BOARD OF ELECTIONS.

Meeting of the Board of Elections held Tuesday, November 22, 1904, at 12 o'clock M.

Present—Commissioners Voorhis, Page, Maguire and Fuller.

The minutes of the meetings of the Board held on the 14th, 18th, 21st and 24th ult. were read and approved, and the reading of the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on the 15th inst. was dispensed with.

The following communications were received and disposed of as follows, viz.:

From William H. Kipp, Chief Clerk, Police Department, dated the 15th inst., acknowledging receipt of a communication from the Board, under date of the 15th inst., relative to the opening of the ballot boxes used for the reception of the enrollment blanks or ballots of electors on the last four days of registration, and the removal of the contents thereof to the several branch offices of the Board, and stating that the same has been referred to the Chief Inspector, with instructions to issue the necessary order. Filed.

From Henry Berlinger, Secretary, Municipal Civil Service Commission, three communications, dated the 14th, 15th and 16th inst. respectively, certifying, in response to request therefor, eligible lists of Clerks from which the Board may make appointments for temporary service. Communications ordered on file, and the Chief Clerk of the Board directed to notify the persons, in the order in which they appear on said lists, to present themselves for appointment and assignment to duty, etc.

From S. S. Baldwin, No. 380 Fulton street, Brooklyn Borough, two communications, dated the 18th and 21st inst. respectively, stating that he holds assignments of the claims of certain Inspectors of Elections therein named for serving as such election officers on the last days of registration and general election, and requesting that their signature identification cards be transmitted to him. Laid on the table.

From Hon. William S. Bennett, dated the 18th inst., transmitting a bill of Charles A. McInnes, No. 833 Columbus avenue, Borough of Manhattan, amounting to \$9.50, for services rendered and supplies delivered at the request of the Board of Election Inspectors in the Twentieth Election District, Twenty-first Assembly District, New York County, for the purpose of lighting and heating the polling booth in said district on the last days of registration and general election, and from the American Steel House Company, F. K. Plumbly, President, dated the 21st inst., in relation to the aforesaid claim. Referred to Detective Sergeant Leahey for investigation and report.

From Charles Wetterer, No. 529 Amsterdam avenue, dated the 21st inst., stating that he is the proprietor of the barber shop at the above premises, which were designated for use as the polling place in the Thirtieth Election District, Nineteenth Assembly District, New York County, at the last general election; that on the morning of said day the police officers detailed to said polling place, in order to gain access thereto, broke in a door, and requesting that the Board of Elections compensate him for the damages caused thereby, amounting to \$45. Referred to Detective Sergeant Leahey for investigation and report.

From the Chief Clerk of the Board, dated the 21st inst., reporting in relation to the attendance of the clerical force in his office for the preceding week, and reporting that the reports received from the Chief Clerks of the Queens and The Bronx borough offices of supplies received on account of contract with the Martin B. Brown Company have been compared with said contract and found correct as to quantity. Filed.

From the Chief Clerks of the Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn borough offices, dated the 21st inst., and the Chief Clerks of the Queens and Richmond borough offices, dated the 19th inst., reporting in relation to the attendance of the clerical force in their respective offices for the preceding week. Filed.

From the Chief Clerk of the Manhattan borough office, dated the 16th inst., reporting in relation to the communication from the Assistant Deputy Comptroller in regard to the claims of Joseph Goldstein and J. M. Levine for serving as election officers on October 29, 1904, which was referred to him at the meeting of the Board held on the 15th inst. for investigation and report. Ordered on file, and the information contained therein to be communicated to the Assistant Deputy Comptroller.

From the Chief Clerk of the Manhattan Borough office, dated the 17th inst., reporting that he has caused the Board of Election Inspectors in the Eleventh Election District, Ninth Assembly District, New York County, to prepare and file, as provided by law, the statement of votes cast in said district at the last general election. Filed.

From James Graham (a Clerk in the Manhattan Borough office of the Board of Elections), dated the 22d inst., requesting that the Board file the exemption certificate therewith inclosed, which was issued to him by the County Clerk of Kings County as a former member of the Volunteer Fire Department of the former town of Flatlands. On motion, the said communication and certificate were ordered on file.

From the Chief Clerk of the Richmond Borough office, dated the 16th inst., transmitting a communication received by him from William Hogan, Captain, Eighty-first Precinct Police, under date of the 26th ult., stating that because of alterations that have been made in the station-house in said precinct, the rooms heretofore used for the storage of election appurtenances are no longer available, the Chief Clerk recommending in his communication that the premises at No. 60 Castleton avenue, Borough of Richmond, be leased for such use, in place of said rooms. Filed.

