

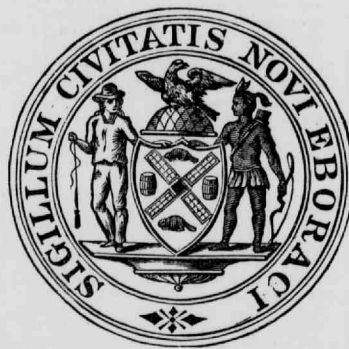

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 12, 1883:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,944, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 798 tenement-houses, 123 private dwellings, 54 other dwellings, 12 manufactories and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 47 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 1 chemical works, 1 railroad shops, 39 sunken and vacant lots, 84 yards, courts, and areas, 127 cellars and basements, 257 waste pipes and drains, 247 privies and water-closets, 28 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 10 smoky chimneys, 20 cesspools, and 11 other nuisances.

The total number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 664.

During the past week 225 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

103 permits were issued to the consignees of 103 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

213 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 170 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 166 houses, 166 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

9 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 445 births, 59 still-births, 250 marriages, and 668 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, May 12, 1883. This shows the same number of births, an increase of 9 still-births, and 41 marriages, and a decrease of 35 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1882, there was an increase of 5 births and 1 marriage, and a decrease of 2 still-births, and 109 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 2; diphtheria, 4; croup 2; whooping-cough, 3; typhoid fever, 4; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 9; phthisis pulmonalis, 27; bronchitis, 14; aneurism, 4; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 1; drowning, 3; while the deaths from measles increased 1; scarlatina, 1; erysipelas, 1; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; pneumonia, 6; heart disease, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; convulsions, 3; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 13; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and preterm births, 3. The number of deaths from rheumatism and gout, surgical operations and suicide was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 163 were in institutions, 353 in tenement-houses, 128 in houses containing three families or less, 10 in hotels and boarding-houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 98 on the first, 158 on the second, 131 on the third, 68 on the fourth, 28 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 655 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 13 non-residents; 83 were stated to be single, 180 married, 90 widowed, and the condition of 315 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 12, 1883, was 60.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.906, the mean humidity was 46, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,121, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.51 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1883.

CHAPTER 56.

AN ACT to amend the Code of Civil Procedure.

Passed February 23, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section twenty-four hundred and seventy-nine of the Code of Civil Procedure is amended so as to read as follows:

§ 2479. Where a new county has been heretofore, or is hereafter, erected, or territory has been heretofore, or is hereafter, transferred from one county to another, the jurisdiction of the surrogate's court of each of the counties affected thereby, to take the proof of a will, or to grant letters, depends

upon the locality, when the petition is presented, of the place where the property of the decedent is situated, or where the event occurred, as the case may be, which determines jurisdiction. If, before the erection of the new county, or the transfer of the territory, letters have been granted, upon the ground that the decedent died or resided within the county, the surrogate's court from which they were issued has exclusive jurisdiction of the estate, and of all matters incidental thereto; and if the place where the decedent died or resided is embraced within another county, certified copies of any papers or proceedings, filed, entered, or recorded in the surrogate's court thereof, must be furnished on the payment of the fees therefor, by the proper officer, to any person interested in the estate; and upon the latter's request and payment of the fees therefor, the proper officer of the court so having jurisdiction must file, enter or record the same, in like manner and with like effect as the originals. Where the letters were granted upon any ground other than the decedent's death or residence within the county, the jurisdiction of the court from which they were issued remains unaffected by any change in the territorial limits of its county.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 57.

AN ACT for the preservation of public records, maps, and papers.

Passed February 23, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Whenever by reason of age, exposure, or any casualty, any public records, maps, or papers in the custody of the county clerk, surrogate, register, or other county officer in the county of New York shall become mutilated, obliterated, or rendered unfit for public service, it shall be the duty of the officer having the official custody or control of any such records, maps, or papers to cause copies thereof to be made and certified for the public use, and the officer making such transcripts or copies shall be paid a sum as may be just, but which in no case shall exceed a sum to be certified by a justice of the supreme court for the first judicial district, to be reasonable, for the service rendered. And no payment shall be made for any service rendered under this act until the work shall be examined and approved of as to its manner and form of execution by a justice of the supreme court of the said first district, nor shall any such work be done until a justice of the supreme court of the first judicial district shall, after an examination, certify that such work is necessary for the security and safety of the public records. And such new copies when so made and approved shall for all purposes take the place of the original records.

Sec. 2. The board of estimate and apportionment in the city of New York shall make appropriations to meet the expenses incurred by this act.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 62.

AN ACT to authorize the board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York to transfer certain unexpended balances to the credit of the board of education, and to provide for payment of teachers' salaries and repairs for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-three.

Passed February 27, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York is hereby authorized, within ten days after the passage of this act, to transfer to the board of education such portion of unexpended balances, remaining to its credit from previous years, as may be necessary to meet any deficiency for teachers' salaries and repairs for the present year.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 65.

AN ACT in relation to sales of real estate made and to be made by executors under authority given them by will.

