22.08 for the corresponding week of 1896.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 106, 76, 78, 33 and 0, against 136, 78, 75, 63 and 0 for the previous week—a total of 293 against 352. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eighteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Ninth and Thirteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Twenty-second Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Seventeenth and Twentieth Wards, and the decrease in the Twenty-second Wards. Wards, and the decrease in the Twenty-second Ward. Eighteen of the 33 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 7 were below Fourteenth street. No case of small-pox was reported.
