STATED MEETING.

Tuesday, June 3, 1902, 1 o'clock p. m.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 604.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor,
June 2, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

I return herewith without my approval the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on May 20, 1902, permitting St. Nicholas's German Roman Catholic Church to place transparencies on certain lampposts in the Borough of Manhattan.

My objection to this resolution is that it does not conform to section 50 of the Greater New York Charter. It relates to a matter mentioned in said section, and, therefore, any provision made by the Board of Aldermen must be by way of a general ordinance which must apply throughout the whole city or throughout specific portions of it. I desire to again call your attention to this section of the Charter, and suggest that your Honorable Board enact the general ordinance made necessary thereby.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to St. Nicholas's German Roman Catholic Church to place transparencies on the following lampposts in the Borough of Manhattan, to wit: Southeast corner of Second street and First avenue; northeast corner of Second street and Avenue A, and in front of the church premises on Second street, between Avenue A and First avenue; the work to be done at the church's expense, under the direction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan; such permission to continue only for a period of sixty days from the date of this resolution taking effect.

Gentlemen—The Police Commissioner has this day directed the following proceedings.

"Ordered, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to recommend to the Board of Aldermen to fix the salaries of the employees on the steamboat "Patrol" of the Police Department, as follows:

"Chief Engineer at the rate of \$3.25 per day, instead of \$1,140 per annum.

"Assistant Engineer at the rate of \$2.50 per day, instead of \$900 per annum.

"Three Firemen (each), at the rate of \$2.50 per day, instead of \$900 per annum.

"Two Oilers (each), at the rate of \$2.25 per day, instead of \$780 per annum.

"Three Deckhands (each), at the rate of \$2 per day, instead of \$720 per annum.

"Cook at the rate of \$1.65 per day, instead of \$600 per annum.

"Steward at the rate of \$1 per day, instead of \$360 per annum.

"Cabin Boy at the rate of 70 cents per day, instead of \$240 per annum.

"Ordered, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully informed that, while there is an apparent increase of about \$231.50 per annum by this change, yet such an increase will not appear when deduction is made for lost time, if said employees are paid at a rate per diem instead of per annum."

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), the proceeds to be used for the construction and equipment of the Borough Building in the Borough of Richmond.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment May 23, 1902, authorizing the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of bonds to an amount not exceeding two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), for the purpose of providing means for the construction and equipment of the Borough Building in the Borough of Richmond, and that when authority shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the amended Greater New York Charter to an amount not exceeding two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purpose aforesaid."

No. 666.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), the proceeds to be used for the construction and equipment of a court house in the Borough of The Bronx.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment May 23, 1902, authorizing the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock to an amount not exceeding two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) to provide means for the construction and equipment of a court house in the Borough of The Bronx, and that when authority shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is hereby authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the amended Greater New York Charter to an amount not exceeding two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), the proceeds thereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) the proceeds to be used for the completion of the construction of the Criminal Court Building in the Borough of Manhattan.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, May 23, 1902, authorizing the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"That, pursuant to the provisions of sections 47 and 180 of the amended Greater New York Charter, and the recommendation of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by resolution adopted May 21, 1902, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding one million dollars (\$1,000,000) to provide means for the building of docks, wharves or piers, and for acquiring land by purchase or condemnation for said purpose, and that when authority shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Charter, to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), the proceeds thereof shall be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Stern to construct and maintain a tunnel or vault, as shown on the accompanying diagram, underneath that part of West Twenty-second street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, which is between the properties owned by the said Benjamin I. Stern, to wit, No. 15 West Twenty-second street, on the north side, and No. 16 West Twenty-second street, on the south side, the same being opposite; provided that the said Benjamin I. Stern shall pay to The City of New York, as compensation for the privilege, such amount as may be determined as an equivalent by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and provided, further, that the said Benjamin I. Stern shall stipulate with the President of the Borough of Manhattan to save The City of New York harmless from any loss that may be occasioned during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of constructing said tunnel; the work to be done and the materials supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 96 of the Building Code, in regard to the inclosing walls of elevator shafts.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Note—Matter underscored thus _____ is new matter; matter in brackets thus [] is old law to be omitted.

