DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR WEEK ENDED OCTOBER 31, 1914.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT BUDGET FOR 1915.

Each year the Board of Estimate is confronted with the hopeless task of reconciling the amount of the budget requests made by the various city and county departments with the amounts which would willingly be allowed by the taxpayers. The result is bound to be a compromise not wholly satisfactory to either side. It is but natural to suppose that a health department which has for its motto "Public health is purchasable," will not be wholly contented unless all its budget requests are granted, and as this has never yet been the case in this city, it might be thought that the responsible officials of the Department of Health of The City of New York were in a state of chronic discontent. This, however, is far from true, for it is realized not only that the present city administration is very kindly disposed toward health activities generally, but that the per capita allowance for public health administration in this city is somewhat above the average amount allowed throughout the United States.

The budget now being considered by the Board of Estimate carries an appropriation slightly over \$3,500,000 for the Department of Health for the year 1915. On a basis of a population of 5,800,000 this amounts to 64 cents per capita, surely a small sum for safeguarding health. Although the amount of money available in 1915 will be considerably less than the sum appropriated in 1914, the Department will carry out its full program which provides, among other things, for the maintenance of an active Bureau of Public Health Education, the extension of its activities for the control of the city's food supply, the regulation of the sale of harmful and fraudulent medicinal preparations, and the employment of full-time in place of part-time Bureau Chiefs and Assistant Chiefs.

EXTENSION WORK IN PUBLIC HEALTH EDUCATION.

The Bureau of Public Health Education is co-operating with a number of teachers in the training schools and high schools of this city in giving their students an insight into the work of the Department of Health. The students use one of the bureau's monographs* as a text book in their work in hygiene and in municipal government, following their book studies by a visit to the health exhibit on the fifth floor of the Department building, No. 139 Centre street. In addition to this, the bureau has arranged for extension lectures to the students in their schools, similar to the lectures given in the courses arranged for the Health Department's employees. Work of this sort is bound to lay the foundation for sympathetic and effective co-operation between the Department of Health and the public at large.

DELAY IN ADMISSION TO TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITALS.

Criticism has frequently been made of the long delay occurring in admitting patients to public tuberculosis sanatoria and hospitals. To some extent, of course,

this has been due in the past to lack of sufficient accommodations to care for all the patients applying for admission to such institutions; much of the delay, however, was charged to the social investigation made by the Department of Charities. That the latter was only a minor factor and that the delay was usually due to the patients themselves, is disclosed by an investigation recently made by the Commissioner of Charities. This showed that a large number of people on the waiting list have been offered admission to Sea View Hospital, which they have refused, electing to wait until such time as they could be admitted into certain private hospitals of their own choice.

This, of course, goes far to account not only for the large number of patients on the waiting list but also for the fact that patients have waited as long as six weeks before admission to an institution. The Commissioner of Charities is cordially co-operating with this Department in its tuberculosis work and in order hereafter to avoid all unnecessary delays in admitting tuberculosis patients to the various city institutions, has modified the policy of the Department of Charities so that in the future, cases of tuberculosis will be admitted as soon as a positive diagnosis has been made, leaving the social investigation to follow.

HOW CANADA CONTROLS THE PATENT MEDICINE EVIL.

In a previous number we discussed the enormous extent of the patent medicine evil and suggested that the time had come to take definite steps to control the evil. A prominent manufacturing chemist makes the suggestion that the Department of Health follow the plan pursued by the Canadian authorities. In Canada, the manufacturers of all proprietary medicines for internal use must file with the Department of Inland Revenue certificates stating the proportion of certain scheduled drugs per maximum dose, the quantity prescribed in twenty-four hours, as well as the particular preparation of each scheduled drug used. The list of scheduled drugs is the following:

External preparations are exempt from registration *provided they do not contain cocaine or any of its salts or preparations.*

It has been objected that the Canadian law compels manufacturers to disclose valuable formulas, but this is wholly untrue. The Canadian regulations distinctly state that it is not expected nor is it desirable that the formula of any preparation be furnished by the manufacturer, but the affidavits submitted with the application must in every case state the purpose of scheduled drugs as already mentioned. The Department of Health will welcome any suggestions from those interested.

THE POLICE MANUAL "HOW TO KEEP WELL."

