Our deceased associate was for the second time the representative of the Fifteenth Assembly District in this Common Council. He was deservedly very popular with his constituents, as he possessed, in a marked degree, those manly traits of character that invariably attract and attach all who came within the influence of his personality. He was kind and courteous in his demeanor, genial and confiding in his disposition, firm and unyielding in his convictions, and disinterested in his friendships. His death is a loss to the public ; a cause of sorrow to his friends; a calamity to his family and relatives. He was a conscientious and painstaking representative, and an honest legislator, and it becomes the sad duty of the members of this Board, in view of these facts, to take such action as will testify our sorrow for his death and place on record our estimate of the loss this Board and the public have sustained by his death; he is therefore Resolved, That the members of this Common Council deplore the death of Alderman James J. Corcoran, who represented the Fifteenth Assembly District in this Board, and hereby place on record this evidence of the esteem in which he was held by us, and our sense of his worth, both in his private and public relations. AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, October 5, 1887, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Com-missioners Baldwin, Barnes, and Fish. Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works. The minutes of the stated meeting of September 28 were read and approved. The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in vouchers Nos. 2904 to 3002, inclusive; and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment. The Committee on Construction presented the following resolutions, approving of the plans for the construction of the "East Branch Reservoir," and recommending the adoption of the same : Whereas, The Commissioner of Public Works has heretofore prepared and submitted to this Commission plans for the construction of the "East Branch Reservoir," Masonry Dam, etc., in the town of South East, Putnam County, New York ; and Whereas, The said Commissioner of Public Works submitted to us on the 28th ultime other and further plans for the construction is slid reservoir; therefore, be it Resolved, That the contract plans for the construction of the said East Branch Reservoir,

Masonry Dam, etc., in the town of South East, Putnam County, New York, and known as " Sheets Nos. I to 10," submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works on the 38th ultimo, be and the same are hereby approved and adopted as the plans according to which the said reservoir shall be con-structed, subject to such changes or modifications as the Aqueduct Commissioners may from time to tume deem necessary for the more efficient carrying out of the provisions of chapter 400, of the Laws of 1853, and the acts amendatory thereof; and that the said plans so adopted be filed in this office; and the Secretary is hereby directed to transmit a copy of the same to the Commissioner of Public Works, with a certificate of the adoption of the same endorsed thereon. Aqueduct Commissioners, President Spencer next called the attention of the Commissioners to the report of the Committee on Construction, having reference to the back pay of certain employees, and adopted at the last meeting, and on motion of Commissioner Barnes the said report, excepting that part of it which refers to the claim of the widow of George C. The certificates of 661 births, 48 still-births, 244 marriages and 677 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 1, 1887. This shows a decrease of 79 births, 11 still-births and 16 deaths, and an increase of 46 mar-riages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was a decrease of 17 births and 13 marriages, and an increase of 52 deaths, and the same number of still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from dipthteria decreased 7; typhoid fever, 1; pureperal diseases, 1; erysipelas, 2; cerebto-spinal fever, 1; diartheeal diseases, 28; inanition, 1; rheu-matism and gout, 1; heart diseases, 6; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 12; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; gastnitis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; Brights disease and nephritis, 6; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; scarlatina, 2; croup, 4; whooping cough, 1; malarial fevers, 8; cancer, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 12; bronchits, 1; pneu-monia, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; convisions, 1; prenature and preternatural births, 4; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 2 and drowning, 5. The number of deaths from alcoholism and cyamosis and atelectasis was the same in the two successive weeks. Accommunication from Inspector William F. Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for lower ending October 1, 1857: There were 8,453 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police. There were 290 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police. There were 200 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 70 permits. There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 7 permits. There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 49 permits.

Deaths from the principal Zymolic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 136 were in institutions, 390 in tenement-houses, 127 in houses containing three families or less, 11 in hotels and boarding-houses. 13 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 123 on the first, 186 on the second, 111 on the third, 68 on the fourth, 32 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 656 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 12 non-residents; 18 were stated to be single, 178 married, 80 widowed, and the condition of 336 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 677; still-births, 48; bodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 53 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 663 births, 244 marriages, 48 still-births, 677 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 131 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 14 of marriage, and 86 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 1, 1887, was 56.5 degrees Fahr.; mean reading of the barometer was 29.966; the mean humidity was 73, saturation being 100; number of miles traveled by the wind was 798, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.75 i depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Obs atory, Central Park.

The disposition of 670 deaths and still-births, or 92.41 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries : Bayside (Jewish), 28 ; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 264 ; City pauper barial-ground (undenominational), 83 ; Greenwood (undenominational), 43 ; Lutheran (andenominational), 97 ; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20 ; Evergreen (undenominational), 49 ; Woodlawn (undenominational), 29 ; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 3 ; Union (Methodist Protes-tant), 4 ; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 13 ; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3 ; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7 ; Washington (undenominational), 16.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending September 24, 1887, was in the following Wards, viz. : First, 8; Second, 0; Third, 4; Fourth, 8; Fifth, 12; Sixth, 12; Seventh, 20; Elghth, 10; Ninth, 20; Tenth, 20; Eleventh, 16; Twelfth, 70; Thirteenth, 71; Fifteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 26; Seventheenth, 38; Eighteenth, 32; Nineteenth, 140; Twenty-first, 45; Twenty-second, 84; Twenty-third, 15; Twenty-fourth, 2.

The actual mortality for the week ending September 24, 1887, was 692; this is 84 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 94.2 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.12 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,492,181.
