Of the petitions considered 45 were adopted and resolutions forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

The Building Bureau reports that during the quarter plans and specifications were filed to the number of 218 for 306 buildings, the estimated cost of which is \$8,453,100.

Of the number of applications received, 43 were for other than frame dwelling

houses, to cost less than \$20,000 each, estimated at a total of \$257,900; 46 for frame dwellings, estimated at a total cost of \$210,450; 8 stores at an estimated cost of less than \$15,000 each, to cost about \$43,000; 144 tenement houses over \$15,000 each, to cost in the aggregate \$5,743,000, and 3 tenement houses costing less than \$15,000 each, to be built for \$40,000.

There were 147 alterations to buildings, plans being filed amounting to an estimated cost of \$336,225. Work was begun on 171 new buildings during the quarter, and there were completed in the same time 199, leaving 714 new buildings in progress. Alterations were commenced on 129 buildings; alterations completed on 127 buildings, leaving alterations on 195 buildings in progress.

During the quarter there were 83 violations of the building law for defective plumbing, 4 for defective elevators, 231 for defective construction and material, 302 for erecting and altering without permit; and 163 for unsafe buildings; 5 cases for omitting to place fire-escapes on buildings. Notices were issued to remove violations of the law to the number of 782; to remove unsafe buildings, 319; to repair passen-

ger elevators, 4, and to place fire-escapes on buildings, 7.

Complaints to the number of 337 were received, and, upon investigation, were remedied, except in 243 instances, where complaints were unfounded, and in 94 cases notices were issued.

Passenger elevators to the number of 108 were investigated, and 4 were found

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Mercantile Burglar Alarm Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Mercantile Burglar Alarm Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as foland on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT. PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this day of , 1912, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Mercantile Burglar Alarm Company, a domestic cantile Burglar Alarm Company, a domestic corporation of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and

agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors in conduits under the streets, avenues and highways within that portion of the Borough of Manhattan lying south of a line beginning at a point on the Hudson River on a line with the north side of Reade street, thence easterly along the north side of Reade street to the west side of Centre street, thence northerly along the west side of Centre street, thence southerly along the easterly line of Duane street, thence southerly along the easterly agreements herein contained, the parties hereto New Chambers street to the easterly line of James Slip; thence southerly along the easterly line of James Slip to a point on the shore of the East River in line therewith, for the purpose of electrically connecting detecting and signalling apparatus to be located upon the premises of subscribers with signal recording apparatus located at some suitable point or points and thereby maintaining and operating a burglar alarm system, for the protection of the

premises of subscribers and for no other pur-

premises of subscribers and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The said right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company, its successors or assigns, for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement, fixing such annual rate at such amount as shall be desuch annual rate at such amount as shall be de-termined by three disinterested freeholders, se-lected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen

by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company. These two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall not months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascer-tained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and ex-penses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each pay-

ing one-half thereof.
Second—The Company shall pay to the City
for the said privilege, the following sums of

1. The sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

2. The further sum of five hundred dollars 2. The further sum of the numerical control (\$500) in cash for past use and occupation of the streets, to be paid within thirty (30) days the streets, to be paid within thirty (30) days by the Mayor.

3. During the first five (5) years of this contract, an annual sum which shall in no case less than one th which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

4. During the succeeding five (5) years of this contract, an annual sum which shall in no

case be less than one thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,200), and which shall be equal to three and one-half (3½) per cent. of the gross annual receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,200).
5. During the remaining five (5) years of

this contract, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of the gross annual receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500).

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the

Mayor. All annual charges, as above, shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 fel. is signed by the Mayor and September 30 fol-lowing shall bear to the whole of one year. Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third-The said annual charges or payments, Third—The said annual charges or payments, as above specified, shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or franchises hardly granted or any part thereof, shall be lease or sublease of the rights of franchises hereby granted, or any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions as to payments any statute or any conditions as to payments any statute or any conditions. assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions as to payments, any statute or any condition herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by said statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, either by the act of the Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statute relating to

the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unsure any subsequent consent or consents.

necessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the plant and property of the Company used for maintaining and operating an electrical burglar alarm signal system within the streets and highways of the City shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used by the City for any purpose whatsoever.