The Police Department has just issued a booklet containing simple rules of health prepared by a committee of Police Surgeons. In general, the rules lay emphasis on the prevention of disease and on the importance of consulting the District Surgeon in the beginning of any illness. Striking paragraphs are devoted to eyes and ears, mouth and teeth, diet, food poisoning, care of bowels, skin diseases, feet, exercise, ventilation, catching diseases, tuberculosis, and small cuts and injuries. Altogether this booklet may be commended as an admirable guide for the employees of the uniformed force.

COPPER SULPHATE IN FOODS.

In food inspection decision No. 149, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced that on and after January 1st, 1913, all foods greened with copper salts would be regarded as adulterated. This decision was based on the general conclusions reached by the Referee Board from a study of their experimental results and from other conclusions.

While it was agreed that the use of copper salts in the coloring of vegetables could not be said to reduce or lower or injuriously affect the quality or strength of such vegetables, as far as the food value was concerned, it was held that the use of these salts could conceal inferiority, inasmuch as the bright green color imparted to the vegetables, simulated a state of freshness they might not possess before treatment. Moreover, it was definitely held that *even very small amounts of copper in food might have a deleterious action on the human body and must, therefore, be considered injurious to health.*

The Department of Health has been holding a number of cases in this city pending the final decision or action taken by the Federal Government. Accordingly, under date of September 2nd, an inquiry was directed to the U. S. Department of Agriculture as to the exact status, at the present time, regarding the use of copper sulphate in foods, and the attitude of the U. S. Government in this direction.

In reply, the Department of Agriculture stated that it had under consideration the application of the attorneys representing the owners of vegetables greened with copper salts, for permission to dispose of quantities of these articles, now in the United States, which were imported prior to January 1st, 1913. These attorneys have been requested to furnish additional information, pending the receipt of which no action has thus far been taken by the Department of Agriculture.

SCHOOL MEDICAL INSPECTION—SUGGESTIONS AND COMMENTS THEREON.

The following suggestions regarding the work of school medical inspection were made by Dr. C. Ward Crampton, Director of Physical Training of the Department of Education. Our readers may be interested in the comments on these suggestions made by the Director of the Bureau of Child Hygiene, Department of Health. To a very great extent, the methods suggested by Dr. Crampton are those which the Department of Health is now following. This agreement in principle is gratifying, and is bound to favor active and effective co-operation between the Board of Education and the Department of Health.

Suggestion 1. "School medical inspectors should be on duty from 9 o'clock until 3."

The present budget appropriation is based upon employing part-time inspectors. They are therefore on duty only three hours daily. The matter of having full-time employees of the Department of Health is now under consideration as part of the general program for the Department. Under present circumstances it is not possible for the Department to assign inspectors to duty from 9 to 3.

Suggestion 2. "School medical inspectors should be assigned to no other duty." School medical inspectors are not assigned (during the school term) to any duty other than that of school medical inspector.

Suggestion 3. "An effort should be made to bring the parents to school for consultation, when their children are examined."

Efforts have been made in this direction and the work which is incidental to informing parents that their children are to be examined has been found to use up an amount of time that can be spent more profitably in other directions. After careful investigation of the merits of this proposal, we feel that, as all parents of children who are found to have physical defects are notified, nothing would be gained, and a good deal of efficiency lost, by asking all parents to come to school at the time their children are examined.

Suggestion 4. "An effort should be made to bring parents to school for consultation with the physician when physical defects have been discovered."

That effort has been made since the organization of the Bureau of Child Hygiene. Whenever a child is found to have a physical defect, a copy of form 12K is sent to

the parent. If, within three days, the child does not present evidence to the school nurse that it is under the care of a physician, the principal signs and sends form 118K, which urges the parent to come to school to consult the doctor or nurse. 52,365 such school consultations between parents and the school doctors and school nurses were held during the year 1913. It has been found, however, that in spite of great efforts on the part of doctors, nurses and teachers, many parents will not come to the schools.

Suggestion 5. "We call into question the practice of physicians using Saturday mornings to visit homes of children in an endeavor to 'follow up' physical defects, and we recommend for consideration the establishment of office hours in schools during this time."

