Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge during the months of January, February and March, 1904:

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx is charged with the following duties:

I. To make the Topographical Surveys, Computations, Maps or Plans and Profiles and Reports in Connection with the Following Three (3) Divisions of Work.

A. The preparation of a design for the street system in those parts of the borough where a design is not adopted as yet, and the making of surveys, maps, etc., showing changes of adopted street systems and grades; also the preparation of three copies for filing of all matters which have been adopted by the Local Boards or approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

B. The actual demarcation on the ground by monument stones and copper bolts of the lines of adopted avenues, streets, public squares, places, etc., and the protection of the same when improvements are being made.

C. The making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions, profiles, etc., for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of acquiring title by the City to avenues, streets and other public property.

II. To Keep in Custody the Records and Maps of all Matters Pertaining to Work Under the Jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; also Keeping in Custody all Maps Filed in Relation to the Borough of The Bronx, Under the Department of Public Parks, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

III. To Make Examinations, Maps and Reports of Miscellaneous Matters Referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

I—A. Preparation of the design of a street system, maps showing changes of adopted street systems, etc.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, approved a tentative plan of the street system, east of the Bronx river, which amended previously filed plans and laid out streets over such areas which had not been taken up.

A resolution was passed as follows:

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx cause to be prepared for submission to this Board, in suitable sections and drawn to a larger scale, three similar copies of the adopted general plan of the street system, for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible in a general way the nature and extent of the proposed changes and amendments, laying out and extending of streets, roads, avenues, squares or places.

The whole district east of the Bronx river was subdivided in 35 sections, numbering from 29 to 64, and maps to be drawn on a scale of 150 feet to the inch; fifteen of these sections, numbered 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 36, 38, 39, 41, 43, 45, 47, 49 and 52, were forwarded in triplicate prior to April 1, 1904, of which seven sections, namely, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 38 and 47 were actually filed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Surveys, computations of block dimensions and grade studies are under way for a number of sections, but none of those sections was submitted for approval as yet.

Progress is necessarily slow on account of the small force which could be assigned for this work.

Computations were also made for all the changes or establishing of new street lines, etc., which had been before the Local Boards and for which maps were forwarded for adoption and filing.

During the quarter a number of forms were prepared for the Card Index of the Chief Engineer and the President; also the index was begun and is now completed to letter "W," with the names thereon to about letter "H."

Two designs (water color drawings) were made for the enlargement of the Municipal Building, showing the addition of two stories; also a number of photographs were taken for this purpose.

A special drawing was prepared of section 29 of the final maps for the purpose of being photo-lithographed in the same manner as the final maps, which were made for that part of the Borough of The Bronx, lying west of the Bronx river.

Sections 30 and 31 of the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx are in preparation for the same purpose.

Sections 29, 30, 31, 32, 33 and 34 were accurately plotted on mounted paper and are partly completed.

Many maps, sketches, tracings, black prints and blue prints were made auxiliary to preparing maps for adoption and in connection with various other works under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; also a considerable amount of copying and searching of records in the different City departments and the Register's office of New York City and Westchester County at White Plains.

President Orr asked the Acting Chief Engineer as to the work on the Brooklyn contract, especially with reference to Joralemon street, in the neighborhood of Hicks street, and Mr. Rice reported that while he was not thoroughly satisfied with the manner in which the work was being carried on he had refrained from suggesting improvements in the methods, not caring to run any risk of putting the City in a position of assuming responsibility for the work.

President Orr asked Mr. McDonald if he had anything to say to the Board as to the condition of the work on his contract. Mr. McDonald reported to the Board that the Rapid Transit Railroad would be ready for turning over to the operating company from One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and Broadway on the west side, and Lenox avenue and One Hundred and Forty-fifth street on the east side line to the City Hall by August 1 next. Mr. McDonald invited the Board to take a trip of inspection of the subway in a body on the 19th inst., leaving the City Hall at 1.30 p. m. President Orr accepted this invitation on behalf of the Board and thanked Mr. McDonald.

Letter of the President of the New York and Jersey Railroad, dated the 13th of July, asking permission to open Morton street for a shaft, was read, as follows, with a report thereon of the Acting Chief Engineer:

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, New York City:

DEAR SIR—Under the terms of the franchise granted by your Honorable Board to this company (certificate of July 10, 1902), it is, among other things, provided, in section 5, that "excavations necessary in the course of construction by the tunnel company shall be made without disturbing the surface of the streets, except the portions of Greenwich, Christopher and West Tenth streets adjoining the terminal station aforesaid; provided, however, that the Board may, wherever elsewhere local conditions make excavations from the surface necessary for efficient construction, grant the right to make such excavations from the surface, subject to such conditions as the Board may prescribe," and, further, that "all plans for and the method of doing the work shall from time to time be subject to the approval of the Board."

The approach from the river has been constructed across West street and under Morton street to a point immediately west of and close to Greenwich street, from which point a curve must be constructed, turning from Morton street into Greenwich street. This curve has to be constructed of such width as to give additional side clearance for cars, making it necessary that this portion of the work shall be built of masonry construction. It is, therefore, necessary to turn the shield and drive the same back from its present location in Morton street, near Greenwich street, to the shaft at West street.

