

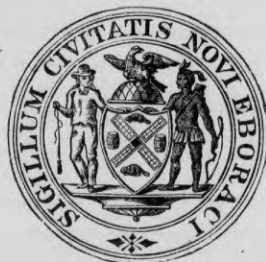

### BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

MARCH 22, 1888.

Hon. Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor; Hon. Henry R. Beekman, Counsel to the Corporation; and Hon. John Newton, Commissioner of Public Works, the three officers mentioned in section 66 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, met in the Mayor's temporary office, in the Stewart Building, at 1 o'clock P. M. to-day.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Richard A. Storrs, the Deputy Comptroller, appeared before the Board in relation to publishing the statutory notice as to redemption of lands and tenements, after sale for unpaid taxes, etc. He called attention to the provisions of section 941 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and submitted proposals made by certain newspapers, showing the rates at which they were willing to publish the advertisement called for. The following is a synopsis of the bids:

Mr. Storrs presented to the Board the following resolution, which was adopted unanimously:

A regular meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 3 P. M., at the office of his Honor Mayor Hewitt.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, and Colonel Emmons Clark.

SIR—I inclose a report on our rifle-range, made by the General Inspector of Rifle Practice of the State. I understand a plan has been adopted for taking the smoke from the firing points, and any change in that is probably undesirable. All the other recommendations in the report should be acted on, and it would be well to do all the work at one time.

After deliberation, the Board decided that it had no power in the matter, and the Clerk was directed to so advise Colonel Jones.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 10, 1888:

There were 5,500 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 532 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 271 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 30 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 4 permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 30 permits.

I herewith forward reports in detail from Chief Inspector Bullard and E. W. Martin, Chemist, of the work performed by themselves and their respective corps; also report of S. A. Goldschmidt, Inspector of Offensive Trades, and report of the number of complaints and reinspections made by the Medical Inspectors.

The certificates of 792 births, 65 still-births, 226 marriages and 799 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 10, 1888. This shows a decrease of 152 births, 1 still-birth, 83 marriages and 4 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1887 there was a decrease of 68 deaths, an increase of 1 still-birth, an increase of 16 marriages, and an increase of 202 births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 9; diphtheria, 2; croup, 8; whooping-cough, 1; typhoid fever, 1; rheumatism and gout, 4; phthisis, 15; bronchitis, 1; pneumonia, 9; heart diseases, 17; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 11; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 9; while small-pox increased 1; measles, 1; erysipelas, 2; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 6; diarrheal diseases, 4; inanition, 4; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 5; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; enteritis, gastritis, gastro-enteritis and peritonitis, 6; cyanosis and atelectasis, 7; premature births, 8; suicides, 4; while the deaths from cerebro-spinal meningitis were the same in both weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 147 were in institutions, 478 in tenement-houses, 148 in houses containing three families or less, 12 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 141 on the first, 213 on the second, 140 on the third, 97 on the fourth, 37 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 0 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 17 non-resident; 116 were stated to be single, 237 married, 84 widowed, and the condition of 362 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 799; still-births, 65; bodies in transitu, 11; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 104 were under certificates received from the Coroners; 792 births, 226 marriages, 65 still-births, 799 deaths; 11 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 149 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 12 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 95 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 10, 1888, was 23.7 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.968; the mean humidity was 86, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,916, and the total amount of rain-fall was .01 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 757 deaths and still-births, or 87.62 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 26; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 287; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 105; Greenwood (undenominational), 47; Lutheran (undenominational), 126; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 45; Woodlawn (undenominational), 21; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 19; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Macphelah, L. The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken for that purpose.

All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overflowing the sidewalk or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and alleys, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT

in compliance with the provisions of chapter 550, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 362 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rates:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rates have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rates, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the consolidation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalty will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rates of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be collected of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN

made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by wilful

waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States jurors are not liable.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, or to interfere directly or indirectly in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
