4. Clinton Market. This occupies a trapezoid bounded by Spring, West, Canal and Washington streets, with an area equal to 9.49-100 city lots, the entire building being used as a market, and bringing in an annual income of nearly \$9,000, on an assessed valuation of \$85,000, which is about six per cent. on actual value, the best paying of the four markets named. The building is a one-story shed, old and very dilapidated, built in sections of wood excepting one small central building of brick; extensive repairs being constantly necessary to keep it in order for the business transacted. The proximity of the New West Washington Market seriously interferes with Clinton Market, and will eventually lead to its being absorbed in its larger and newer rival. The existence of another market a mile to the south would seem an additional reason for its removal.

These properties can only be sold or leased, subject to use as public markets, for ten years from and after such sale or lease (chapter 410, section 170, Laws of 1882); their legitimate business, as markets, is fast passing away, rendering it unnecessary to continue to maintain them as public markets.

It would, therefore, seem that it might be advisable to dispose of the foregoing market property, and I recommend that the matter be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation, requesting him to prepare a bill to be presented to the Legislature to authorize the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to sell at public auction such property when deemed advantageous for the public interests.

Besides the above-mentioned market property, there are several lots and plots of vacant land belonging to the City, which are not required for public purposes, that it would be advisable to sell at the present time, and I submit a resolution to authorize the Comptroller to take measures to sell the same at public auction to the highest bidders, as provided by law.

Six vacant lots are on the line of the old Croton Aqueduct on One Hundred and First and One Hundred and Second streets, one hundred feet west of Ninth avenue, and one vacant lot on west side of Third avenue, between One Hundred and Seventy-fifth and One Hundred and Seventy-sixth streets, which was acquired by the City by annexation of the town of West Farms, now in the Twenty-fourth Ward.

#### Twenty-fourth Ward.

One vacant lot on the west side of Third avenue (formerly Fordham avenue), 189.96 feet south of One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, 27 x 103.5 feet, Ward No. 45 on Block 1150.

#### TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SALE.

The highest bidders will be required to pay ten (10) per cent. of the purchase money and the auctioneer's fee on each lot immediately after the sale; thirty (30) per cent. upon the delivery of the deeds, within thirty days from the date of sale; and the balance, sixty (60) per cent. of the purchase money, or any portion thereof, may remain at the option of the purchaser, on bond and mortgage, for five years, with interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, the mortgages to contain the customary thirty days' interest and ninety days' tax clauses.

The bond and mortgage may be paid off at any time within the term thereof on giving thirty days' notice to the Comptroller, or it may be paid by installments of not less than five hundred dollars, on any day when the interest is due, or on thirty days' notice. The bonds and mortgages will be prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, and the sum of twelve dollars and fifty cents will be charged for drawing, acknowledging and recording each separate mortgage. If more than one lot of land is included in any mortgage, the whole mortgage must be paid off before any release can be given by the Corporation, as a release of any part of the premises included in a mortgage to the Corporation is forbidden by law.

The Comptroller may, at his option, resell any lot which may be struck off to the highest bidder who may fail to comply with the terms of sale, and the party who may fail to comply therewith will be held liable for any deficiency that may result from any such resale.

The right to reject any bid is reserved.

The Recorder moved that that portion of the Comptroller's report relating to the public markets be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation, with the request that he will prepare a bill to authorize the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to discontinue the markets therein referred to, and sell or otherwise dispose of the property as they may deem most advantageous for the interests of the City, said bill to be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval before presentation to the Legislature; and that the resolution to authorize the sale of vacant lots belonging to the City at public auction be laid over, which motions were carried.

The Comptroller presented the following report and resolution on the appropriation of certain rooms in Essex Market for the use of Grand Army and Naval Posts, which had applied therefor:

GENTLEMEN—Several applications of Grand Army and Naval Posts in this city for rooms in the upper parts of the Essex and Centre Market buildings, have been presented to this Board and referred to the Comptroller. A part of the second story of the Essex Market building is now vacant, and rooms in that building may be appropriated to the several Grand Army and Naval Posts which have applied for rooms, and if considered advisable they may be appropriated for their accommodation, which I understand will be accepted by the Posts.

The second story of the Essex Market building was divided by partitions for the use of the companies of the Eleventh Regiment, which formerly occupied the premises; and the rooms are numbered. I submit a resolution to set apart and appropriate a room, rent free, for each of the Posts, designated by a number, as shown on a diagram, the occupation of the premises to continue subject to the pleasure of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That rooms in the second story of the Essex Market Building, now vacant, be set apart and appropriated, as per diagram of the premises, for the use and accommodation of certain Grand Army and Naval Posts, at a nominal rent of one dollar per annum, payable monthly, if demanded, as follows:

1. The room No. 5, for the Veteran Association of the Seventy-third Regiment, N. Y. Volunteers, known as Second Regiment Fire Zouaves.
2. The room No. 12, for the Naval Post No. 516, G. A. R.
3. The room No. 4, for the Peter Cooper Post No. 582, G. A. R.
4. The room No. 14, for the Adam Goss Post No. G. A. R.

