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APPROVED PAPERS.

Approved Papers for the week ending October 15, 1887.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to James E. Fitzgerald to flag the sidewalk, full width, in front of his premises, Nos. 425 and 427 East Sixty-fifth street, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 4, 1887.
Approved by the Mayor, October 11, 1887.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Mount Carmel Church to construct a vault under the sidewalk on north side of One Hundred and Fifteenth street, commencing at a point about one hundred and ninety-two feet west of Pleasant avenue and running west about thirty feet, without payment of the usual fee, the work to be done at the expense of the Church, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Approved by the Mayor, October 11, 1887.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Henry Debert to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of his premises in One Hundred and Twenty-second street, between Eighth and St. Nicholas avenues, the work to be done and water supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 4, 1887.
Approved by the Mayor, October 11, 1887.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to William C. Schemmerhorn to pave the carriage-way of Sixty-seventh street, from Second avenue to Avenue A, with trap-block pavement, and that crosswalks of three courses of blue stone be laid at the intersecting and terminating avenues, where not already done, the work done at his own expense, under the direction and supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works.

This Board has learned with sorrow of the decease of Alderman James J. Corcoran, the representative in this Board of the people of the Fifteenth Assembly District.

Our deceased associate was for the second time the representative of the Fifteenth Assembly District in this Common Council. He was deservedly very popular with his constituents, as he possessed, in a marked degree, those many traits of character that invariably attract and attach all who came within the influence of his personality. He was kind and courteous in his demeanor, genial and confiding in his disposition, firm and unyielding in his convictions, and disinterested in his friendships. His death is a loss to the public; a cause of sorrow to his friends; a calamity to his family and relatives. He was a conscientious and painstaking representative, and an honest legislator, and it becomes the sad duty of the members of this Board, in view of these facts, to take such action as will testify our sorrow for his death and place on record our estimate of the loss this Board and the public have sustained by his death; be it therefore

Resolved, That the members of this Common Council deplore the death of Alderman James J. Corcoran, who represented the Fifteenth Assembly District in this Board, and hereby place on record this evidence of the esteem in which he was held by us, and our sense of his worth, both in his private and public relations.

Resolved, That, out of respect for the memory of Alderman James J. Corcoran, the Chamber of this Board, and the chair lately occupied by him, be draped in mourning for a period of thirty days; that the offices of the Corporation, except those specially by law required to be kept open, be closed on the day of the funeral ceremonies (Thursday, October 13, 1887); that the flags on the City Hall and the other public buildings be displayed at half-staff from sunrise until sunset on that day; that the members of the Board will attend his funeral in a body, and that a committee of six members of this Board, of whom the President shall be one, be appointed to perfect the above and make such other arrangements as may to them appear to be necessary.

Resolved, That, as an additional mark of respect for the memory of our lamented associate, this Board do now adjourn.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen unanimously by a rising vote, October 11, 1887, and Aldermen Diuver, Fitzgerald, Quinn, Dowling, Cowie, and Van Rensselaer appointed the Special Committee, the President being named in the resolution.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, October 5, 1887, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, and Fish.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of September 28 were read and approved. The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in vouchers Nos. 2094 to 2093, inclusive; and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction presented the following resolutions, approving of the plans for the construction of the "East Branch Reservoir," and recommending the adoption of the same: Whereas, The Commissioner of Public Works has heretofore prepared and submitted to this Commission plans for the construction of the "East Branch Reservoir," Masonry Dam, etc., in the town of South East, Putnam County, New York; and

Whereas, The said Commissioner of Public Works submitted to us on the 28th ultimo other and further plans for the construction of said reservoir; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the contract plans for the construction of the said East Branch Reservoir,

Masonry Dam, etc., in the town of South East, Putnam County, New York, and known as "Sheets Nos. 1 to 10," submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works on the 28th ultimo, be and the same are hereby approved and adopted as the plans according to which the said reservoir shall be constructed, subject to such changes or modifications as the Aqueduct Commissioners may from time to time deem necessary for the more efficient carrying out of the provisions of chapter 490, of the Laws of 1883, and the acts amendatory thereof; and that the said plans so adopted be filed in this office; and the Secretary is hereby directed to transmit a copy of the same to the Commissioner of Public Works, with a certificate of the adoption of the same endorsed thereon. Adopted.

The Committee also reported in favor of granting three months' leave of absence to George J. Green, Inspector of Masonry, without pay, from the 11th instant; and on motion of Commissioner Dowd such leave was granted.

President Spencer called the attention of the Commissioners to the fact that the communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, dated September 28, 1887, transmitting the plans for the construction of the "East Branch Reservoir," was addressed to the Committee on Construction instead of to the Aqueduct Commissioners; and on motion of Commissioner Barnes the Secretary was directed to have the minutes amended so that the said communication will appear as being addressed to the Aqueduct Commissioners.

President Spencer next called the attention of the Commissioners to the report of the Committee on Construction, having reference to the back pay of certain employees, and adopted at the last meeting, and on motion of Commissioner Barnes the said report, excepting that part of it which refers to the claim of the widow of George C. Glatt, which was heretofore allowed, was referred back to said committee for further examination and report.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 136 were in institutions, 390 in tenement-houses, 127 in houses containing three families or less, 11 in hotels and boarding-houses, 13 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 123 on the first, 186 on the second, 111 on the third, 68 on the fourth, 32 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 665 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 12 non-residents; 83 were stated to be single, 178 married, 80 widowed, and the condition of 336 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 677; still-births, 48; bodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 83 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 663 births, 244 marriages, 48 still-births, 677 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 131 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 14 of marriage, and 86 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 1, 1887, was 56.5 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.966; the mean humidity was 73, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 798, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.75 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 670 deaths and still-births, or 92.41 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 28; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 264; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 83; Greenwood (undenominational), 43; Lutheran (undenominational), 97; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 40; Woodlawn (undenominational), 29; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 3; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 13; Macpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 16.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending September 24, 1887, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 8; Second, 0; Third, 4; Fourth, 8; Fifth, 12; Sixth, 12; Seventh, 29; Eighth, 19; Ninth, 26; Tenth, 20; Eleventh, 16; Twelfth, 79; Thirteenth, 17; Fourteenth, 17; Fifteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 26; Seventeenth, 38; Eighteenth, 32; Nineteenth, 140; Twentieth, 33; Twenty-first, 45; Twenty-second, 84; Twenty-third, 15; Twenty-fourth, 2.

The actual mortality for the week ending September 24, 1887, was 692; this is 84 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 94.2 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.12 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,492,181.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Brooklyn was 22.64; Baltimore, 18.20; New Orleans, 24.63; Richmond, 23.92; Charleston, 44.09; Pittsburgh, 21.05. Monthly returns—Mobile, 19.20; Albany, 25.24; Syracuse, 17.54; Troy, N. Y., 24.37. Foreign cities—weekly returns—

Sir—There were 633 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 8, 1887, which is a decrease of 44, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and the same number as was reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending October 1, 1887, was 685, which is 90.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.86 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,493,026.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable the Department to protect against the use of water, and a wasteful waste of water is a waste of money, and is a health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water used.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water, or on account of such leakage as is caused by defective plumbing, or of waste of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

5th. Charges for extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
