SIR—There were 749 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 21, 1888, which is a decrease of 14, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 40 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1887. The actual mortality for the week ending January 14, 1888, was 807, which is 127.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.87 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,505,701.

on the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premthe knowledge or consent of the owners of the premThe main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law denges for water supplied through the law therefore holds the owner of the premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water ents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, to library, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the woners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their remises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, thy must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is compiled with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