The time of occupation of said rooms to be subject to the pleasure of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. No alterations to be made of the premises without the written consent of the Comptroller, and all fixtures and repairs to be made at the expense of the several Posts.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following resolutions of the Board of Docks requesting the consent and approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of a change in dimensions of the new pier at the foot of West Thirty-third street, North river, known as Pier, new 63:

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board governing this Department, held this date, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

"Whereas, The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and this Board, as representatives of the City, have agreed to enter into an agreement for the sale and purchase of wharf property, beginning at a point on the northerly line of West Thirty-third (33d) street, and thence northerly about one hundred and one feet, for the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and

"Whereas, It is desirable that the new bulkhead wall to be immediately built upon this property, if obtained for the City, may be utilized for the best interests of the City; be it

"Resolved, That this Board deems it advisable to change the dimensions of the new pier at the foot of West Thirty-third (33d) street, North river, known as Pier, new Sixty-three (63), North river, from the dimensions thereof as laid down on the plans determined by the Board, April 13, 1871, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, April 27, 1871, to include an additional area adjacent to the northerly side of the pier and to the established bulkhead-line; the amended dimensions of the pier to be as follows:

"Beginning at a point in the established bulkhead-line, which said point is also in the southerly side line of the pier as formerly determined; thence running westerly along the southerly side line of the pier as formerly determined a distance of 500 feet; thence running northerly along the westerly end line of the pier as formerly determined a distance of 60 feet; thence running easterly along the northerly side line of the pier as formerly determined a distance of 335 feet; thence running northerly parallel to the established bulkhead-line a distance of 60 feet; thence running easterly parallel to the northerly side line of the pier as formerly determined a distance of 165 feet to a point in the established bulkhead-line; thence running southerly along the established bulkhead-line a distance of 120 feet to the point and place of beginning.

"All as shown on a map or plan submitted in duplicate by the Engineer-in-Chief and hereby approved by the Board.

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they hereby are requested to consent to and approve the change in dimensions of the new pier at the foot of West Thirty-third (33d) street, North river, known as Pier, new Sixty-three (63)."

The Comptroller presented the following resolution of the Board of Aldermen establishing a ferry between a point at or near the foot of West Thirteenth street, North river, and Jersey City, etc.:

(In Common Council.)

Whereas, The public interests will be promoted by the establishment of a ferry between a point at or near the foot of West Thirteenth street, North river, and Jersey City, having a connection also with the City of Brooklyn, whereby the transportation of market supplies to West Washington Market will be greatly facilitated;

Resolved, That a ferry be and is hereby established to run between a point south of and at or near the foot of West Thirteenth street, North river, and Jersey City, in the State of New Jersey, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are hereby authorized and empowered to sell at public auction to the highest bidder the franchise or right to run and operate such ferry upon such terms and conditions and such regulations as are required by law and the ordinances of the Common Council, and as may be prescribed by said Commissioners for promoting the public interests.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 24, 1889, a majority of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

The 1,202 deaths represent a death-rate of 39.31 against 24.85 for the previous week, and 26.34 for the corresponding week of 1888-9.

The increase of 440 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 66 deaths from phthisis, 14 from heart diseases, 49 from bronchitis, 159 from pneumonia and 39 from diseases of the kidney. There was an increase of 8 deaths from scarlet fever and 6 from whooping-cough; with these exceptions the zymotic diseases showed little change.

This sudden and marked increase in the number of deaths is apparently due to an epidemic influence, for it is not confined to any one portion of the city, and is chiefly due to acute inflammations of the respiratory organs and those other organs which are most apt to be unfavorably affected in such cases, viz.: the heart and kidneys. Although the mortality from pneumonia has been pretty well distributed, the increase has been most marked in the westerly wards lying north of Fourteenth street.

The increase of deaths is to a great extent among persons over 25 years of age, there having been, out of the total increase of 440, 353 over that age and only 87 under, although more than half the population is under 25 years of age.

Those entitled to exemption are: Clergymen, lawyers, physicians, surgeons, surgeon-dentists, professors or teachers in a college, academy or public school, licensed pharmacists or pharmacists, actually engaged in their respective professions and not following any other calling; multiarmen, policemen, and firemen; election officers, jury non-residents, and city employees, and United States employees; officers of vessels making regular trips; licensed pilots, actually following that calling; superintendents, conductors and engineers of a railroad company other than a street railroad company; telegraph operators actually doing duty as such; Grand, Sheriff's, and Civil Court jurors; stationary engineers; and persons physically incapable of performing jury duty by reason of severe sickness, deafness, or other physical disorder.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered in person, if possible, and at this office only, under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, if unpaid, will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

#### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thereupon be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

#### PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 250 and 251 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of the Board of Aldermen.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

#### REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows: "The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. \* \* \* \* \*

The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents."

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKING.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATERS and ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

#### METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." \* \* \*

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

#### NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
