

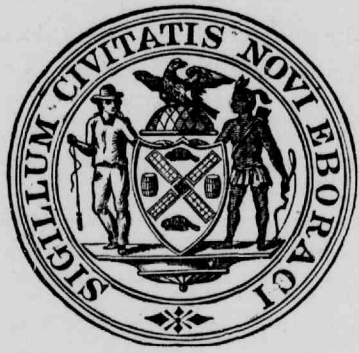

Whereas, Subdivision 4 of section 3 of chapter 386, Laws of 1851, imposes the duty upon the Board of Education of this city to "continue to furnish through the Free Academy (now College of the City of New York) the benefit of education, gratuitously, to persons who have been pupils in the common schools of the said city and county, for a period of time to be regulated by the Board of Education, not less than one year," thus excluding all children who may not have attended the common schools for the period named, a like or more stringent rule is made applicable to admissions to the Normal College; and,

Whereas, The exclusion of children, graduates of the several parish and other private schools in this city, from the Normal College and College of the City of New York, is so unjust to a large and influential class of citizens, that action should be taken to prevent a longer continuance of this unjust discrimination. The full force of the wrong thus done the parents of such children will be best understood when it is known that, as tax-payers, they pay their full proportion of the expenses of our entire system of common school education, including the expenses of both colleges, and their proportion of the money extorted from this city annually for educational purposes in other portions of this State, without the slightest benefit or advantage from either, and, in addition, pay the expense of educating their own children in schools of their own selecting, thus saving the city the annual per capita cost of every child so educated, during the primary and other preliminary periods of instruction, until qualified for admission to the public colleges, when, no matter what degree of merit their children may have attained as scholars, they are refused admission to these free colleges; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby authorized and directed, for and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, to memorialize the Legislature of this State for the passage of a law amending the act above quoted, so as to admit to participation in the benefits intended to be conferred in the establishment of the Normal College and College of the City of New York the children of all persons residents of this city, irrespective of the schools from which such students may have received their preparatory course of instruction, who may have attained the qualifications necessary to pass the examination now required for admission to either college by children graduating from the public schools.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the Proceedings for the week ending March 2, 1878.

MEETING FEBRUARY 27, 1878.

Messrs. James M. Constable, Hugh Auchinclos and Albert S. Bickmore, a Committee from the "American Zoological and Botanical Garden Company, Limited," were received.

They presented a bill to authorize the Department to set apart and appropriate the portion of Central Park between the drive-way on the westerly side of the park and Eighth avenue, and extending from Ninety-sixth street to One Hundred and Tenth street, for the purposes of a Zoological and Botanical Garden, and to make a contract with said "American Zoological and Botanical Garden Company, Limited," for the establishment and conducting of said garden.

They requested that the Department would forward said bill to the Legislature, with a recommendation for its passage.

They also presented a memoranda, stating the principal heads of such a contract as they would be prepared to make with the Department should the bill be passed by the Legislature.

The following is a copy of said memoranda, viz.:

MEMORANDA.

"1. Capital not to be less than \$200,000, to be disbursed during the first three years.
"2. Admission—Sundays free. Saturdays free to the pupils of the public schools when visiting in a body, under the care of their teachers—one day, 50 cents; other days, 25 cents.

"3. Receipts to be applied—1st, To maintenance; 2d, To interest at seven per cent. on stock and bonds paid for; 3d, The surplus, if any, to be devoted to the purchase of more animals, the improvement of the grounds or reduction of admission.

"4. The city is not to be at any expense, either for the construction or maintenance of said gardens, except furnishing policemen to preserve order.

"5. The city authorities to have the right to investigate the accounts of the Corporation.

"6. The city to have the right to re-enter into possession of the grounds upon reimbursing the amount of moneys actually contributed by stock and bondholders."

The President of the Department was authorized to make an agreement with the New York Mutual Gas-light Company, for the use of the premises now occupied by the Department, at 36 Union square, from May 1 to December 31, 1878, at a rent not exceeding the rate of \$2,500 per annum.

