A communication dated April 30, 1918, was presented from Sylvester G. Connolly, Clerk in the Office of the Commission, requesting a leave of absence for the duration of the war, pursuant to the provisions of the Fenner Law, chapter 435, Laws of 1917, in order that he might enlist in the United States Naval Reserve Forces. The Secretary was instructed to submit the application to the Mayor for approval.

Commissioner Drennan recommended an amendment to Regulation XIII of the General Regulations of the Commission by adding to subdivision VIII the following clauses:

(6) Business of Rating Officers—Where a department certifies to this Commission that service ratings cannot be given by reason of the separation from the service of the rating officer, the Civil Service Commission shall assign one of its examiners to give such ratings, based upon such data as may be submitted to it by any one interested therein.

(7) Delinquent Departments—Service ratings shall be transmitted to the Civil Service Commission within thirty days after the expiration of the period to which they refer. Where a department refuses, neglects or delays to submit service ratings which are due the Civil Service Commission, after ten days' notice to the delinquent department, shall certify to that fact, and the ratings of all employees of such delinquent department shall be fixed at standard.

(8) Appeal—Where ratings are given, as provided for in Clauses VI and VII hereof, any employee may appeal to the Board of Review of the Civil Service Commission within ten days after his rating has been made by said Commission.

The matter was laid over.


