The following resolutions were adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York be and are hereby requested, for the purpose of storing voting booths, ballot boxes and other election material in the custody of the Board of Elections of The City of New York, to authorize the leasing from August Belmont & Co., of the Borough of Manhattan, for a term of two years and five months, commencing December 1, 1904, at an annual rent of two hundred and forty dollars, payable quarterly, to wit: On the first days of March, June, September and December, the room or store known as store No. 4, situate on the first floor of the Solingen Building, located on One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Mott avenue and Walton avenue, said room being in size about 16 feet wide by 34 feet deep, and adjoining to and on the easterly side of the main entrance hall and stairway of said building. The lessor to place and maintain said premises in a tenable condition for the use and occupancy thereof by the lessee, as aforesaid, and to give the necessary facilities for the receiving, delivery and removal of said property at all reasonable hours on such days and occasions as may be required.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York be and are hereby requested, for the purpose of storing voting booths, ballot boxes and other election material in the custody of the Board of Elections of The City of New York, to authorize the leasing from Katherine Fink, of the Borough of Richmond, for a term of two years and five months, commencing December 1, 1904, at an annual rental of fifty dollars, payable quarterly, to wit: On the first days of March, June, September and December, the rear portion of the first floor of the building known as No. 60 Castleton avenue, West Brighton, Borough of Richmond, said room being in size about 15 feet wide by 40 feet deep. The lessor to place and maintain said premises in a tenable condition for the use and occupancy thereof by the lessee, as aforesaid, and to give the necessary facilities for the receiving, delivery and removal of said property at all reasonable hours on such days and occasions as may be required.

Resolved, That the persons whose names appear on the eligible list received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated November 16, 1904, and who have been certified to for appointment, be and are hereby appointed temporary Clerks in the service of the Board of Elections, to aid in the completion of the party enrollment and the preparation of the necessary copies thereof, as required by law, such service commencing on or after the 18th inst., and to be compensated for at the rate of three dollars (\$3) per diem, and to be in duration in each case at the pleasure of the Board, not exceeding a period of forty days, from November 16, 1904, the hours of service to be from 9 o'clock A. M. to 12.30 o'clock P. M., and 1 o'clock P. M. to 4.30 o'clock P. M., except on Saturdays, when the hours will be from 9 o'clock A. M. to 12.30 o'clock P. M.

THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS FOR STANDPIPE (FIRE LINE) WORK IN BUILDINGS OF CERTAIN CLASSES, REQUIRED UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 762, CHAPTER 378, OF THE LAWS OF 1897, AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 466 OF THE LAWS OF 1901; AND SECTIONS 102 AND 109 OF THE BUILDING CODE, ARE HEREBY APPROVED AND ESTABLISHED, TO TAKE EFFECT IMMEDIATELY.

REGULATIONS FOR INSTALLATION OF STANDPIPES (FIRE LINES).

STANDPIPES WILL BE REQUIRED IN all buildings exceeding 100 feet in height, erected prior to December 25, 1899, and in all buildings exceeding 85 feet in height erected since same date.

Such buildings as come within above classification, and which do not exceed 150 feet in height, in which standpipes (fire lines) now installed are less than three inches in diameter, must be provided with lines four inches in diameter, and in such buildings as exceed 150 feet in height the fire line must be six inches in diameter, unless the lines already installed are considered satisfactory and approved by the Fire Department.

These standpipes must be of wrought iron or steel of sufficient strength to withstand the necessary pressure (in no case less than 300 pounds to the square inch) to force adequate streams of water to any of the floors of the building, or to the roof, and must extend from cellar to roof and be connected with outside two-way three-inch standard Fire Department connections, with clapper valves and proper caps, placed on street front of buildings, above curb level, in a position accessible for use of Fire Department and arranged so that the clapper valves will hang properly. These standpipes must be provided with proper valves (gate valves preferred) and 2½-inch outlets of the regular Fire Department pattern and thread on each floor level, with sufficient standard 2½-inch hose and nozzles attached thereto to properly cover entire floor area, arranged on proper and approved racks or reels, with approved open or controlling nozzles. Proper check valves shall be placed in top and bottom of such lines as are required to use tank or pump supply, or both. The hose outlets and hose must be located within stairway inclosures, except where impracticable to do so for reasons satisfactory to the department.

Where more than one standpipe is installed, cross connections, preferably in basement, of same size as main risers, with proper gate and check valves, must be provided.

In all buildings over 150 feet in height and in such buildings as come within these regulations

as to height and are occupied for living purposes, such as hotels, hospitals, asylums, etc., also in theatres, the standpipe line must have approved tank or pump supply, or both.

Tanks—Bottom of gravity tanks must be elevated at least 20 feet above highest hose outlet, provided with separate feed supply, and such tanks shall be of not less than 3,500 gallons capacity. If used for domestic purposes, feed lines must be properly arranged to insure constant supply.

Pressure tank supply system or direct supply from street mains will be permitted in some cases if circumstances warrant and pressures are adequate.

All wrought iron and steel pipes must be equal in quality to standard.

All joints must be screwed joints, made up with red lead, and be thoroughly water tight.

All standpipes must rest on brick pier foundations or on heavy iron hangers suspended from floor beams at the discretion of officer in charge of bureau.

Horizontal supply lines must be supported by heavy iron hangers from floor beams at intervals of not more than ten feet, and vertical main lines, properly stayed, at each floor level; all to be securely braced to withstand vibration.

The arrangement of lines must be straight and as direct as possible. Offsets will be permitted only when unavoidable and bends must be of a radius not less than five diameters of pipe.

All pipes and connections must be readily accessible for inspection and repairing.

Drawings, showing location, sizes and connections, with duplicate descriptions, must be furnished to the Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire appliances for all fire line, or standpipe work.

These drawings must be to scale, and shall consist of such floor plans and sections as may be necessary to show clearly all such work to be done, and must show all partitions, stairway inclosures and elevator shafts.
