To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—I deem it my duty at this time to call the attention of your Honorable Body to the condition of the room in the City Hall designated as the Governor's Room. It contains a large and valuable collection of oil paintings, the property of the City, consisting of the portraits of eminent citizens who have rendered distinguished services, and have been honored by the people with high public offices since the period of the Revolution; it contains other objects of historical interest, such as the furniture used by the Colonial Congress, and it is used for public receptions. All these facts combined make it a place of special interest to persons visiting the City, as well as to our own people, and it would seem eminently proper, therefore, that the room and its contents be kept in good condition. Its present condition, however, is anything but creditable to the City; the carpet on the floor is worn threadbare by long and constant use, and the curtains at the windows have fallen into shreds from age.

From a careful examination and estimate I find that the sum of \$2,500 would be sufficient to renovate and refurnish the room so far as to give it a presentable appearance, and I respectfully recommend that your Honorable Body request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to appropriate that amount, to be expended by this Department for that purpose.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held October 17, 1874.

Present—Hon. William F. Havemeyer, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller; George W. Lane, Esq., Chamberlain; and Jenkins Van Schaick, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The following resolution, submitted by the Comptroller, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of the Act, chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and hereby is directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, "Dock Bonds of the City of New York," for the purpose of raising the moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act, relating to the Department of Docks, its powers and duties, being part of the amount asked for by the Commissioners of Docks in their requisition dated March 25, 1874.

The petition of the Metropolitan Gas-light Company, "for confirmation, or new grant of water lots on Hudson river, between Sixty-fifth and Sixty-sixth streets, was received, and laid on the table for future consideration.

The following communication from the Commissioners of Docks was received, viz.:

To the Hon. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Board governing this Department, held this day, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted, by the affirmative vote of all the Commissioners:

"Whereas, This Board is authorized, by subdivision 4 of section 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871, to acquire by purchase in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New

York, any and all wharf property in said city, not already owned by said corporation; and

"Whereas, In pursuance of the provisions of said section 6, this Board has entered into an agreement for the purchase of that portion of the bulkhead adjoining the southerly side of pier 50, North river, say, to the extent of about 50 feet, claimed to be owned by Harriet B. White and Robert H. Ludlow, for the sum of \$10,000, provided the Counsel to the Corporation shall approve of the title to the said property; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the Board of the Department of Docks, in conformity with the requirements of said subdivision 4, hereby certify to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, that an agreement has been made for the purchase of about fifty feet of the bulkhead adjoining on the southerly side of pier 50, North river, from Harriet B. White and Robert H. Ludlow, reputed owners thereof, for the sum of \$10,000; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby respectfully requested to take action in regard to the approval of the said agreement, as required by said subdivision 4, on as early a date as practicable, in order that no delay may be occasioned to the works and operations of this Department, now in progress for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of said bulkhead."