Leave of absence for the month of March, 1878, without pay, was granted to Mr. C. R. Schott, Division Engineer.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Croes, Civil and Topographical Engineer," the same being such as to the said Commissioners, or a majority of them, seem most conducive to the public good; and that the President of the Department cause the said road to be surveyed and designated by proper monuments where it is not already so designated, and also cause three similar maps or plans of the same to be prepared and submitted to this Board, to be filed in pursuance of said laws above mentioned.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be, and hereby is, authorized and requested to commence and prosecute proceedings on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, for the purpose of acquiring the title to the road or street commonly known as Bronx River Road, and extending from Woodlawn station on the Harlem Railroad, and Grand avenue, to the north line of the City of New York, as same has been heretofore laid out by this Department, as a first-class road or street.

Resolved, That Mr. James C. Aldrich, Superintending Engineer on Riverside Avenue Construction, be and hereby is, suspended; that it is proposed to remove him, and that he be allowed an opportunity to appear before the Board at its next meeting for a hearing, in accordance with the law.

W. W. ADAMS, Esq., Supt., etc., etc.:

SIR—In compliance with your order, we made a minute examination of the building situated at the junction of Broadway, Sixth avenue, Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, the upper part of which is used as an armory by the Seventy-first Regiment.

The building is of brick, the walls being in good order; the inside is divided in four sections by brick walls, all in good condition; the timbers and floor are of adequate strength; the top part of the roof is too flat, causing it to leak, discoloring the ceilings, but in our opinion not rendering them unsafe. We would recommend that the top part of the roof be raised in the centre so as to throw off the water from the same, and that two more iron bolts be put in each rafter to add strength thereto. In all other respects we deem the building safe for the purposes used.

Alderman Bennett called up G. O. 41, being a resolution and ordinance, as follows:

Whereas, Free access to many of the fire-hydrants located on the sidewalks near the curb-stones, particularly in narrow streets in the lower part of this city, is prevented by reason of snow and ice being piled around them in the work of cleaning the sidewalks by property owners, and by the snow-ploughs and other machines used by railroad companies to clean their tracks after each fall of snow; and

Whereas, The evil is aggravated by the fact that the snow thus heaped around the fire-hydrants becomes congealed by the action of the frost, rendering them useless or next to useless by fire engines, and if a preventative is not provided, this reprehensible practice, which occasions loss of valuable time in making them available, may result at any moment in converting a small fire into a disastrous conflagration; be it therefore

Resolved, That section 63 of article 5 of chapter VI. of the Ordinances of 1866 be and is hereby amended by inserting after the word "stop-cocks," in the second line thereof, the words "or fire-hydrants," also by inserting after the word "thereon," in the third and sixth lines thereof, the words "or thereabout," so that said section, when so amended, shall read as follows:

Sec. 63. Any person or persons who shall obstruct the access to the different stop-cocks or fire-hydrants connected with the water-pipes, by placing thereon or thereabout stones, bricks, lumber, dirt or any other materials, or who shall permit any such materials to be placed thereon or thereabout by those in his or their employ, shall be subject to the penalty of fifty dollars for each offense, with an additional sum of twenty-five dollars for each day the same shall be continued after notice of removal shall have been served.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the negative, on a division, viz.:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Bennett, Carroll, Ehrhart, Foster, Lewis, and Pinckney—7.

Negative—Aldermen Biglin, Gedney, Guntzer, Hall, Jacobus, Keenan, Kiernan, Morris, Perley, Phillips, Reilly, Sauer, Sheils, and Slevin—14.

Alderman Bennett moved a reconsideration of the above vote.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative, on a division called by Alderman Bennett, viz.:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Bennett, Biglin, Carroll, Ehrhart, Foster, Guntzer, Hall, Keenan, Lewis, Morris, Pinckney, Reilly, Sauer, Sheils, and Slevin—16.

Negative—Aldermen Gedney, Kiernan, Perley, and Phillips—4.

The paper was then referred to the Committee on Law Department.

Alderman Jacobus called up G. O. 72, being a resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That boulevard lamps be placed on the lamp-posts in front of the U. P. Church in Charles street, between West Fourth street and Waverley place, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative, on a division, viz.:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Bennett, Biglin, Carroll, Ehrhart, Foster, Gedney, Guntzer, Hall, Jacobus, Keenan, Kiernan, Lewis, Morris, Perley, Phillips, Pinckney, Reilly, Sauer, Sheils, and Slevin—21.

Alderman Jacobus, as provided in section 13, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, called up a veto message from his Honor the Mayor of resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Ann Connolly to erect a stand in Pike slip for the sale of coffee and fruits; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.
