

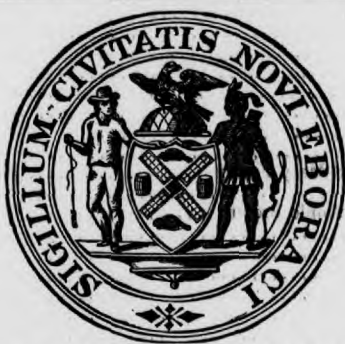

The 1006 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.32, against 20.29 for the previous week, and 25.16 for the corresponding week of 1894.

The increase of 231 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 25 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 22 from influenza, of 16 from scarlet fever, of 7 from whooping cough, of 29 from phthisis, of 30 from heart diseases, of 18 from bronchitis, of 84 from pneumonia, of 33 from diseases of the digestive organs, of 33 from Bright's disease, of 13 from old age, and of 32 from violence, partially offset by a decrease of 5 in the deaths from measles; and of 7 from convulsions.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, while the three deaths from measles were scattered over as many wards.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 13th day of February, 1895, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, section 220 of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 220. Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street), Fifth avenue (Washington place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street (First avenue to Tenth avenue), One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street (Third avenue to Ninth avenue).

And at such time and place, or at such further or other time and place as we may appoint, we will hear the proofs and allegations of any owner, lessees or other person, in any way entitled to or interested in said real estate or any part or parcel thereof, and also such proofs and allegations as may be then offered on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York.
