

# BOARD OF ASSESSORS.

OFFICE BOARD OF ASSESSORS, No. 11½ CITY HALL, NEW YORK, August 13, 1885.

To the Commissioners of the Department of Taxes and Assessments:

Gentlemen—In compliance with your request by letter under date of July 8, 1885, we herewith respectfully forward to your Department a detailed report of our action, from January 1st to August 1st, 1885, upon the various assessment lists described in the accompanying statement.

From this report it will be seen that we have received 144 assessment lists since the 1st January, 1885, which, in addition to 110 lists on hand at that period, make a total of 254 lists, involving an aggregate amount of \$4,750,752.27.

Of this number, 66 lists, amounting to \$1,939,474.32, have been apportioned, advertised and transmitted to the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments for confirmation, leaving still in this office 188 lists amounting to \$2,814.37.07.

in this office 188 lists amounting to \$2,811,277.95.

Of this amount, however, we have apportuned and advertised since the 1st day of July, 36 lists amounting to \$784,291.30, the transmission of which will appear in our next quarterly report. Very respectfully,

SIR—There were 569 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 24, 1885, which is an increase of 38, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 85 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending October 17, 1885, was 581, which is 12.0 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.40 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,411,722.

SIR—I have the honor to report that, as directed by you, I have carefully investigated the water-supply furnished to the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, for the purpose of ascertaining the cause of the numerous complaints received against the said supply. I have had analyses made at short intervals by Prof. Waller of samples of water taken from taps at different points in the Wards. During the past eight months, with one exception, the results of these analyses have been satisfactory, indicating that the water is of fair qualitity and free from sewage contaminations. In the case of the exception, another analysis of a sample taken at the same point after blowing off the adjoining main, proved that the cause of the apparent pollution was purely local and probably due to decomposing matter in the main. An examination of the reservoir at Kensico and of the streams supplying it, made on June 1 of the current year, by President Shaler and myself, showed that any causes of contamination at the headwaters previously existing had been removed, or were being eliminated at the time of the inspection (see Report, June 3, 1885).

It is my opinion, after carefully investigating the subject, that the cause of trouble is to be found in the arrangement of the water-mains. The engineers have been compelled by the peculiar growth of the annexed district, to lay miles of pipe along streets not yet built up; the result of this is many miles of dead ends. The Chief Engineer of the Department of Public Works informs me that all the mains north of the Harlem river terminate in dead ends, except one, which, running through Third and Fordham avenues to the Harlen river, crosses it, and is distributed to a small district in Harlem.

The length of these dead ends varies from seven hundred feet to two and one-quarter miles; their total length being about thirty-five miles. During the warm weather the water in them deposits a large amount of sediment and decomposes. Whenever for any purpose the pressure in the main is increased the sediment in the ends is stirred up and driven with the foul water into the house pipes. Luke-warm water is more offensive to taste and smell than cold water in the same condition. The temperature of the water during the past two weeks has fallen from 72° to 53° Fahr. As it continues to fall the decomposition in the ends will be less and less, and the water as it grows colder will be less and less offensive. The Chief Engineer informs me that during the spring and summer of next year it is his purpose to connect most of the dead ends, thereby making through circuits. This will cause the water to circulate, and will prevent it from decomposing. I consider it a very necessary work, and until then the ends should be frequently blown off, which will do something to prevent the existing evil, though it cannot be expected to entirely abate it, as the pressure thing to prevent the existing evil, though it cannot be expected to entirely abate it, as the pressure is not sufficient to carry off much sediment and clean the pipes, being only about four pounds to the

The appropriation for 1885 was but \$5,000, which amount has long since been expended; and there are about one hundred certified claims filed by divers undertakers in the City of New York awaiting payment. The Committee are informed that certain undertakers are hesitating about burying the soldier-dead, in consequence of the fact of the appropriation having been expended.

