A penalty of five dollars [85] is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department problisting the use of water through hose, or in any other wastefil manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for the supplying of the commission of the control of the control

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall is deemed to be included in the regular vents and shall is deemed to be included in the regular vents and shall work to the control of the property of the shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and limit upon such houses and bots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be me de against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of mater actually used as shown by said meters. The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half ceat, per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water, Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from trost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all weaster of scater.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, rathway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot ne permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left from any and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left from any hydrant freezes and become any gerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basius, water-closets, baths and urnals for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectior-cries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, coint-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the fancets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.