Passed February 27, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Sales of real estate situate in the city and county of New York, or at any other place within the state of New York, made by executors in pursuance of an authority given by any last will, unless otherwise directed in such will, may be public or private and on such terms as in the opinion of the executor shall be most advantageous to those interested therein.

Sec. 2. All such sales made since the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, are hereby ratified and confirmed and declared to be as valid in every respect as if section one of this act had been in force on and at all times since said first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty.

Sec. 3. This act shall not prejudice or invalidate any suit or proceeding already commenced and now pending to set aside any private sale made by any executor since said first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty.

Sec. 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 67.

AN ACT to amend chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in the city of New York."

Passed February 28, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section two thousand one hundred and forty-three of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in the city of New York," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 2143. This act shall not affect any offense committed or right of removal accrued prior to the time when it takes effect, and all penalties and forfeitures incurred under any statute superseded or repealed by this act prior to the time when it takes effect may be prosecuted and punished in the same manner and with the same effect as if this act had not been passed. Nor shall this act affect any right accrued or acquired prior to the time when it takes effect, nor create a vacancy in any office or employment. Sections one hundred and eighteen, ten hundred and seventy-four, ten hundred and seventy-six to ten hundred and eighty-five inclusive, ten hundred and eighty-seven, eleven hundred and ten, eleven hundred and eleven, eleven hundred and fourteen, eleven hundred and fifteen, eleven hundred and seventeen, eleven hundred and twenty-three, eleven hundred and twenty-five to eleven hundred and sixty-nine, eleven hundred and eighty-three to twelve hundred and three inclusive, twelve hundred and five, twelve hundred and eight to twelve hundred and forty-eight inclusive, twelve hundred and fifty to twelve hundred and seventy-four inclusive, twelve hundred and seventy-six, twelve hundred and seventy-seven, twelve hundred and eighty-four, twelve hundred and eighty-five, except subdivisions nine, eleven, and twelve, twelve hundred and eighty-six, except subdivisions four and five, twelve hundred and eighty-seven, twelve hundred and eighty-eight, twelve hundred and ninety-six, thirteen hundred and one, thirteen hundred and seven, thirteen hundred and eight, thirteen hundred and eleven to thirteen hundred and fourteen inclusive, thirteen hundred and sixteen to thirteen hundred and forty-six inclusive, thirteen hundred and forty-nine to thirteen hundred and fifty-seven inclusive, thirteen hundred and fifty-eight to thirteen hundred and sixty inclusive, thirteen hundred and seventy-one, thirteen hundred and eighty-three, thirteen hundred and ninety-two to thirteen hundred and ninety-seven inclusive, fourteen hundred and five, fourteen hundred and twenty-one, fourteen hundred and twenty-four, fourteen hundred and thirty-eight, fourteen hundred and sixty-two, fourteen hundred and ninety-four, fourteen hundred and ninety-five to fifteen hundred and two inclusive, fifteen hundred and seven, fifteen hundred and twelve, fifteen hundred and fourteen to fifteen hundred and seventeen inclusive, the last clause of section fifteen hundred and eighteen, sections fifteen hundred and twenty-six to fifteen hundred and twenty-nine inclusive, fifteen hundred and sixty-nine to fifteen hundred and seventy-two inclusive, fifteen hundred and seventy-six to fifteen hundred and eighty-two inclusive, fifteen hundred and ninety-three, sixteen hundred and fifty-two to sixteen hundred and ninety-eight inclusive, seventeen hundred and fifteen, seventeen hundred and sixty-five, seventeen hundred and seventy-nine of this act being intended only to contain the substance of certain sections of the Code of Civil Procedure, or of the Code of Criminal Procedure, or of amendments thereof, shall not be construed as making any new enactment or as repealing, modifying, amending or superseding any provision of either of said codes, or any amendments thereof, but shall be treated and considered as embraced in this act solely in order that it may contain all provisions of existing laws which are of special application in the city of New York. Sections thirteen hundred and seventy-one to thirteen hundred and seventy-six inclusive, fifteen hundred and thirty-nine, sixteen hundred and thirty-seven to

sixteen hundred and fifty inclusive, shall in like manner be treated and considered as making no new enactment, but as embraced in this act for the same reason. For the purpose of determining the effect of this act upon other acts except the Penal Code, and the effect of other acts except the Penal Code upon this act, this act is deemed to have been enacted on the first day of January, in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-two. All acts passed after such date, and the Penal Code, are to have the same effect as if they were passed after this act. This act shall take effect on the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-three. This act may be cited as the New York city consolidation act of eighteen hundred and eighty-two.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 71.

AN ACT to promote building in the cities of this state, and to enable certain corporations to hold real estate therein.