We would also call the Board's attention to the further fact that the death rate of soldiers, sailors and marines is yearly increasing, by reason of their advanced age, and we are therefore of the opinion that an increased appropriation will be necessary to meet the demands of the current year and to liquidate existing unpaid claims, to wit, at least \$15,000.

Should the Board desire to have further information from the Committee on the subject embraced in this application, we will, on notification to our Chairman, be happy to call on you.

We would therefore ask your Honorable Body for an appropriation of at least, the sum above named.

Office of Committee for Enforcement of Law, Society for the Prevention of Crime NEW YORK, October 20, 1884.

Hon. JOHN R. VOORHIS, Commissioner of Police, New York City.

Hon. John R. Voorhis, Commissioner of Police, New York City:

Dear Sir—It was my pleasure, by invitation of the Chief of Police, Wm. Murray, Esq., to make an inspection below Forty-second street by midnight Saturday night last, October 17, together with Inspector Henry Steers; we wished to see if officers on post were doing their duty; also, to see if the Excise and Gambling Laws were being enforced; to also see if the public streets were free of the presence of women of doubtful character, and the law fully observed. That the inspection should be perfectly fair, and to show to me that no notice of the intended inspection was planned beforehand the offer was made that I should select the route and go where I should wish, which I did, from street to street, from avenue to avenue, and from and to different station-houses, and at and between the hours of 10 p. M., and 4 a. M. We visited sixteen different Police Precincts, and thoroughly inspected the same; we found that the officers on duty to a large extent, were doing honest service, and in but few instances, did we find officers on duty to a large extent, were doing honest service, and they were quietly and kindly reprimanded by Inspector Steers. We found in all parts of the City the saloons closed and curtains up, to a very large extent. Where there were lights to be seen, in a few instances, we found that parties who tried the doors and with pails were unable to obtain admission. We found but one liquor store open and doing business, that was in the Fourth Ward, where an instant arrest was made by the Captain and the place closed up. We witnessed the midnight roll-call of officers at the Fourth Precinct, under Captain Webb, and will say, a

finer and better body of men, and under discipline, can rarely be found. This Precinct is a marvel under the direction of Captain Webb, who is enforcing law and order here (in one of the worst parts of the city) as it never has been done before. Much praise is due him. Other Precincts we found the force was under a better discipline and the streets clear and clean of the criminal classes that in years back have made the lower part of the city dangerous. And let me here say, too much praise and honor cannot be given to the new Chief of Police, William Murray, Esq., who grasps the great question, which has never been solved before, how to give this great city protection and guard it so that the lives and property of its citizens shall be safe at all times, day and night. This, to my mind, he has accomplished, and with the able assistance of his right-hand man, Inspector Henry Steers, the city may not only do honor to these two men, but feel as never before, this grand city of ours will take its place as the leading one where law and order is strictly and honestly enforced I thought it would be pleasing to you to know of the silent, quiet and firm work done by the present Chief of Police, and will here say, we thoroughly endorse his work, manner and mode, and will give him all the aid in our power to help him in the work of giving us a clean and safe city to dwell in.

A T A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 27th day of October, 1885, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 2c6 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2c6. That no privy-vault, or cesspool, shall be allowed within thirty feet of any tenement or lodging-house, hotel or manufactory in the City of New York, of a greater depth than three feet; nor unless it be connected at the upper end with the Croton water and at the lower end with the street sewer, and provided with an outlet at the lowest point and on the bottom, so as to admit of the complete discharge of the contents whenever the outlet is opened and the vault or sink is flushed with water. The outlet shall be kept closed, except during the process of flushing, with a tight-fitting plug, so as to effectually prevent the escape of gases and offensive odors; and sufficient water shall at all times be kept in the vaults or sink to prevent solid matter adhering to the bottom. The sides and bottom of every privy-vault, cesspool, or school-sink in the City of New York must be impermeable and secured against any saturation of the walls or the ground about the same.
