

The 1006 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.32, against 20.29 for the previous week, and 25.16 for the corresponding week of 1894. The increase of 231 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 25 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 22 from influenza, of 16 from scarlet fever, of 7 from whooping cough, of 29 from phthisis, of 30 from heart diseases, of 18 from bronchitis, of 84 from pneumonia, of 33 from diseases of the diges-tive organs, of 33 from Bright's disease, of 13 from old age, and of 32 from violence, partially offset by a decrease of 5 in the deaths from measles; and of 7 from convulsions. The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, while the three deaths from measles were scattered over as many wards.