Over a year ago the Bureau of Child Hygiene tried this plan of holding school consultations in school buildings on Saturday mornings. In the Borough of Manhattan alone this plan was tried in twenty-eight schools. They were found to be successful, but the President of the Janitors' Association apparently let it be known among the janitors that one of the latter had been fined for permitting the use of the building on Saturday without the special consent of the Board of Education. We have been unable to ascertain just which janitor it was who was fined, but the rumor was persistent and since the janitors received this information the use of school buildings on Saturdays was discouraged and the school consultations were discontinued. We shall be glad to resume these school consultations on Saturday mornings in the schools if we can obtain the necessary authority from the Board of Education.

Suggestion 6. "We recommend a revision of a system of notification of parents. We suggest that the initial notification now signed by the physician alone, should be signed by the physician and the principal of the school. Certain other changes might profitably be made in this slip."

The department has adopted the procedure of sending out two forms in order to induce parents to obtain treatment for their children for the reason that the "follow up" was found to be essential in order to obtain results. The first form is sent out by this department as a preliminary notice to induce the parents to obtain treatment for their children. It has been found by experience that if a notice is also sent by the principal of the school within three days, the parents are inclined to accept it as added authority, and a large number of cases obtain treatment by this means. It is difficult to understand just how this plan can be strengthened by having only one notice sent out instead of two.

Suggestion 7. "We recommend that a form of card be devised in consultation between two departments, which will provide the teacher an opportunity to refer cases to the medical inspector for advice, and to receive such advice."

Such a form is now in use. These forms have been successful and are of great value.

Suggestion 8. "We recommend the following plan for the term's work of medical inspection:

"1. A detailed inspection by the inspector of all children entering school for the first time, below 2-B grade.

"2. A physical examination of all children in all grades above 2-B entering school for the first time.

"3. A physical examination of children especially referred to the inspector and cases of marked defects noted by the inspector in his routine inspection. A practical plan for this examination should be established."

The plan contained in these suggestions is now carried out and has been since the organization of the Bureau of Child Hygiene. All children entering school for the first time are examined immediately upon admission and all children referred by principals and teachers are examined as soon as such reference is made.

"4. An examination of all children in the 2-B grades.

"6. An examination of all children in the 5-A grades.

"7. An examination of all children in the 6-B grades."

At the present time the form of procedure is as follows: Examinations are made in the following order: (a) all children entering school for the first time; (b) all special children referred by principals or teachers or observed by inspectors or nurses in the regular course of their duties; (c) all children in kindergarten 1-A and 1-B grades, all children in 3-A and 3-B grades and all children in 6-A and 6-B grades. It was the purpose of this department, within the limits of its appropriation, to give each child three physical examinations during the course of its school life. A study of the incidence of physical defects has shown that the greatest amount of good may be done by placing the child under medical supervision early in its school life. In order to have the examinations made at the intervals when they would be most effective, the three years indicated above have been taken.

"5. An examination of all children who have been left back the preceding term, unless examined within six months."

Special studies have been made regarding retarded children. As, according to the report of the City Superintendent of Schools, for the year ending July 31, 1912, there were 124,398 children (or 21 per cent. of a total registration of 579,728) who were over age for their grades, and who therefore might be considered retarded, absolute compliance with this suggestion would mean that 124,398 of these children would have to be examined in addition to the routine examinations. At the present time the teachers are requested to send for examination any child, who, in their opinion, is suffering from any physical disability. In order that this class of retarded children may be cared for as adequately as possible under the present restrictions of our appropriation, the Director of the Bureau of Child Hygiene would suggest that the City Superintendent of Schools request the principals and teachers to send for physical examination all children who have failed of promotion whenever, in the judgment of the teacher, such failure is dependent upon ill-health.

Suggestion 9. "In a few selected schools a co-operative educational campaign for good hygiene and the removal of physical defects should be instituted on a class competition basis."

This idea of a class competition basis for the improvement of health conditions in school children has already been carried out in a few selected schools, and is being pushed as rapidly as possible.

Suggestion 10. "Further efforts should be made to standardize diagnosis."

The Bureau of Child Hygiene, by means of supervision and instruction, has made constant efforts to improve diagnosis. However, there will always be a difference of opinion between any one group of physicians and another in matters of minor diagnostic importance. To attempt to remove such differences absolutely might result in making the work of the physicians altogether too mechanical. Concrete suggestions toward any helpful standardization of diagnosis will be gladly received.

