The 933 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.38, against 24.82 for the preceding week, and 22.77 for the corresponding week of 1894.

The number of deaths varied little from that during the preceding week. There was an increase of 20 in the deaths from phthisis, of 10 from bronchitis, of 14 from pneumonia, and of 10 from violence, nearly offset by a decrease of 5 in the deaths from measles, of 6 from scarlet fever, of 10 from heart diseases, and of 25 from Bright's disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the Thirteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Ninth and Twenty-second Wards.
