To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On July 12, 1918 (Cal. No. 133), your Board referred to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication, dated July 9, 1918, from the Police Commission, requesting that the salaries of the uniformed force of the various ranks and grades of the Police Department be increased (approximately 10 per cent.), as follows:

Chief Inspector, from \$6,000 to \$7,000.
Borough Inspectors, from \$4,200 to \$4,500.
Inspectors, from \$3,900 to \$4,300.
Surgeons, from \$3,500 to \$4,000.
Captains, from \$3,120 to \$3,500.
Lieutenants, from \$2,450 to \$2,700.
Surgeons, from \$3,500 to \$4,000.
Patrolmen, First Grade, \$1,500 to \$1,650.
Patrolmen, Second Grade, \$1,400 to \$1,550.
Patrolmen, Third Grade, \$1,300 to \$1,450.
Patrolmen, Fourth Grade, \$1,200 to \$1,350.
Patrolmen, Fifth Grade, \$1,050 to \$1,200.
Matrons, \$1,200 to \$1,350.

Your Committee, upon consideration of the urgency of this matter has determined to recommend the adoption of the annexed resolution, which affects the Matrons and all of the Patrolmen up to the first grade. The other matters referred to in the communication of the Police Commissioner are held under consideration by your Committee in connection with the 1919 budget, and for recommendation at an earlier period if it is found feasible to take such action.

An Ordinance to Repeal "An Ordinance to Amend Section 35 of Article 2 of Chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Fire Prevention."

AN ORDINANCE to repeal "An Ordinance to amend section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to fire prevention."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. An ordinance to amend section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "fire prevention," adopted July 2, 1918, and received from the Mayor July 16, 1918, is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances relating to "fire prevention," is hereby amended by inserting therein a new subdivision to read as follows:

2. To prevent films in projecting machines from taking fire. Every motion picture projecting machine used for the projecting of motion pictures, shall be equipped with an approved automatic shutter placed between the condensers and the film, and so arranged as to close immediately and automatically should the film become stationary through breakage or failure of the take-up to work properly.