Suggestion 11. "We recommend that careful consideration be given to the development of a plan of effective legal interference in all cases where parents refuse treatment."

This matter will be referred to the Advisory Council of the Bureau of Child Hygiene. It involves submitting plans which may have to lead to amendments to the existing laws. At the present time the Bureau of Child Hygiene uses the existing laws to obtain treatment for children whose parents willfully neglect them.

SCHOOL MEDICAL INSPECTION—FURTHER SUGGESTIONS.

Some time ago a special committee of the Advisory Council of the Department of Health was appointed to consider and recommend in respect to: A—The numerical ratio of school nurses to school children; and: B—The frequency of physical examination of school children.

This committee has just submitted the following report:

A—There should be on the average one nurse to every 3,000 school children, and the Health Department should approach this ratio as rapidly as the appropriated budget will permit.

This recommendation is made on the understanding that the work of the school nurse shall include the following items of service:

1. In the school:

(a) Making routine examinations of children to detect those cases which should be referred to the school physician.

(b) Assisting the physician in making physical examinations and recording results.

(c) Acting in emergency cases such as caring for accidents, bandaging cuts, removing splinters, caring for cases of fainting, convulsions, and the like.

2. In the home:

(a) Explaining to parents the significance of the notices sent by the school physicians concerning the condition of their children and aiding the parents in securing remedial action.

(b) Instructing and educating parents in the practices of applied hygiene.

3. In the clinic:

(a) Assisting the physicians in treatments and operations.

(b) Leading the children to view the proceedings of the clinic as diverting experiences rather than terrifying ordeals.

It is further recommended that when 2,500 or more children are assembled in one school building, one nurse at least should be assigned for exclusive duty there.

B—Each school child should have a careful physical (or health) examination each year, and the Health Department should approach this frequency of health examinations as rapidly as funds may be obtained for this purpose.

Among the inducements held out to the prospective student is "A Beautiful Diploma, Handsomely Lithographed, 22 by 70 inches in Size, given FREE, with name written in as desired, to each student on graduation. It is prepossessing in appearance and will add to the professional appearance of any office." The prospective student is also told that the practice of chiropractic undoubtedly "pays better from the very start than any other profession, business or trade. It does not require the long time needed for the acquirement of skilled trades, or other learned (!) professions. It does not require the expense of the years of education needed in other lines. You may study it while working at other occupations and you may even support yourself by practicing among friends while you are finishing your studies before graduation."

The following paragraph will undoubtedly attract a lot of students: "You do not need a college education to render yourself fit to study chiropractic. A common-school education is all that is required—'Common sense' is the principal thing after all and is far better than the superficial veneer which is about all that many of the college graduates seem to have brought home with them."

We wonder how many intelligent people would trust themselves to healers (!) of this type?

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Resolutions Adopted.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held October 27, 1914, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following regulations for the dumping of ashes, refuse or street sweepings upon vacant lots below grade, be and the same are hereby adopted, to take effect immediately:

1. No ashes, refuse, or street sweepings shall be deposited upon or used to fill up or raise the surface or level of any vacant lot or land under or above water in or adjacent to the built up portion of the City of New York without a permit from the Department of Health, and such permit shall be effective only during the continued compliance with the rules and regulations of the said Department.

2. Any person or persons desiring to fill such vacant land with street sweepings, refuse and ashes shall make written application for a permit to the Department of Health, describing the land and their interest therein, and shall state in such application the sources from which the material is to be obtained.

3. In the material (ashes, refuse, or street sweepings) used as fill, the amount of putrescible matter shall be kept below two and one-half (2½) per centum, except in the case of street sweepings, which may contain a larger amount of animal excrement or deciduous vegetable matter, and all putrescible matter shall be immediately raked out and properly buried or removed from the dump.

4. All material trimmed and sorted from the dump shall be removed at the expiration of each day's work, except glass, which may be stored in a properly screened building approved by the Department of Health.

5. All paper and cans shall be raked from the surface of the dump each day and properly buried or removed.

6. Every part of such dump when filled to the required grade, shall be made level and covered with fresh earth or clean ashes.