Passed March 1, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Any association or corporation duly organized under the laws of this state for the purpose of acquiring, maintaining and improving real estate for residences, homesteads and apartment houses in any city having over twenty-five thousand inhabitants may hold at any one time real estate in excess of the amount now limited by law, by filing with the clerk of the county where its certificates of incorporation is filed a resolution of its board of trustees, duly attested, fixing the amount desired to be held, together with a consent in writing of its members or stockholders representing two-thirds in amount of its capital stock, and the approval of a justice of the supreme court in said county. And thereupon it shall be lawful for such corporation to hold at any one time the amount of real estate so fixed, assented to and approved, but no such corporation or association shall hold real estate to exceed in value three millions of dollars.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 80.

AN ACT to amend section six of chapter three of the second part of the Revised Statutes.

Passed March 7, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section six of chapter three of the second part of the Revised Statutes is hereby amended so that the same shall read as follows:

§ 6. If the party to such conveyance be or reside within the united kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or the dominions thereunto belonging, the same may be acknowledged or proved before the mayor or provost or chief magistrate of any city or town in said kingdom or dominions, or before any consul of the United States appointed to reside at any place in said kingdom or dominions.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 322.

AN ACT to alter the boundaries of the first and second judicial districts in the city of New York.

Passed April 26, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The first judicial district in the city of New York shall hereafter embrace all that portion of the city of New York known as the eighth, the fifth and the third wards and all that part of the first ward lying west of Broadway and Whitehall streets. The second judicial district shall embrace all that portion of the city of New York known as the fourteenth, sixth, fourth and second wards and all that portion of the first ward lying south and east of Broadway and Whitehall street.

Sec. 2. The jurisdiction of the first and second judicial district courts shall extend over the territory mentioned in the first section of this act respectively. All acts and parts of acts referring to the first and second judicial districts of the city of New York as heretofore constituted shall hereafter be understood as referring to the first and second districts as provided for in the first section of this act.

Sec. 3. All vacancies occurring in either of said districts by reason of death, resignation or otherwise, shall be filled as now provided for by law. All elections for justices in either of said districts shall be in and for the territories mentioned in the first section of this act respectively, and in the manner now provided for by law in other districts in said city.

Sec. 4. Nothing in this act contained shall affect in anywise any action now pending in either of said courts.

Sec. 5. All acts and parts of acts now in force applicable to the district courts of the city of New York shall apply to the courts mentioned in this act, excepting, however, all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 340.

AN ACT to regulate the sale of intoxicating liquors in cities having a population of over three hundred thousand inhabitants.

Passed April 30, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The boards of commissioners of excise in the cities of this state, having a population of over three hundred thousand inhabitants, shall, if all other requirements of the law have been complied with, have power to grant license to sell strong or spirituous liquors, ale, wine or beer, to be drunk on the premises, to be named in the application for such license, to any person or persons having a good moral character, whether or not they propose to keep an inn, tavern or hotel, provided that no such license shall be granted unless the said commissioners shall be satisfied, upon examination, that the applicant therefor is a person of good moral character, and that a license may properly be granted for such sale in the place proposed.

Sec. 2. Any such board shall have at all times, discretionary power to permit any person or persons to whom a license may have been granted in respect of any specified premises, to remove to any other place within jurisdiction of the same board during the period covered by such license, and there to continue the conduct of business under such license in the same manner as if no removal had been made, provided always that such discretionary power shall not be exercised until and unless all the requirements of law to be observed upon the granting of an original license shall, upon said application for removal, be complied with and fulfilled with in every respect.

Sec. 3. No person or persons having a license under this act, nor any assistant, agent, employee, or servant of any such person or persons so licensed shall be arrested for any alleged violation of any provision of any excise law by any peace officer or other person, unless a warrant therefor, based on affidavit, shall have first duly issued according to law, except and provided that in case of any violation of any provision of any excise law between the hour of one o'clock Sunday morning and the hour of twelve o'clock Sunday night, in presence of any officer or person authorized to make arrests for violation of law, such officer or person may forthwith and without warrant make arrest of the person or persons so violating any provision of any excise law. Any officer or person authorized to make arrests for violation of law may arrest, without warrant, any person who, in the presence of such officer or other person authorized to make arrests, may be engaged in the sale of any intoxicating liquor without a license.

Sec. 4. No city of this state having a population of more than three hundred thousand inhabitants shall hereafter be subject to or be embraced within any provision of the sixth section of the act, chapter six hundred and twenty-eight of the laws of eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, entitled "An act to suppress intemperance and to regulate the sale of intoxicating liquors," passed April sixteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven.

Sec. 5. Any person who shall, without a license, sell or give away any strong or spirituous liquors, ale, wine or beer to be drunk upon the premises, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. And nothing in this act contained shall alter or affect the provisions of existing laws touching the sale or giving away of intoxicating liquors to be drunk upon the premises or the prohibition thereof in the cases mentioned in said laws, and the penalties prescribed therefor, except as provided in section four of this act. And such provisions of existing laws as are applicable to persons who might thereby be licensed to sell intoxicating liquors to be drunk upon the premises shall be applicable to persons who may be licensed under this act, except as such laws are modified by the terms of this act.

Sec. 6. This act shall take effect immediately.
