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## POLICE DEPARTMENT.

### Report for the Quarter Ending December 31, 1905.

His Honor the Mayor, City Hall, New York:

Sir—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the Police Commissioner of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending December 31, 1905.

#### Report.

On the 31st day of December, 1905, the number of the force of all grades (including those on probation) was 8,859.

#### Sick Time.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be found that the sick time lost was 20,270 days, the sick time paid was 10,135 days, and the sick time unpaid was 10,135 days. Total days' time of the force was 803,015. Per cent. of sick to full time was 2.52, and for preceding quarter 2.65.

#### Arrests.

The total number of arrests by the Police Force during the quarter was: Males, 37,303; females, 9,365; total, 46,668. Number arrested for principal felonies, 4,689; number discharged without trial, 1,942; number acquitted, 526; number convicted, 727; number sent to other authorities, 57; number died, 3; number pending, 1,434.

Note—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in felony report and general report (in schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made from the daily returns from the station houses, and the felony report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station house at the time of arrest is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the magistrate.

#### Lost Children.

Males, 226; females, 111; total, 337. Restored to parents or guardians, 313; other dispositions, 24. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office, 243.

#### MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Municipal Civil Service Commission,  
No. 61 Elm Street,  
New York City, March 21, 1906.

A meeting of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Wednesday, March 21, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

All the Commissioners were present.

The minutes of the meetings held March 14, 16 and 19 were approved.

The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Birdseye, and give him all the facts in his possession with reference to the matter. The papers were ordered filed.

Resolved, That section 178 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 178. Spitting upon the sidewalk of any public street, avenue, park, public square or place in The City of New York, or upon the floor of any hall in any tenement house which is used in common by the tenants thereof, or upon the floor of any hall or office in any hotel or lodging house which is used in common by the guests thereof, or upon the floor of any theatre, store, factory, or of any building which is used in common by the public, or upon the floor of any ferry boat, railroad car or other public conveyance, or upon the floor of any ferry house, depot or station, or upon the sta-

tion platform or stairs of any elevated railroad or other common carrier, or into the street from the cars, stairs or platforms of the elevated railroads, is hereby forbidden.

"The corporations or persons owning or having the management or control of any such building, store, factory, ferry boat, railroad car or other public conveyance, ferry house, depot or station, station platform or stairs of any elevated railroad or other common carrier, are hereby required to keep permanently posted in each of said places a sufficient number of notices forbidding spitting upon the floors and calling attention to the provisions of this section.

"It is hereby made the duty of every corporation or person engaged in the manufacture of cigars, cigarettes or tobacco, or conducting the business of printing in The City of New York, where ten or more persons are employed on the premises, to provide proper receptacles for expectoration. Such receptacles are to be in proportion of one for every two persons so employed, and they are to be cleaned and disinfected at least once in every twenty-four hours.

"A copy of the preceding paragraph must be kept posted in a conspicuous place in every factory or printing office mentioned therein."

Beginning at the corner formed by the intersection of the southeasterly side of Seventh Avenue with the southwesterly side of Thirty-eighth Street; running thence southeasterly and along the southwesterly side of Thirty-eighth Street to the corner formed by the intersection of the southwesterly side of Thirty-eighth Street with the northwesterly side of Thirteenth Avenue; running thence southwesterly and along the northwesterly side of Thirteenth Avenue to the corner formed by the intersection of the northwesterly side of Benson Avenue with the northwesterly side of Thirteenth Avenue; running thence northwesterly and along the northwesterly side of Benson Avenue to the corner formed by the intersection of the southeasterly side of Seventh Avenue with the northwesterly side of Benson Avenue; running thence in a westerly direction from the corner formed by the intersection of the southeasterly side of Benson Avenue with the southeasterly side of Seventh Avenue to the corner formed by the intersection of the southeasterly side of Seventh Avenue with the northwesterly side of Ninetieth Street; running thence in a northwesterly direction and along the northwesterly side of Ninetieth Street to the corner formed by the intersection of the northwesterly side of Ninetieth Street with the southeasterly side of Fifth Avenue; running thence in a northwesterly direction and along the southeasterly side of Fifth Avenue, still in a northwesterly direction along the southeasterly side of Stewart Avenue, and still in a northwesterly direction along the southeasterly side of Seventh Avenue to the corner formed by the intersection of the southwesterly side of Thirty-eighth Street with the southeasterly side of Seventh Avenue to the point or place of beginning.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 23d day of July, 1906, at the opening of the Court on that day.

## NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