For the purpose of turning this shield, it is necessary to construct a shaft opening from the surface of Morton street, having an external size of 46 feet 9 inches by 31 feet. This shaft will have to be put down from the surface, and an air flooring will have to be constructed in it approximately at tide level, in order that an air chamber may be made below the surface of this air flooring. So soon as the air flooring is in place the surface of the street will be restored.

I hand you herewith a blue-print showing the location and dimensions of the shaft opening.

In executing this work, I beg to say that every precaution will be taken to prevent injury to property and inconvenience to the public. One-half of the opening in Morton street will be bridged while the excavation is in progress, so that traffic along said street will not be obstructed.

I take pleasure in calling your attention to the fact that we have built one of the tubes of this approach all the way from the shaft at the foot of Morton street to the present position in Morton street, a distance of approximately 600 feet, without having caused any depression in the surface of the streets or injury to abutting property.

I respectfully request permission to construct the shaft above referred to for the purposes stated.

Letter of the President of the New York and Jersey Railroad Company, dated the 12th of July, 1904, renewing application for extension of the line of that company to Thirty-third street and Sixth avenue was read, as follows, and referred to the Committee on Plans:

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, New York City:

DEAR SIR—A short time ago I withdrew the application of this company for the right to extend its lines under West Tenth street to Sixth avenue and under Sixth avenue to Thirty-third street in deference to the objection raised by some members of your Honorable Board that such extension might deprive the City of the use of Sixth avenue as part of a system of municipal rapid transit, as such use might, in the future, be necessary to the City's interests. The Special Com-

mittee of your Honorable Board recommended, in lieu thereof, that our lines be extended eastwardly under Ninth street to Fourth avenue. Two public hearings have been had on this question, at each of which a large and representative delegation of property-owners and business men of New York appeared and strongly urged that the extension up Sixth avenue be authorized.

With a view to meeting the objection raised, and, at the same time, the strong demand of the property-owners and business interests above referred to, I have had a plan prepared by our engineers for the construction of this extension, so that the top thereof will at all points be at least 20 feet below the surface of Sixth avenue. This will leave the immediate subsurface open for the use of the City, free from any interference by the structures this company may place in said avenue. Such structures will be strong enough to carry any future subway that may be imposed upon it.

We propose to build this extension without seeking financial aid or assistance from The City of New York, and to pay to the City a reasonable compensation for the rights granted.

While this plan is less satisfactory to us than the one first proposed, namely, to occupy the immediate subsurface of Sixth avenue, yet, desiring to meet the objections raised thereto, and to satisfy the demand for the extension of our lines to a point in the City which will, in the highest degree, enhance their usefulness to the public, I respectfully renew the application for the right to extend the same from the present terminus under Christopher street or under West Tenth street to Sixth avenue, and thence under Sixth avenue to Thirty-third street, the uppermost limit of our construction to approach the surface of said streets and avenue at no point nearer than 20 feet, and stations to be located at such points along said extension as your Honorable Board may direct.

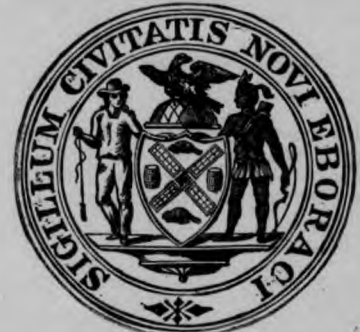

ATTENTION OF THOSE WHOM IT MAY concern is hereby directed to chapter 66 of the Laws of 1904, which authorizes the Comptroller, upon written advice of the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York, to compromise with property-owners interested certain claims for taxes, assessments and sales for the same, and for on account of evidences of indebtedness issued on account of local improvements in

the territory formerly included in the boundary of Long Island City. This statute, which was accepted by the City, and became a law on May 9, 1904, reads as follows:

"An Act to authorize the comptroller and corporation counsel of the city of New York on behalf of said city to compromise and settle with property-owners interested certain claims for taxes, assessments and sales for the same, and for on account of evidences of indebtedness issued on account of local improvements in the territory formerly included within the boundaries of Long Island City.

"Accepted by the City.

"Became a law May 9, 1904, with the approval of the Governor; passed, three-fifths being present.

"The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

"Section 1. The Comptroller of the city of New York acting under the written advice of the corporation counsel of said city is hereby authorized and empowered to compromise and settle certain claims for taxes, assessments for local improvements, and sales for the same and certain claims arising from evidences of indebtedness issued on account of local improvements upon such terms as may be agreed upon with persons interested therein, and to purchase upon such terms as may be agreed upon, evidences of indebtedness issued to obtain money with which to construct local improvements, and the comptroller is authorized to issue special revenue bonds to provide the means necessary to make payments for the said purposes in the manner provided by the Greater New York Charter. Corporate stock may also be issued by the board of estimate and apportionment without the concurrence or approval of any other board or public body to make payments for the said purposes.

"Section 2. This act relates only to taxes, assessments and sales for the same, and to evidences of indebtedness for local improvements, affecting lands or on account of local improvements within the territory formerly comprised within the boundaries of Long Island City, and to such taxes, assessments and sales for the same as were confirmed, levied or became a lien upon lands within the boundaries of Long Island City, previous to January first, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, and to such evidences of indebtedness as were issued previous to said date for or on account of local improvements within said boundaries.

"Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
