MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Headquarters New York City Fire Department, {
October 31, 1904.}

Meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission, held at the Headquarters of the New York City Fire Department, Monday, October 31, 1904.
Deputy Fire Commissioner Churchill in the chair.
Present—Commissioners Piser, Sherry and Montgomery.
Minutes of the previous meeting read and approved.

Inspector Murray, Chief of the Bureau of Combustibles, addressed the Commission, by request, on the provisions of the Regulations relative to the transportation of explosives through the City.

Commissioner Piser introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That sections 9, 11, 12, 14 and 17 of Part 3 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations, be amended to read as follows:

Section 9. No explosives shall be transported by wagon through the streets of the City unless said wagon is in charge of a competent person, holding a certificate of fitness, which certificate shall be open to inspection by any officer of the Fire or Police Departments. Said certificate of fitness shall be issued only to employees of corporations, firms or persons duly licensed by the Fire Commissioner to transport or sell or to keep and use explosives in the City, and if the explosives are being transported by a person licensed to keep and use explosives, the same must be accompanied by the magazine permit card, showing new location of the magazine.

Section 11. A wagon used for transportation of explosives by persons duly licensed to transport or sell explosives shall comply with the following specifications:

It shall have

(a) Springs.

(b) A wooden top extending over bed, inclosed on both sides and back.

(c) An additional floor laid lengthwise, of sound material, not exceeding three inches wide, tongued and grooved, planed smooth and fair, and blind nailed.

Section 12. No metal tools or other pieces of metal shall be carried within any wagon carrying explosives.

Section 14. Not more than 1,000 pounds of explosives shall be transported at any one time on a wagon through the streets of the City by licensees to transport or sell, and not more than 50 pounds shall be transported at any one time on one magazine permit card by licensees to keep and use explosives.

Section 17. A wagon carrying explosives under a license to transport and sell shall have painted on it in easy legible letters at least twelve inches high, "Powder Wagon," on sides and back, and shall also have the owner's name displayed so as to be read readily at a distance of 100 feet on each side, and in case of a licensee having more than one wagon these shall be plainly lettered "Wagon No. 1," or "Wagon No. 2," etc., and a wagon carrying explosives under a license to keep and use explosives shall prominently display a red flag at least eighteen inches square. Laid over.

On motion, duly made and seconded, the vote of August 30, 1904, passing a resolution amending section 57, Part 5, was reconsidered, and the said resolution came up for consideration.

On motion of Commissioner Sherry, seconded by Commissioner Piser, it was

Resolved, That section 57, Part 5, of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations, be amended so as to extend the prohibition of the use or discharge of fireworks without a permit to the entire City, thereby including that portion of the City not within the fire limits in said prohibition; and to read as follows:

Section 57. Except on Independence Day or the day celebrated as such and during the twelve hours preceding and the six hours following, the use or discharge of fireworks or firecrackers in the City, without a license or permit from the Fire Commissioner, is prohibited. No license or permit shall be issued for the discharge of fireworks within the City until the person, firm or corporation desiring to secure said license shall have made written application for same and deposited with the Fire Commissioner a bond in the penal sum of five thousand dollars, approved as to sufficiency by the Comptroller, and conditioned for the payment of any loss, damage or injury resulting to persons or property by reason of the discharge or use of said fireworks, and for the strict observance of sections 731, 767, 771 and 773 of the Greater New York Charter, and the ordinances adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 13, 1902, and approved by the Mayor, May 19, 1902, amending sections 763 and 769 of the Greater New York Charter, and of these Regulations.

Carried. Commissioners Piser, Sherry and Montgomery voting in favor thereof.

The application of Merck & Co. was taken up for consideration, and upon motion, it was

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of section 13, chapter 2, Part 6, of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, the Fire Commissioner is hereby authorized to grant a supplementary permit to Merck & Co., thereby authorizing said firm to carry an additional quantity of stock in the quantity, place and manner specified in their application of October 26, 1904.

Commissioners Piser, Sherry and Montgomery voting in favor thereof.