7. No dust or offensive odors shall be allowed to escape from such dump to the detriment or annoyance of any person or persons not being therein or thereupon engaged, and no one shall fire a dump or burn anything thereon, except in a properly constructed incinerator approved by the Department of Health.

8. When deemed necessary, the Department of Health may require the dump to be sprinkled to prevent the rising of dust therefrom, and may require the use of an adequate disinfecting solution to prevent the escape therefrom of offensive odors, and the breeding of flies.

9. A violation of any of these regulations may be sufficient cause for the revocation of the permit and for the prosecution of the offender.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health held October 27, 1914, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following regulations to keep live chickens, geese, ducks, or other fowls for domestic purposes, be and the same are hereby adopted, to take effect immediately:

1. The Sanitary Superintendent, Assistant Sanitary Superintendent or a Chief Inspector of the Sanitary Bureau of the Department of Health are hereby authorized to issue permits to keep live chickens, geese, ducks or other fowl for domestic purposes under and by virtue of the provisions of section 79 of the Sanitary Code.

2. There will be issued with each permit a set of regulations bearing the same number as the permit. These regulations must be complied with while any of the above mentioned fowls are being kept.

(d) All chickens (or other fowls) shall be confined to proper coops and runways, and shall not be allowed at large.

(e) No roosters shall be kept. (f) All coops shall be whitewashed or otherwise treated as approved by the Department of Health at least once a year, and at such other times as may be directed by the Department of Health, and all coops, runways and surroundings shall be kept in a clean condition.

(g) If chickens (or other fowls) are to be kept on a vacant lot, the written consent of the owner of said lot, or evidence of ownership thereof by the applicant, shall be produced at the time of the presentation of the application.

(h) Chickens (or other fowls) shall be kept so as not to cause a nuisance.

(i) A permit to keep chickens, geese, ducks or other fowls for domestic use, shall not include the right to slaughter.

(j) No such permit for the keeping of chickens (or other fowls) shall be granted when the said chickens (or other fowls) or the coops or runways in which they are kept, measured in the most direct line, are within 25 feet of any inhabited building (other than the dwelling of the applicant if said chickens or other fowls are to be maintained on the same lot with the dwelling of said applicant or on an adjoining lot).

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health held October 27, 1914, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following regulations to keep live pigeons for domestic purposes be and the same are hereby adopted, to take effect immediately:

1. The Sanitary Superintendent, Assistant Sanitary Superintendent or a Chief Inspector of the Sanitary Bureau of the Department of Health are hereby authorized to issue permits to keep live pigeons for domestic purposes under and by virtue of the provisions of Section 81 of the Sanitary Code.

2. There will be issued with each permit a set of regulations bearing the same number as the permit. These regulations must be complied with while the above mentioned fowls are being kept.

3. A violation of these regulations may be sufficient cause for the revocation of a permit and the prosecution of the offender.

4. No permit from the Department of Health for the keeping of pigeons is necessary in unimproved sections of the city used for farming purposes.

5. The keeping of pigeons for domestic purposes shall be allowed in the City of New York under the following conditions:

(a) Provided that a permit therefor, issued in accordance with the regulations of the Department of Health, be obtained from the said Department, and provided also, that the conditions imposed in such permit be fully met.

(b) No pigeons shall be kept on the same lot with a tenement house.

(c) No application to keep pigeons on the same lot with a building other than a tenement shall be accepted unless the applicant file with his application the written consent of the other tenant or tenants of the said building.

(d) All pigeons shall be confined to proper coops, and not allowed at large.

(e) All coops shall be whitewashed or otherwise treated as approved by the Department of Health at least once a year, and at such other times as may be directed by the Department of Health, and all coops and surroundings shall be kept in a clean condition.

(f) If pigeons are to be kept on a vacant lot, the written consent of the owner of said lot, or evidence of ownership thereof by the applicant, shall be produced at the time of the presentation of the application.

(g) Pigeons shall be kept so as not to cause a nuisance.

(h) A permit to keep pigeons for domestic use shall not include the right to slaughter.

(i) No such permit for the keeping of pigeons shall be granted when the said pigeons or the coops in which they are kept, measured in the most direct line, are within 25 feet of any inhabited building (other than the dwelling of the applicant if said pigeons are to be maintained on the same lot with the dwelling of said applicant or on an adjoining lot).

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all

house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for an opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-ends, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
