Commissioner Henry R. Beekman was elected President of this Board, from October 1 to the first Wednesday in May, 1886.

Permission was given to Messrs. Morris K. Jesup, A. S. Hatch and others, a committee, to erect an iron drinking-fountain in permanent finish at the south side of the small park on Thirty-second street, between Broadway and Sixth avenue, on the site of the fountain now located at that point, any inscription on said fountain to be approved by this Board, the same to be erected free of all expense to the city.

A form of contract and specifications for excavating and removing the additional earth and rock, furnishing the materials and completing the drainage, furnishing the materials and erecting the mason-work, granite and other stone-work, of the enlargement of the Metropolitan Museum of Art in the Central Park, the whole in accordance with the plans and specifications, schedule and architect's directions therefor, as prepared and presented by Theodore Weston, Architect, was approved and ordered printed and the work ordered advertised.
