That the attention of the Board of Police be respectfully called to the previous communications

respectfully called to the previous communications of the Board of Health, and also to the provisions of the Board of Health, and also to the Povisions of law making any violation of the ordinances of the Sanitary Code a misdemeanor, and the occasion of arrest, while at the same time the duty of enforcing the Sanitary Code is expressly laid upon the Board of Police by section 17 of chapter 74 of Laws of 1866; also that since the matter of street cleaning and collection of ashes and garbage has been by law entirely committed to the Police De-partment this Department is unwilling to interfere, and also that, in the opinion of this Department

until the public attention has been fully called to the new measures proposed by the Board of Police, and until every possible provision has been made to secure the object of the careful, separate, and prompt removal of ashes and garbage, no civil suits for penalties should be commenced. The matter of enforcing the ordinances of the Sanitary Code is entirely within the control of the Board of Police, especially if a policeman should occasionally accompany the garbage and ash carts, and at the same time call the attention of occupants to their necessary action, and mark any case of disobedience.

Sanitary Bureau

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 3, 1874:

The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,106, as follows: 5 public buildings, 1,034 tenement houses, 166 private dwellings, 161 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 48 stores and warehouses, 91 stables, 1 dangerous building, 54 slaughter-houses, 7 fatrendering establishments, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 3 manure dumps, 4 dumping-grounds, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 5 head-picking establishments, 1 lime-kiln, 5 public sewers and drains, 2 markets, 2 ponds, 33 vacant lots, 2 roadways, 1 dyke, 1 smoke-house, 3 dangerous chimneys, 41 yards, courts, and areas, 87 cellars and basements, 53 waste-pipes and drains, 156 privies and water-closets, 49 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 1 piggery, 51 other muisances, together with 15 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

During the past week 62 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

tors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 74 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 60 houses, 60 privysinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have disinfected 66 miles of street-gutters in the following Wards, viz.: First, Third, Fifth, Sixth, Eighth, Eleventh, Fourteenth, Seventeenth, and Twentieth. They have also disinfected 1,996 privies and water-closets, 125 yards, courts, and areas, and 41 cellars and basements.

14 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits have been granted consignees of 87 vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of this Port.

109 permits were granted Scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious disease were reported for the week ending October 3, 1874: Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 24; scarlet fever, 27; measles, 1; diphtheria, 34; small-pox, 15; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 1.

262 loads of night-soil were removed by the Night Scavengers from the privy vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat, fish, etc., was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending October 3, 1874: Cattle, 2 carcasses; calves (bob), 10 carcasses; sheep, 1 carcass; beef, 168 pounds; veal, 80 pounds; mutton, 16 pounds; poultry, 282 pounds; game, 254 pounds; fish, 2,400 pounds; tongue, 46 pounds; cheese, 467 pounds; and scollops, 15 gallons.

There were recorded 585 deaths, 183 marriages, 499 births, 46 still-births, 30 applications for transit permits, and 68 returns from Coroners. There were 10 searches of the registry of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 5 of marriage, and 9 of death were issued from this Bureau; 4 cases of death were referred to the Coroners. to the Coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health: SIR—In the week ending on Saturday, the 3d of October, there were 585 deaths reported in this city. There were 558 deaths verified the previous week, and 540 during the week of the great rain ending on the 19th of September. The increase last week was chiefly of diphtheria, infantile malades terminating in convulsions, and of invalids in hospitals. There were 120 deaths charged to diarrhoeal diseases, but only 9 of them were of persons over 4 years of age. 310 of the 585 deaths (52.09 per cent.), were of children under 5 years of age. The death-rate in that portion of the population which is over 4 years of age, was equivalent to 15.59 per 1,000 annually.

The total number of deaths in the 13 weeks or summer quarter, ending on the 26th of September, was 8,500. Of this number 5,131, or 60.30 per cent, of the whole were of children under 5 years of age, and 3,524 were of infants that had not seen their first birth-day. That is, 41.40 per cent, of the total mortality was of the class of nurslings under a year old, and of which a census would probably find about 26,500 living in the city. probably find about 26,500 living in the city. The number of deaths of children between the ages of 2 and 5 years, was only 619 in the 13 weeks. The death-rate in the city during this quarter of the year, was equal to 32.72 per 1,000 of the living inhabitants annually. In the last three weeks, the death-rate has been equivalent to 27.00, 27.90 and 29.25 successively.

in the Manual, be amended so as to read as fol-

RULE 92. Captains shall wear the prescribed uniform at all times when on duty, unless specially authorized to wear citizen's clothes by the Board or Superintendent of Police.

Sergeants, Roundsmen, Patrolmen, and Door-men shall wear the prescribed uniform at all times when their respective platoons are on patrol or reserve duty; and when the off platoon may be called on duty, on extraordinary occasions.

But Captains are authorized to order (or grant But Captains are authorized to order for grain leave to) members of their command to wear citizen's dress on special occasions, when required to perform detective duty, and shall report all such cases to the Superintendent.

When either of the above enumerated members of the force attends at any Court, as witness recognitions of the regular or special drills

or complainant; or at the regular or special drills for exercise; or at headquarters, on any business whatever; or at the School of Instruction, he shall appear in the prescribed uniform.

Members of the force may, for special purposes, be relieved from wearing uniform by the Board, or by the Superintendent of Police, and by Captains, as above provided; but at no time, while in citizen's dress, is any member exempted from the performance of Police duties, and from the strict observance of the rules and regulations of the Department.

The caps, gloves, shields, badges, emblems, devices, belts, buttons, and clubs to correspond with samples deposited in the cloth-room of the department of clothing and equipment.

The coat will be buttoned at all times.

The gloves are to be worn at all times when members of the force are on duty, except during the tours of night duty, when they may be dis-

Patrolmen are required to wear India rubber or other water-proof overcoats while on post-duty during wet weather.

Patrolmen assigned to duty in the Twenty-sixth Precinct will wear upon the cap or hat band, in summer, above the particular num wearer, the words "Ordinance Police. number of the

Members of the force assigned to special duty mechanics, and required to report to the Chief Clerk, and members of the force detailed to clerical duty, are not required to appear in uniform