If, however, at the termination of this grant, as above, the City, by the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall on thirty (30) days' notice from the Board remove any and all of its wires, or other electrical conductors, or any portion thereof, from any or all of the streets and public places within the limits of the City, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its electric system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as a provided by the Charter of the City and in

the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances or departmental rules and regulations, now in force or which may be adopted, affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City.

No construction or repair of said electric system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permit so issued such officials may impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall com-

The electrical and other equipment to be installed by the Company, whether the same be under streets and avenues or in private property, shall be constructed and maintained subject to the appropriate the same beautiful to the same beautiful t

ject to the approval and under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Seventh—The plant, conduits, wires, connections, instruments and all appurtenances thereto shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest approved manner and with the most modern and improved appliances, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to its plants, conduits, wires, connections, instruments and appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions or improvements are necessary in the tions or improvements are necessary in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Eighth—All cables and wires of the Company

laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). Such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors in the Borough of Manhattan, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be required for the operation of the messenger system hereby authorized. No cables or wires shall in the future be strung above the surface of the streets and avenues by the Company and those

at present in existence shall be removed and placed underground when and where required by the Board or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Ninth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant.

Tenth-The Company shall, upon request owning premises in the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate, not personally in arrears to it for service already rendered extend its wires to such premises and furnish protection service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed

at the time such request is made.

Eleventh—The Company shall file with the
Board on the first day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which were in use by the Company on September 30 preceding, and the streets in or over which the same were located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on or befere the tenth day of each month a map or plan of the locations in which the wires have

been placed by it during the preceding month. Twelfth—The rates to be charged by the Com-pany shall not be in excess of the following and it is agreed that the same may be altered or changed by the Board as hereinafter provided: 1. For burglar alarm protection the sum of

three hundred dollars (\$300) per annum for the protection of one entrance to a vault and fifty dollars' (\$50) additional per annum for the protection of each additional entrance to the sam vault. For the same protection to additional vaults under the same ownership and in the same building, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) per annum for protection of one entrance to each additional vault and the added sum of fifty dollars (\$50) per annum for the protection of each additional entrance to the same vault.

2. For boxes by which the patrol signal to the central station, the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) per annum for the necessary boxes on any one post and the additional sum of fifty dollars (\$50) per annum for the necessary equipment on each additional post required by the same subscriber.

3. For patrol protection generally, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) per annum for each building or other premises so protected. 4. For any other service furnished or to be furnished by the Company, the rates charged shall be reasonable and fair and subject to the approval of the Board.

The Company agrees, upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City government to furnish service to any and all buildings under the control of such Board, Department or Bureau within the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate at rates not to exceed fifty (50) per cent. of the rates charged by the Company to any other individual

or corporation for similar service. Thirteenth—During the term of this contract or any renewal thereof the Board shall have the power to regulate and fix the maximum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair

Fourteenth-The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

pany for service.

Fifteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purpose than those explicitly set forth herein, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Seventeenth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory covered by this contract, or any part tory covered by this contract, or any part

tory covered by this contract, or any part thereof.

Eighteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City a sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the said City, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the said Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

hereinafter provided for.

If, for a period of three consecutive months, the burglar alarm system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of six months out of any consecutive twelve months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law

or in equity.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of accounts and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company, together with such other in-formation and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under

In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements, furnishing of service to applicants, as herein provided, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or nade pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events the Company shall pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties provided in the grant shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance or after a hearing with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under

the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-second—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the system constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. Twenty-fourth—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction.

Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company; or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have designated, or it such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-fifth—The words "streets and avenues" or "streets or avenues" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean streets, driveways. conavenues, highways, parkways, driveways, con-courses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement included within the limits of the terri-tory in which the Company is hereby authorized

to operate. Twenty-sixth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues of the territory in which the Company is authorized to op-

erate by this contract.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same is figures.

figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, to gether with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawless of construction work may also be seen there