Section 1. Section ninety-six is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 96—Elevator Inclosures. All elevators hereafter placed in any building, except such fireproof buildings as have been or may be hereafter erected, shall be inclosed in suitable walls of brick or with a suitable framework of iron and burnt clay filling, or of such other fireproof material and form of construction as may be approved by the Department of Buildings, except that the inclosure walls in non-fireproof buildings over five stories high, used as warehouses, [stores] or factories shall be of brick. If the inclosure walls are of brick, laid in cement mortar, and not used as bearing walls, they may be eight inches in thickness for not more than fifty feet of their uppermost height, and increasing in thickness four inches for each lower fifty feet portion or part thereof. Said walls or construction shall extend through and at least three feet above the roof. All openings in the said walls shall be provided with fireproof shutters or fireproof doors, made solid for three feet above the floor level, except that the doors used for openings in buildings intended for the occupancy of one family may be of wood covered on the inner surface and edges with metal, not including the openings in the cellar, nor above the roof in any such shaft walls. The roofs over all inclosed elevators shall be made of fireproof materials, with a skylight at least three-fourths the area of the shaft, made of glass set in iron frames. When the shaft does not extend to the ground the lower end shall be inclosed in fireproof material.

Sec. 2. All ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Hon. ELIAS GOODMAN, Alderman, Thirty-first District, Borough of Manhattan, N. Y.:

My Dear Sir—During an experience in active newspaper work for nearly a quarter of a century, in Harlem and upper New York generally, I have always noticed there was a desire on the part of property owners, business men and residents, as well as the driving public who use the thoroughfare so extensively, to have the name of Seventh avenue above Central Park changed to one that would prove more appropriate and characteristic.

Seventh avenue below Fifty-ninth street is separated from Seventh avenue above One Hundred and Tenth street by Central Park, a distance of over two and a half miles; while the two thoroughfares are of an entirely different character and appearance, are used for different purposes, are under the control, as far as care and maintenance are concerned, of different City departments, and they have nothing in common but the name.

The question has often arisen as to what would be an appropriate designation for the upper avenue; and the fact that so many titles have been proposed has, no doubt, caused the delay in properly naming it heretofore.

The many owners of costly equipages who use the roadway, as well as the thousands of pedestrians who congregate along its sidewalks on pleasant afternoons to view and admire the handsome turnouts and splendid specimens of horseflesh, the like of which cannot be excelled the world over, would prefer that the suggestive name "Drive" be the proper designation for it, while others suggest that some title historically significant should be used.

To satisfy both elements, I, as a citizen and taxpayer of that locality, would favor the name "Knowlton Drive," which would embody a title signifying the character of the thoroughfare and, at the same time, memorialize a worthy historical hero, as well as an event which not only affected the history of Harlem and New York City, but our success as a nation as well.

Students of local Harlem history are fully conversant with the battle of Harlem Heights, which took place on what are now known as Morningside Heights, and which had a victorious ending for a handful of our American troops over a much greater number of British soldiers, at a point in our present Central Park near where the thoroughfare in question begins.

The success of this battle was brought about mainly by the heroism and intrepidity of Colonel Knowlton, of the Connecticut Rangers, a band of fearless patriots, who, in spite of the many defeats and discouragements that had heretofore decimated the American army, and which had almost dispirited our noble Washington, attacked a detachment of British soldiers far greater in numbers than the loyal Americans and drove them from their stronghold, which was where the upper end of Morningside Park now is, about Amsterdam avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-third street. It was near this point that the brave Knowlton was killed while leading the attack.

While nothing important was gained by this victory, it nevertheless stimulated and inspired our troops to bear their hardships more patiently and encouraged them to believe that, with the same show of bravery, under the guidance of Washington and his faithful officers, they could win, which they eventually did, the struggle for American independence.

Hence the naming of this important Harlem thoroughfare "Knowlton Drive" would not only indicate its general character, but would memorialize the battle of Harlem Heights and the hero who mainly assisted in making the battle the success it ultimately proved to be.

Hoping you can urge this designation for our handsome avenue, and that you will obtain the assistance of your associates in your Honorable Board, I remain,

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), the proceeds whereof to provide means to pay for the construction of new buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 18, 1902, authorizing the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified.

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), for the purpose of providing means to pay for the construction of new buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue said Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000).

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath or in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
